Although the Germans have several times bombed London in a small way, they have not so far been able to reach the docks or to any appreciable extent to stop the stream of traffic which goes on every day throughout that complicated area known as "the Port of London." Nearly half of the commerce of the nation passes through those docks. The water approach is not easy and it is close to France where Hitler has thousands of airplanes ready to drop death dealing bombs. Yet in spite of this the ships enter and leave and the business of the country goes on. It is really wonderful.

When told of a British reverse in war Queen Victoria said "Please understand there is no depression in this house and we are not interested in the possibilities of defeat. They do not exist."

GOD SAVE NORWAY The last words of King Haakon in an address yester-

day to the people of Norway was "God Save the Land of Norway." He stated that he had left Norway because he thought it better to do so rather than become the nunnet of Hitler, taking orders from him and doing his bidding in all things. He visioned the time when, through the efforts of Britain the country would once more be free.

A SECRET VIGOR

Mother of nations, Mother of heroes, with strength still equal to the time; still wise to entertain, and swift to execute the policy which the mind and heart of mankind require at the present hour, and thus only hospitable to the foreigner, and truly a home to the thoughtful and generous who are born in the soil.
