Meanwhile, it was admitted that German armored columns were making rapid progress but the continuous French front had never been broken yet. A spokesman said that at first German tanks had outnumbered the French eight to one but the French had been proven so vastly superior that now they were outnumbered only three to one. In manpower France was similarly out-numbered but, in spite of this, the French were fighting back most obstinately with fierce counter-attacks which were costing the enemy enormously in casualties. If one-tenth of the editorial space which these journals have devoted to petty politics and clumsy calumny had been used in explanation of the good work every Canadian could do for his country-and the Allied cause-by buying War Savings Certificates, something really worth while would have gone down on the record—and the minds of fewer people would have been unnecessarily disturbed."
