Germans And Italians Are Victims

RAIDS ARE EFFECTIVE

A. F. Does Extensive Damage To Military Objectives In Germany-More Bombings On British Isles

Bag Twenty-Four Enemy Planes

British Defenders Have Brought Down That Many Nazi Warplanes During Past Two Weeks

LONDON, July 4:- The Royal Air Force during the night is reported to have made its most destructive raids so far in the war on military objectives in Germany and German - occupied France. Numerous direct hits were made at important points including ammunitions dumps and fuel tanks. Large fires were set. At Hamburg a refinery was attacked; at Hamm, a viaduct was hit and at Meiderlink, a blast furnace.

Three northeast coast towns bore the brunt of more intensive air raiding of the British Isles by German bombers during last night, the attacks also extending to the southwest. Again civilians were the principal sufferers with the aim evidently to cause terror rather than to strike at well-protected military objectives. An early estimate placed the dead at twelve and the injured at 123. The list dead in one of the three northeast bound attacked by the German Princesses Not bombers was reported to have reached ten.

Public halls were commandeered to provide accomodation and protection for the homeless.

Anti-aircraft defences went into action against German aircraft as they crossed the southeast coast this morning and dropped bombs at several points. The Ministry of Home Security said the bombs were few in number and did not appear to have been dropped at any particular objective. Two persons were injured slightly in the daylight raid which followed the night attacks.








MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

British reports state that they have sunk thirteen Italian submarines since the entry of that country into the war. They say that is one tenth of the whole Italian submarine fleet. That seems to be pretty good work for three weeks. If they keep that up the Italian subs will soon be non-existent.

The British also report that they have shot down sixty! Italian airplanes since they declared war on the British Empire. That is in addition to the dozens of German planes shot down recently.

They will be given money every \$5.00 week out of which they will buy .50 the household provisions and fuel. The women will organize the house-3.00 work, arrange for darning, mending 9.00 and shoe repairs and nurse refugee children and invalids.






