## Twenty German Planes Are Downed

### Great Krupp Plant Is Mass Of Flames

### Essen Munitions Plant Reported Devastated; British Fliers' Attack

Thousands of Fire Bombs and Tons of Explosives Dropped by Royal Air Force on This and Other Objectives in Reich

LONDON, November 8: (CP)—The great Krupp armaments works at Essen, Germany, was left "one huge sheet of fire" in an overnight attack by the Royal Air Force, the Air Ministry announced today. Thousands of fire bombs and uncounted tons of explosives were loosed on the plants for more than four hours. Returning pilots said they could see the resulting glow sixty miles away.

Official sources reported that the Royal Air Force carried out a smashing attack on various German-held objectives during the night in addition to the exceedingly heavy attack on the Krupp works. Oil plants in Germany, invasion ports, airdromes and other targets were bombed as well.

### It's No Thrill On Home Fronts

But British Women Doing Grand Job With Ration Problems and So On

SOUTHPORT, Eng., Nov. 8: (CP)—"Women on the home front are doing a grand job in the face of difficulties," according to Mrs. Barbara Ayrton Gould, addressing the National Conference of Labor Women.

"There is no excitement staying at home wrestling with the problems of rationing," she said. "There is no thrill, but all the time these women are as vital in winning the war as the men who go out and destroy Nazis in the air. If the home front were to crack everything else would crack."

### John Queen Is Re-Elected

WINNIPEG, Nov. 8: (CP)—John Queen was re-elected mayor of Winnipeg by acclamation today when no opponent was nominated. November 22 will be election day and there are nineteen candidates for ten seats on the city council with fifteen for ten school board seats.

### POPE IS ALARMED

ROME—Alarmed over the threat of the British Under Secretary of Foreign Affairs that the Royal Air Force planned to bomb Rome, the Pope is reported to be seeking further assurance from Great Britain that the Vatican will be spared.

### CONTINGENT FROM YUKON OFF TO WAR

Party Here Yesterday Enroute To Vancouver To Enlist—Norwegian Out To Get Hitler

"Yes, I want to get overseas as far and as fast as I can. I want to get even with the man (and the description was not as complimentary as that) who killed my sister and her four year old baby girl." So said Walter Erickson, one of a party of eleven Dawson men who were in Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon aboard the steamer Princess Norah enroute to Vancouver to enlist in the Canadian Active Service Force. One was Norwegian born, one Swedish, one French and the rest Canadian born—one in Dawson.

Mr. Erickson told how he had learned indirectly of the fate that had befallen his sister and her child. Living outside of Oslo, Norway, in a small town, they had seen two transport planes land and ran out to the field. They turned out to be Germans who immediately turned machine guns on the people and mowed them down. "They're a bunch of rotten murderers. Why that's not war," declared Erickson who said that his mother and father and sisters and brothers also lived in Norway but he had heard nothing from them since the invasion of Norway.

The party was headed by Tommy Rogers, a Welshman and veteran of the last war. Burns McDonald and Adolf Watelet, the latter a Frenchman, also served in the last war.

The others were all younger men, all having been in the employ of the Yukon Consolidated Mining Co., principal gold mining concern of the Yukon. All are anxious to get into the war without delay. All being friends, they hope to be able to train and serve together. They expect to be met at Vancouver and taken in charge by the military authorities there. Each wears a copper-bronze maple leaf presented by the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, and embossed with a crown and the words "Dawson Y. T. Canada."

**AI Physically**

Before leaving Dawson all underwent military medical examination and were pronounced in Category A. Enlistments could not be formal at Dawson because, had they actually been enlisted, it would have been a breach of neutrality for them to pass through Alaska, as they had to, in travelling out of the Yukon to British Columbia. Therefore, they had to pay their own way.

They are the second lot of Dawson men who have left in groups to enlist. Another party will be coming out within the next couple of weeks. This party will reach Vancouver Saturday morning.

The party, a likely and well set up looking lot ranging in age from 21 to 44, comprised the following: Thomas Rogers, miner, aged 42, born at Ynysyrol, Wales. Gustave Besner, miner, 33, born at Dawson. Henry Herschfield, carpenter, 26, born at Steinbeck, Manitoba. Leonard Wilson, 22, caterpillar and truck mechanic, born at Round Hill, Alberta. Burn McDonald, 41, miner, born at Sydney Mines, Nova Scotia. Walter Erickson, 39, painter, born at Fredericstad, Norway. Otto Nordling, 31, clerk, born at Lurja, Sweden. James Sinclair, 26, carpenter, Toronto. Norman Hartnell, 21, truck driver. (Continued on Page Four)

Voyageur of "Ark of Yukon," Now Settled Near Juneau, to Visit Philadelphia

Paul Satko, Richmond, Virginia, automobile mechanic, who this year picked up his wife and eight children, crossed the continent in a motorized covered wagon and then sailed from Seattle to Juneau in the crude home-made boat Ark of Juneau, was back in Prince Rupert again Thursday afternoon. Having settled his wife and the children, including one which was born since arrival in Alaska, Satko said that he was on his way to Philadelphia to visit with relatives. Undoubtedly, he will also be able to capitalize on the adventures of the trip this year which won him so much publicity. Satko left the steamer Princess Norah at Prince Rupert and will proceed East by rail from here Friday evening.

"The family is doing fine," said Satko. They are living on land at Eagle River, some twenty miles north of Juneau. They are quite happy in their new home and have no doubt they will enjoy prosperity there. It was because things weren't going so well in his line before leaving Richmond that they struck out for Alaska.

Satko does not know definitely how long he will be in the East. It may be two weeks and it may be six.

### Britain Got Best Of Air Fighting During Heavy German Raids

Royal Air Force Lost Four Machines—Nazis Aiming at British Industry, Transport and Morale

LONDON, November 8: (CP)—German war planes appeared early over London tonight after scattered daylight raids on Great Britain. The Air Ministry said that twenty enemy planes had been destroyed today as against four British, two of whose pilots were saved. One British squadron alone shot down fifteen German dive bombers which were attacking shipping.

### CONVOY IS DESTROYED

Big German Victory on North Atlantic is Claimed by Berlin

BERLIN, Nov. 8: (CP)—The German high command claimed today that surface warships of the German navy operating in the Atlantic "have completely destroyed a British convoy on the North Atlantic route," sinking 86,500 tons of shipping.

### DETAILS OF BIG PARADE

As previously intimated, the parade and service are expected to be the most impressive and spectacular ever held in Prince Rupert which is now a full military centre. ISTANBUL—Turkey is rounding up spies. One hundred Italians and Bulgarians are reported to have been arrested.

SYDNEY, Australia, November 8 (C.P.)—The American yacht South-Seas will be used as a hotel at Noumea, New Caledonia, for Pan American Airways, because of the "indefinite political situation" in the French island.

### TWO DROWN IN SEINER

Double Fatality Yesterday in Wreck of Fishing Boat in Alberni Canal

PORT ALBERNI, Nov. 8: (CP)—George Stilianovich of Vancouver was drowned and Augustine Carr, also of Vancouver, is missing and believed drowned following the wreck of the 62-foot seiner Liberty which drove aground in a fifty-mile gale on a reef yesterday in Alberni Canal 32 miles southwest of here. Five others on board were rescued.

**FIRE AT TERRACE**  
 TERRACE—Fire destroyed a residence near the railway station at noon today. The loss is estimated at \$2000. The building had been completed only this year.

**WAS NOT HANDLED**  
 NEW YORK—National Broadcasting Company announced that a speech Chancellor Hitler was to have delivered over its network beginning 10:15 a.m. Pacific Standard Time had been cancelled. Earlier the company had advised that Hitler was speaking from 10:15 to noon, the origin of the broadcast being not disclosed. A Berlin radio broadcast reported Hitler would attend a commemorative gathering of Nazi veterans in Munich tonight on the eve of the November 9 Nazi memorial Day.

**TACOMA BRIDGE COLLAPSES**  
 TACOMA—The Tacoma Narrows Bridge, third longest suspension bridge in the world, collapsed today. No one was on the bridge which began swaying crazily during a high wind earlier. All that is left of the \$6,500,000 structure, which fell a distance of 190 feet, are the two towers. A newspaperman, Leonard Coatsworth, had a narrow escape, losing his auto. He was the last across.

**NOT RESIGNING**  
 BOSTON—Speaking here, Joseph P. Kennedy said he was not resigning as United States ambassador to Great Britain but was ready to be back in London on forty-eight hours' notice. He was pessimistic as to an early peace, Kennedy said.

**FREIGHTER ATTACKED**  
 NEW YORK—The British freighter Empire Dorado radioed today that she was sinking 300 miles west of Ireland with casualties aboard. Lifeboats had been smashed by an enemy attack and could not be used, the message said.

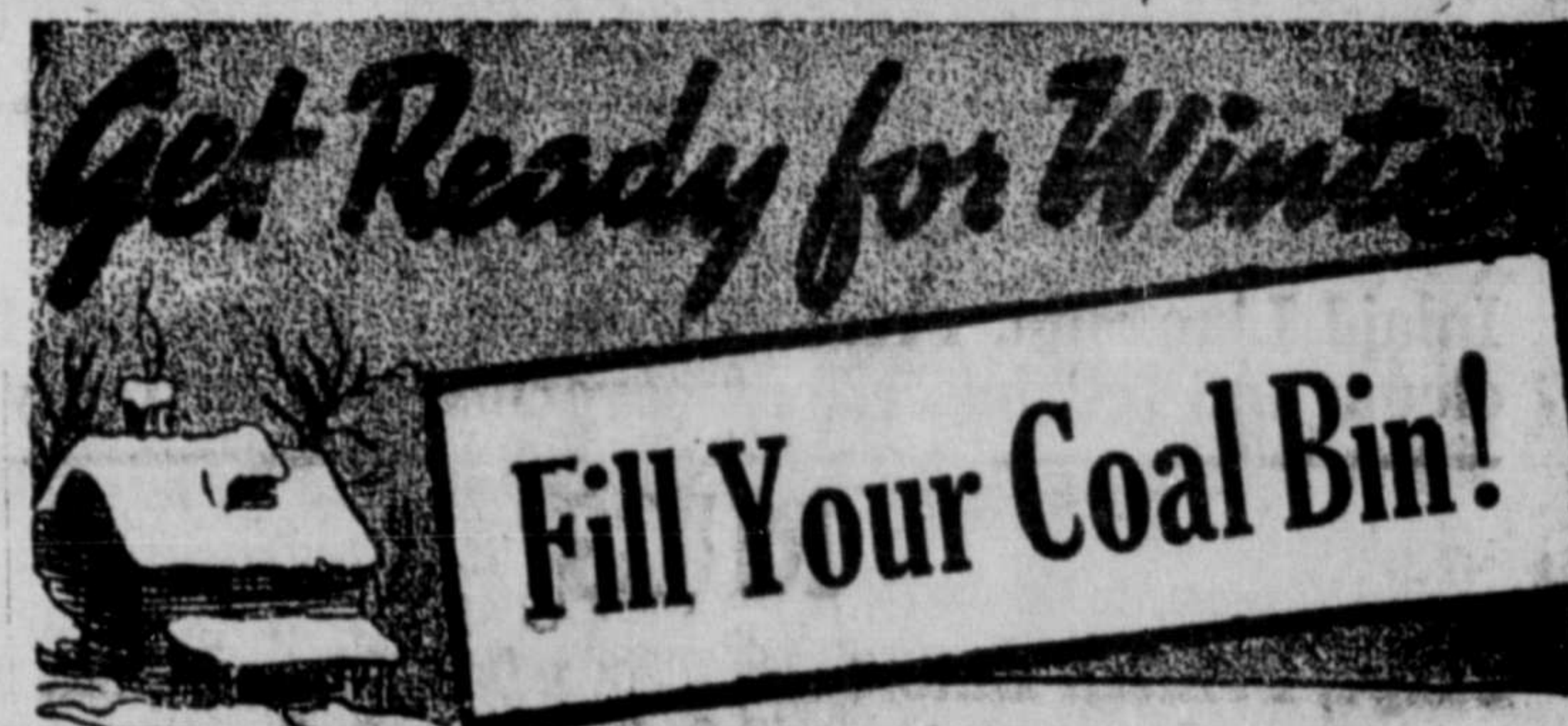

**150 Is Objective**

With Capt. George Black M. P. leading the movement, efforts are being made to secure 150 recruits for overseas service in the Yukon. Now that the season's mining work is over, many young men of the Territory are craving to get into action and every boat from now on will probably see recruits heading south.

Gus Besner, the Dawson born member of the party which was here yesterday, is the son of Fred Besner, well known Yukon pioneer of 1902 vintage and is related to Oiler Besner, formerly of Prince Rupert and now of Vancouver. Gus Besner's brother-in-law, A. Dubois, is superintendent of eleven dredges for the Yukon Consolidated in the Dawson district.
