

It seems like "laying it on too thick" for the staid people of England. Copies of the song were put on the top shelf of the music shops out of reach.

Then came the war and people realized they were fighting for freedom. But it was not until the evacuation of Dunkirk drew the eyes of the world to Britain as the only country left that could save democracy from the brutal rule of Hitler that the sentiment expressed in the song became the sentiment of the English speaking world and the English defence forces became heroes. So today everybody sings:

"There'll always be an England While there's a country lane, Wherever there's a cottage small Beside a field of grain.

"There'll always be an England, And England shall be free If England means as much to you As England means to me."

This is the song that Canadians sing as they land in a British port. It is the song that Australian and South Africans sing when they catch sight of English shores. It is sung in the United States. It was the last song of the little boys and girls who had just left their native land and who were drowned by the Nazi terrorists. They stood on the deck and sang those words just as the ship on which they were crossing to Canada sank beneath the waves. It is a song that will live for many a year because it expresses the faith of a great people.

England seems to have borne the brunt of the German attack so there is no need to apologize for the singling out of that country by the song writer any more than there was for the singing of "Tipperary" in the previous war. Today, England has become the symbol of unexampled bravery in resisting attempted oppression and, from that resistance, will spring the suppression of Hitler and all that for which he stands. When we sing "There'll always be an England" we mean that there will aiways remain somewhere in the world that spirit which will overcome evil no matter how one-sided may seem the fight.




