ARTILLERY EXCHANGES PARIS- German artillery in the Bitche area of the Western Front is reported to have drawn return fire from the French. The Germans were endeavouring to barrage the Allied supply lines but were unsuccessful. A German frontier raid east of the Moselle yesterday was repulsed completely. Severe cold weather still holds down the fighting along the Western Front, British reconnaissance planes penetrated deep into northwest Germany.

56,000 CHINESE KILLED

HONG KONG- Declaring that fifty thousand Chinese had been killed and 200,000 wounded in Kwangsi Province, the Japanese high command in South China suggested to Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek today that he seek peace under threat of further slaughter. The Chinese claim that there have been heavy Japanese casualties and that they too have been making progress at some points.

AGAINST UNITED STATES BERLIN- Obviously directed against the United States, it was officially announced today that neutral vessels calling at Allied ports, including the contraband control points, will be made subject to sinking. At present time only two United States passengers are in the transAtlantic service-the Manhattan and Washington-plying between New York and Genoa. The former vessel left Genoa Monday. Morning At Ottawa For Lord Tweedsmuir

OTTAWA, Feb. 14:-The simple funeral service of the Presbyterian Church was read today over i within old St. Andrews Church by Rev. Alexander Ferguson. The flag-draped casket containing the body left the Senate chamber early in the afternoon on the shoulders of eight bearers to be taken under military escort to the church only a few blocks away.

Within the church were Sir Lyman Duff, chief justice of Canada and acting governor general, Prime Minister King and Conservative leader Manion, members of the cabinet, foreign representatives and others in high positions. Lady Tweedsmuir and Prime Minister King were among the last to view the body as it lay in state in the Senate chamber. The son, Alistair, stood guard at the bier as officer of the Princess Louise Dragoon Guards.

At the conclusion of the service the body was drawn to the railway station on a gun carriage pulled by a naval detachment. In Montreal it will be cremated and the ashes sent to the Old Country.

### FINNS ARE STILL MAKING FINE DEFENCE ALTHOUGH WEAKENING SIGNS SHOWN British Tanker Among Today's Awards Made To Vancouver And Victims—Unidentified Vessel Victoria Firms And Possibly To

Finally Admit That Russians Have Broken Into Mannerheim Although at Cost of Enormous Casualties-Holding Out Elsewhere

BRITAIN JOINS FINLAND

LONDON, February 14: (CP)—Great Britain today gave her citizens formal permission to volunteer to fight for Finland against Russia. Ivan Maisky, Russian ambassador, was in the diplomatic gallery as Osbert Peake, Under Secretary for Home Affairs, announced the decision. The government action gives official sanction to enlistment of British volunteers for the Finnish forces which has been under way on considerable scale for some time. Thus an exception is made in the law which makes it actually illegal for Britons to join against a nation against which war has not been formally declared.

# MOVES OUT

Bulkley Valley Farmers Did Well On Timothy This Year

SMITHERS, Feb. 14.— The timothy seed crop of the Bulkley Valley has been pretty well moved jout and only a small amount now awaits shipment although some threshing is still going on in isolated spots. The crop was a very large one, a number of car loads of seed having gone out from both the co-operative plant in Telkwa and the McNeil seed cleaning plant in Smithers.

The price started in at about 51/2c per pound for the seed with later sales at around 7c a pound. These prices compare favorably with prices received during the past few years as the price has been as low as 3c in some years. The farmers of the valley who had good crops this year will do very well. Several farmers had over 50 tons of seed while many others had from 10 to 20 tons.


