Canada has had many men serving overseas with the Royal Air Force since the beginning of the war. Now there is a distinct Canadian air unit TRAINED Accountant with wide taking part in the defence of Great Britain and the offensive against Germany. In addition there are home defence squadrons that are defending Canada's coasts, doing patrol and reconnaissance work and affording protection, to convoys. New stations such as that at and near Prince Rupert are being established.

In addition to the regular home defence force, there! is the air training plan of the British Commonwealth with GIRL or woman wanted for genera! twenty-two schools in operation, eight elementary flying and two initial training schools. In addition there are twenty recruit centres, three manning depots and one re- | WANTED-Man to drive milk-wagpair depot. Sixty-three airdromes are in process of construction and construction work is being speeded up.

Under the Empire plan over thirteen hundred officers have been trained or are training also as well as over eleven thousand of other ranks as well as three thousand civilians connected with the work. There has been no difficulty in securing recruits.

It may also be mentioned that two new airports to be used under the Commonwealth scheme were opened this week, one at Ottawa and the other at Edmonton and the schools are already being used by the young aviators.

### CANADA'S NEST EGG

Canada is apt to worry a little over her wheat carryover. This year the carryover of something like three hundred million bushels is a nice nest egg which will be very helpful in feeding starving war-stricken Europeans. The pity is it is not larger. Still that many million bushels will feed a lot of people and at the same time give Canada a chance to start the next crop year on a more even keel. Naturally Great Britain will have the first claim on this vast store.

Farmers are a little restive at the thought that all they have been able to get is the guaranteed price of seventy cents a bushel. And yet that is more than the open market price so they really have little to grumble about.

Many a country looks with envy this year on Canada's wheat store. It is probably the largest carryover of any country in the world. It has been conserved because it was an easily accessible supply.






