BRING DOWN NAZI SHIPS

Eleven Enemy Planes Destroyed as Result of Yesterday's Raids on Britain

Again Today

England, Scotland and Wales All Visited Again Today

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—An Air Ministry communique said that in all eleven enemy planes were destroyed yesterday as the Royal Air Force continued to take unremitting toll in the course of continued German air raiding of the United Kingdom, making 34 Nazi planes to be brought down in two days, 72 during the week and 109 since June 18 when the present phase of air warfare commenced.

As the aerial combat between Great Britain and Germany reached a new peak of intensity today, the Nazis carried out further raids in England, Scotland and Wales. The casualties were not heavy and damage was stated to be inconsequential as far as military objectives were concerned despite German claims to the contrary. One man was reported killed in southwest Scotland and one in Wales, others being injured. Many bombs were dropped on a town in north-east England. There were also night raids by the Germans and a few persons were killed.

A German bomber was shot down during a terrific dogfight over southwest coast town this afternoon. Observers said the German plane crashed just offshore. Several other raiders were, apparently, damaged and were driven off without reaching their objective.

OTTAWA, July 13: (CP)—Marketing measures such as were accorded Canadian apples and lobsters cannot be applied to British Columbia canned salmon. Hon. J. E. Michaud, federal minister of fisheries, states. Such measures would prove of no advantage to the canned salmon industry, Mr. Michaud said.

Packard Will Make Engines

Will Carry Out Order For Britain Which Ford Turned Down

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 13: (CP)—The Packard Motor Corporation will produce 9000 Rolls-Royce airplane engines for Great Britain and United States. The order, as far as Britain is concerned, had been turned down by the Ford Motor Corporation. Three thousand of the engines will be for the United States government and 6000 for Britain.

Laval Is Named Vice-Dictator Of New France

VICHY, July 13: (CP)—Chief of State Petain has named Former Premier Pierre Laval as Vice-President and his successor as dictator of France. General Maxime Weygand is named minister of defence. There was a meeting of the totalitarian cabinet today following completion of its formation.

MAY BREAK WITH TURKS

Roumania Says it is Ready to Sever Entente With Turkey

BUCHAREST, July 13: (CP)—Roumania reported that it was ready to sever the Balkan entente with Turkey unless officials responsible for Turkey's mutual assistance pact with France and Great Britain are replaced.

BIG ATTACK Warded Off

Italians Unable To Drive British Defenders Out Of Moyale On Kenya-Ethiopian Frontier

NARIOBI, Kenya Colony, July 13: (CP)—British defenders, consisting largely of South Africans, have not only staved off a three-day assault by heavy Italian mechanized forces and artillery on Moyale, strong fortified post on the Kenya-Ethiopian frontier, but in a counter-thrust, inflicted heavy losses on the Italians. British headquarters said that reinforcements are enroute. The Italians had staged a general bombardment. Italian planes also made an unsuccessful attack, two being brought down.

Bank Head TO RESIGN

Unconfirmed Reports That Montagu Norman Is Retiring And Will Be Succeeded By Lord Catto

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—Unconfirmed reports in London are to the effect that Montagu Norman will resign as Governor of the Bank of England. Lord Catto is regarded as the chief candidate to succeed him.

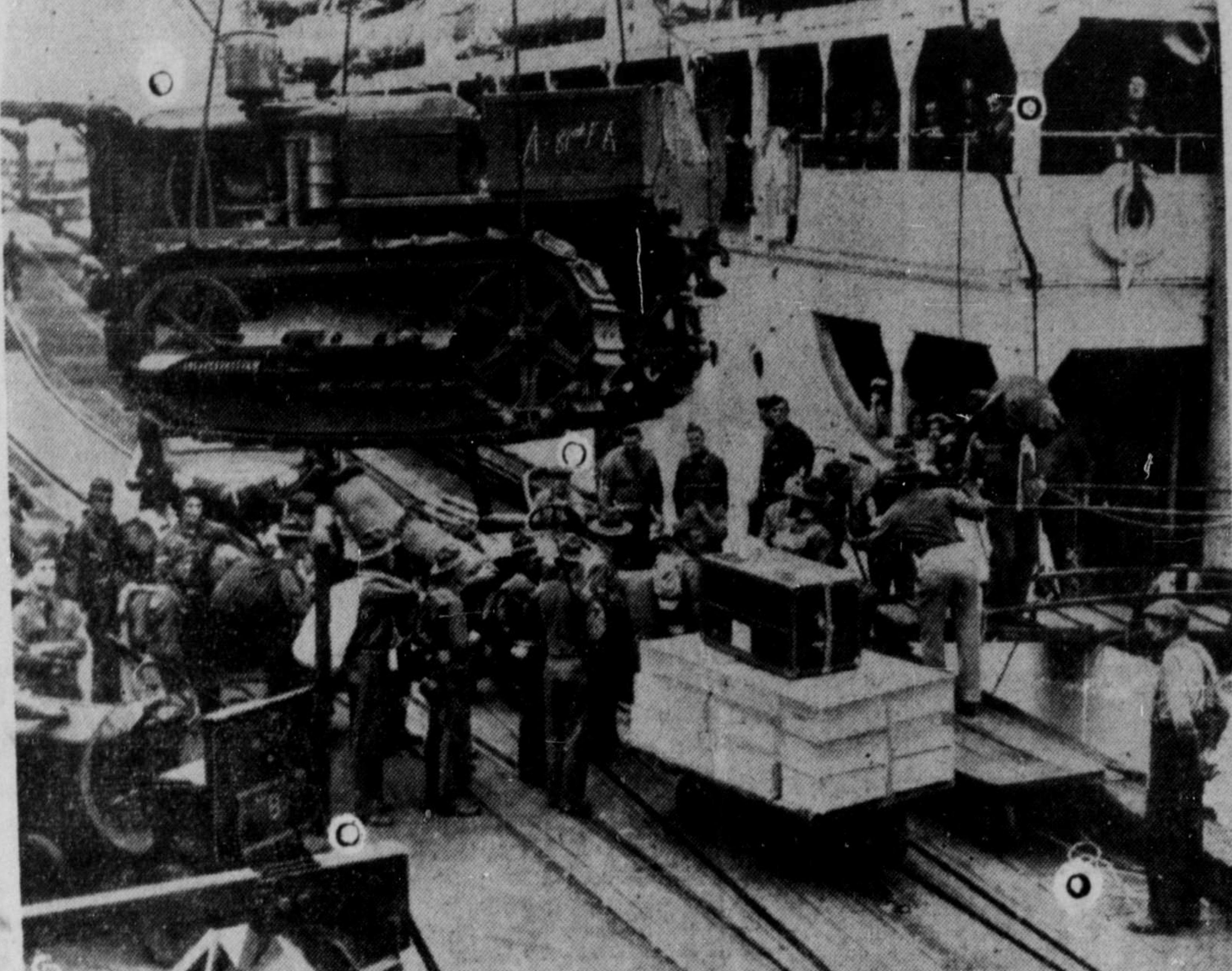

ACCEDED TO BY BRITAIN

Burma Railway Being Closed To Shipment Of War Materials To China

TOKIO, July 13: (CP)—The Associated Press reports that Great Britain has acceded to Japanese demands and prohibited the shipment of war materials over the Burma railway to China. The ban, however, Britain insists, shall not apply to foodstuffs, movement of munitions and gasoline being banned.

Intimation of the compromise was given following a conference of Sir Robert Craigie, British ambassador, with Foreign Minister Arita.

Another report was that Great Britain had agreed to close the Burma railway for two months while negotiations between Britain and Japan proceed.

NEW BEAM IS FOUND

Can Melt Airplane Engines At Distance Of 250 Miles

NEW YORK, July 13: (CP)—Nikolai Tesla, noted inventor, claims to have devised a beam, based on a newly-found principle of physics, by which an airplane engine can be melted at a distance of 250 miles. Tesla has offered the invention to the United States government.

TWO FLIERS LOSE LIVES

Double Tragedy in Crash at Brandon Today

BRANDON, Man., July 13: (CP)—Pte. F. J. Hunter of the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps and Simon Rosenman Jr., a Brandon flying club instructor, were killed this morning when their plane nose dived into a field four miles west of Brandon.

REUNION ON THE GO
DERBY, Eng., July 13: (CP)—Bryan Harrison, evacuee from Kent, was sitting on a fence watching trains go up the Derbyshire slope when he heard his name called from a passing troop train. His father was in the train, back from Flanders.

Thirty-Two Year-Olds Register

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—Registration of all Britons of 32 years of age for military service commenced today.

With the extension of Britain's highly geared mobilization program, the addition of the approximately 300,000 thirty-two-year-old men makes the total now called to the colors three million. Lending urgency to the mobilization are the continued Nazi air raids.

CUBA HAS ELECTION

Island Republic Is Choosing A President On July 14

HAVANA, July 13: (CP)—Cuba's general elections come Sunday. The most active campaign ever seen in Cuba is being staged by Senor Fulgencio Batista and Dr. Ramon San Martin, presidential candidates.

Batista, ex-chief of the Cuban army, and Dr. Grau San Martin, a former revolutionary president of the republic, lead the government and opposition parties, respectively.

The Agrarian party has its own presidential candidate, Dr. Reinaldo Marquez Camacho, Havana University professor.

In the constituent assembly elections last November 15, the seven political parties forming the Social-Democratic coalition backing Batista got 709,721 votes; the opposition, led by Dr. Grau San Martin, cornered only 271,622.

Batista was the army sergeant who on September 4, 1933, led a coup d'etat which ousted all commissioned officers. For years he could have had the presidency by another coup, but he chose to resign his army command and leave it to the voters to decide whether he should be president or retire from public life.

CALLING UP SINGLE MEN

They Will Be Required To Take Up Military Service First Under New Canadian Plan

OTTAWA, July 13: (CP)—Under the compulsory national service plan for Canada single men will first be called up for military service. Hon. J. G. Gardiner, minister of national services, announced to the House of Commons last night.

There will be two lists of registered manpower—one immediate, one postponed. Married men and those engaged in essential industries will be placed on a postponed list and will be subject to call later.

Men marrying after July 15 will be considered unmarried. There will be only a very few definite grounds of exemption. The national service measure was passed by the Senate yesterday. Precedent in Senate procedure was created when Hon. J. G. Gardiner sat in the upper chamber to advise the Senate government leader, Hon. Raoul Dandurand.

VOLCANO ERUPTING

Nineteen Killed or Injured by New Japanese Lava Flow

TOKYO, July 13: (CP)—The volcano Miyake is reported erupting and dispatches say nineteen were killed or injured and that thirty others were reported missing.

COULD GIVE EIRE HELP

Great Britain In Position To Assist Strongly In Repelling Possible Invasion

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—While hope has been given up of inducing Eire to withdraw from its policy of neutrality in the war, it is stated officially that Great Britain is now in a position, should it become necessary, to send large forces to the defence of that country in the event of an invasion. No initiative, however, would be taken in interfering with the neutrality of Eire.

Baltic States Are Cut Off From Germany

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—Railway service and communications between Germany and the Baltic States of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania have been suspended for some days, according to advices received here.

FINN SHIP TORPEDOED

Crew of Freighter Petsamo Land Safely At Cork Following Attack

CORK, July 13: (CP)—Crew of forty-two of the 4,500-ton Finnish freighter Petsamo has been landed here following the torpedoing and sinking of the vessel off the west coast of Eire.

CO-ORDINATE WAR EFFORT

Great Britain And Ethiopia Unite With View To Defeating Italy In North Africa

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—In connection with his announcement that Great Britain will recognize the government of Emperor Haile Selassie as the lawful government of Ethiopia, R. A. Butler, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, told the House of Commons that British and Ethiopian forces will co-ordinate all activities "likely to damage the enemy's effort in north and east Africa and Ethiopia."

TURKEY IN NO DANGER

Premier Gives Assurance To Assembly—Joint Control Of Dardanelles

ANKARA, July 13: (CP)—The Premier of Turkey told the National Assembly that the country was in no danger from foreign aggression. Joint control of the Dardanelles by Turkey and Russia is predicted.

CHILDREN IN CANADA

Two Thousand Arrive From Great Britain and More Are Coming

Met Submarines

Convoys of British Warships Believed to Have Sunk U-Boat

HALIFAX, July 13: (CP)—Nearly two thousand children sent from Great Britain to be guests of Canadian families for the duration of the war were aboard two liners docking at an eastern Canadian port yesterday. A third ship laden with children was reported close behind. It was stated that they were brought out under a private plan.

The convoy with the children had encounters with Nazi submarine ambushes but escorting British warships drove the u-boats off and one is believed to have been sunk. In addition to the children, there were mothers in many cases on board as well as some prominent individuals including Sir Norman Angell, noted writer, and Lady Angell and the newspaper correspondent from Paris known as "Pertinax" who escaped from France after a warrant had been issued for his arrest.

GREEK SHIP DESTROYED

Hellenic Shipper Burns And Is Abandoned Off Columbia River

ASTORIA, July 13: (CP)—The Greek steamer Hellenic Shipper has been abandoned one hundred miles off Astoria at the mouth of the Columbia River following a mysterious fire. The crew put off in lifeboats and all were rescued safely by fishing boats. The vessel was bound for Honolulu.

Evacuation Has Been Postponed

Warships Not Available To Provide For Escort of Children

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—It was announced that the government had postponed indefinitely plans to evacuate children to Canada and the United States. The reason for the suspension is that warships cannot be spared to provide escort vessels which are considered necessary in view of the German u-boat threat as indicated by the sinking last week of the Arandora Star. Meantime children can be sent on private responsibility.

Japan Fires On Ships Of Gt. Britain?

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—There is no confirmation here and Tokyo denies reports from Moscow that Japanese naval vessels fired on two British ships off the central Chinese coast, killing six members of their crews. The report was originally published in a small Chinese vernacular newspaper at Shanghai, the Chinese American Daily News. The boats were not bonafide British boats but were rather Chinese "chicken boats" with no Occidental officers. They might have been smugglers.

BAR GOLD

LONDON, (CP)—The Montreal price of bar gold on the London market was unchanged today at \$37.54 per fine ounce.

RUSSIA KEEPING OUT

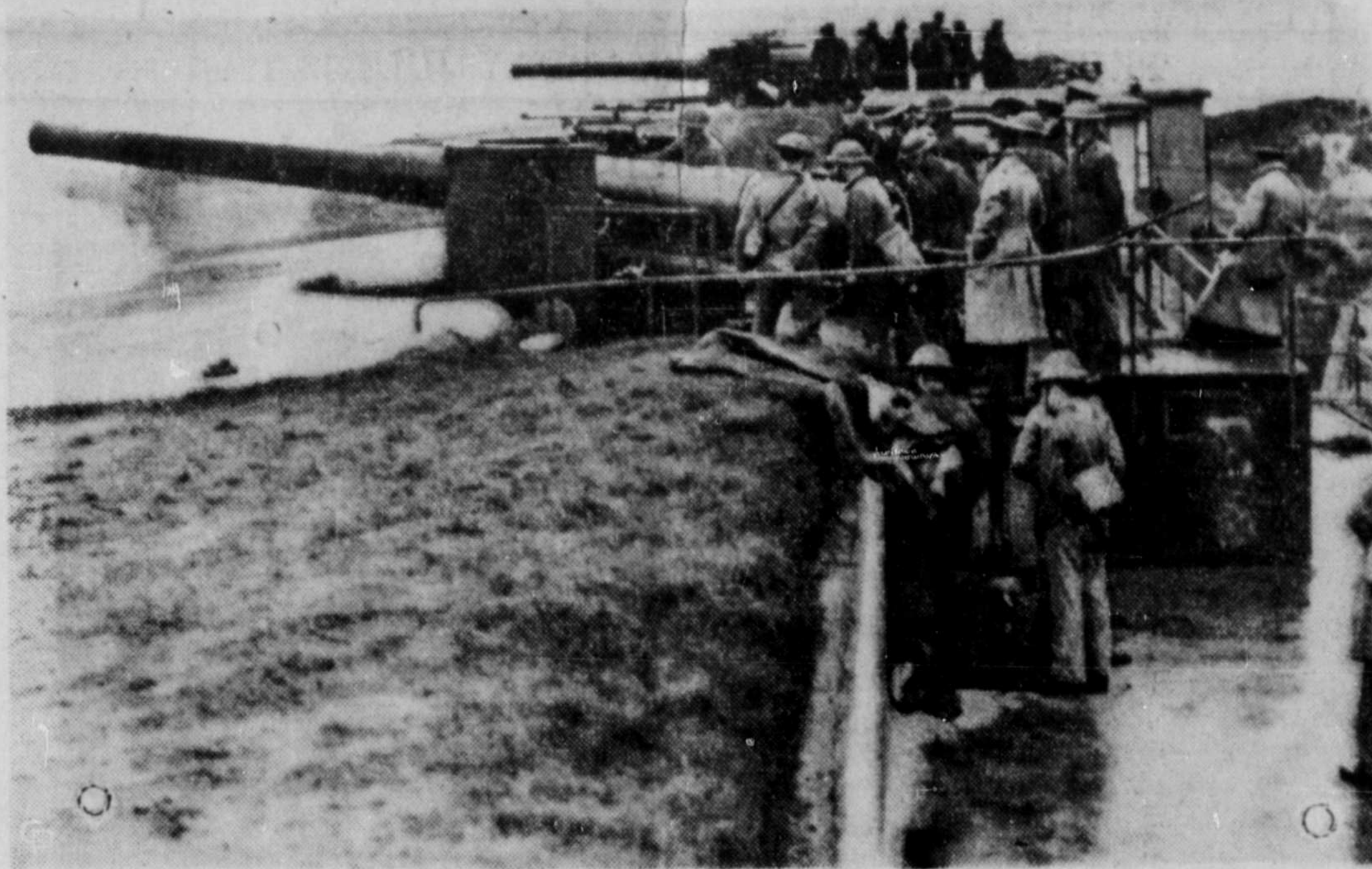

Dizzy doesn't even consider the possibility that he won't be able to make the grade again with the Cubs and his Texas league fans seem to have the same philosophy—all except one of Dizzy's staunchest friends. She doesn't attend baseball games, but she has it all figured out what Dizzy can do if his arm falls him permanently.

The lady is 87 years old and she is Dizzy's grandmother, Mrs. C. M. Dean of Beggs, Oklahoma.

Her idea: If Dizzy is ever washed out of baseball she thinks he would make a fine preacher.

Dutch Reuther, the scout who was sent along with Dizzy from the Chicago Cubs to coach him while he tries to reconstruct his pitching form, says he now can see improvement in Dizzy's performance.

Many Loyal Fans

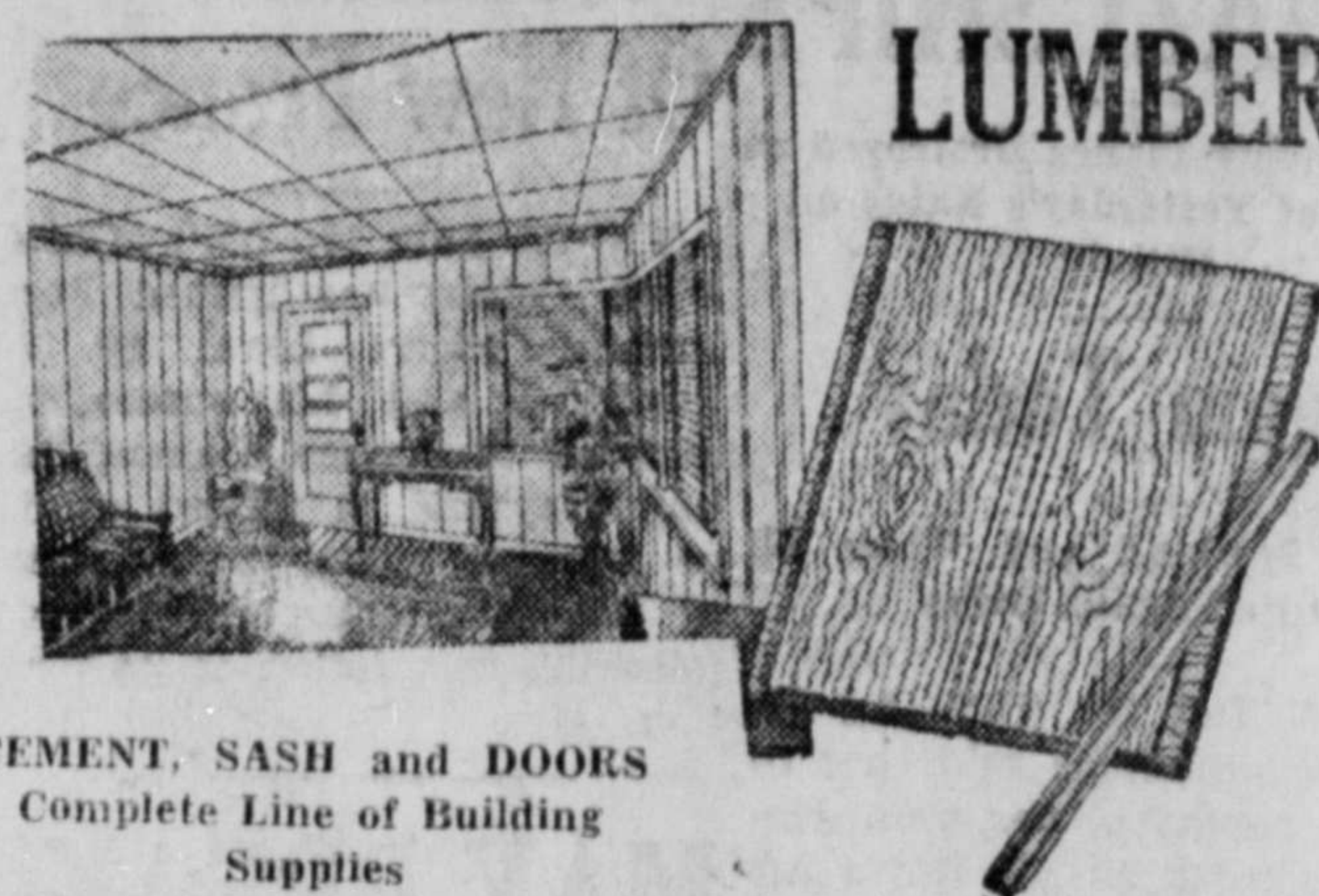

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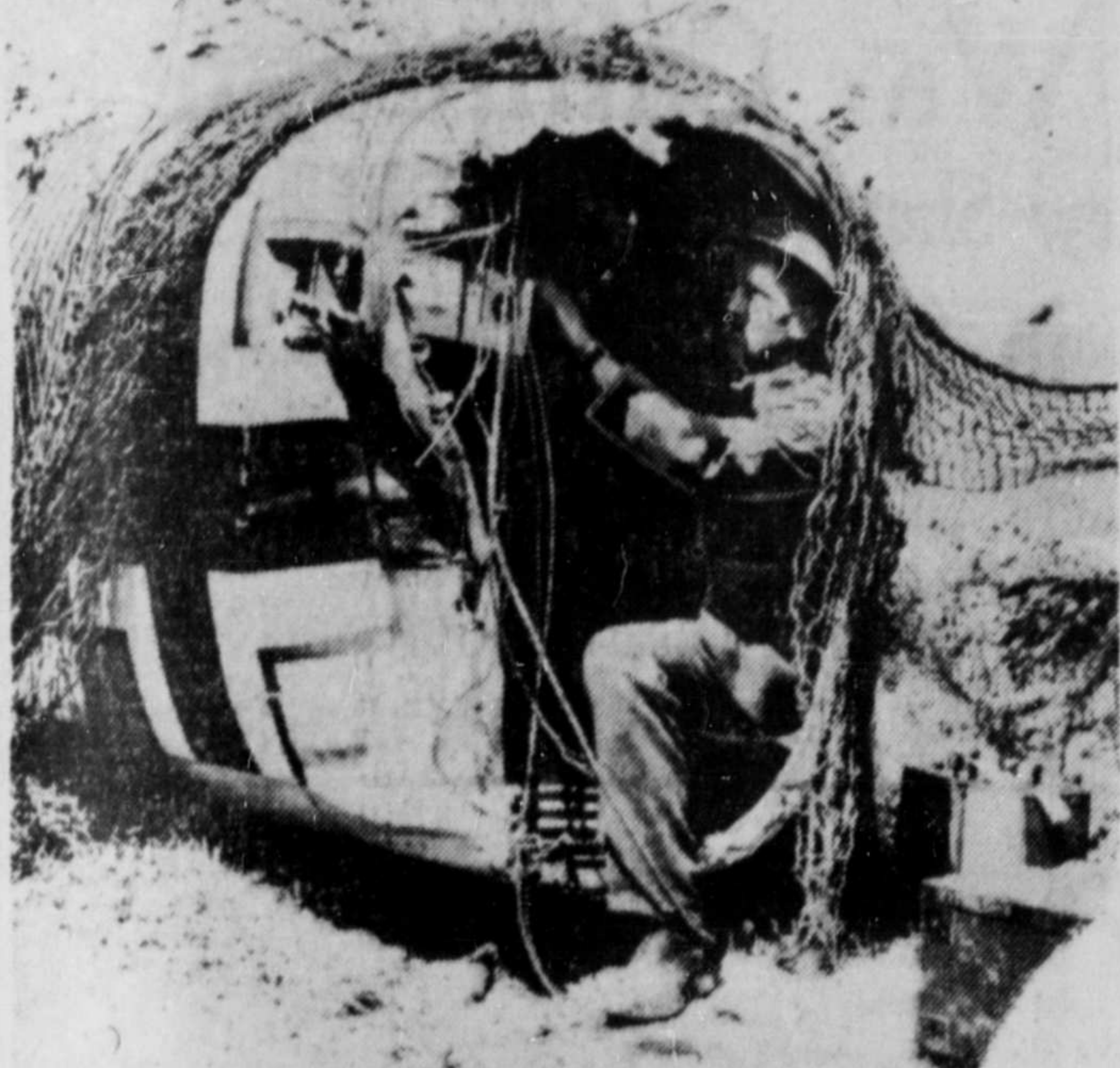

PRYING FOR NAZI PLANE SECRETS



A British aviation sergeant mechanic is shown carefully taking a German bomber apart piece by piece. The plane is a Junkers 88, the latest type of German bomber. It was shot down by Royal Air Force fighters. NO BETTER HOSPITAL

Million Dollar Red Cross Effort Has Produced Best Set-up Of Kind

LONDON, July 13: (CP)—The finest military hospital in Britain shortly will be ready to receive members of Canada's fighting forces wounded in war.

Officers of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps are convinced that the Canadian Red Cross Hospital, nearing completion in the quiet of the countryside, surpasses anything else of its kind here.

Built and equipped by the Canadian Red Cross Society, it will shortly be turned over to the R. C. A. M. C. which will staff it. The property, situated on a private estate, has been leased for a nominal rental of one shilling yearly.

Costing approximately \$1,000,000, it has accommodation under normal conditions for 60 officers and 480 men. If necessary, it can take as many as 750 men.

Canadian newspapermen, on a visit to the hospital, found it occupied by an army of workmen. Construction began last January but frost delayed the foundation work for a month after that. Packages of equipment were being unloaded by men of the R. C. A. M. C.

Officers paid tribute to the work of the men of the unit—No. 5 General Hospital R. C. A. M. C.—in helping convey tons of freight from a nearby railway station. Captain Alec O'Hara, from Kenora, Ont., quartermaster of the unit, pointed to the big comfortable beds and described how they had been shifted from trains onto trucks, then onto trolleys, then taken on handcarts into the wards. All the packing cases were being salvaged, he said, and were fetching more money for the Canadian Red Cross than they originally cost in Canada.

The array of equipment includes tables and chairs from Stratford, Ontario, and mattresses from Montreal; wheel stretchers from Woodstock, Ont., and an operating table from Toronto. Sterilizing equipment was brought from Madison, Wisconsin, because none was available in Canada.

Especially impressive was the up-to-date kitchen. Its modern fittings were pointed to with pride by Capt. O'Hara. They include a battery of coke-burning ovens, giant steam kettles in which anything can be cooked, electric hot plates and a cold-room with capacity for a fortnight's supply of food. Heating, ventilation and humidity are controlled by special apparatus fixed to the ceiling.

In the kitchen, ready to go into action when the hospital opens, was a veteran soldier and chef, Corporal John W. Sharley, who used to live in Winnipeg. Corporal Sharley was a chef of the Royal Fusiliers in the first Great War and has resumed his old job for the R. C. A. M. C.

"I'm as ready as the kitchen is," he said.

George Nasmith of Toronto, deputy commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross Society in London, mentioned the complexity of the task of obtaining equipment and supplies for a hospital of this kind. He paid tribute to the way in which this had been accomplished. This purchasing job has been in the hands of Major C. A. Scott of Toronto, well-known civil engineer, who served in the last war with the Canadian Engineers.

Col. C. L. T. Arthur, well-known Winnipeg doctor, who served with the Canadian Forces in the First Great War, will staff the hospital. The reinforced brick structure is laid out around a two-storey administration block. Every other section is one storey only.

General Design The imposing white-pillared entrance to the administration block is surmounted with the Canadian coat of arms. A long enclosed corridor connects it with various departments. These include a special laboratory for Sir Frederick Banting, which will be completed to his own requirements, x-ray department, dispensary, operating unit, dining room and kitchen and officers' wards. There will be three operating theatres.

Back of the administration block is an enclosed courtyard and back of it again a corridor 865 feet long

Waterfront Whiffs

Canadian Halibut Landings This Season Will Be Little, If Any, Greater Than Last—Gill Netters Are Doing Quite Well—Trollers Not So Good




Up to the eve of the closing of fishing in Area No. 2 in which the majority of the vessels of the Prince Rupert fleet operate, halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1940 season have reached a total of 10,416,119 pounds including 4,357,019 pounds from Canadian vessels and 6,059,100 pounds from American boats. The grand total is substantially in excess of last year's 8,924,800 pounds at a corresponding date. The Canadian total compares with 3,949,300 pounds last year, the big increase for this year being in American fish comparing with 4,975,500 pounds a year ago. With the 1939 season some two weeks longer than 1940 it is even possible that, when all returns are in, this year's Canadian total may be smaller than last. In any case, there is nothing to suggest that it will be much larger. During the past week landings totalled 732,800 pounds of which 444,100 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 288,500 pounds from American. Prices held steady during the week with the high bid of the week for Canadian fish 10.7c and 7.5c which the Oldfield received for 12,000 pounds and the low 9c and 7c which the May L. and I. H. received for 2,400 and 4,500 pounds respectively. For American fish the high price of the week was 9.9c and 7.5c and the low 9c and 7.5c. The high price was received by the Eureka for 14,500 pounds and the low by the Foremost for 40,000 pounds. Yesterday the final day of the week only Canadian fish was in, 50,700 pounds being sold at from 9.5c and 7c to 10.3c and 7c.

CLARIFY ADDRESSES

Some Changes Noted in Official Designations As Princess Alice Retains Royal Title

OTTAWA, July 13: (CP) — Throughout the Dominion there is considerable uncertainty regarding correct titular designations for the new Governor-General and his consort. This is understandable because the position is unusual in Canada.

The Earl of Athlone is correctly referred to as "the Governor-General" and at second reference may be styled "his Excellency." The form "his Excellency the Governor-General" is rarely used; the term "Governor-General" being considered more dignified.

Princess Alice, as daughter of Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany, and fourth son of Queen Victoria, retains her royal title. She should never be referred to as "her Excellency," but invariably as "her Royal Highness." Shortest and most usual form of address and reference is simply "Princess Alice."

The expression "their Excellencies" is incorrect and never used in this regime. The Governor-General and Princess Alice, when mentioned together, should be referred to as "his Excellency and her Royal Highness."

Princess Alice should never be referred to as the "Countess of Athlone," but the title "Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone," is correct and this may be shortened to "Princess Alice." The designation "her Royal Highness, Princess Alice," is rarely used.

When the Governor-General is referred to by name he should be designated the Earl of Athlone, and it may be made slightly more formal by adding K. G. Other letters need only be added when the most formal designation is required. In this case the Governor-General's full titles are: Major General, the Right Honourable the Earl of Athlone, K.G., P.C., G.C., B., G.M.M.G., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., F.R.S., A.D.C.
