It is estimated that Vancouverites bought four times as many flags last month than in any other single month before the war. Flag manufacturers predict that more than 40,000 flags may be manufactured here before the end of the year, mostly Union Jacks and Canadian ensigns.

The orders come from all sources. Patriotic citizens who never thought of flags before, buy them in wartime and all boat owners seek to have flags on their vessels. The biggest orders however, come for ensigns and signalling flags for the Royal Canadian

We have to bend our emergies in the one direction for the time being: If we believe in liberalism we must be prepared to defend liberalism against the supreme danger. Later we may have to struggle to get back some of our individual liberties. That will be comparatively easy.




