## LOCAL MEN ARE CHARGED WITH HIGH TREASON

### DREADNOUGHTS FOR CANADA

Government Newspaper Declares That Two Super-Dreadnoughts Will Be Immediately Ordered, But Report Is Not Credited.

(Special to Daily News.)  
Montreal, April 3.—The government organ in Quebec yesterday announced that Canada will order two super-dreadnoughts while the question of the complete character of the Dominion navy is being discussed by the Canadian Minister of Marine and the British Admiralty. This is regarded in political circles here as an effort to test the opinion in Quebec, which has been against any Canadian contribution to the British navy or the building of ships of her own.

### BUDGET IS INTRODUCED

British Chancellor Reports a Nest-Egg of Thirty-Two Millions Left Over and Rosy View of Trade Prospects.

(Special to Daily News.)  
London, April 3.—The British budget for 1912-13 was introduced in the House of Commons last night by Lloyd George. The Chancellor is in the fortunate position of having a nest-egg of \$32,750,000 remaining from last year. This, he said, was largest realized on record. There will be no reduction in taxation this year and no new ones imposed. The revenue for the coming year he estimated at \$935,945,000, leaving a surplus of \$1,520,000. He took a rosy view of trade prospects.

### STRIKE BALLOT IS FINISHED

Undoubtedly a Large Majority Against Resumption of Work, but Number Returning to Work Is Steadily Increasing.

London, April 3.—The balloting of the striking miners on the question of terminating the strike is finished, but the official returns will not be available until this afternoon. Apparently there will be a large majority against the resumption of work. More than 50,000 miners, however, have already returned to work and if the decision is against restarting it is certain that thousands of men who are desirous of working will disregard it.

### PRINCE RUPERT POWER BOAT

Fine Photograph of the Handsome Power Boat Ka Yex Appears in Montreal Illustrated Weekly this Month.

Ranking amongst a group of Canada's crackerjack power boats, the handsome launch Ka Yex figures in pictorial form on the front page of the Montreal Standard for March 23rd. It is stated in the letter-press that the Ka Yex belongs to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co., but this is not now so, as the latest intelligence regarding the boat are to the effect that she has been purchased by the Dominion Government authorities for use as a fisheries cruiser. The Ka Yex formerly belonged to Mr. J. T. Kugler, who purchased her from the G.T.P.

## ARE CHARGED WITH TREASON BY THE CONSERVATIVE CLUB

William Barratt Clayton, H. H. and Ed. Clarke All Three Arraigned Last Night Before President J. F. McDonald in High Tribunal---Accusers Fail to Come Forward

In the inner sanctuary of the Conservative Club last night there was conducted with dread solemnity the trial of three Conservatives charged with the heinous crime of treason. The word had gone round in awed whispers that the hapless three had betrayed the secrets of the inner temple of their sect, and drawn aside the thick veil which hides the mysterious occult workings of Conservatism, letting the searching light of day into the dim recesses of the Altar Chamber, and revealing the most intimate manipulations of the wondrous machine to the gaze of an unworthy. It was indeed an awful crime with which the devoted three were charged.

Shackled together metaphorically, in the chains of resentful Conservative compulsion, the wretched wights were dragged before the Terrible Tribunal. High above the Altar, under the very frown of the Idol itself, sat enthroned on the Awful Throne of Condemnatory Conservatism, the massive form of the Immeasurable—President, J. F. McDonald, of the Club, prepared to wreak to the very bitter end the most vengeful will of Betray-

ed Conservatism upon the miserable victims.

There trembling in their shoes facing the frown of the Idol and the beetling brows of the Immeasurable with his grim attendant myrmidons covered the reckless trio while the Terrible Charge was read to them.

William Barratt Clayton, Harry H. Clarke, and Edward Clarke you are here charged with traitorously scheming against the Secret Principles of Conservatism, and wilfully and with intent betraying to the non-elect amongst the Electors, the things that ought to be kept dark in the interests of The Idol and those who serve him with secret rites as becomes the secretive style of The Idol's awful sway. What have you to say to the charge which is preferred against you or what plea have you to offer that judgement may not now be done upon you as has been done upon others who were traitors in the past?

And the trio making answer as one man, trembling under the immense frown of the Immeasurable as he thundered forth the dread charge, raised their voices and denied the accusation. And

William Barratt Clayton with eloquence as one heavenborn denied the charge in whole and in part, and demanded with dignity that his accusers be brought forth that he might answer them there and then.

From the high throne before the altar spoke in sonorous accents the Immeasurable—The President. "Wretched wight!" he thundered, "Dost deny then the charge made against thee? What of the pestiferous pamphlet titled so abhorrently to the doctrines of Conservatism, 'Truth?' Were you not art and part author of that traitorous sheet? Were not these with you your assistants in the treason?"

Then the three were silent, while chosen ones of Conservatism whispered that they must indeed be traitors if they had been even remotely associated with any sort of Truth.

Then from the throne the Immeasurable summoned the accusers of the three to come forward with their testimony, while the trio stood their ground

### OLD DAWSON MAN DEAD

Captain French, one of the Pioneers of the Yukon, and a General Favorite, Dies Suddenly in Vancouver Hospital.

All the old timers of Dawson, from the early times up to three years ago, knew well and thoroughly enjoyed the company of the always breezy Captain W. S. French. He had seen service in the Royal Navy, where he secured his title, and had all the charm of a cultured, travelled gentleman. Coming in with a lot of Englishmen with means, the captain went to mining and for a time prospered, but later suffered the misfortune that comes to so many in placer mining.

Three years ago he transferred his always cheery presence to Vancouver and went into the real estate business. He had already a large acquaintance there, was a social feature in club and prospered. A few days ago he was taken sick and requested to be moved to the General Hospital. There he soon afterwards passed away.

Captain French was of an old Irish family, was a Freemason, and sixty-five years of age.

### WILL LECTURE THIS EVENING

Father Donnelly, the Famous Missionary Priest of London, England, Begins Series of Social Lectures Tonight.

Rev. Father Donnelly of London, England, begins his series of lectures tonight in the Roman Catholic Church. He is what is known as a missionary priest, but has become famous for his lectures on Catholic doctrine to non-Catholics. These lectures are not controversial but expository simply, and the people of Prince Rupert, of whatever religious denomination, will find the keenest intellectual enjoyment in his discourses.

The Father possesses a charming personality, a well modulated voice and a breezy wit. He said this morning during a chat: "Some people have the idea that I am a papal emissary in disguise, and I have to laugh at them." His lecture tonight will be but a preliminary outline of the series, one of which he will deliver every evening during the two weeks of his stay. They are to be social and non-Catholic in a sense, and he likes to be called upon to reply to the questions raised by his audiences.

He came to Canada and began his present course of lectures last October, since which time he has lectured 309 times, in all the large cities from Montreal to Victoria, and now at Prince Rupert, "which is bound to become the greatest of them all," he laughingly said this morning. He goes from here to Calgary for two weeks.

### STEAMER SALVOR SENT TO AID CHELOHSIN

Passengers Came in on Yesterday Afternoon's Train---Never Had to Get Out Lifeboats---Chelohsin Reached North Pacific Cannery Dock Under Her Own Steam

Victoria, April 3.—The steamer Salvor left yesterday afternoon to go to the assistance of the stranded steamer Chelohsin, the new coaster of the Union Steamship Company, which struck a rock in the Skeena River and is badly damaged, the engine room

being full of water. The steamer has been beached at the North Pacific cannery.

One of the passengers of the Chelohsin, who came in on the train yesterday, says the passengers did not have to take to the boats; that soon after the

steamer struck she slid off the reef and under her own steam reached the North Pacific dock and there tied up. The passengers walked ashore there. There was never any great amount of scare and the shore was only about forty yards away from where the vessel struck.

**HENRI BOURASSA OUT OF QUEBEC POLITICS.**

We are in receipt of a polite request from Henri Bourassa's newspaper, Le Devoir, to print a three column article by Monsieur Bourassa upon "The Annexation of Ungava to Quebec and Minority Rights." Bourassa as a national character is always interesting and no doubt he puts up a very clever argument in support of his contention as to the constitutional rights of the minority, but Ungava is a trifle too remote to inflict three columns upon our readers on a subject which has no direct bearing upon the future of this city. By dropping a line to the office of Le Devoir, Montreal, copies of the article can be obtained both in French and English.

Telegraphic despatches advise us that Monsieur Bourassa is definitely out of provincial politics, and he has failed to confirm the rumor that he intends to present himself as a candidate for the Dominion. He is going on a "mission" through Canada and as far as Prince Rupert, but the particular object of this mission we shall probably be in the dark about until he starts upon it in the fall. This is what he himself says, which gives no hint of any specific character:

"I have been sitting in the scum of provincial politics for fifteen years and I am going to Europe to cleanse my mind and rejuvenate myself. After that I must give some of my helpers on Le Devoir a holiday. Then I will probably make a tour through the west. I don't want to think of politics for at least two years."

**TABLOIDS ANENT THE M'BRIDE VICTORY.**

The brave campaign made by the Liberal party all over the province and the causes that led to so disastrous a defeat are cleverly summed up in an editorial of the Vancouver Sun, from which we give a few extracts herewith:

"Everything was on the side of the government save a meritorious record as administrators, and their conduct of provincial affairs they resolutely refused to discuss."

"The invincible allies which they possessed in the campaign were the general prosperity of the province, which is in no sense due to them; a powerful and perfectly working political organization; an unlimited supply of money; a popular program of railway construction, and the active support of all who have personally benefitted by the alienation of the public domain and by direct or indirect gifts from the government."

"They were aided by the briefness of the time allowed the Liberals to prepare for the contest, by unjust voters' lists which in themselves gave them an immense advantage."

"The Liberal party accepts defeat uncomplainingly. The regret they feel is simply that the province should be placed so entirely at the mercy of men whom they honestly believe to be unworthy of public confidence and who they are convinced will take advantage to the utmost of the opportunities they will possess of despoiling the people during the next four years."

"The old saying anent giving folk plenty of rope we predict will apply to the provincial government during the next term of office."

**BABY'S BRAIN IN OLD HEAD**

Most Wonderful Operation Involving Transplanting of Brain Matter in the Whole History of Modern Surgery.

New York, March 30.—Surgeons of Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, were able to pronounce today with practical certainty the recovery of William Buckner, a Cincinnati capitalist, who has had part of an infant's brain transplanted to his own. The house surgeon of the famous Baltimore hospital made this statement over the long distance telephone today.

It is the first operation of the sort in the history of surgery, and the medical and psychological world is eagerly watching results. Up to the present time Mr. Buckner's mind appears to be as clear and virile as it was before he was stricken.

The infant whose brain was used to replace a frayed portion of Mr. Buckner's brain died of inanition almost immediately after birth. The patient's brain had to be entirely removed from the skull before transplanting was accomplished.

**Suffragettes Defiant**

London, March 30.—Twelve of the thirteen suffragettes tried for participating in window smashing were given jail sentences. The thirteenth was let off. The judge appealed to the women to be bound over to keep the peace, but to no avail.

"Not even for the sake of your children?" he pleaded with one.

"No, it is for them that I am doing this," she replied.

**New French Ring Rules.**

The new rules of the French Boxing Federation bar boxers under 21 years of age, and this provision shuts out George Charpentier, who is only 18 years old, but who has won successively the bantam, feather, light and welterweight championships of his country, and who recently disposed of the English middleweight champion, Jim Sullivan.

**B.C. LANDS NOT RESTORED**

Federal Government too Busy to Take Up Matter

Ottawa, March 30.—Members from British Columbia have been pressing on the Dominion Government the necessity of restoring to British Columbia 3,000,000 acres of land in the Cassiar district and are confident that the lands will be restored to the province, but it is not likely any action will be taken this session owing to the near approach of prorogation.

It is understood that the Federal ministers are favorable to the transfer, but pressure of business has prevented it being taken up yet. It will, however, be considered in recess and be probably a matter for negotiations between the two governments.

# In the World of Sport

## A FAMOUS HORSEMAN

James Newsome Was the Grand Old Man of the Circus World

Mr. James Newsome, the grand old man of the circus world, died at Cleethorpes, England, in his 87th year, and was said to be England's oldest equestrian and horsebreaker.

Mr. Newsome was the descendant of a long line of brilliant riders, indeed he claimed to be one of the family of Temple Newsome, near London, though it was comparatively late in life before he became aware of this.

He was born at Newcastle, and at 12 years of age was apprenticed to Mr. William Batley at Astley's, where he quickly became one of the cleverest as well as one of the most daring riders in the Batley retinue.

At the age of 2 he fell in love with Miss Hains, the principal dancer at Astley's, and the union formed by their marriage only terminated about six years ago, when Mme. Newsome died at the age of 79.

The fame of the happily mated couple noised abroad, and managers and proprietors came over from Paris and elsewhere to see the two stars.

A three years' engagement at the Cirque du Champ Elysee in Paris followed, and so successful did their performance prove that their contract was renewed for another three years.

A tour through France, Holland, and Germany, followed the Paris engagement.

Mr. Newsome returned to England about 1852 and launched out on his own behalf, opening his first circus at Vauxhall Gardens.

The following winter he had a spell at Drury Lane, and then with two others commenced to tour the country.

He soon became sole proprietor, and for 40 years Newsome's Circus was known throughout Great Britain.

Mr. Newsome paid one seater in those days \$600 a fortnight, and for one scene in "Dick Whittington" he paid \$25,000.

At the cost of \$40,000, but in consequence of some litigation over this Mr. Newsome found himself a ruined man, and, though now getting old, he went back to the ring.

He by no means escaped scathless during his long list of brilliant achievements. He had one leg broken, a shoulder dislocated, and several ribs fractured, while he has been carried out of the ring as a dead man on several occasions.

But his marvelous vitality always carried him through.

One of his most cherished possessions was the letter containing a glowing tribute from the late King Edward, then Prince of Wales, who expressed amazement that Mr. Newsome could break a very vicious horse without resorting to the slightest ill-usage.

Horse Review Says the "Thoroughbred Brand is Disappearing"

The following from the "Horse Review" will be read with a good deal of interest by horsemen who follow the fortunes of the thoroughbred.

Says the "Review": Thoroughbred racing in America, worthy of the name, is now restricted exclusively to the state of Kentucky, where meetings are few and purses and stakes of minor value.

There are some "merry-go-rounds" still running in out-of-the-way places, such as Jamestown, Va., etc., but they are hanging on by a mere thread, which at any moment is apt to be severed.

There is the iniquitous "sink" at Juarez, Mexico, just across the border from El Paso, Tex., but word comes that "the game" there is bound to die a natural death and cannot last indefinitely.

The recent attempt to establish so-called "racing" upon a large scale in the City of Mexico, in which project a syndicate of American gamblers was interested, has proved a failure.

The similar project now under way at Havana is considered by those "in the know" sure to meet the same fate. In other words, "Last Chance Junction" is rapidly being reached.

For the first year or so the old machine has been packed away in a dismantled condition, but Mr. Cody has now renovated it and installed a new motor, an Austro-Daimler, of well over 100 horse-power.

The engine appears to be more in keeping with the huge framework, and in yesterday's trial, although only half let out, it gave a pace that left the Army Aircraft Factory's latest production hopelessly in the rear.

Mr. Cody calculates that the extra power will enable him to carry five passengers and enough petrol for a four hour's flight. He has already made the necessary arrangements to tend to develop in the bottom plane a platform for the mounting of a machine gun that will command everything in front of and below the biplane.

GREAT TURF WINNER

The Splendid Record of the Dead Horse Islinglass

The death of Islinglass removes the greatest winner in the history of the turf in this country. A son of Isomy and Deadlock, he was 22 years old and owned by the late Mr. Henry MacAlmont. In twelve starts he won eleven races, and was only beaten once, when he was giving Raeburn ten pounds in the Lancashire Plate.

His successes included the Two Thousand, Derby and St. Leger, and his earnings amounted to the record sum of \$280,675. In the stud his fee was \$1,000, and his earnings since his retirement from racing reached another large fortune. Donovan, Rock Sand, Bayard, Sceptre, La Fleche and Flying Fox were in that order the next largest winners on the English turf, and all of them surpassed the \$185,500 won by Domino, the leader among American racehorses.

"DEI GRATIA" ON COINS.

The words "Dei Gratia," which were omitted from Canadian silver coins struck last year, are to be reinstated according to a new proclamation, by order in Council. The coins hereafter minted will bear above the effigy of His Majesty King George, the inscription, "Georgius V, Dei Gra, Rex et Imp. Ind."

## POOLROOMS MAY FORFEIT LICENSE "ON SUSPICION"

CHARACTERISTIC ATTITUDE OF THE MAYOR IN REGARD TO "HEARSAY" ACCUSATIONS CAME OUT IN DISCUSSION OF THE POOLROOM EYLAW MONDAY NIGHT.

During the discussion in committee of the whole Monday night of the poolroom bylaw there came up a marked difference of opinion between the Mayor and Alderman Montgomery over the Mayor's contention that a clause should be included in the bylaw providing for the canceling of any poolroom license if the premises were suspected (presumably with reasonable grounds) of being used for any gambling games. The word "suspected" did not suit Alderman Montgomery. He held the principle that British law provides that a man is innocent until he is proved guilty, therefore no board could cancel any license merely "on suspicion" of misconduct.

The Mayor maintained his characteristic ground, backed up by Alderman Bullock-Webster,

who endeavored to show Alderman Montgomery that in spite of the British law a man may be guilty and appear guilty without possible proof of the fact.

After a little further discussion Alderman Montgomery seemed ready to allow the insertion of a clause to the effect suggested provided the authority for canceling a license rested with the whole council.

But here Alderman Morrissey took a much more determined stand against the clause on exactly the same ground as Alderman Montgomery had first adopted. He pressed his attitude vigorously in a brief speech, but as he sat down the mayor as member of committee moved that the clause be inserted. On a show of hands the motion was declared carried by Chairman Alderman Dybhavn.
