SURVEY OF 1940 IN ARMY'S PART SHOWS PROGRESS OF WAR EFFORT IN DOMINION

Review of Activities of Nation's Forces at Home and Overseas Indicates Advancement During Year

OTTAWA, December 11: (CP)—Emphasis was laid on mobility and mechanization in Canada's military training program throughout 1940 in keeping with the trends of modern warfare.

The training program was necessarily limited to some extent by lack of equipment and accommodation for troops but towards the end of the year the latter deficiency was largely met and equipment was available in greater quantities.

The outstanding development of the year, however, was in connection with preliminary rather than advanced training for the army. This was the introduction of the compulsory principle under the National Resources Mobilization Act.

As the year opened military training was concerned almost wholly with the Canadian Active Service Force, the full-time soldier now called the Active Army.

In the fall months of 1939 after the outbreak of war, two divisions were mobilized along with ancillary and coastal defence forces. The First Division was sent overseas in December, 1939, partly because available accommodation did not permit of its being concentrated in one place for advanced training in Canada.

That left the 2nd Division and some other units to carry on training throughout the winter of 1940 scattered across the country by units. In the spring camp accommodation for the 2nd division was provided and an intensive program of hut building was launched. When the 2nd Division moved overseas in the summer accommodation was available for the 3rd and 4th Divisions which were mobilized.

N.P.A.M. Activity
Early in the summer a recruiting campaign was launched to bring the Non-Permanent Active Militia, now called the reserve army, up to full war strength so that it would serve as a reserve upon which active units could draw for recruits and reinforcements.

This campaign brought the militia up to some 112,000 men, of whom about 65,000 received two weeks intensive training in camp.

Having obtained this, voluntary recruiting for the reserve army was stopped and the compulsory scheme put into effect. Under this men were called into the reserve army by age classes, starting with age 21, and started their services with a period of 30 days in 39 training centres across the country.

GET LEAVE OVER 'XMAS

Men Of H. M. S. Saguenay Get Rest Following Battle With German U-Boat

OTTAWA, Dec. 11: (CP)—Members of the crew of H. M. C. S. Saguenay, which is now at a British port receiving repairs to damage done in her battle with a German submarine, have been granted leave over Christmas and are to report back for duty on December 27.

Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King yesterday sent messages of sympathy to those bereaved as a result of the mishap to the Saguenay, also expressing hope that the wounded would soon recover.

Overseas the 1st Division, after the fall of France, made its training conform to its probable responsibilities in the defence of Britain against a German invasion. The division practised extensively in rapid movement and extended operations. The 2nd Division on its arrival went through the same type of training and, to some extent, the troops in Canada followed suit.

At Camp Borden the armored fighting vehicles training centre was organized as a nucleus of a possible Canadian tank division. An armored brigade was formed out of a number of mechanized cavalry and other units and the acquisition of some 200 old tanks from the United States made it possible for training of a larger number of men for tank duties to proceed.

Plans were made for training of troops in the use of skills during the present winter and the idea of parachute troops was considered as a possible development in preparation for an offensive stage in the war.

BLOCKADE TO STAND

Great Britain Will Not Allow Food To Get To Occupied Countries

LONDON, Dec. 11: (CP)—Great Britain yesterday ruled that the rigid blockade against sending food into German-occupied countries must be maintained. To allow food to get through to these countries would only assist the Reich and delay the liberation of the occupied countries. It is stated that the food situation in Europe should actually be somewhat improved. Any shortage there is entirely due to German action. Certain medical supplies may be allowed to pass the blockade.

NEW BOAT COMING

The fine new provincial police boat P.M.L. 15, just out of the builders' hands in the south, is due here tomorrow from Vancouver enroute to Queen Charlotte City where it is to be stationed. On board are Sergeant Alex Dunbar, officer in charge, Constable Winterburn and a radio officer. The new boat is sixty feet long by 15 foot beam. She has a 150 h.p. Vivian diesel engine.

CIANO BLAMED

LONDON—The British press today published a dispatch from Berlin by way of Stockholm stating that Count Ciano, Italian foreign minister, is being held responsible for the defeat of Italian forces in Albania, the campaign having been started before sufficient preparations had been made. Minister of Justice Dino Grandi, former Italian ambassador to London, is slated to return to his former post of foreign minister in succession to Ciano.

R. A. F. ACTIVE

LONDON—The Royal Air Force staged further successful raids on German occupied country and channel invasion bases despite unfavorable weather last night, it was announced today.

FALACIOUS THEORY

LONDON—The Press Association warned today that it was a "fallacious theory" to believe that German air raids on Great Britain were dwindling because the Nazi air force was weakened. It would be foolish to be more optimistic than to believe that the present lull was due to bad weather.

MCKINNON IN HOSPITAL

BALBOA, CANAL ZONE—Hon. J. A. McKinnon, Canadian minister of trade and commerce, on a tour with the Canadian trade delegation to the West Indies, has entered hospital here.

DUCHESS DOING WELL

MIAMI—Following a major operation, the Duchess of Windsor was reported this morning to have spent a comfortable night. She is in good spirits and feeling better, her doctor announced this morning. She is a patient in St. Francis Hospital. At 8 o'clock last night her temperature was 99.4. At 11 p.m. it was normal and has been so since. The Duke was at her bedside early this morning, solicitous of her every comfort.

GAS TO JAPAN

SAN FRANCISCO—Laden with one million gallons of aviation gas for Japanese war planes, the Japanese tanker Meta Maru sailed from here today.

TROLLER IS MISSING

VICTORIA—Provincial police reported today they were without word of the forty foot troller Aena which is unreported with three men aboard since she left Tofino December 4. Royal Canadian Air Force planes taking part in a hunt have found no trace of the boat. The missing men are William and Bert Hendricksen of Bamfield and Charles F. Bugge of Seattle.

AID TO BRITAIN

WASHINGTON D. C.—Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones indicated today that decision on the question of United States financial aid to Great Britain now awaited the return to Washington of Franklin D. Roosevelt from his Caribbean tour.

DOVER, Dec. 11: (CP)—There was half an hour of shelling yesterday between big guns on either side of the Straits of Dover. Houses were damaged on the Dover side and three persons were injured.

EVACUEES IN INDIA

BOMBAY, Dec. 11: (CP)—The War Emergency Educational Arrangements Committee has completed arrangements for the school training of European children in India who would normally have been to school in the British Isles.

War News

6000 PRISONERS AND BOOTY

CAIRO—The British command announces that more than six thousand Italian prisoners have been taken in the western desert of Egypt together with quantities of war materials. The command said that operations are proceeding satisfactorily and booty seized has not yet been sorted out. The British Army, having driven a wedge between Italian advance positions at Sidi Baranni and other Italian positions farther west, face a possible head-on collision with the main body of Italians in North Africa. Meanwhile, thirty thousand Italian soldiers are at present encircled and, if the British hold at Buq Buq, may be faced with the alternative of capture or annihilation. British navy and air force are co-operating with the mechanized army. The Italians admit themselves that the situation is difficult.

SMALL AIR RAIDS

LONDON—A single German plane dropped two bombs this morning on an East Anglian town while London had a brief pre-dawn alarm, the first in forty-six hours, when German scouting planes came over. One of the bombs wrecked a house in East Anglia, killing one person and injuring several others.

SUBMARINE BELIEVED HIT

LONDON—The German submarine that torpedoed the Canadian destroyer Saguenay is believed to have been hit by a salvo fired by the destroyers, according to A. J. McWhinnie, London Herald correspondent on a nearby British destroyer.

All British Forces Combining to Bottle Up Large Body of Fascists on Western Desert—Talk of Complete Withdrawal From Albania

SIDI BARANNI TAKEN!

LONDON, December 11: (CP)—British forces recaptured Sidi Baranni this afternoon, it was officially announced tonight. A communique from Cairo issued in London said a large number of prisoners, including three generals, were captured. The town was the main advance base of the Italian drive into Egypt.

With even Rome admitting that things are not going at all well for the Italians, Fascist forces today faced fresh military disasters both in Egypt and Albania. In the western desert of Egypt, the British army, navy and air force were co-operating in pocketing thirty thousand Italian troops in a triangle with its apex near Buq Buq on the Mediterranean west of Sidi Baranni. Already six thousand men had been taken prisoners, a considerable amount of war material seized and thirty thousand more Italian troops were facing surrender or annihilation. In London military authorities were cautious in surveying the situation. If the British could hold at Buq Buq, they said, a large Italian army might be trapped. In view of the vast territory, it was suggested that the campaign be kept in proper perspective. In Albania the Italians were still in retreat and it was suggested there might be a complete Fascist withdrawal through the port of Durazzo.

SANCTIONS ON JAPAN

Iron and Steel Product Exports From United States to be Embargoed After End of Year

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 11: (CP)—Iron and steel sanctions against Japan will go into effect on December 31, it is announced officially. At the same time the Asiatic fleet of the United States Navy is to be strengthened.

Domei Japanese News Agency declared in a Tokyo broadcast today that the United States extension of the export licensing system to iron ore, pig iron and steel products "is regarded here as a new economic measure expressly aimed at Japan."

INDIAN AMBULANCES

DELHI, Dec. 11: (CP)—Fifty new military ambulances are being purchased through a popular fund, to be manned and maintained by the St. John Ambulance Brigade, "for use in India only."

In Rome the Italian high command admitted that Fascist forces were in retreat around Sidi Baranni in Egypt after being overpowered in the British offensive. A general has been killed in the Egyptian campaign, the Italians admit.

MILKMAN MUST SERVE

MANCHESTER, Dec. 11: (CP)—Both Nazism and British "so-called democracy" are capitalistic systems, said a milk roundsman appealing to a conscientious objector's tribunal for release from military service. But the judges decided he must serve.

PR. GEORGE MAN HELD

William Allan Hunt, Aged 76, Arrested After Stabbing on Train In East

RIMOUSKI, Quebec, Dec. 11: (CP)—Sergeant Moise Gauvin of the Quebec Provincial police said last night that William Allan Hunt, aged 76, of Prince George was being held here pending an inquest into the death of Joseph Madore, 68, of St. Clophase, Quebec, aboard a Moncton-bound passenger train.

Madore died of what Sergeant Gauvin said was a knife wound in the heart.

Gauvin quoted Hunt as saying that he struck Madore in self-defence, thinking Madore was about to strike him.

Lesson Of The War . . .

Percy J. Phillip, Canadian correspondent of the New York Times and formerly newspaper correspondent in France, speaking last week, told of the French being without mechanized war material and without any real leader as a result of which they were beaten by the Germans. He said:

"Let us look squarely at the facts. France lost the war because she was disunited, without discipline and strong leadership at a time when she had to face, with an armed force which was numerically far inferior to that which Foch had at his disposal in 1918, an enemy who was disciplined to the point of complete unity, who was armed to the utmost necessity by the tremendous labor—sixty, seventy and even eighty hours a week—of the German men and women in the factories who was in large part fanatically inspired and under the spell of that 'wicked man' Adolf Hitler.

It is for us who are still fighting this war, if we want to win, to learn a lesson instead of wasting time criticizing others and that lesson is surely that we will have to put everything we have of courage, of work, of skill, of loyal obedience and of sacrifice into the task of beating that tremendous force of evil which Herr Hitler has built up and holds ready to strike at us again.

"We are still free—but these people of France, of Belgium, of Holland and all these other countries are living day after day in the presence of their conquerors. Can you imagine what their feelings are, what yours would be?"

Monstrous Outrage . . .

"And now Hitler has piled this new monstrous outrage on conquered France," said Mr. Phillip. "As he did in Alsace, he has turned seventy thousand good Lorrainers out of their homes, pell-mell with a suitcase and thirty dollars of all their possessions. Their rich farms, their industries, their businesses built up through long patient years have been stripped from them to be given to Germans so that, forsooth, the problem of the Rhineland shall be settled forever.

What nonsense. Joan of Arc was from Lorraine and she wasn't German. And then didn't Hitler build his whole career on the alleged injustices to Germany of the Treaty of Versailles? How then can he justify this far greater injustice than was ever done to Germany?"

To make a new world? Hitler's new world. Is that how it is going to be made? If it is, it will be a world filled with new bitter hatreds, far deeper even than those Hitler has nourished in his heart and installed into his people. Its policies will be dreams of vengeance and its ambitions will be violent and evil.

Oh yes, there was plenty that was wrong with the old world. It was just as men make it and they are imperfect workers. But we did seem to be getting somewhere and surely the interest and fun, and perhaps even the meaning of living, is not so much in accomplishment as in the effort to make the world a better place to live in, imperfectly of course, for life is always changing its forms, but all together, helpfully and with faith, hope and charity.

What impertinence it is for this man who never did an honest day's work in his life—a failure from the Munich bread-line—to think that he can shatter the world to bits "and then remould it nearer to the heart's desire," sowing dragon's teeth of hatred, spoiling the lives of so many millions.

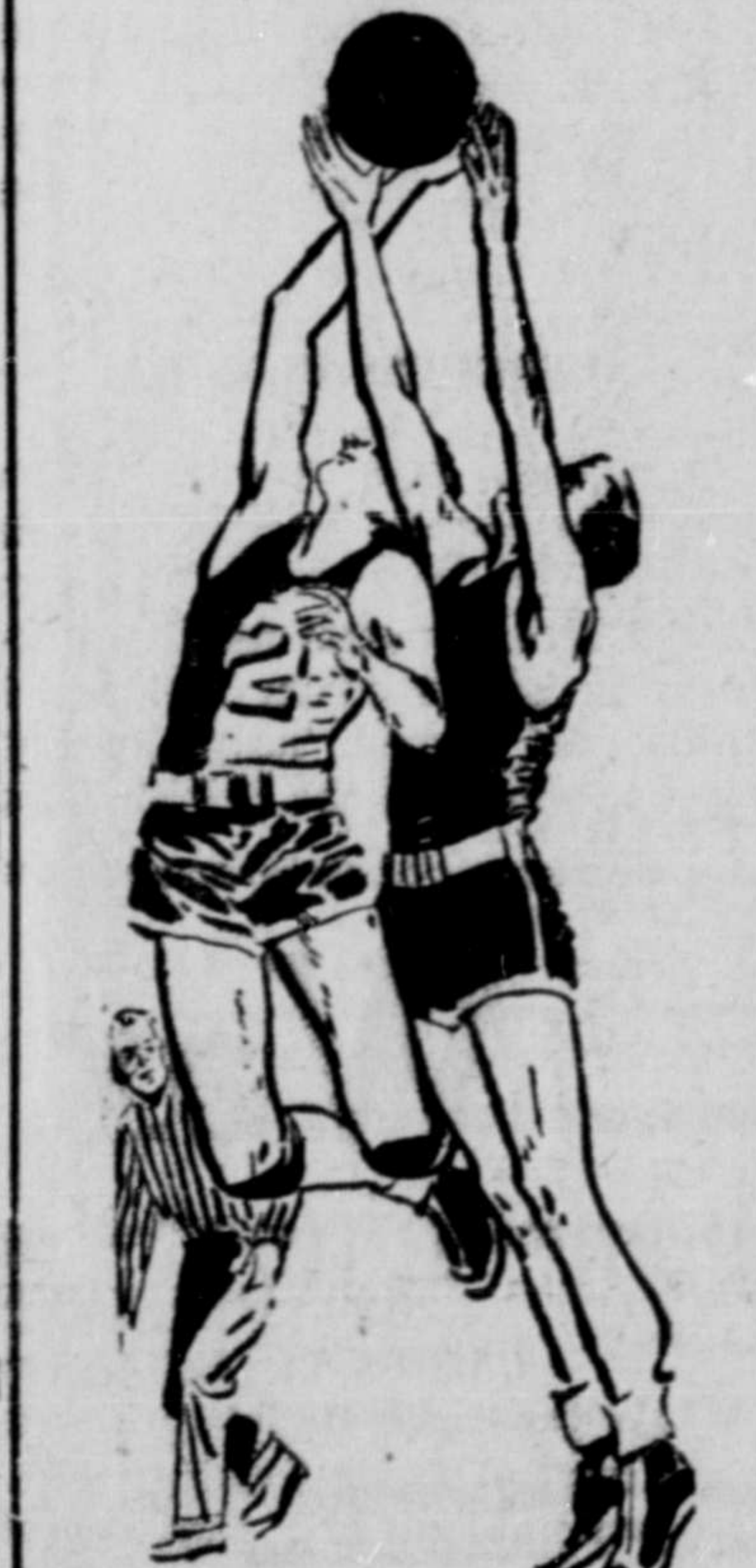

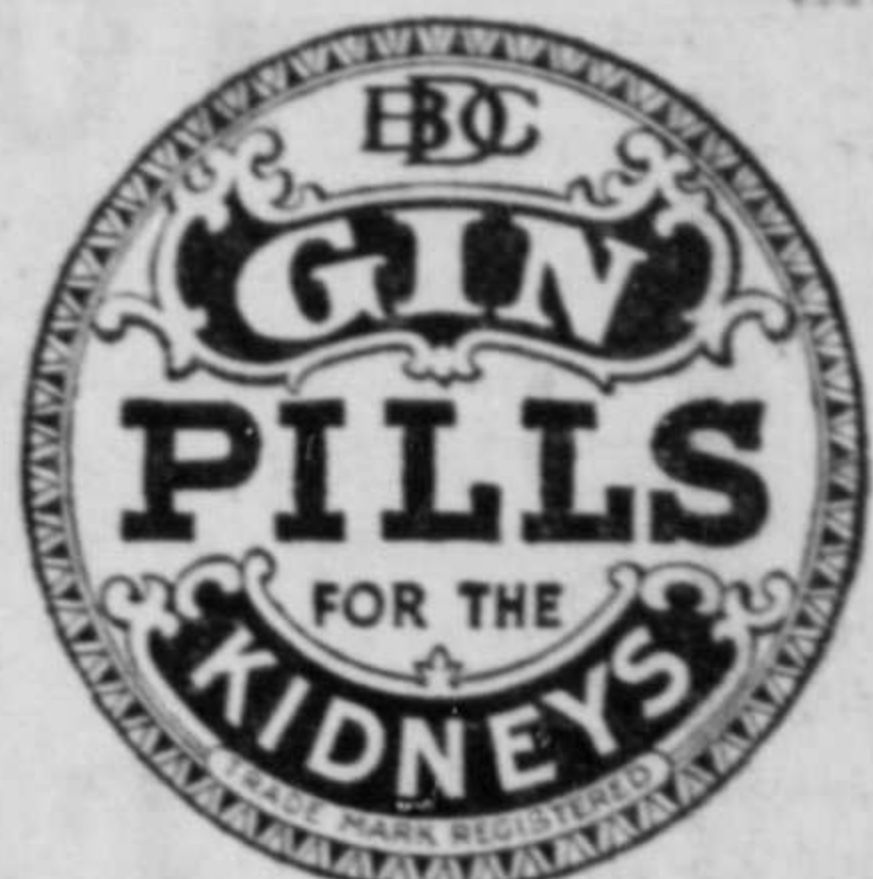

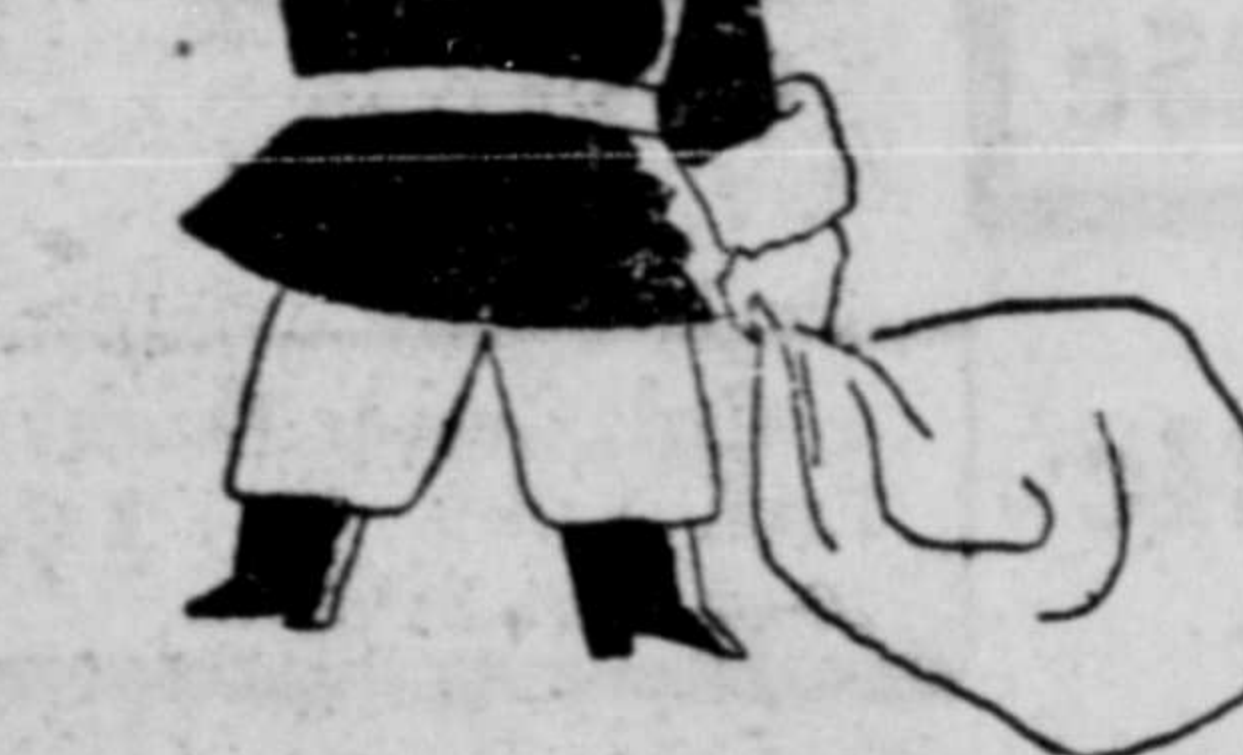

BIG YOUTH GATHERING ADDRESSED

Sperry Phillips at Francois Lake—Newly Weds Greeted
(By Trygveon Maivany)

FRANCOIS LAKE, December 11
Secretary of the Boys' and Girls' Clubs of British Columbia, addressed at Francois one of the greatest gatherings of young people ever assembled in the Central Interior. Arriving after short notice he found the front benches occupied by old timers and eager dancers awaiting the coming of the Burns Lake Orchestra.

Introduced by Hazen D. Long, president of the Francois Lake Seed Growers' Association, and by John H. Keefe, president of the Farmers' Institute, Mr. Phillips had an appreciative audience. Drawing the attention of the boys and girls to the fact that the first grain clubs were organized in Central British Columbia, and that the first calf clubs were organized at Uncha Valley and Danskin, he showed them that the responsibility of production was theirs. Dwelling on the importance of Junior Club work he commended their organization which had been recognized by the Ministry of Agriculture and especially by the Deputy Minister, J. B. Munro. At the mention of Mr. Munro's name a roar of applause went up and it was apparent that he was well known to the young audience.

Mr. Phillips reminded his audience that their parents had made great sacrifices, endured all the hardships of pioneers and carried all the weight of development. Commending the organizations for much they had already accomplished, he spoke briefly of the main objects of these clubs—first, to keep the young men and women on the land where there was a security which did not exist in the floating labor market, although farm training is of great value to boys and girls in any walk of life. Many high positions in industry and government were held by men whom as boys got their early training on the farm.

Delineates Prospects
Mr. Phillips went on in a delineation of the many projects sponsored by the Boys' and Girls' Clubs which give them special training that was useful if they remained on the farm. These projects include calf clubs, swine, sheep, poultry, root crops, grain and seed growing. He stated that it was also intended that club work fit in with the general farm program of the district but that it was quite obvious that in most districts there has been little study of a definite farm program.

In the Junior Live Stock Clubs training was given in care, management and feeding of livestock. In the crop clubs training was given in the preparation of soil and cultivation. Most important of all, all club members were required to keep careful records showing whether or not a profit had been made in the operation of the project. Club members were required to carry on judging competitions and the winners of local competitions were eligible to take part in the provincial elimination contests.

The winners of the Provincial Judging Competitions were given a trip to Eastern Canada as the guests of the Canadian Council on Boys' and Girls' Club work. Here they competed in judging contests with teams from every part of Canada and it was not surprising that, when they returned to their homes, they would have acquired much information which would be useful in the development of agriculture in their own districts. The success of this work, of course, depended to a large extent on local support.

The organization of the clubs in a community was under the direct supervision of the District Agriculturist but it was more than a one man job. It is necessary to have the support of all local organizations and in the past, they had had magnificent support, speaking generally, particularly from the Farmers' Institutes, Women's Institutes, local fall fairs and Boards of Trade.

Possibly the most important factor in carrying through any of these projects was the local organizer. This was usually some public spirited citizen, whether farmer, school-teacher or business man, who devoted a great deal of his time to organizing and seeing that the juniors received proper training. There was no remuneration

received by the local organizer but most of them felt that the work was worth while for the satisfaction of accomplishment. Junior Club work in Central British Columbia was well organized, considering the difficulties of the district. The importance of this work was widely recognized as it was quite obvious that it is only a matter of a few years until the boys and girls, now members of these clubs, would be required to take on the responsibility of agricultural production.

Newlyweds Greeted
Mr. Phillips was just getting into his stride when the Burns Lake Orchestra stole quietly in. The crash of the opening bars of the Wedding March from "Lohengrin" introduced the advent of the latest newlyweds, Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Staunton, and their entourage. Equal to the occasion, Mr. Phillips kissed the bride who a few short hours before was Miss Martha Sutherland, prominent member of all Boys' and Girls' Clubs, kissed the bridesmaid and even the flower girl, wee Peggy Staunton.

In a neat congratulatory speech he conveyed the compliments of the Department of Agriculture to the newlyweds. His toast to the bride brought a crowded house, full of intent listeners to their feet and, at the request of the groom, the District Agriculturist, S. G. Preston, responded blushing but showing an intimacy with the home life of the Central Interior which further endeared him to the people of the Lakes District.
