EVACUATION OF BERLIN

Government Announces Plan to Get Children Away From Capital-R.A.F. Still Pounding

BERLIN, Sept. 30. — German authorities are setting up a plan for evacuation of children from Berlin and other more populous centres of the Reich to the country. It is stated, however, that the plan is not compulsory and not even necessary but is being instituted for the benefit of those people who consider that their children would be safer in the country than in the cities.

Financial assistance will be given by the government to those parents who desire to send their children to the country but are financially unable to do so. Nazi authorities denv any move for a general evacuation of Berlin.

Orders in regard to the carrying of gas masks in Germany are now being relaxed it is announced, in view of the indications that there is no intention to resort to this type of warfare.

Wide areas of Berlin underwent attacks by the Royal Air Force in the course of two raids Saturday night. One raid lasted for one hour and 42 minutes and the second for twenty-eight minutes. There was another 2-hour alarm last night. A large munitions plant at Dusselderf was attacked as well as railway yards at Hamm and Mannheim. Elsewhere in many parts of west and northwest Germany Royal Air Force bombers were active with terrific raids and Berlin stated in an official communique that there had been heavy casualties with "substantial numbers" killed and injured. The Royal Air Force also continued pounding Channel invasion bases for 48 hours straight and from the British side of the English Channel large fires were still visible.

During Sunday night the Royal Air Force flew six hundred miles through thick weather to bomb Berlin power stations, industrial plants and other military objectives deep in the Reich as well as the French coast invasion bases. EDITORIAL

Canadian Relations With Japan . . .

Canada is at war with Germany and Italy and now we find Japan allying herself with these two countries with a threat to war against us if any third party comes in against the Axis powers. Under these circumstances it seems as if our government should consider revising our relations with Japan.

During the past few months we have been buying constantly increasing quantities of manufactured goods from Japan while the purchases from British countries vien, Garrien, Arney, Kingston, have been steadily decreasing. Products of our mines scherk outs, ouch zur. suitable for war materials have been going to Japan. In view of the new situation created by the treaty it might be wise to cut off the war materials and to raise the duties on imports from Japan. We are not sufficiently well: informed to know what other factors may enter into the situation but it does seem as if we are putting life into a country that is now definitely lined up with the enemy.

The United States government has recently taken action to cut off supplies going to Japan and has loaned: money to China. We seem to be encouraging Japan in her aggressive policy. We think the people of Canada should be better informed by the government as to why we do this.

Ready for Business . . .

Some of the destroyers recently purchased from the United States in exchange for sites for naval bases are now in commission and ready for action. They will be particularly useful in running down German and Italian submarines and in helping to convoy merchant ships to and from the British Isles. Fifteen destroyers now are worth five times as much as the same number at any other time.

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


