Local Man Named P.G.E. Head

General Manager of Provincial Road Goes to W.H. Tobey

Announcement of Appointment of Local Superintendent to Responsible Post is Made Today

Premier T. D. Pattullo in Vancouver today announced the appointment of William H. Tobey, superintendent for the Canadian National Railways at Prince Rupert, as general manager of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, succeeding the late Robert Wilson and taking over February 1. News of the appointment reached Prince Rupert at noon in a Canadian Press dispatch to the Daily News.

CANADIAN ARMY HEAD IN FRANCE

General McNaughton at B.E.F. Headquarters Confering With Viscount Gort

PARIS, Jan. 10: (CP)—General A. G. L. McNaughton, commandant of the Canadian overseas forces, arrived with members of his staff at British headquarters in France yesterday to confer with Viscount Gort, commander-in-chief of the British Expeditionary Force.

Would Cut Pay of Mayor and Alderman Too

VANCOUVER, Jan. 10: (CP)—Ald. J. W. Cornett has moved to reduce the salary of the mayor of Vancouver from \$5,400 to \$2,000 and the indemnities for aldermen from \$1,620 to \$1,000 per year.

Edouard Herriot Again President

Named Head of French Chamber of Deputies Yesterday

PARIS, Jan. 10.—Former Premier, Edouard Herriot was tonight re-elected as president of the French Chamber of Deputies.

GUAM FOR AIR BASE

Development of Outpost Near Orient Again Revived By President Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 10.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt has revived the idea of development of Guam in the South Seas as a United States air base, it was revealed yesterday before the Senate naval committee by Admiral Harold R. Stark, chief of naval operations. Last year the project had been rejected by the Senate. The plan is to make it a base for super air bombers. An appropriation of \$4,000,000 for its development has been allotted, it was disclosed. Guam is 1500 miles from Tokyo.

TO BUILD WARSHIPS

Fifty-two Thousand Ton Dreadnaughts For United States To Be World's Largest

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 10:—Plans were revealed by the Senate naval committee yesterday for the construction of two 52,000-ton battleships with speed at thirty-three knots and carrying eighteen-inch guns. They would be the most formidable super dreadnaughts in the world, complementing two 45,000-ton battleships now under construction.

KEPT HIS CABINET COUNSEL

Chamberlain Silent On Hore-Belisha—Sarcasm, Determination, Dolefulness, Confidence, Pride, Diplomacy

LONDON, Jan. 10: (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain spoke of many subjects pertaining to the war in his hour's speech at the Lord Mayor's luncheon in Mansion House yesterday but he kept absolute silence on one subject to which many people had hoped he might refer. That was the subject of cabinet-reorganization, particularly the retirement of Rt. Hon. Leslie Hore-Belisha as secretary of war. Neither directly nor indirectly did Mr. Chamberlain refer to this matter.

GERMANY ON SPOT

Looks Like Hitler Will Now Have To Choose Between Italy and Russia

BUDAPEST, Jan. 10: (CP)—Germany has been "put on the spot" by the military assistance alliance between Italy and Hungary, it is felt in international political circles here. The Reich is now forced to choose between these two powers and Russia and Chancellor Adolf Hitler sears knows what to do. The failure of Russia in its Finnish campaign and economic structure may have a bearing on Der Fuehrer's decision.

Is Named Chief Of Air Force

Command of British Aviation in France Given to Air Marshal Garrett

LONDON, Jan. 10: (CP)—Air Marshal Alfred S. Garrett has been appointed commander-in-chief of the Royal Air Force in France in connection with the move to separate the Air Force from the British Expeditionary Force and army control. Air Marshal Garrett is now equal in authority with Viscount Gort, commander-in-chief of the British Expeditionary Force.

WASHINGTON—The United States government will permit the return to Germany of members of the crew of the scuttled German liner Columbus.

NO CANADIENS IN FRANCE
OTTAWA—A high official of the Defence Ministry today denied unconfirmed reports out of Paris that several detachments of Canadian troops had landed in France.

CITY OF FLINT AGAIN
NEW YORK—The American freighter City of Flint, after a hectic three months' voyage, is now on her way home. She left Norway January 7 and is due Baltimore January 27.

LONDON, (CP)—The Montreal price of bar gold on the London market was unchanged today at \$35.54 per fine ounce.

BRITON IS PRISONER

Germans Take Their First Captive On Western Front In Person Of Badly Wounded Officer

BERLIN, Jan. 10:—Nazi military authorities last night claimed the capture of the first British prisoner to be taken on the western front. He was a seriously wounded officer evidently left behind by the French with whom he had been serving as an observer. He was taken to a hospital for treatment.

PATTULLO GOES EAST

Premier of British Columbia in Vancouver Today on His Way to Ottawa

VANCOUVER, Jan. 10: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo is spending the day in Vancouver. He arrived this morning from Victoria and will leave tonight for Ottawa to discuss with Dominion authorities, among other things, finances, freight rates and the Alaska highway. Hon. John Hart, the minister of finance, is already in Ottawa.

Were In Audience With King George

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain and Hore-Belisha Visit His Majesty

LONDON, Jan. 10: (CP)—King George was at Buckingham Palace yesterday and received Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain in audience. Rt. Hon. Leslie Hore-Belisha also visited the Palace to surrender his seals of office following his retirement as Secretary of State for War. Hore-Belisha's successor, Rt. Hon. Oliver Stanley, is ill with a severe attack of influenza and will not be able to receive the seals for a few days. The King returned today to Sandringham to rejoin the Queen and the Princesses.

SKI CHAMP TO JASPER

Gertrude Wepsala To Practise On Mountain Resort Slopes

VANCOUVER, Jan. 10:—To commence training for the Dominion Ski Championships late in February Gertrude Wepsala, pretty blonde titleholder, leaves here tonight for Jasper. She will be accompanied by Art Coles, a fellow member of the Tyee Ski Runners team that last year produced two Dominion champions. They will join their coach, Peter Vajda, of the Western Canadian Swiss Ski School, at Maligne Lake, to practise on the swiftly undulating slopes above the Chalet and the tremendous runs in nearby Shovel Pass.

Negotiations Have Failed

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 10: (CP)—Negotiations for a reciprocal trade treaty between the United States and Uruguay have broken down because of the collapse of negotiations with Argentina, the Department of States announces.

Great Britain Takes Air Warfare Today To Germany's Shores

Battle Is Waged in Vicinity of Isle of Sylt—Fierce Cannonading Heard—Germany Claims Three Ships Down

LONDON, January 10: (CP)—The Royal Air Force carried the war to German shores in an outburst of renewed air and sea warfare today following Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's warning yesterday of grim days ahead. The Royal Air Force sent warplanes over the German northwest coast and the Frisian Islands.

Copenhagen dispatches indicated that the Britons had run into battle, flashes and rumble of cannonading in the distant searchlight glare being followed by the southwestward flight of numerous aircraft. This indicated that there was an air battle over the Island of Sylt, a northern German air base, observers reported.

Later the Air Ministry announced that Royal Air Force planes had dropped bombs near the German Island of Sylt while on patrol over enemy seaplane bases last night. It was not mentioned if opposition had been met.

In Berlin the Germans claimed that three British planes had been shot down over Helligoland Bight.

Discussions On Waterways Will Be Resumed Soon

OTTAWA, Jan. 10: (CP)—Discussions between United States and Canadian experts on the St. Lawrence waterway project will be resumed at Washington on January 22 it was announced yesterday following a two-day session.

PUT OVER WAR LOAN

Five Former Finance Ministers on National Committee—To Be Floated Next Week

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—Hon. J. L. Ralston, Minister of Finance, announces that during the past few weeks preparatory organization work has been going on in connection with Canada's first war loan, and that the loan will be launched next Monday morning, further details to be made known Friday. The first national war loan will give even the most Canadian investor an opportunity to participate by subscribing to bonds as low as \$50. (Continued on Page Four)

BIG SHIP BLOWS UP

Liner Dunbar Castle, On Way To South Africa, Principal Sea War Victim Yesterday

Many Losses

Stranding Of Liner Rothesay Castle Is Another War Casualty—Numerous Smaller Ships Sink

LONDON, Jan. 10: (CP)—Principal victim of the war at sea yesterday was the 10,002-ton British Union Castle liner Dunbar Castle, on her way to the Cape of Good Hope, which was virtually ripped in two in a mine explosion off the southeast coast of England and within ten minutes sank with a broken back. Due to the courage and presence of mind of officers and crew, passengers and crew numbering 150 were saved but the captain and two seamen were killed by the explosion. Survivors have been landed.

Four other ships—two Danish, one Dutch and one British—were sent to the bottom during the day. Eighteen survivors of the tanker British Liberty, sunk after striking a mine Monday, arrived yesterday in England from France where they had been landed. Twenty other members of the crew of the tanker are missing and are believed to have perished.

Another Major Loss

Another major loss, due to navigation hazards on account of war conditions, was the liner Rothesay Castle, grounded on the west coast of Scotland and expected to break her back.

The British steamship Oakgrove, 1985 tons, was attacked by an enemy aircraft and sunk, an undetermined number of her crew of twenty being saved. Capt. W. F. Falconer is among the missing.

Further the Admiralty announced that the British steamship Gowrie, 689 tons, had been sunk by German war planes, a lightship tender, five fishing boats and two unidentified craft also being attacked.

RISKING WEATHER

Germans Resort to Cover of Unfavorable Elements to Carry Out Attacks

LONDON, Jan. 10: (CP)—Owing to their fear of British pursuit planes and anti-aircraft fire, Germany has resorted to the policy of sending its bombing planes out in poor weather and bad visibility to attack North Sea shipping. This was indicated yesterday when German warplanes, venturing forth in what would be ordinarily considered foul flying weather and shielded by chilly mist, attacked merchant ships off the British Isles and also flew over the Firths of Forth and Tay. One of the vessels attacked was also machine-gunned at close range, this accounting for ten men being hurt. Five fishing smacks were also bombed and machine-gunned. No ships were sunk although some were damaged. British aviators did not engage the enemy on account of bad visibility.

In Berlin it was stated that armed patrol boats, conveying merchant ships, had been the object of attack. All German planes had returned safely.

Fourteen ships in all are reported to have been attacked since yesterday by the German bombers.

The German high command in Berlin claimed that eight British vessels had been sunk by German planes in the North Sea yesterday.

GYRO CLUB ACTIVITIES

Found Things In South Improved

Reports covering 1938 activities, presented to the regular monthly business luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club today, showed that some \$1500 had been expended by the club during the year on its playground work including the conducting of supervised playground activities during the summer, improvement and maintenance of the grounds and further development of Morse Creek as a swimming resort in summer and a skating rink in winter.

Playground work was again the principal feature of Gyro Club activity during the past year but an important innovation was war activity work which was commenced around November 1 and upon which some \$250 has been to date expended principally in supplying stationery, recreational facilities etc. for the naval and military units, which are garrisoned locally including ships operating from the port, barracks and fortress points.

Other expenditures for the year by the Gyro Club on community service included \$100 for the Booth Memorial School gymnasium shed, \$75 for community centre plans and \$20 for renovation of the hospital ward.

In addition to this, the club continues to work towards the community centre project in connection with which it is taking a leading part.

The Gyro Club will have its installation of 1940 officers on January 24 with District Governor Roy Sharp of Seattle coming north to take charge of the ceremonies in that connection. It was decided that the installation should be combined with a special farewell to W. H. Tobey, a past president and district governor, and Mrs. Tobey.

Past President D. G. Borland presided over today's luncheon in the absence of President W. M. Watts. There was a good attendance of members.

People Optimistic Not Because Of War Stimulation But On Account Of New Industrial Capital

H. W. M. Rolston, publisher of the Stewart News at Stewart, was a passenger aboard the Prince Rupert today returning north after spending the Christmas and New Year holiday season in Vancouver and Victoria. Mr. Rolston stated that there was a decided feeling of optimism in the southern cities in regard to the future due not to war stimulation but to the entry of new capital into the country for industrial purposes.

SESSION OF JR. CHAMBER

Business at Meeting Last Night Largely of Routine Nature—National Civic Beautification Scheme

With Vice-President Boss Ingram taking the chair in the absence from the city on a trip south of the President, A. S. Nickerson, the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce was in regular monthly dinner session last night. Business was of almost entirely routine nature consisting of consideration of correspondence and receiving of committee reports. In addition to a goodly attendance of members, there were guests in the persons of Colin P. McCarthy, Jack Ray and Ronald Lane.

Correspondence from the Junior Chamber of Commerce included a proposal for a national civic beautification project in May 1940 for a trophy put up by the Vancouver Junior Chamber of Commerce. This was referred to the annual clean-up week committee.

There were national committee reports on the subjects of immigration, traffic safety and tourist traffic.

The Dominion Securities Corporation Ltd suggested that the Junior Chamber accept agency for the forthcoming Dominion war loan, thus doing a national service and possibly gaining some commission which might prove acceptable for its own treasury. Action on this matter was deferred until the return of the president.

Regarding a proposal that local men might give talks to Junior Chambers of Commerce in other cities they may visit, it was reported that J. W. Nicholls, general manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., and Dr. Neal M. Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, had already agreed to do so when occasion arose.

Stan Saville presented a report for the Christmas street decoration committee which, together with John Connell, who provided necessary transportation, was accorded a vote of thanks for a job well done.

John Connell and T. J. Williams reported in connection with the Christmas radio auction which had failed to materialize. It was urged that such a broadcast should be held next year with proper organization in good time.

There was a letter from the Montreal Junior Chamber in connection with a public speakers' manual in which the members displayed considerable interest.

Mrs. Fisher Is Week Of Prayer Meeting Speaker



As the loan campaign will be the first widespread voluntary effort in which the Canadian people as a whole will be asked to play a part on the economic war-front, a great deal of work had been

done in planning the organization of the campaign. In this connection, the minister stated that there would be a National War Loan Committee which will consist of representative citizens across Canada and will demonstrate the national character of the first war loan offering.

On this committee, of which the Minister of Finance will be chair-

man, will be the five former ministers of finance now living, namely Rt. Hon. Sir Thomas White; Hon. Sir Henry Drayton; Hon. Chas. A. Dunning; Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett; and Hon. E. N. Rhodes; and demonstrating the nation-wide unanimity in the purpose of prosecuting the war the provincial treasurer of every province from Nova Scotia to

British Columbia has consented to serve. The following are the nine provincial treasurers: Hon. Angus L. Macdonald, Nova Scotia; Hon. C. T. Richard, New Brunswick; Hon. J. A. Mathewson, Quebec; Hon. Mitchell F. Hepburn, Ontario; Hon. Stuart S. Garson, Manitoba; Hon. W. J. Patterson, Saskatchewan; Hon. Solon E. Low, Alberta; and Hon.

John Hart, British Columbia. The National War Loan Committee will be fully representative of the various sections of Canada. It will provide the assistance of a group of citizens who will individually and collectively take an interest in furthering the undertaking and who will be available to plan and assist any activity which

may be considered necessary for the success of the loan.

"While necessarily the formal membership of this committee is limited, I am confident," said Mr. Ralston, "that every citizen, regardless of his or her walk in life, will regard himself or herself as a member of the nation-wide organization for putting this loan over the top."
