STRIKING BRITISH COLLIERS GO BACK TO WORK

FOSTER PRINCE RUPERT AS A BOAT BUILDING CENTRE

CAPTAIN BABINGTON'S SPLENDID NEW LUNCH NOW ON THE STOCKS IS AN EXAMPLE OF THE WORK LOCAL ENTERPRISE CAN ACHIEVE.

At his boat building yards at Cameron Cove H. Johnson is making good progress with the building of Captain Babington's handsome and powerful new gasoline launch. The new boat is now all planked, and partly decked. She is 46 feet over all, 14 feet 2 inches beam and draws 6 feet 6 inches. She is tremendously strong, designed altogether for hard service as a tow boat or salvage tug. Her framing throughout is oak, stem and stern posts stoutest yellow cedar, and guard of Australian iron wood. Her power is to be a 40 horse power Standard engine. The new boat, which is as yet unnamed, is similar in appearance to the Rover, but larger and stronger in every way. Captain Babington, who is naturally intensely interested in the progress of the boat, says that he has had her built in Prince Rupert in order to show to all concerned that it is really possible now to have a good, substantial power boat, most suitable for all local purposes, built locally at much less cost than by sending the work south. Owing to heavy overhead charges even the best builders below cannot possibly

underbid local enterprise and have besides the disadvantage of not thoroughly appreciating local conditions, while the owner of the boat cannot stand by to see that things are done as he desires. Those interested in the progress of the waterfront of Prince Rupert hope to see the contract for the new Prince Rupert coast mission power boat placed locally and the launching ceremony made a function to draw a big crowd.

MUSHROOM GROWTH ABOVE GOOD OLD SNAIL-PACE BELOW

Emil Kauffman Starts up His Contract for Sheds on the Provincial Government Wharf---Sensational Activity on Deck Level---Below Deck Original Contractor Manages After Many Weeks to Get One Brace in Position

Tremendous excitement at the waterfront near the Westholme Lumber Company's premises—Emil Kauffman has begun work on the sheds and warehouses for the new government wharf. He has a gang of some twenty or thirty men on, any amount of lumber there and yesterday afternoon was fairly making things hum with activity. The air of somnolent, go as you please, wait for the tide or for McBride had vanished. Kauffman's men were busy among the lumber as bees in a honeycomb, the circular saws shrieked and buzzed continually, hammers rang, and the building of those sheds was going on in earnest. Emil Kauffman himself was there with his coat off actively superintending just as he did on the big warehouses he rapidly completed for the wholesale district by the G. T. P. wharf. Nobody visiting the scene would have dreamt it was

the same time-honored Government wharf which has been growing up with the city since almost the first memories of the earliest pioneer. Mr. Kauffman expects to have his part of the work complete in less than six weeks, and looks like achieving this end easily. He has got started with the work a good deal sooner than had been expected, for it was thought he would have to wait until all the ferro-concrete braces had been fitted between the piles. Mr. Kauffman is glad he didn't have to wait until then, for as a matter of fact yesterday afternoon there was only one of these braces in permanent position. The work of fitting them appears to be as tedious as the construction of the famous sea-wall, which depended on the state of the moon and the tides. Portions of the decking of the wharf have to be lifted in order to let the bra-

ces be lowered to the men placing them, and this necessity reacts as a certain hindrance to the work of Kauffman's men, for the apertures in the decking have to be avoided by the men passing quickly to and fro about their business. At the present rate of progress with the braces it looks as if the wharf would not be complete and fit for heavy steamship traffic until about Christmas this year. Until the braces are in position the structure is not in shape to stand continuous heavy boat traffic in spite of its highly modern railway buffer spring boom. The impact of a deep water steamship making even a Barney Johnston landing at the government wharf in its present shape would strain the unbraced piling, but yesterday the Government snag-scow Cygnet was berthed there with apparently no ill effects to the structure.

RUPERT'S FIRST REAL CANTATA

Last night in McIntyre Hall Mr. J. E. DROPPED TWO HUNDRED FEET

Famous Aviator Dashed to Death With His Bi-plane in California, After Successfully Amusing Large Crowd of Spectators.

Rodgers, the famous aviator, and the first man to cross the American continent in an aeroplane, was dashed to death ere late yesterday afternoon, when his machine dropped a distance of 200 feet. Rodgers had been amusing a crowd of spectators by flying over the sea, among the flocks of gulls and on returning apparently lost control of his machine, for when just above the shore the bi-plane shot down like a rocket. The aviator was badly crushed, his back and neck being broken.

LAND DISPUTES ON GRAHAM

Special Agent Fletcher Believes They Can Be Amicably Settled if Disputants Will "Give and Take a Little."

Victoria, March 28.—By the time Hon. Mr. Ross returns he will find awaiting him the report of Mr. S. A. Fletcher, who was commissioned to enquire into various land disputes on Graham Island, of the Queen Charlotte group. Mr. Fletcher proceeded forthwith to Masset, visited all the settlements on the north coast and on Masset Inlet, and made careful and exhaustive enquiries as to all the disputes in question. From Queenstown he crossed by Mexican Tom's trail to Tl-El River and thence worked his way down the coast to Queen Charlotte City. Arthur Robertson, a well known pioneer of the country, acted as guide for the trip. Mr. Fletcher is of the opinion that the various disputes can be satisfactorily adjusted without especial difficulty, "providing all concerned are prepared to give and take a little." He thinks that the new clause in the Coal and Petroleum Act, inserted last session at the request of Mr. Manson, will prevent any further conflict or difficulty between the pre-emptors and the holders of coal licenses.

Among the arrivals by the Prince George yesterday was Mr. T. E. Ibbotson of Vancouver, who will have charge of the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Home Investment Co. Mr. A. J. Tate, who has been in charge since the opening of the office in this city, will leave Saturday for the south. In future Mr. Tate will be in the Seattle office of the company.

PROGRESSIVES DETERMINED TO PROGRESS.

Notwithstanding the fact that the political campaign is over; notwithstanding the further fact that the Progressive Conservatives were wiped out, or bought out, by the Ring just before the Conservative convention, they yesterday advertised and held another meeting in the name of Progressives. Such sturdy adherence to settled principles would stimulate popular admiration to a high pitch were it not for the careless trick of back-sliding these Progressives seem to have cultivated into a regular habit. Now if, after they had been wiped out or sold out, they had repented—even at the eleventh hour—say at 5 o'clock last Thursday, and have all cast their votes against William Manson as they originally intended, great would have been their reward. But they did not, so how can we trust them again, for verily the Truth is not in them.

Their bold action, however, in again calling a meeting as Progressive Conservatives does just tickle the approbatory nerve when we recall the Conservative solemnities of the preceding evening. Three leading Progressives were called upon the carpet of the Conservative Club to be read out of that organization for treachery to the party. "And there was not one amongst them to cast the first stone." Were they all tarred with the same brush?

It is a bold action because of the reprisals that will inevitably follow; the punishments that the Ring will see are inflicted by hook or more probably by crook upon all those guilty of independent thought or opinion before they cast their ballot. One instance of this is found in the case of Earl Scovill, government agent at Golden, B. C. He was a supporter of H. E. Forster, the Independent Conservative candidate, and nothing was said of it. But Forster defeated the regular Conservative nominee, and the day after the election Mr. Scovill was asked for his resignation.

So that while one may admire the courage of the Progressives in timidly creeping out of their holes when the danger seems to be passed, we cannot refrain from the warning not to be too bold; because this province we live in is not a land of free speech and political liberty; it is not a land of constitutional government, but a limited oligarchy.

Louis P. Bowler has in the Daily Financial News of London an article on the resources of the Queen Charlotte Islands which he concludes in these words: "From a money making and patriotic point of view it would be well for the financier and empire builder to keep an eye on Queen Charlotte Islands and not let them become absolutely absorbed by American capital, accelerated by the opening of the Panama Canal."

RECIPROCITY AGAIN A LIVE ISSUE.

Hay is selling across the line from \$20 to \$30 a ton. There is plenty of feed on this side of the line. But through the rejection of the reciprocity agreement we cannot with profit take the feed across where it is needed or bring the animals which need the feed here where it is plentiful, says the Calgary Albertan. A California correspondent says that straw is selling at \$20 a ton there.

A correspondent to the Albertan refers to the B. C. market which was mentioned in the recent election. Then it was argued by the Conservative speakers that reciprocity would mean the loss of the B. C. market and that our farmers would be unable to dispose of their oats and their hay. But hay is cheaper at the Canadian coast than it is in Alberta, and across the line, which is shut out to Canadian producers, the price is very high. Here is a year when the B. C. market is practically useless and we are shut out both going and coming from the market which but for the duty is available.

WALLACE CO. GET NEW BOAT

Fisheries Company Has Purchased Steamer Orontes of Glasgow, Which Is on Way Around Horn to This Coast.

The Wallace Fisheries, Ltd., recently purchased the trim little steamer Orontes in Glasgow for the purpose of collecting fish from its fishermen operating far out at sea on Swiftsure Bank on the west coast of Vancouver Island. The vessel reached Las Palmas, Cape Verde Islands, on Thursday, twenty days out, according to a cablegram received yesterday by Mr. J. M. MacMillan, one of the directors of the company. Her next stop will be at Bahia, Brazil. The Orontes is of 100 tons register and a speed of eleven knots an hour. She will arrive on this coast about May 1.

Mr. Peter Wallace, general manager of the company, and Mr. MacMillan spent several days on Alberni Canal inspecting their new salmon cannery and cold storage plant just completed there and representing, with fishing equipment, an investment of \$300,000. The cold storage plant has a capacity of 2,500,000 pounds. Seining operations by Canadians on Swiftsure Bank, which has hitherto been monopolized by Americans, promises to be successful. The bank is outside the three mile limit near the entrance to the Strait of Juan de Fuca. The Wallace Company will also have a fleet of gasoline fishing boats in territorial waters and expect to pack 40,000 cases of salmon during the coming season.—Vancouver World.

P. has bought nearly all the land available at this point for their round-house, yards and freight divisional purposes. A large force of men has been busy for many months in clearing the land. The G. T. P. has started work on the round-house for twelve engines.

FEWER BIRTHS IN ENGLAND

Serious Decline in the Birth Rate Revealed by Returns of the Registrar General for Last Year.

A serious decline in the natural increase of population in England and Wales during the year 1911 is revealed in the return of the registrar general. The births registered numbered 881,233; the deaths numbered 527,864. The increase of population thus shown is 353,369, whereas the average for the preceding five years was 405,559.

The birth rate shows a further decline, being 24.4 per 1,000, or 0.7 lower than the rate in any other year on record, and 2.8 per 1,000 less than the average of the ten years preceding. The death rate was 14.6 per 1,000, which is 1.1 per 1,000 above the rate in 1910, which was the lowest on record.

WIRELESS SYSTEM ENCIRCLING THE WHOLE BRITISH EMPIRE

DETAILS OF PROPOSED ARRANGEMENTS WITH MARCONI COMPANY BY THE IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT AND THE GOVERNMENTS OF ALL THE COLONIES.

(Special Correspondence.) Montreal, March 27.—Details of the proposed arrangements between the Imperial government and the Canadian Marconi Company for an "all red" wireless system to encircle the British Empire, a scheme which eventually will embrace the whole world, have been received by Mr. A. E. Reoch, secretary treasurer of the Canadian Marconia Company, Limited, here.

The plan embraces high power stations at various strategic points within the Empire by which messages can be taken and forwarded, so that the British Empire will eventually become independent of cables. The importance of this plan is very great, as it would mean that in case of war with any power the British authorities would be able to go ahead with their plans whether the cables were cut or not, and could keep in close communication with the fleet anywhere between London and Hong-kong.

The communication received by Mr. Reoch states that the Imperial postmaster general, acting on behalf of His Majesty's government and the governments of the dominions and colonies, has accepted the conditions proposed by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company for the construction of all the long distance wireless stations required for the Imperial wireless scheme. This is along the lines agreed to at the conference of June of last year, when representatives of the various colonies and of the Imperial government agreed that the project was practicable.

According to the plans announced the stations will be operated for the first six months on account of the government by the Marconi Company, and after that will be taken over by the government. The company will be paid a certain sum for each station, exclusive of sites, foundation and buildings. It is further provided that the company shall receive a certain percentage of the gross receipts of all the stations during the term of the agreement, which is for twenty-eight years. The Imperial government, however, has the right to terminate the agreement at the expiration of eighteen years, in which case, however, it would lose the right to use any of the Marconi patents.

While the scheme has big commercial possibilities, it is from an Imperial point of view that the governments have taken it up. It is considered that the value of such an inter-empire wireless can hardly be overestimated, since by it not only will the Imperial government secure cheaper and quicker communication with the colonial governments, but it will obtain a more speedy and reliable communication with the fleet. All the vessels are equipped with wireless, and in this way the warships on the Pacific will be brought within almost as close touch with the Admiralty as the fleet sailing in home waters; and as these messages are all sent by secret code they would be of little used to possible hostile powers even if picked out of the air by other wireless systems.

HOME RULE BILL FOR SCOTLAND

Local Parliament to Control All Finances Except Customs—Executive Power Still Vested in Crown Through Privy Council.

London, March 29.—Home rule for Scotland is the object of a bill introduced by Dr. Chappel, Liberal member for Stirlingshire, who said that the bill was designed to establish a Scottish parliament to deal with matters exclusively relating to Scotland, thus relieving the Imperial parliament of much business. It is proposed to vest the executive power in the Crown, the administration being carried on by a committee of the Scottish privy council responsible to the Scottish parliament to impose taxes other than customs and excise. Arrangements are provided by the bill for the adjustment of financial arrangements between the Scottish parliament and Imperial parliament. The supreme power and control of Imperial parliament is expressly reserved.
