# North Europe Armistice Is Mooted

## Negotiations For Peace In Russo-Finnish War Actively Under Way; Stiff Red Terms

**IS UP TO MANNERHEIM**  
OSLO—The newspaper Tidens Tegn said today that the Finnish government lays the final decision for peace or continued war with Russia in the hands of Field Marshal Mannerheim, the Finnish commander-in-chief, and his decision depends on what possibility he sees of help from abroad.

HELSINGFORS, March 8: (CP)—Active negotiations are in progress for an armistice in the war between Finland and Russia, it was admitted in a statement today by V. A. Tanner, Finnish foreign minister but the demands of the Soviet were so extensive that they might be impossible of acceptance. Contact had been made between Finland and Russia through an intermediary and had not yet been broken, said Tanner.

The official Finnish press bureau tonight declared that Russia's territorial demands were "more far-reaching in character" than those which had been rejected by Finland.

## Irish Look Good In New Uniforms

Beneficial Effects of Intensive Training—Some to go Overseas

Wearing their new active service uniforms, Irish Fusiliers of the local regiment were out on route march this morning, led by their bugle and band. As a result of intensive training they have been having during the past few months, the Fusiliers present a very smart appearance, particularly now that they are wearing the new uniforms. It is understood some of the local "Irish" will be drafted shortly for overseas service and possibly some of the "Irish."

Jackson officiated and Miss Wright was accompanied for the hymns "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" and "Abide With Me." Pallbearers were Joseph White, Phillip Auckland, Ivan Mahood and Moses Alexee.

## Transferred to Ketchikan

George Hartle, located here for the past three years as United States customs officer, has been notified of his transfer to Ketchikan, Alaska, at which point he will be leaving on Thursday of next week aboard the Princess Louise. At Ketchikan, Mr. Hartle will succeed M. L. Stepp, formerly of Prince Rupert, who is returning from the United States government service. Mrs. Hartle and family will go north later.

## CANADIAN AIR HEADS

Careers of Those in Charge of R.C.A.F. Overseas Described

OTTAWA, March 8: (CP)—Group Captain Walsh of Ottawa, appointed to command headquarters of overseas Royal Canadian Air Force the major section of which is now in the United Kingdom, according to Minister of Defence announcement, is an Englishman by birth, although he came to this country at the age of eleven. He was born in May, 1893, at Crosby, Lancashire, the son of Captain J. T. Walsh and Mrs. Walsh, later of Montreal. His father was well-known in steamship circles, having been associated with the Canadian Pacific Steamships for many years, afloat and ashore. He was educated at Loyola College, Montreal.

Group Captain Walsh enlisted in the ranks of the Victoria Rifles of Canada, familiarly known in Montreal as the "Vics," and received a commission in that unit in April, 1915. He went overseas with the 24th Battalion, C.E.F., and in December, 1916, transferred to the Royal Flying Corps; later the Royal Air Force.

Returning to Canada after the First Great War, Group Captain Walsh became a civilian for a short while, but put on his uniform again in February, 1920, when the Canadian Air Force was established. As one of the originals of the R.C.A.F., he has witnessed the slow but steady development of the force that has now been called upon to shoulder heavy responsibilities.

Before his departure for England, Group Captain Walsh was Acting Member of the Air Council for Air Staff, and in that capacity was vitally interested in the training, equipment and despatch of No. 110 (City of Toronto) Army Co-operation Squadron. He is well qualified, therefore, to advise concerning the completion of its training syllabus, and to provide for its various requirements.

As a graduate (1929) of the Royal Air Force Staff College, the Officer Commanding Canada's Overseas Air Force Headquarters is familiar with procedure in the Royal Air Force and can assist in maintaining close co-operation between the two services. When the R. C. A. F. was engaged in civil government air operations, Group Captain Walsh commanded the Lac du Bonnet sub-base and later was posted to command the High River Air Station.

He was also officer in command of the School of Army Co-operation, when this was functioning at Trenton. He has filled a number of staff appointments, such as Staff Officer for Organization, Staff Officer for Personnel, Staff Officer for Air Staff Duties and Air Staff Officer.

LONDON, March 8: (CP)—Aldershot trounced Chelsea five to one in a South B English League soccer game. Millwall defeated Norwich City 3 to 1 in another post-war South B match.

## AIR RAIDS EXTENSIVE

Royal Air Force Flies Over Poland—Another Nazi Bomber Down—Shipping Strafed

LONDON, March 8: (CP)—The Royal Air Force, for the first time since the outbreak of the war, last night scouted German-occupied Poland with reconnaissance flights. It was the third successive night of extensive flights deep into Germany and they were the longest flights so far made. Pamphlets were dropped.

Today another German Heinkel bombing plane was shot down off the north coast of Scotland. It was the second German plane to come down in two days and the forty-fifth of the war.

Three British and three Belgian trawlers reported having been machine-gunned by German planes but returned to port safely. A German news agency claims to have sunk or severely damaged eleven merchant ships last night or the night before in raids on the British coast.

## Bulletins

**CHILI COLLIERY DISASTER**  
CONCEPTION, Chili — Three hundred and two Chilean miners are believed killed and 98 injured in a colliery disaster at Coronel, south of Concepcion. Flames roared 500 feet below the surface after a fire damp explosion. Damage is estimated at \$2,000,000. The Premier and health minister have left for the scene.

**DR. MANION SPEAKS**  
OTTAWA — "A national government is the only way to victory," said Dr. R. J. Manion, National Conservative party leader, in an address last night. "I place country before party. MacKenzie King places party before country. Dr. Manion gave as the first plank in his platform an efficient, whole-hearted voluntary war effort without extravagance, patronage or profiteering. He reiterated his opposition to conscription. He would work towards a post-war progress to prevent unemployment and ensure youth welfare. He would appoint a minister of youth welfare. He also would build a complete trans-Canada highway with surfaced feeders. After the war he would also make efforts to induce immigration and capital from Europe for development of this country. His minister of labor, Dr. Manion said, would be a labor leader and labor would be represented on war boards and commissions which it was not today. He would institute unemployment insurance which in his opinion did not necessitate constitutional amendment to effect, this being only an excuse for inaction. Improved social legislation and better old age pensions were also promised in co-operation with the provinces.

## Violation Of Neutrality By Remington Co?

HOUSTON, March 8: (CP)—The Remington Arms Co. has been indicted by a federal grand jury for alleged violation of the neutrality act in shipment of 275,000 rounds of ammunition to Mexico.

## BUILDING AIR FORCE

Huge Secret Estimates Are Passed By British House—Labor Critical of Canadian Training Centre

LONDON, March 8: (CP)—Parliament gave approval yesterday to secret estimates of the Royal Air Force. Although details were withheld, the secretary for air, Sir Kingsley Wood, told the House that the estimates for air defences involved the greatest expenditures under this head in Great Britain's history. He referred to the superiority of British ships and declared he would rather have British planes such as Hurricanes and Spitfires than an overwhelmingly greater number of German machines of similar type. He said that this year would see Great Britain with ten thousand fighting planes.

The Royal Air Force, it was disclosed, has carried out more than one thousand sorties into German territory since the outbreak of the war.

Some Labor members were inclined to be critical of Canada being given a monopoly on Empire training and questioned the suitability of the Dominion for winter training.

## TERRACE MEETING

Interior Town Feels That Hanson's Re-election is Assured

TERRACE, March 8—Politics was in the air Wednesday night when Olof Hanson addressed a full house at the Oddfellows Hall, making his bid for re-election to the Dominion House. Beside Mr. Hanson there were on the platform E. T. Kenney, the provincial member, S. J. Mayer of Smithers and Nicholson of Prince Rupert. Chairman Harry King presided.

Mr. Hanson is so well known and appreciated in the district that few doubt his re-election but he made a good showing in his speech, lasting half an hour, dispelling any doubts on the subject.

Mr. Kenney followed and declared that Mr. Hanson is the right man. Mr. Kenney also showed the people of Terrace that he has gained in eloquence and platform style the past few years. He made a stirring plea for a united front against the very real menace of the war. G. W. Nickerson was next called upon by Chairman Harry King. He spoke for an hour.

After a short question period the gathering dispersed and the speakers left for points east.

## Naval Fighting In Far North

Norwegian Reports Sounds of Battle in Waters of Arctic Ocean

OSLO, March 8 (Canadian Press)—The newspaper Arbsiderbladet reports that residents of Berlevaag, Arctic town on the tip of Tanafjord, heard a dozen detonations apparently from naval guns at sea.

## War News

**ANOTHER SCUTTILING**  
LONDON—The Admiralty announces the scuttling of the 5,800-ton German merchant ship Uruguay in the North Atlantic. It was decided to scuttle rather than submit to capture. The exact time and place were not disclosed.

**RIBBENTROP TO ROME**  
BERLIN—The Foreign Office disclosed today that Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop is leaving for Rome tomorrow for conferences with Premier Benito Mussolini.

**ITALIAN SHIP SUNK**  
LONDON—Survivors of the 6,000 ton Italian freighter Amelia Laura charged that a German plane had deliberately dropped incendiary bombs on their vessel, killing one member of the crew, setting the ship afire and forcing them to abandon it. The vessel may be salvageable. Another Italian vessel rescued the crew. A Dutch freighter was also bombed and sunk last night as the Nazis continued night aid raids on British and neutral shipping.

**JAPANESE ADVANCING**  
HONG KONG—Japanese South China headquarters announce complete occupation of Chungshan area, fifty miles south of Canton, by an expedition driving inland from Pearl River delta. Chungshan is the birthplace of Sun Yat Sen, father of the Chinese republic.

**BRITISH REPLY**  
LONDON—The British government's reply to Italy's protest over the detention and unloading of Italian ships carrying German coal to Italy is expected to be made within a day or so. It is anticipated that it will be courteous but firm, pointing out that no exception can be made in the case of Italy. No serious breach of relations is expected.

**RUSSIA AND JAPAN**  
MOSCOW—Four classes of Russian reserves are reported to have been summoned for Far East service in view of increased tension between Russia and Japan owing to deadlocked trade negotiations.

**NAZI U-BOAT SUNK**  
ROME—A radio report to Rome from Gibraltar tells of the sinking by the British of another German submarine. A German u-boat unsuccessfully tried to break up a French convoy.

**ALLIES SURE TO WIN**  
LONDON—Returning to London, Joseph P. Kennedy, United States ambassador to the United States, says that there is no serious thought in the United States of the Allies losing the war. It is taken as a foregone conclusion that Germany is sure to lose.

**SPIRITUAL GUIDANCE**  
HALIFAX—Lieut. Col. G. A. Wells, Bishop of Cariboo and Canadian chaplain-in-chief, says that soldiers in the present war are taking the spiritual aspect much more seriously than in the last. They are looking and asking for spiritual guidance.

**WESTERN FRONT QUIET**  
PARIS—The French command reports the Western Front has been comparatively quiet except for minor patrol activity during the past few days since mid-week when French and British troops withstood a small but savage German attack in the course of considerable fighting. It was at this time that British prisoners were taken by a German raiding party as well as two British soldiers and one German being killed. A few French prisoners were taken yesterday while on patrol.

# EDITORIALS

LATE J. R. MORGAN

The late J. R. Morgan, who died in Vancouver this week, was a wonderful man. His interesting experiences would have filled a number of volumes if they had been written down. Not only had he been in accidents which would have killed any ordinary man but he had had many setbacks, all of which he overcame. Even when he was maimed and blind he operated a large logging camp more successfully than most entirely fit men.

Prince Rupert knew Mr. Morgan well. He lived here at various times, had contracts here, was partner in logging ventures for many years with a Prince Rupert man, W. E. Williams. Without an arm and without sight for a number of years, yet he never lost his efficiency and held his own as an outstanding man even to the end.

### A BITTER STRUGGLE

There is a bitter struggle going on in Alberta between the government Social Credit forces and those opposed to that system. There is also a third party, the C.C.F., which does not agree with Social Credit but does not propose to help out any other party or parties.

While in this first Social Credit Legislature no attempt was made to introduce Social Credit as a complete system. Premier Aberhart made several attempts to injure the banks, to cut interest rates and to show the people that his party was opposed to all vested interests.

The Alberta election will be watched with great interest and it will be all over before polling commences for the Dominion Parliament. The Alberta election takes place on March 21 and the Federal election on March 26.

### OBJECTIVE REMOVED

Had any intensive bombing of Britain taken place as threatened, one of the important objectives would probably have been the world's largest steamship, Queen Elizabeth. The British people knew the danger so they removed the vessel to the United States where she now lies in New York Harbor, strongly guarded. Should she be needed she can be loaded with food stuffs or troops or ammunition and sailed to Britain at any time. She will be part of the reserve shipping.

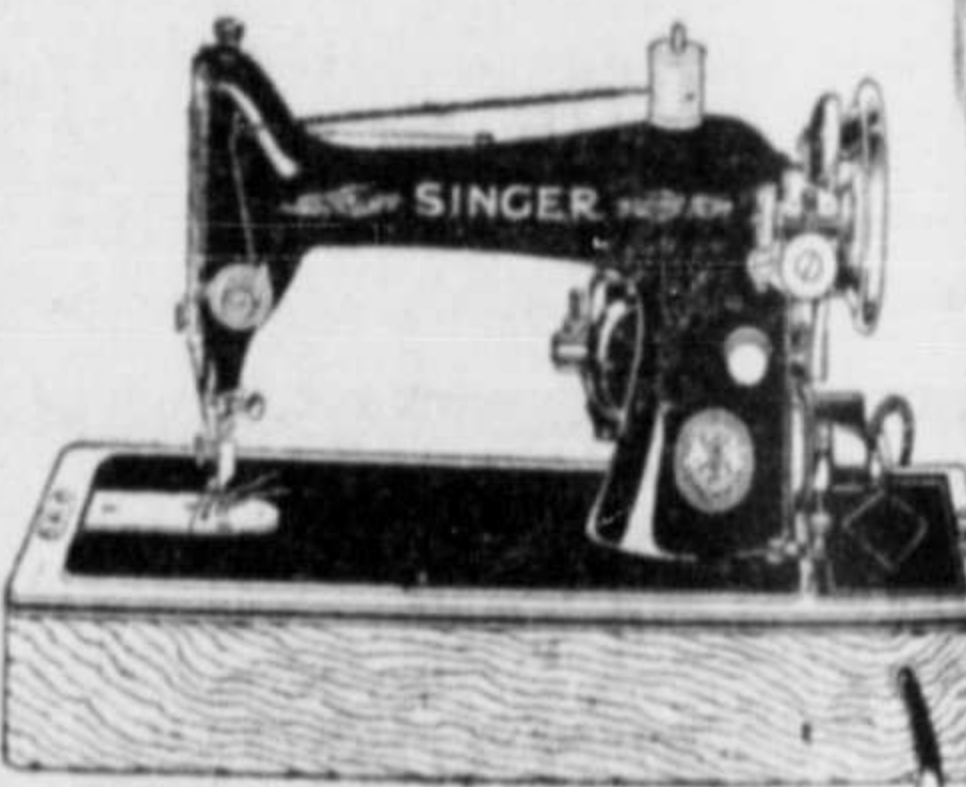

## CAREER OF MUSICIAN

Dr. Karl Muck, Dead in Stuttgart, had Great Record as Conductor

STUTT GART, Germany, March 7 (AP)—When lack of tact led to internment of Dr. Karl Muck, noted orchestra conductor, who is dead here, as an enemy alien in 1918, one of his prison fellows was the German consul-general in New York. It was his daughter, the Baroness von Scholley, who cared for Muck at her home in Stuttgart through his last days. For many years Muck was an intimate of the elder Scholleys. He breathed going out and preferred reading to any diversion. He was well schooled in philosophy and deeply interested in Oriental philosophy, although not particularly in the occult.

Dr. Muck was born at Wuerzburg October 22, 1859, the son of a councillor in the Bavarian government. At the age of 11 he made his debut in public as pianist at a chamber music concert and soon thereafter played first violin at symphony concerts.

Despite his great predilection for

music, he was a diligent pupil at school, graduating from the Gymnasium and entering the University at Heidelberg at the unusually youthful age of 16. After a year's study at this famous university he went to the University of Leipzig to study philosophy and classical philology, at the same time entering the Leibsig Conservatory as a pupil of Ernst Friedrich Richter and Karl Reinecke.

At the age of 20 he made his debut as solo pianist in a Leipzig Gewandhaus concert, in the same year taking his degree as a Ph. D. He now decided to devote himself entirely to music. In 1880 he accepted an engagement as choir master of the municipal opera at Zurich and later went to Salzburg as theatrical conductor. Thereafter he filled season engagements at the municipal opera houses of Bruenn and Graz and in 1886 became first conductor of the Deutsches Landestheater of Prague under the famous operatic director, Angelo Neumann.

There he soon attracted country-wide attention and shortly came to be considered, together with Dr. Hans Richter and Felix Weingaertner, as one of the three outstanding conductors of Germany.

Berlin Royal Opera as first conductor. Following his first period of conducting in the United States and the death of Mottl in 1911, he received an offer to become the musical director general of the Royal Opera in Munich. This post, however, he refused in favor of an offer to go to America in 1912 as conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra for the second time.

Released in 1919 after his World War detention, he returned to Germany where he conducted as a guest in various cities until 1922 when he became the conductor of the Hamburg Philharmonic concerts. These he rapidly raised to a high artistic standard. In 1927 he also resumed his activities at the Bayreuth Wagner Festival to which he returned again in 1930 as alternating conductor with Arturo Toscanini.

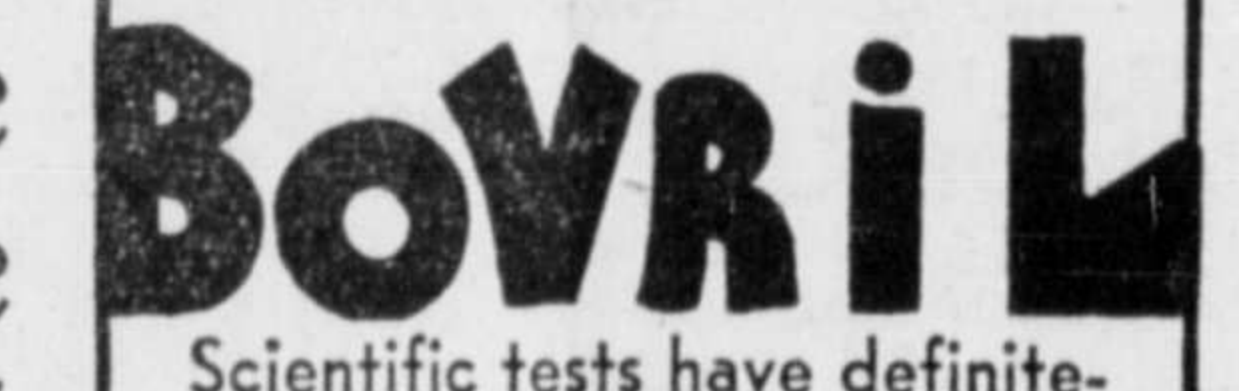
