Making the third candidate definitely in the field in addition to Olof Hanson, the Liberal, and George Weaver of New Westminster, the C.C.F., Skeena district Conservatives, in convention here today, chose George F. Cameron M.A., L.L.B., Vancouver barrister, as their candidate in the forthcoming federal election. Mr. Cameron's nomination was unanimous, his name being the only one brought before the convention. He was proposed by R. W. Cameron and seconded by Miss E. M. Earl. Mr. Cameron has already agreed to accept the nomination. James H. Thompson presided over the Conservative convention. BRUINS WIN OVER HAWKS

Desire Shut-Out Score in National Hockey League Game Last Night

BOSTON, February 28 (Canadian Press)—Boston Bruins ended their losing streak in no uncertain manner last night by scoring a six-to-no shut-out victory over the Chicago Black Hawks in the only scheduled fixture for the evening in the National Hockey League. The win brought the Bruins back up to within a game of the leading New York Rangers in the league standing.

Tomorrow night Boston will play the Canadiens at Montreal, the Detroit Red Wings will meet the Maple Leafs at Toronto and Chicago will play the Rangers in New York.

MORE RAIDS ON GERMANY

Air Force Planes Fly Over Berlin For Second Successive Night

Feb. 28.—For the second night British Royal Air Force planes flew over the German capital of Berlin. The Air Ministry announced extensive and successful flights over Berlin, Hanover, Kiel Canal and Baltic naval bases, dropping pamphlets.

The previous night there had been similar extensive flights over Berlin, Dusseldorf, Cologne and the Reich air and naval bases.

At Paris a French communique said there had been extensive French reconnaissance flights over German territory.

PRESIDENT RETURNING

Roosevelt Believes Defences of Panama Canal Should Be Strengthened

BALBOA, Canal Zone, Feb. 28.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt is steaming homeward today aboard U.S.S. Tuscaloosa following an inspection yesterday of Canal Zone defences with General Vorhees, the military governor. During his inspection, the chief executive was accompanied by army and navy officials by whom he was met. After the inspection, Mr. Roosevelt expressed the belief that more guns and planes were necessary for adequate long range defence of the canal.

The President also visited Panama during yesterday and conferred with the cabinet of the republic.

Mr. Roosevelt, it is expected, will disembark from the Tuscaloosa at Charleston, South Carolina, proceeding from there to Washington.

Maitland To Make Tour Of Central B.C.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 28 (CP)—Hon. R. L. Maitland, provincial Conservative leader, who has been in the East in connection with the federal election will start a tour of the province from Revelstoke March 13 on behalf of Conservative candidates. He will visit Kamloops after Revelstoke and then turn up to the Cariboo district to assist Fred Stephens, the Conservative candidate there.

PASSING OF CANNERYMAN

Edward F. Nason, for Years Manager of Boswell, Dies in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Feb. 28 (CP)—Edward F. Nason, well known coast canneryman and for years manager of Boswell Cannery on Rivers Inlet, died yesterday at the age of fifty-four after having been ill for several months.

PREMIER IN WEST

On Way From Winnipeg to Prince Albert Today

WINNIPEG, Feb. 28.—After speaking at Winnipeg last night in his first platform address of the campaign, Prime Minister William Lyon MacKenzie King was enroute west by Canadian National Railways this morning, his destination being his own constituency at Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, where he will arrive Thursday to receive renomination that evening. Tonight he will spend at Saskatoon. Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Dominion minister of justice, who arrived here from Ottawa with Mr. King, did not accompany the Prime Minister's party. He intended to leave by plane for Edmonton later today.

ENCIRCLE VIIPURI

Russians Moving to Take Finnish City—Defenders Fight Desperately in Mannerheim Line

HELSINGFORS, Feb. 28 (CP)—A communique last night indicated that the Russians were aiming at some sort of encirclement of Viipuri, strategic second city of Finland. The Finns are reported fighting desperately in Mannerheim Line positions southeast and east of Viipuri, resisting stubbornly what seems ceaseless waves of Russian attacks on three fronts. Eighteen Russian tanks and a large quantity of Russian small arms were claimed to have been taken by the Finns yesterday despite their retreat. Meantime reinforcements have been rushed up to both sides and bitter fighting proceeds in the Viipuri section.

Baron von Mannerheim, Finnish commander-in-chief has ordered the complete evacuation of all towns within twenty-five miles of beleaguered Viipuri.

A Russian communique from Moscow today claimed that Finnish defences on the Mannerheim line were crumbling and that the Russians were advancing on all other fronts.

So far in February ninety-six Finnish civilians have been killed in Russian air raids, a statement at Helsingfors said.

Authorize Contracts For Ships

OTAWA, Feb. 28 (CP)—Hon. C. D. Howe announced today that an order in council had been passed awarding contracts for mine-sweepers to British Columbia shipyards.

Each ship costs \$620,000, two being built at Prince Rupert.

DAN CUPID VERY BUSY

Darts of Matrimony Have Been Flying Since War Began

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Since the war started last September, Dan Cupid has been very busy in Canada. The number of marriages this January totalled 3,500 as compared with 2,300 in the same month last year, an increase of 48 per cent.

NAME IS CHANGED

Conservatives in Federal Election Will be Known as National Government Candidates

SAULT STE. MARIE, February 28 (Canadian Press)—Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, Conservative leader, declared today that "all candidates who belong to the National Conservative party are supporters of the national government movement." He said there might be other candidates supporting the national government and added: "I personally prefer to use the term 'national government' in describing our candidates."

MUST WORK UPON FARM

French Government Requisitions Agricultural Workers, Requiring Them To Put in Spring Crops

PARIS, Feb. 28 (CP)—The French government has ordered all farm workers requisitioned, holding them to the soil under military control to assure spring planting on a full scale.

War News

CANADIANS IN FINLAND
HELSINKI—The Helsinki radio today announced that the first Canadian Volunteers had arrived in Finland.

HUNGARIAN INCIDENT
BUDAPEST.—Hungarian police today laid virtual siege to the French Legation where, they asserted, French ministers were harboring forty Czech refugees, who had entered Hungary illegally.

LOYD GEORGE'S WARNING
LONDON.—Speaking at Dorchester, Rt. Hon. David Lloyd-George, who was Great Britain's Prime Minister of the First Great War, warned this country sharply that it faced an acute food shortage. "We are not so well off as last time for a long war," he declared. Lloyd-George took issue with Fomer War Minister Hore-Belisha's advocacy of immediate and active help to Finland. Great Britain should not be skidded over the icy snows of the north into a war with Russia, he declared. The final peace should not be a sham pact but one of lasting endurance.

GERMANY HELPING RUSSIA
HELSINGFORS.—Russia is importing German technicians to operate the Salmajervi nickel mines in Northern Finland which Great Britain and Canadian interests were to have opened shortly, it is learned here. It is also planned to similarly operate iron mines in that area.

TWO MORE GERMANS DOWN
PARIS.—Bringing down two German planes which took part in massed German flights over France during the past forty-eight hours was announced today by the French high command.

DROVE GERMANS OFF
LONDON.—The British trawler Aurora, one of four attacked by German war planes yesterday, drove off two after a twenty minute machine gun battle. Smoke was streaming from the tail of one attacker, it was reported today.

EASING UP CENSORSHIP
PARIS.—The French press will be restored with complete freedom to express political opinion. Diplomatic and military news will, however, still be strictly censored.

KING IS GLOOMY

Pictures Long and Widespread War and Stresses Importance of Having Competent Government

WINNIPEG, February 28 (Canadian Press)—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, painting a dark picture of a long and widespread war, opened his western campaign here last night with a plea for a return of the government as "the ablest body you can bring together, of one mind and one purpose, to serve you in the war effort."

Speaking last night at the first of two meetings he will address in the west, Mr. King warned listeners that the next Parliament would be a "war parliament" with the government having power of life and death over citizens.

GERMANS RESCUED

Four Airmen Who Lost Their Plane Picked Up From North Sea

LONDON, Feb. 28 (CP)—A British trawler yesterday rescued from the North Sea four German fliers whose plane had been shot down outside the Firth of Forth in the course of an attempted air raid on the British east coast. The Germans had taken to a rubber boat after their plane dropped into the sea. A second German plane crashed on British soil.

NO PEACE EXPECTED

Hitler's Mood Not Conciliatory For Welles' Visit

BERLIN, Feb. 28.—Chancellor Adolf Hitler will advance no peace plan to Under Secretary of State Sumner Welles of the United States on the occasion of his visit to Berlin, it is authoritatively stated in Nazi quarters. Nor does he expect to receive a peace plan which will justify serious consideration.

Der Fuehrer will, it is expected, advance his ambitions in regard to central and southern Europe and will stress claims for return of colonies lost by Germany after the last war.

A Nazi spokesman said yesterday that "British terror must be broken before the constructive forces of Europe can co-operate."

Welles left Rome at midnight last night and is to make a stop in Switzerland before arriving in Berlin, probably on Friday. He will meet Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop on Friday, it is expected, and Chancellor Hitler on Saturday.

TO MOVE STRIKERS

Action of Sitdowners at Pioneer Mine Will Not Be Tolerated, Says Premier Pattullo

VANCOUVER, Feb. 28 (CP)—Striking miners at the Pioneer Gold mine have entered the mine and say they will remain there until their demands for wage increases are granted.

The men, numbering forty, have occupied the mine at the 2400-foot level and are equipped with bedding and food for two or three days.

Dr. Howard T. James, managing director of the mine, said he would ask the British Columbia police, through Sergeant A. S. Woods-Johnson, to take action against the sit-downers and get them out of the mine.

Premier Takes Stand
VICTORIA, Feb. 28.—Premier Pattullo today announced that the British Columbia police had been instructed to remove the sitdowners from the Pioneer mine and he stated that "the mine shall be given protection so that it can again be opened up for the benefit of the workers themselves and the people of the province at large."

Regarding this phase of the strike proceedings, Mr. Pattullo said "this kind of thing cannot be tolerated in British Columbia." He said that the members of the International Mine and Mill Workers Union at Pioneer went on strike five months ago contrary to the Industrial Arbitration and Conciliation Act and he added "the law must be upheld and it is in the interest of the workers as well as of the employers that it should be."

WHERE REAL RAIN FALLS

California Town Has 8 3/4 Inches in Less Than Day

VERA CRUZ, Feb. 28.—A town near here had no less than 8 3/4 inches of rain between 5 p.m. Monday and 10 a.m. Tuesday as northern California flood conditions became serious, doing widespread damage.

BAR GOLD

LONDON (CP)—The Montreal price of bar gold on the London market was unchanged today at \$37.54 per fine ounce.

GERMANY ANXIOUS

Would Guarantee Roumanian Borders in Return for Products—Price Too High For Bucharest

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Feb. 28 (CP)—Authoritative quarters said today that Germany had offered to guarantee Roumanian borders in return for huge increases of oil, wheat and other raw material shipments to the Reich. Authorities said it was extremely doubtful if Roumania would accept because virtual Nazi control of her exports was too high a price.

Meantime German anger at Roumania is said to have increased as a result of the signing of a trade agreement with France and the increasing of railway rates on Roumanian goods to the Reich.

Bucharest is considering emergency mobilization of all her industries.

Patrol Activity On Western Front

Germany Claim to Have Resisted French Party Successfully

PARIS, Feb. 28.—Renewed patrol activity between the French and Germans on the Western Front is reported. East of the Moselle River the Germans repulsed a strong French patrol, a Berlin communique states.

CALL HOME TURK SHIPS

All Vessels Are Required to Meet Import and Export Traffic of Islam

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Feb. 28 (CP)—The Turkish government has forbidden Turkish merchant ships to engage in tramp traffic, directing that every vessel must touch at a Turkish port each voyage. The order said that Turkish shipping was required by Turkey's need to carry more of her heavy import and export traffic in her own ships. The London Daily Express had said yesterday that all Turkish shipping had been ordered to return to home ports, a report that was at first denied by Turkish authorities.

SCHOOLS AT NEW POINTS

Airmen to be Trained at Vancouver, Calgary, Prince Albert, Saskatoon, Regina, Ottawa

OTTAWA, Feb. 28 (CP)—Hon. Norman Rogers, minister of national defence, announced yesterday that air training schools are to be established at Vancouver, Calgary, Saskatoon, Prince Albert, Regina and Ottawa in addition to locations previously announced.

BERMUDA PURCHASE

United States Senator Proposes Legislation to Buy it With War Debts

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 28.—Senator Robert R. Reynolds of North Carolina announces he will introduce legislation in the United States Senate calling for the purchase of the British Island of Bermuda, payment to be made for same by deduction from the British war debt to the United States. Reynolds says he will introduce this bill in view of British interference with United States mails at Bermuda.

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ACTION IS NEEDED

Immediate action is needed by the countries that sympathize with Finland if that country is to be saved from the clutches of Russia. Already much has been done in the way of sending supplies and food for the Finnish armies but that is not enough. Men are needed. Some have been supplied in a desultory way and so have airplanes and tanks been sent but they are not an army. Inevitably, the Finns will be defeated by mere force of numbers unless more help comes. While we expect help will be sent, nothing seems sure.

CARRYING ON AS USUAL

The best service a young man who is physically fit can give his country just now is to join the Canadian forces. The next best service he can give is to carry on his work in the usual way seeing that he does his job well just as he would if he had joined the overseas forces. Those who cannot be accepted for military or naval service, either from disability or from age limit, can do their work on the home front, carrying on their businesses or callings in such a way as best to help the country while the young fighters are away. Carrying on is very important. So far there has been no scarcity of young men for the fighting forces. Every province of Canada has contributed its quota.

COST OF WAR

It is estimated that the war is costing Great Britain about six million pounds a day or approximately thirty million dollars. That is a huge sum, so large that it is almost a certainty it can never be repaid. Most people do not expect it will be repaid. In fact it is doubtful if any of the national debts ever will be paid off. Some administration will come into power that will wipe them off with a stroke of the pen.

We are not suggesting that this drastic action should be taken. It will not be done for some time to come, so there is no need for any holder of these securities to get cold feet.

Today the German national debt is probably valueless outside of Germany but the British securities continue to be worth as much as any on the market.

MONTREAL, Feb. 28.—Several changes in the freight claims department of the Canadian National Railways are announced today by A. G. Gilmour, general freight claims agent. These changes hinge around the retirement of H. McDonald, freight claims agent at Winnipeg after thirty-seven years of railway service.

Replacing Mr. McDonald at Winnipeg will be Thomas Ginnely, formerly assistant freight claims agent at Vancouver. W. Carr, of Montreal has been appointed district freight claims agent at Vancouver.

Hugh McDonald was born at Curran, Ontario, February 22, 1875. He entered railway service as assistant agent at St. Jerome, Que. January 1, 1903. He served at many points in Eastern Canada and was appointed freight claims agent at Quebec in 1911 and later moved to Toronto. He came west to Winnipeg in 1930 and served in the Winnipeg position until his retirement.

Thomas Ginnely was born at Limerick, Ireland, Feb. 11, 1880, and entered railway service at Winnipeg, June 20, 1910, as a clerk in the freight claims department. He was appointed chief clerk in 1912 and in 1920 was moved to Vancouver.

William Carr was born at Perth, Scotland, September 22, 1882. After ten years of railway service in the Old Country he came to Canada and joined the audit office of the Grand Trunk Railway in July, 1907. Two years later he joined the freight claims department. He held many posts in this department, moving up a step at a time until he was appointed assistant to auditor of freight claims at Montreal in 1930. He now goes to Vancouver.

NEW LISTS OF VOTERS

Dominion Elections, March 26, are Held Under Enumeration and Revision System

OTTAWA, Feb. 28 (CP)—Canadians go to the polls March 26 under a thoroughly revamped elections act, the result of two years' work by the House of Commons elections committee.

The biggest change in the new act is abandonment of the "permanent" voters' list inaugurated with questionable success for the 1935 election. The previous system of creating a new list by enumeration for each election is being restored.

There are also many changes regarding the printing and distribution of the voters' lists, limitation of the use of radio, the banning of written pledges by candidates, immediate payment of election staffs (where they formerly might wait months), prohibition of disorderly conduct at election meetings and premature publication of results.

The much-argued question of election expenses, the feature of extensive and heated debates in the House of Commons and in committee, remains in the same position it has occupied for 20 years.

The purpose behind the permanent voters' list introduced by R. B. Bennett, then prime minister, was to permit the calling of an election within four weeks. But the system was discarded after one trial, although somewhat similar systems are in use in Britain and Australia.

The 1935 list was established in October, 1933. After revision, the roster of almost 6,000,000 names was printed at the government printing bureau at Ottawa. Then in April, May and June of 1935, the "annual revision" took place, but the initiative for changes rested on the elector.

The work developed upon volunteer workers generally and changes reached as high as 15,000 in some ridings, confirming the view of Jules Castonguay, chief electoral officer, that city voters' lists become practically obsolete in six months.

strictly fresh, collected by enumerators during the seventh week (Feb. 5-10) before polling day under the terms of the act. It must be printed by now and copies distributed to every elector in cities of more than 25,000, and posted in other areas. Sittings for revision of the preliminary list will be held in urban ridings on the 14th, 13th and 12th days before the election and in rural ridings on the 13th day.

After that revision, a voter has no further chance of having his name included. In the country, an "open list" will apply, a qualified voter whose name was omitted being able to vote on taking an oath, supported by the oath of another elector of the same subdivision. The 1935 act closed the rural list, although it had been open since 1920.

The enumeration this time also includes all those who will reach 21 years of age on or before polling day, whereas previously they had to be 21 at the time of enumeration. Those becoming 21 after that and before election day could apply for revision of the list.

Revision to the former system of establishing the list is expected to be cheaper than the so-called permanent list. The 1930 election cost about \$2,200,000 while the 1935 election, with 5,918,207 names on the list, cost approximately \$4,000,000. This current election, with an additional 500,000 voters enumerated will cost between \$2,500,000 and \$3,000,000.

In the past employers have been asked to give workers two hours, apart from their lunch hour, in which to vote. Now under section 45 of the new act, a penalty is provided for an employer failing to comply.

Lieut. C. H. Playart arrived in the city on the Prince George this morning from Victoria to become medical officer of the 102nd Battery stationed at Barrett Point.


