NAZIS BOMB SOUTH PORT

Southampton Bears Brunt of Latest Attack - 8 to 5 Sunday's Score

LONDON, December 2 (Canadian Press) - Southampton bore the brunt of the Nazi aerial bombing assault in the Battle of Britain over the week-end. A number of fires were started but by this morning were officially announced to be under control. It was a heavy bombardment and the centre of the important southern port was deliberately attacked. Casualties in Sunday night's raid on Southampton were reported unofficially to be fewer than those of Saturday.

The attack fanned out over the southwest England and reached Liverpool and the Midlands.

London had two air alarms during last night and there was heavy anti-aircraft fire.

Weather was thick and cloudy and, no doubt, tended to curtail enemy operations.

During Sunday London had air raid alarms. Enemy planes came at great height over the Kent coast and were engaged in combat with Royal Air Force fighters.

During the day eight Nazi planes were brought down with loss of five British machines.

Saturday Night

Owing probably to misty weather conditions, London had a very quiet night Saturday. The night alarm was one of the shortest on record and only a few bombs were dropped.

A southwest town had its electricity alarm in three days. However, damage was slight.

Yugoslavia To Join With Axis

BUDAPEST, Dec. 2: (CP) - Diplomatic sources reported that a week-end conference between Chancellor Adolf Hitler and the Yugoslav foreign minister in Berlin had prepared the way for Yugoslavia to join the axis military treaty but there was no confirmation in other sources.

FRUIT IS CUT OFF

Only Oranges May Now Be Imported Into Great Britain - Conserving Shipping Space

LONDON, December 2 (Canadian Press) - Imports of all fruit except oranges were banned for Great Britain today in an order designed to conserve shipping space.

GERMANS PURSUED

MIAMI—Messages picked up by Tropical Radio at Miami Saturday night were taken to indicate that the two German steamers Rhine and Edervald, which slipped out of Tampico, Mexico, Friday, supposedly bound for Spain, were being pursued by warships. The Rhine was broadcasting urgent calls at frequent intervals saying "we have a message."

REWARD FOR USURPER

CHUNG KING—General Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist government of China is offering a reward of \$100,000 for the head of Wang Ching Wei, head of the Japanese-puppet government of China, who is charged with usurping the presidency.

"NEW ORDER" CONDEMNED

BUDAPEST—The Ankara (Turkey) radio Saturday night broadcast a charge that the axis "new order" was based alone on force and might be turned even against those who joined it. Despite blandishments, both Russia and Turkey were both outside the axis, the broadcast said.

SURROUNDED BY ENEMIES

MOSCOW—President Kalinin of Russia said Saturday night that the Soviet republic was like a besieged fortress menaced on all sides by enemies who were opposed to Soviet principles. Kalinin called for increased preparedness.

ZOG IN ISTANBUL

ISTANBUL, Turkey—Former King Zog of Albania is reported to have arrived at Istanbul to confer with Albanian leaders in regard to the possibility of returning to Albania and reclaiming the throne.

PRESIDENT INSTALLED

MEXICO—Manuel Avila Camacho, the new President of Mexico, was inaugurated yesterday. He praised the Monroe Doctrine, supported common defence measures in the Western Hemisphere and announced intention of establishing naval bases as part of the general program of continental defence.

VALERA WOULD ARM

WATERFORD—Speaking here, Premier Eamonn de Valera put himself on record as favoring a large standing army to guarantee Eire's defence against any invading army. He would not be satisfied, de Valera said, until every man between 20 and 35 years of age was enrolled in defence units.

New York Stock Mart Is Stronger

NEW YORK, December 2—The New York stock market showed an upward trend in early trading today. During the first hour 140,000 shares changed hands. The industrial average was up .44 at 131.44 and rails were down .03 at 28.05.

TARIFF CHANGES HIT AT LUXURIES AND ARTICLES THAT ARE NOT ESSENTIAL

OTTAWA, December 2: (CP)—Drastic curtailment of luxury imports, mainly from the United States, increased excise taxes on domestic and personal conveniences and reduced customs duties on United Kingdom commodities were among tariff changes announced in the House of Commons today by Hon J. L. Ilsley, minister of national revenue.

Importation of automobiles from non-sterling countries is to be prohibited.

Excise on lower-priced automobiles is to be increased from ten to twenty per cent up to a value of \$700.

A 25 per cent excise tax is to be imposed on many electrical and other appliances including radios, cameras and vacuum cleaners.

A long list of semi non-essential commodities will be imported only by permit on a decreasing scale including all petroleum products.

No action is taken on fresh vegetables.

STRONG BUT CREW IS NOT ENOUGH RESCUED

Reports Admiral Stark, Chief of Entire Personnel of Greek Steamer, U.S. Naval Operations In Trouble off Newfoundland, Safe at St. John's

WASHINGTON, December 2—Admiral H. R. Stark, chief of naval operations, in his annual report to Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox, states that the United States Navy is now the strongest in the world but is not strong enough. This country must have a full strength two-ocean navy, Stark declares.

KILLED BY DYNAMITE

Four Men Lose Their Lives at Mixing Plant Near Tacoma Today

TACOMA, Washington, Dec. 2: (CP)—Four men were killed today when a ton of dynamite exploded in the mixing plant of the Columbia Power Co. fifteen miles south of here.

Sawmill And Log Camp Strike Is Now Spreading

SEATTLE, December 2—The Congress of Industrial Organization strike in Northwest sawmills and logging camps is spreading. Wage increases, an annual week's holiday with pay are demanded.

Bed Caught Fire; Burns To Death

PORTLAND, Oregon, December 2—Wilbur Thomas Johnson was burned to death in his room here. The bed clothing caught fire from a cigarette, it is believed.

Bodies Of Twenty-Seven Miners Are Brought From Pit

CADIZ, Ohio, December 2—All but four bodies of victims of the explosion at the week-end in the Ohio-Pennsylvania colliery here have been brought out. In all, twenty-seven bodies have been recovered.

KENNEDY RESIGNS

United Ambassador to London Quits Post—Bullitt or Davies?

WASHINGTON, December 2—Joseph P. Kennedy, United States ambassador to Great Britain, announced his resignation last night. He is at present in the United States and will not be returning to London. "I am remaining in the United States to help the President keep the United States out of war," Kennedy said.

Prominently mentioned as successor to Kennedy are William C. Bullitt, former ambassador to France, and Joseph G. Davies, former ambassador to Belgium, but no official announcement is yet made.

NAZIS IN CONTROL

Internal Situation in Rumania Still Chaotic—King and Premier Review German Forces

BUCHAREST, Dec. 2—While the Iron Guard uprising was reported to be under control, King Michael and Premier Ion Antonescu reviewed German troops today "to celebrate Rumania's adherence to the Axis bloc." Field Marshal Wilhelm, German army chief of staff, has arrived in Rumania.

Although the Iron Guard uprising is said to be now under control, thousands of Rumanians are reported to be fleeing from the country across the frontier into Bulgaria to escape the campaign of terrorism. Many of these were driven from their homes in the middle of the night, penniless and without food. Some were drowned as they fled across the Danube River in frail boats.

INVALIDS' REUNION

YARRA, Australia, Dec. 2: (CP)—Two officers who had not met for 22 years were reunited in a convalescent hospital here. Capt. A. B. Cooper and Capt. F. J. Griffin first met in an hospital ship in 1918.

Britain-Spain Sign Agreement

MADRID, Dec. 2: (CP) - Great Britain and Spain signed a financial agreement today designed to free Spanish funds blocked in London and give Spain funds to increase purchases from Britain.

War News

ARMY TO INDUSTRY

OTTAWA—Certain expert craftsmen now enlisted in the Army will be granted leave this winter to take up work in essential industries, it is announced.

GREKS STILL ADVANCING

ATHENS—Despite reinforcements, Italian forces are still being driven back headlong in Albania. The Greeks continue their advance all along the front and, with bayonet attack, succeeded in capturing permanent Italian fortifications. Koritza has been captured. Five thousand more Italians have been slain or captured and much equipment taken by the Greeks.

GERMAN ACE LOST

PERLIN—Major Helmuth Veight commander of the Richthofen squadron and the No. 1 Nazi ace was drowned in the English Channel after his plane was forced down.

SUBMARINE LOST

LONDON—The submarine, H. M.S. Triad is missing and must be considered lost, the Admiralty announces. Triad was a sister ship of H.M.S. Thetis which foundered on her trial runs before the war.

NAVAL ENCOUNTERS

LONDON—There were naval encounters between Great Britain and Germany in the North Sea over the week-end. British motor torpedo boats attacked two German supply ships—one off the Dutch coast and another off the mouth of the Scheldt River. German E-boats were driven off.

TROUBLE IN NORWAY

STOCKHOLM—From Norway come reports of serious disturbances following an attempt on the life of Major Quisling, head of the Nazi government of Norway, near whom a thrown bomb exploded. The Gestapo have made numerous arrests.

SOUTHEAST OFFENSIVE

LONDON—L. C. H. S. Amery, Secretary for India, suggests there will be a British offensive against the Axis in southeast Europe if the Italians are driven out of Egypt and the Greeks can hold out in Albania. Canadians may be concentrated with other Dominion forces in the eastern Mediterranean sector.

CONVOY IN TROUBLE

NEW YORK—Messages appealing for assistance from five vessels suggests that five British ships in convoy were surprised by a German U-boat attack in the North Atlantic.

NEW YORK COPPER

NEW YORK, Dec. 2—March copper was selling at 10.4c per pound on the New York metal market today.

CONTROL OF RENTS

Excerpts From Federal Order-in-Council Now Applying to Prince Rupert

Following is an extract from federal order-in-council which has now been extended to Prince Rupert:

The Wartime Prices and Trade Board is hereby authorized from time to time in any area in Canada to fix the maximum rental at which any housing accommodation may be rented or offered for rent and to prescribe the manner in which any maximum rental shall be determined and the conditions under which any housing accommodation may be rented or offered for rent.

For any housing accommodation for which there was a lease in effect January 2, 1940, the rental charged or demanded shall not exceed that in effect on that date.

For any housing accommodation for which there was no lease in effect January 2, 1940, but for which there was a lease in effect at some time or times during 1939, the rental charged or demanded shall not exceed that payable under the latest lease in 1939.

For any other housing accommodation the Rental Administrator, of his own motion or on application in writing by either landlord or tenant, may determine the maximum rental.

Attacks Upon German Bases

LONDON, December 2—Sunday morning the Royal Air Force attacked the enemy submarine base and naval dock at Lorient in the Bay of Biscay and last night oil depots and power stations at Brest as well as the naval base at Wilhelmshafen. Over the week-end military objectives in Norway and Denmark were attacked.

INSPECTS DEFENCES

President Roosevelt Leaves Today For Two Weeks Caribbean Trip

WASHINGTON, December 2—President Franklin D. Roosevelt left today for a two weeks' inspection cruise of United States defences, possibly going as far as Panama. He will be in readiness to return to Washington by plane should any emergency arise requiring his presence at the Capitol.

United States Battleships To Pearl Harbor

SAN DIEGO, Dec. 2:—Four United States battleships—Mexico, Idaho, Mississippi and Oklaoma—and the cruiser Portland left here Saturday for Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

EDITORIAL

The Position Of Iceland . . .

Soon after the war began Iceland was occupied by British troops as a safeguard against being taken over by Germany. When Holland was taken by Germany the island declared its independence and today is nominally a protectorate of Great Britain.

The question now being considered is whether Iceland will join with the British Empire, with the United States or remain independent. The consensus of opinion on the island is that she will ask to join the British Empire. The present situation is not satisfactory. After the war it will be one of the matters that will have to be settled.

Helping China . . .

United States, while taking no part in the struggle between Japan and China, has decided to advance China a credit of \$100,000,000 to enable her to buy supplies in that country. This was announced at the same time that Japan formally made peace with the puppet government of China. It may not have been designed to offset the peace announcement but it must have had that effect. It will help China to carry on the struggle against her oppressor.

A Spitfire Fund . . .

Recently the Germans attempted to bomb Windsor Castle and the attacking plane was shot down, falling close to the castle. A canvas fence ten feet high was immediately erected around it and a fee charged those who wished to inspect it, the money so raised going to the Spitfire fund. A constant stream of people have been paying admission.

Poland In Scotland . . .

Scotland or some parts of it are actually being almost overrun with Poles who have taken refuge in that country. Telling of this Overseas says:

"The district, however, might be accurately described at the moment as Poland-in-Scotland, for wherever one goes there are Poles. Tall men in khaki striding along the streets; gazing into shop windows in couples; filling the buses and trains; Polish, that liquid and attractive language, is to be heard on all sides. And everywhere everyone has a good word to say for these Allies of ours. 'Their manners,' the inhabitants exclaim, 'are beautiful.' And indeed they are, as I had good reason to observe, always getting up and offering their seats to women in crowded buses; helping to hand out all the strange bundles and bags we travel with nowadays; saluting gravely to each other as well as to us, and even on occasion, kissing the hands of the female inhabitants who had perhaps entertained them, an unheard of proceeding in this part of the world! 'The Poles have been the surprise of the war,' someone remarked to me. Tragedy is written across the faces of many; they smile with difficulty; they are quiet in the canteens, and their eyes seem to be focussed on objects we cannot see and can only guess at. They are zealously learning to speak English, and even nonplussing their teachers with searching grammatical questions, for the majority of them are highly educated men.



LOCALS IN HANDY WIN

Prince Rupert Savoy's had an easy victory over the visiting Port Simpson basketball team Saturday night by a score of 47 to 20. A large crowd of fans attended the Exhibition Hall and appreciated an interesting game. ROSE BOWL NEXT STOP

Stanford and Nebraska in Famous New Year's Football Classic

PALO ALTO, Calif., Dec. 2: (CP)—A Cinderella story of football is being written this season and its logical storybook ending will take place in the Rose Bowl on New Year's day when Stanford University meets University of Nebraska.

Its hero is Clark Daniel Shaughnessy, Stanford University's new coach. With the same players who in 1939 gave Stanford its most dismal disastrous season in years he mopped up on the Pacific Coast conference.

Stanford completed its schedule by playing its old rival, California, Saturday, the happy ending being 13 to 7 which takes Stanford into the Rose Bowl as the 1940 team, being untied and undefeated this season.

At the end of 1939 Stanford had had C. E. "Tiny" Thornhill as football coach for seven years. With his famous "rowing sophomores" he had won a conference and a Rose Bowl date three times. But recently things were going badly. Except for its final victory over Dartmouth, the Stanford team was unable to win a single game on its 1939 schedule.

Thornhill was dismissed. About this time the University of Chicago, after a humiliating season of lop-sided losses, decided to discontinue football and Shaughnessy became a coach without a team. Stanford hired him.

Shaughnessy, 48, has been identified with football as either player or coach for 30 years. His reputation was made largely at Tulane and Loyola Universities in New Orleans.

Shaughnessy brought with him the T formation which the professional Chicago Bears use for offence and which had been employed only sparingly in coast football.

Winter Shipping For Welsh Coal

Producers Hope Trade With Canada Is Continued the Year Round

SWANSEA, Wales, Dec. 2: (CP)—West Wales anthracite coal circles have high hopes that trade with Canada will be continued during the winter months. In view of the external markets lost to the anthracite trade in France and Italy, there is grave

danger that many collieries will have to close down. A conference, attended by D. Grenfell, minister for mines, held of all the interests concerned and it is understood that negotiations which have been proceeding here and at London for an arrangement whereby shipments to Canada would continue all the year round are making favorable headway. Usually the season extends from April to November and during the period substantial trade is carried on with the Dominion. The Lawrence River is closed by ice the other months and shipments in the ordinary course, cease the first open water.

LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP) — Potatoes in their jackets will replace boiled and mashed potatoes on the menus of many British restaurants this winter. Catering firms already are taking to heart the advice of the Ministry of Food that potatoes baked in their skins provide more nourishment and less waste than those peeled before cooking.

EVACUEES FOR EIRE

London and Dublin Officials Talk Over Plans for Women and Children

LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP) — Negotiations that may lead to evacuation of tens of thousands of women and children from bombed British areas to Eire are proceeding between W. Dulanty, Eire High Commissioner in London, and Lord Cranborne, Dominions Secretary.

Prime Minister de Valera is understood to have initiated the discussions after the torpedoing of the liner City of Benares in which 81 children being evacuated to Canada were drowned.

When Mr. de Valera learned of the tragedy he called a meeting of his ministers to consider what Eire could do to help the evacuation of British children and their mothers. His suggestion for consultation between the two governments was welcomed in London as "a great gesture" and the British government is anxious to take the fullest possible advantage of Eire's offer of hospitality.

"No decision has yet been reached on matters of detail but it is probable that any scheme will have to be confined to women and children with relatives or friends in Eire who are willing to take them in," an official in close touch with the negotiations said.

"The British government is considering the question of providing free travel vouchers for evacuees unable to pay their own fares and it is even possible that arrangements will be made to pay billeting allowances.

"It is certain, however, that no evacuees will be sent to Eire unless it is known that they have homes to go there.

WOOLLIES IN ORDER

Stockings For Christmas Present This Year Will Be Classy Gift If Obtainable at Any Price

LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP)—There's no place for the lowly silk worm in Great Britain unless it's working for the war effort.

The government's ban on silk goods, effective December 1, means milady's legs will have to be encased in something less glamorous than sheer \$5.56 stockings and milord's silk topper will have to do until the war is over after all.

The silk industry hasn't yet found a substitute for the topper but, judging from reports, milady's legs won't lose much of their glamor just because those cobwebby gauze stockings aren't available any more.

"We have the whole process worked out," said a manufacturer, "and our machines will be able to produce first-class artificial silk stockings in five weeks' time." And he insisted even the most fastidious customer won't be able to distinguish the artificial from the real thing.

were sold after the silk ban was announced. There were such long queues and such huge orders that after half a day a large department store restricted sales to 12 pairs to a customer. In spite of this rush, women will still be able to get real silk stockings after December 1. The order forbidding sale of silk goods after that date applies only to dealings between wholesalers and retailers and stores may sell stocks to customers until they are depleted.

Most stores, anticipating a rush before the purchase tax came into effect, had full stocks on hand when the ban was announced.

RAILWAYS
AS USUAL

All Branches of British Transport Normal as Possible in Blitzkrieg

LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP)—British railwaymen continue to work during air raids to fulfill their "front line" responsibility of keeping the nation's railway services running.

According to a railway spokesman, all branches of the railway transport services operate as normally as possible during air attacks. Both passenger and freight trains continue to run, trainmen and signalmen remain at their posts and tickets are issued at the booking offices the same as usual.

"All other railway staffs continue at work during air raids until danger is imminent in the immediate vicinity of the places at which they are working," he said. "Work is resumed again as soon as the immediate danger is past."

"The closest co-operation exists between the railways and the railway trade unions in the maintenance of the railway transport services."

The spokesman said that, as a safety factor, the speeds of trains are reduced during raids so that drivers have their trains fully under control in the event of a sudden emergency.
