France Will Never Give Up Fight

Resistance Will Be Kept Up Far Abroad If It Is Necessary

German Forces Still Driving on Capital and Reports Conflict as to How Defenders Are Holding Out

TOURS, June 13: (CP)—The French council of ministers reported tonight to have decided to continue French resistance "up to the end." The meeting of ministers was attended by Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax of Great Britain. A French spokesman stressed vital need for equipment after it was disclosed that Premier Paul Reynaud had appealed to the United States for all help short of an expeditionary force. Reynaud said: "We will fight before Paris. We will fight behind Paris. We will fight in the provinces. We will fight in North Africa. If necessary, we will fight in our North American possessions."

WASHINGTON AT GALWAY

United States Liner At Irish Port—Taking Americans Home From Europe

GALWAY, Ireland, June 13:—The United States liner Washington, with 1020 passengers on board, arrived here last night from Genoa and Bordeaux and will take aboard at this port. All are Americans fleeing home from war-torn Europe. The Washington will resume her voyage from here on Monday.

Large Defence Appropriation Approved

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 13:—The House of Representatives yesterday approved another defence appropriation of \$1,700,000,000 providing for the purchase of three thousand new airplanes, fifty-eight warships and an increase in army personnel. This brings the total for defence passed so far at this session to \$5,300,000,000.

War News

INTERN ITALIANS

OTTAWA—Minister of Justice Ernest Lapointe has ordered internment of all residents of Italian origin who may be considered, through their actions or utterances, a danger to the state or a hindrance to the prosecution of the war. Meantime the drive to safeguard Canada from subversive elements goes forward but the number of newly-arrested and those marked for internment remains secret. It is learned authoritatively that "several hundred" have been picked up since the entry of Italy into the war. In some places, notably in Ontario, the police raids netted not only aliens but guns and ammunition, literature and blackshirt uniforms.

HELPING MOTHER COUNTRY

OTTAWA—Hon. C. G. Power, acting minister of defence, told the House of Commons today that all available rifles and ammunition in Canada had been placed at the disposal of Great Britain by request of the mother country.

TURKEY WITH BRITAIN

ISTANBUL—Turkey reaffirmed its mutual assistance pacts with Great Britain and France today and dismissed as worthless Premier Benito Mussolini's offer to respect her neutrality.

BOULOGNE BOMBED

LONDON—The fleet air arm bombed Boulogne Harbor yesterday, destroying one motor torpedo boat. The announcement said that planes had also bombed German supply ships near Bergen, Norway, and runways and barracks at Vaerles airdrome, also in Norway.

SECRET SESSION

LONDON—A secret session of the House of Commons on home defence will be held next Thursday, Clement Richard Attlee, Lord Privy Seal, announced today.

GERMANS AFFIRM LOYALTY

Meeting Held Last Evening In Police Office By Men Of German Birth Or Extraction

Last night the German residents of the city gathered at the office of the city police department and signed a pledge of loyalty and support to Canada and the Empire. All those present had already taken the oath of allegiance when they became naturalized citizens but, owing to the present state of public opinion, they had been advised to reaffirm their convictions. Present at the gathering were Inspector C. G. Barber, provincial police, Sergeant C. C. Jacklin, Rev. (Capt.) R. C. H. Durnford, chaplain to the forces, W. M. Watts, president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, A. S. Nickerson, president of the Junior Chamber, Rev. E. E. Brandt, Ministerial Association, J. S. Wilson, representing the Canadian Legion, W. J. Raymond and H. F. Pullen, representing the press.

Inspector Barber explained the purpose of the gathering and urged those present to carry on quietly without giving occasion for suspicion. He asked how many had firearms in their homes. Two had guns used for hunting and, at the suggestion of Mr. Barber, they said they would turn them in. All declared orally and by their signatures that they subscribed to the declaration of loyalty.

A number of the Germans spoke, explaining the difficulty of their position. One, who was born in Canada of German parents, resented the idea that he should be subjected to being called names and refused work. It was explained that the present condition of the public mind made it desirable to put up with a great many things. There was a time in Canada when Englishmen were not well treated.

The text of the document in addition to the declaration of loyalty follows:

"It is our honest desire to convey to you an outline of our attitude in regard to the present situation.

"No doubt you will have heard the numerous rumors and whisperings which have gained such prominence during the past with reference to alleged subversive activities of the small German-Canadian colony in Prince Rupert. These rumors have grown to such an alarming extent that we feel it necessary to take some action in order to convince the general public to the greatest possible extent as to our honesty and integrity and that the numerous

MAY MOVE TO CANADA

British Government Considers Plans For Transfer Of School Children

LONDON, June 13:—Plans are still being considered by the Government for the removal of many British school children from England to Canada.

accusations and allegations which have been brought against us are unfounded and untrue.

"We would like to state, therefore, that everyone of us has made an honest effort to be a good Canadian citizen, that we respect the law and constitution of Canada in every respect. Some of us are born in this country. Most of us are naturalized. All of us have lived in Canada for a great number of years.

"Canada is our adopted home land and we have learned to love the country and respect its people.

"We have found here economic security as well as spiritual freedom and are grateful for what Canada and its people have been able to offer and grant us.

"While, during the present crisis, we are fully aware of the circumstances in which we unfortunately find ourselves and while at times we feel that injustice is done by irresponsible elements we fully honor and respect the feelings of the people.

"We are indeed fortunate to still find sufficient numbers of friends and sympathizers and we are grateful for their assistance during the past as well as the fairness of the individual authorities mostly concerned with our cause.

"We appeal to your sense of fairness and British Justice to assist us to continue with our normal lives as well as the opportunity to gain our livelihood in your midst by giving the contents of this letter as well as our attached Declaration of Loyalty all possible publicity.

"You may rest assured that, as far as we are concerned, we shall do everything in our power to do our share and carry our burden as well as yourselves.

"We emphatically denounce the Hitler-Mussolini policies."

(The last paragraph was not in the original draft of the letter but was added after its omission had been noted.—Ed.)

SKIRMISH IN AFRICA

British And Italian Forces Engaged—Air Force Active

CAIRO, June 13: (CP)—A skirmish between British and Italian forces on the Egyptian-Italian-Libyan border last night in which the British took sixty-two Italian prisoners is reported by military authorities. The British suffered no casualties.

Roaring from Egyptian bases the Royal Air Force struck new blows today at Italian airbases in Libya, Ethiopia and Eritrea. Air Marshal Arthur Longmore said the air attacks are delivering a "crushing blow" on stoneholds from which Evvot might be threatened.

Yesterday Royal Air Force planes set an Italian warship and two submarines afire at Tobruk on the Libyan coast of the Mediterranean a short distance west of the Egyptian border. Two Italian planes were shot down, all the British returning safely.

RALSTON DEFENCE MINISTER OTTAWA—Hon. J. L. Ralston, present minister of finance, has accepted the portfolio of national defence, Prime Minister Mackenzie King told the House of Commons today.

DEMAND OF JAPANESE SHANGHAI—The Japanese controlled "central Chinese government" at Nanking published a declaration tonight demanding all troops, warships and other armed forces of European belligerents stationed in China be withdrawn.

BRITISH MOVING TROOPS, GUNS AND TANKS ACROSS CHANNEL TO SAVE FRENCH

Six Thousand Allied Forces Trapped and Captured on Disembarkation—Meantime, Nazi Drive on Paris Continues With Undiminished Violence

LONDON, June 13: (CP)—British troops, guns and tanks are again streaming across the English Channel to help France check the great German offensive towards Paris, informed sources report. Included among them are British and Polish forces which had been at Narvik and who recently returned from Norway. They are being rushed to the continent to strengthen the Allied resistance. The number of reinforcements starting for the French battlegrounds since yesterday after a meeting of the Supreme Allied War Council is said to be running into the thousands. South of the Seine fresh British troops, just arrived from the United Kingdom, are said to have taken their places in the lines.

BIG CITIES ARE RAIDED

Turin, Genoa and Milan In Northern Italy Are Attacked By Allied Bombers

ROME, June 13: (CP)—Fourteen were killed and thirty-nine were wounded in an Allied air raid on Turin yesterday, an official announcement said. Genoa and Milan, other populous cities, were also the subject of Allied air raids yesterday.

The British announcement yesterday was that only military objectives had been attacked. Italian authorities said they did not plan to take reprisals in the form of indiscriminate bombings.

One Italian authority announced that there had been Italian air raids on Toulon in southern France.

EGYPT IS ASSISTING

All Its Facilities Are Placed at Disposal of Great Britain for Use in War Against Italy

ALEXANDRIA, June 13: (CP)—Egypt placed all its communication systems, air and naval bases and ports at the disposal of Great Britain today and pledged its ally the "greatest possible assistance" in the war against Italy. Premier Pasha declared the nation would fulfil all obligations under the Anglo-Egyptian treaty of friendship but intended to refrain from any offensive action against Italy. A government source said that Egypt's present attitude was that of a "defensive state" and added that the country would declare war if Italy attacked Egyptian military or civilian objectives.

The Egyptian Chamber of Deputies yesterday approved a declaration severing diplomatic relations with Italy. Previously a dispatch from Cairo had said it was reported the Italian minister had delivered an ultimatum to Egypt.

NO BLOW BY ITALY

Some French Authorities Appear to be Mystified at II Duce Not Striking Yet

TOURS, France, June 13: (CP)—Surprise is expressed here that Italy's armies have not yet struck at France. Italian troops yesterday blew up a bridge at Vinti Mille on the French border in the Alps after completing mobilization of sixty to seventy divisions, indicating that between 900,000 and 1,000,000 Italians were massed on the south border of France. This is the only news of Italian military activity on land in that part of the war zones.

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EDITORIALS

PLAYING GERMAN GAME

"From the office of the Director of Public Information at Ottawa yesterday came the suggestion that 'every time a Canadian repeats gossip from the German radio broadcast he is marching with Hitler's 'Fifth Column' in his own country,' says the Victoria Times. On first thoughts, of course, this may appear a little far-fetched. But we are passing through times in which calm judgment is at a premium. And nothing suits the book of the Herr Doktor Goebbels better than something likely to create suspicion and doubt in the minds of the people of this and other parts of the British Empire.

"Every word that crosses the Atlantic from German radio stations, however, is mechanically recorded on wax cylinders. It is by comparing these records with the daily crop of rumors and gossip reaching its offices that the Department of Public Information is able immediately to determine the volume of this dangerous material which does or does not emanate from the product of the Goebbels imagination. For the most part it has been found that the Canadian rumor-monger and gossip has obtained his 'information' from some one who 'heard it from a chap who heard it.' The wider the dissemination of extravagant reports of incidents which never occurred the more marks Germany's propaganda minister gets from his Nazi chief.

"Suspicion or doubt in any form is all grist to the enemy's mill. The intensive, vicious and wholly unjustified campaign conducted by a few newspapers in a recent attempt to discredit the Canadian government furnishes excellent material for potential 'Fifth Columnists.' If one-tenth of the editorial space which these journals have devoted to petty politics and clumsy calumny had been used in explanation of the good work every Canadian could do for his country—and the Allied cause—by buying War Savings Certificates, something really worth while would have gone down on the record—and the minds of fewer people would have been unnecessarily disturbed."



Six halibut vessels sold catches totalling 144,000 pounds at Seattle yesterday as follows: Polaris, 40,000 pounds, Whiz, 10 1/2 ac and 9 1/2 ac; Nordby, 36,000 pounds, Washington, 10 1/2 ac and 9 1/2 ac; Recovery, 19,500 pounds, Sebastian, 9 1/2 ac and 9 1/4 ac; Flint, 17,000 pounds, San Juan 9 1/4 ac; Visit, 14,000 pounds, Ripley, 9 1/2 ac and 9 1/2 ac; Blanco, 17,000, Whiz, 9 1/2 ac and 9 1/4 ac.

The well known Seattle halibut schooners Vansee and Polaris have been chartered by the Chatham Straits cannery in Alaska to pack salmon this summer. The Vansee left Seattle for Chatham Straits this Tuesday and the Polaris will leave Friday. Both vessels will resume halibut fishing in the fall.

Reports are current again suggesting further amalgamations of coastal steamship services. Current again is the rumor that the steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George are to be acquired by the Canadian Pacific Railway. The suggestion now is that these vessels will go on the Vancouver-Victoria-Seattle run replacing the steamers Princess Elizabeth and Princess Joan which will be used for naval purposes. As far as can be learned, no such changes would be made until the coming fall.

On conclusion of the present voyage, the Prince John is to be withdrawn at Vancouver for the installation of a refrigerator plant, the Queen Charlotte Island service to be taken over by the Prince Charles.

I have been granted half fares on the railway to Prince George and on the stages between Prince George and Quesnel and Quesnel and Wells, you can imagine how surprised I was to learn that a large corporation like the Pacific Stages would not give me a soldier's rate when I inquired.

The full fare would have left me short and I was forced to wire for more money which did not arrive until the following evening. As a result of the delay I missed Friday night's train out of Prince George and arrived here, three days "A. W. O. L." for which I have been crimed. This however, is incidental—I merely wish to bring to the notice of the public the lack of consideration shown by the Pacific Stages in refusing to give the soldiers a rate.

I would hate to believe that their action is an example of the co-operation the army can expect from the public at large and corporations in particular.
