THE CARNIVAL

So far the carnival seems to have been an unqualified success. There has been a lot of splendid team work and there have also been complaints that some of those who promised to help have fallen down on the job and left the work to others. On the whole, however, the results have been excellent and a great many people have enjoyed the games and other forms of entertainment.

Tonight is the final night and those who have not so far been able to visit the Exhibition building should take advantage of the last opportunity. Two or three hours of frivolity is all right for a change, especially in these war days when we are apt to stick too closely to our radios.

STILL KEEPS US GUESSING

Germany is still keeping us all guessing as to whether she has done her worst in connection with the proposed invasion of Britain or if there is something worse to come." Every effort so far has been met and the probability is that a new effort will exceed anything hitherto tried out. While the British so far have brought down just a thousand planes since the bombardment began and possibly five or six thousand German airmen have lost their lives in addition to a proportion of those about which the Royal Air Force is doubtful, Germany still has plenty of planes but many are not much good for combat with the British.

It is possible that Germany is waiting for new planes and for some of the old ones to be brought up to date. What seems certain is that German airmen will not be able to meet the British on anything like equal terms owing to lack of skill and lack of up to the minute planes.

BOTH ARE CRITICAL

Visitors from the interior during the week have been a little critical of some of the Prince Rupert people in not making a greater effort to do business with the farmer and others of the interior. One man said he knew there were difficulties, for goods were not always packed and displayed as they should be and sometimes meat was not! just as well killed as it might be. Yet the interior people. were trying to fulfil the local requirements in this respect. Eggs were being properly packed and graded and packing li and grading of other goods was being attended to in some instances. Efforts toward improvement were being made.

The plea of most of the visitors was that Prince Rupert was the natural market for the interior and that there must be a certain amount of give and take, whereas some merchants wanted to take everything. Suggestions! from Prince Rupert merchants would receive consideration by the shippers as long as they were not too exacting.

****************** Already, it seems, there has been a noticeable change in the situation on both sides. Prince Rupert merchants and the residents generally are more receptive than in the past to handling or purchasing interior products. Interior growers are more anxious to meet the conditions which are necessary in order that the Central British Columbia products may compete with southern growers. What is needed now, it seems, is an added impetus on both sides. Prince Rupert should be more receptive and growers more anxious to meet conditions.
