STALIN IS RUNNING IRON-HANDED PERSONAL PURGE IN RUSSIA - ALSO DIRECTING FINNISH CAMPAIGN

Conducting Iron-Handed Personal Purge in Russia - Also Directing Finnish Campaign

Heads Falling

Several Prominent Officials Already Reported To Have Been "Liquidated"

MOSCOW, Jan. 12. - Dictator Joseph Stalin is reported to be conducting personally an iron-handed purge of the Soviet Army and officialdom. Numerous "liquidations" have already taken place.

Infuriated at the failure of the Finnish campaign, Stalin was reported to have extended the purge to the industrial and diplomatic field.

PARIS, Jan. 12. - Ignace Jan Paderewski, celebrated Polish pianist and former Premier of Poland, has arrived in France to join the provisional government of Poland as minister without portfolio.

FLIGHTS SUCCEED

Royal Air Force Planes Again Visit Seaplane Bases And Heligoland

LONDON, Jan. 12. (CP) - The Royal Air Force made further successful reconnaissance flights last night over western and north-western Germany and over seaplane bases in Heligoland Bight, the Air Ministry announced.

DEATH LIST FROM QUAKE

Turkish Government Officially Announces That 23,121 Persons Lost Lives

ISTANBUL, Jan. 12. - An official statement by the Turkish government announces that 23,121 persons were killed in the recent earthquakes in Anatolia. There were 79,994 injured. Buildings destroyed numbered 16,385 and 29,390 were partially destroyed.

RESCUING OF MINERS

Manager of West Virginia Colliery Hopes To Get Fifty Or Sixty Men Out Alive

BARTLEY, West Virginia, Jan. 12. (CP) - As rescue crews struggled through debris and gas toward sixty-eight miners entombed by an explosion that killed at least twenty-three, G. J. Stollings, general manager of the Pond Creek Pocahontas Coal Corporation, still expressed hope that fifty or sixty would be found alive.

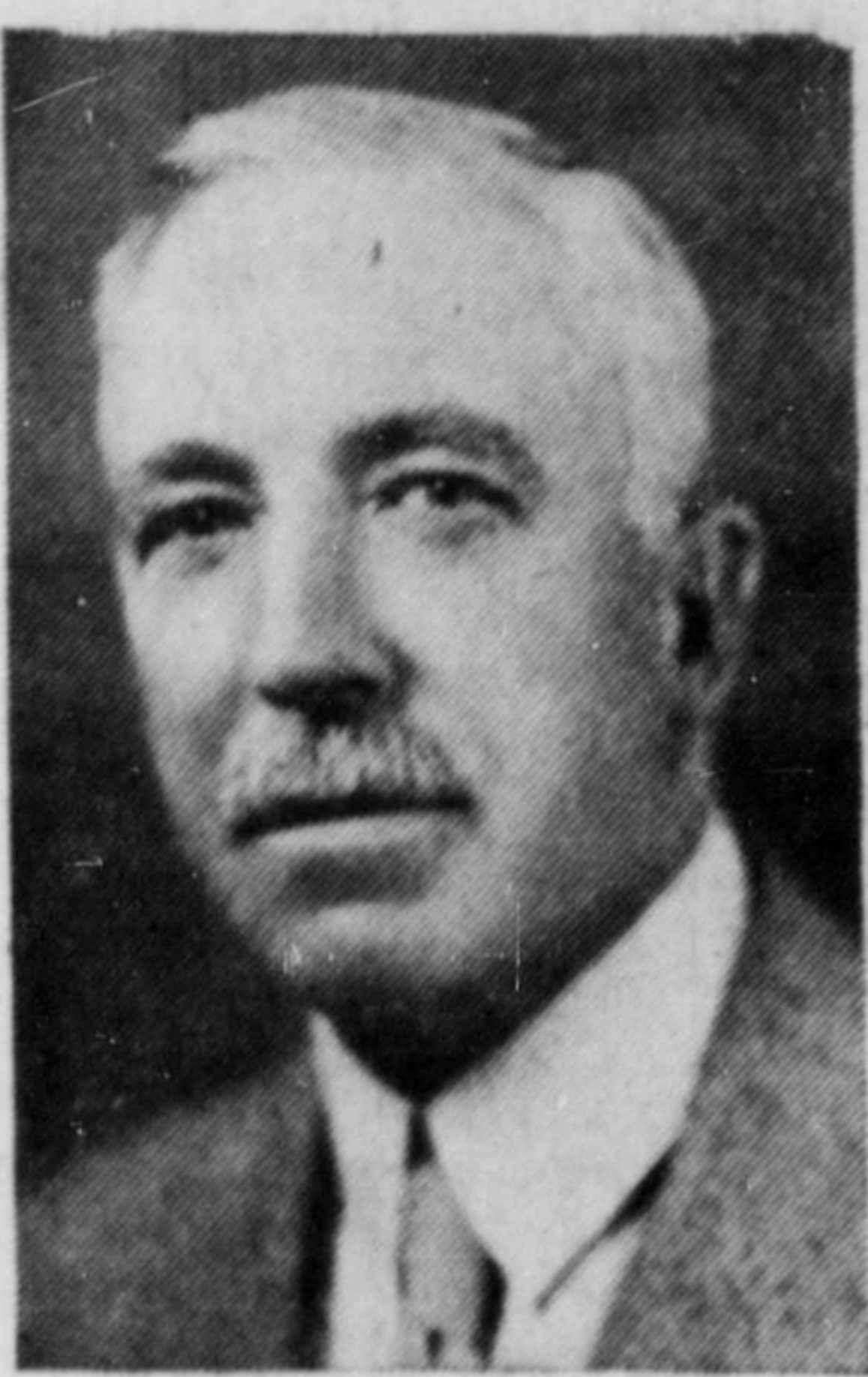
HELPING FINLAND

ECUADORIAN REVOLT ON

Result of Election Is Not Satisfactory To Defeated Candidate For President So He Starts Trouble

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Jan. 12. (CP) - Jose Maria Velasco Ibarra, apparently defeated by a clear majority vote as presidential candidate, led an uprising of sergeants and thirty soldiers but the insurrection was suppressed.

The Ecuadorian Air Force also revolted and some persons were reported killed in street fighting before the revolt was put down.

SURPLUS ON WATER MAIN

Work Was Carried Out At \$9,800 Less Than Had Been Estimated Use Of Overs Asked

As a result of favorable price in purchase of pipe and efficiency of labor employed on the work, a surplus of \$9,800 is shown on the \$40,000 city water main replacement program which is now nearing completion.

War News

MINES SINK SHIPS LONDON - Mines in the last twenty-four hours have sunk the British tanker El Oso, the Italian ship Traviata and the British steamship Grants.

GERMAN COAL SHORTAGE BERLIN - With weather cold, the German people are beginning to feel the shortage of fuel. Frozen canals prevent the movement of the fuel. Use of warm water is allowed only on Saturdays and Sundays now.

BALTIC SEA FREEZING HELSINGFORS - The Baltic Sea is beginning to be badly blocked by ice due to extreme cold.

U. S. PLANES ORDERED LONDON - The British government has placed an order with the Brewster Aircraft Corporation in United States for 144 fighting planes at cost of \$60,000 each.

ON WESTERN FRONT PARIS - Several sharp skirmishes, with artillery and aerial activity, are reported today on the Western Front.

MORE NAZI SHIPS LOST

Ussukuma Scuttled and Sunk Off African Coast To Avoid Capture. It Is Learned

LONDON, Jan. 12. (CP) - Two German ships have been added to the toll on Nazi shipping. In addition to the Bahia Blanca, 8500 tons, which struck an iceberg off Iceland and sank, her crew of sixty-two being rescued and taken to Reykjavik, it was reported from Capetown that the Ussukuma, 7834 tons, was scuttled off Africa a month ago to escape capture. Its crew was rescued.

NEW YORK WHEAT

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. - Wheat prices were off sharply yesterday from 1 3/4c to 2c on the New York market with May closing at \$1 even.

NEW YORK COPPER

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. - Copper closed at 11.25c per pound on the New York metal market yesterday.

JAP GOVT RESIGNING

Administration of Premier Abe to Quit on Sunday Over Yangste River Issue

TOKYO, Jan. 12. (CP) - Premier Nobuyuki Abe announced today that he would resign with his cabinet on Sunday, bearing out predictions that his government would fall if the United States failed to react favorably to Japanese proposals for the reopening of the lower Yangste River to third power trade.

Meantime Japanese military authorities claim further successes in the campaign in China where a new puppet government is being set up. Japan has protested to France at the shipping of supplies through French Indo-China to China and it is said here that the protest will be heeded.

TAKE ALL ALUMINUM

Arrangements Made For Great Britain To Take Entire Exportable Surplus Of Canada

LONDON, Jan. 12. (CP) - Great Britain has purchased Canada's entire exportable surplus of aluminum and has made arrangements to expand the production there, it was disclosed today.

Materials For New Bridges In City Purchased

Bennett & White Contracting Co., who will build the new Hays Creek and Morse Creek bridges for the city, have purchased materials for the work and arranged for the carrying out of creosoting in Vancouver, according to word received at the City Hall. As soon as the materials are ready, they will be shipped north and work will then get under way on the bridges.

New York Stock Market Is Weak

Transactions Yesterday Totalled 840,000 - Industrial Average Off Almost Two Points

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. - Stock transactions on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday totalled 840,000 shares. The industrial average was off 1.92 closing at an average of 148.23. Rails were off .42 at 31.43 and utilities .42 lower at 25.58.

MUNICIPAL SUPERVISOR TO BE NEW COMMISSIONER OF THIS CITY 'TIS ANNOUNCED

Affairs Will Be Actually Directed Locally by D. J. Matheson as Acting Commissioner - Tribute Paid to Work Of W. J. Alder

VICTORIA, January 12: (CP) - R. S. Gilchrist, supervisor of municipalities, will be new commissioner for Prince Rupert. Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of municipalities, announced today. Mr. Gilchrist takes over at the end of this month from W. J. Alder who is resigning to devote his efforts to his own business.

Mr. Gray said Mr. Gilchrist will remain in Victoria supervising Prince Rupert affairs and D. J. Matheson, city clerk and treasurer, will be acting commissioner of Prince Rupert.

The minister paid high tribute to Mr. Alder for his eight years' work as commissioner. He had been responsible for many improvements and his services had been entirely satisfactory, the minister added.

Mr. Gray said that the proposal to have a city manager for Prince Rupert would be examined this year by the government and municipal department officials. Legislation to authorize the scheme is wanted by Prince Rupert citizens and may be enacted at the next session.

DETAILS OF BOND ISSUE

Interest On First Canadian War Loan to be 3 1/2 Per Cent - Other Particulars

OTTAWA, Jan. 12. (CP) - Details of the first Dominion War Loan were announced last night with \$200,000,000 in 3 1/2 per cent bonds to be offered Canadians next Monday morning. The bonds, to be offered at par, will be dated February 1940, maturing February 1, 1952 but, by a system of annual drawings by lot, they will be callable in five equal sections, beginning February 1, 1948.

In addition, the Finance Minister has discretion to accept applications for conversion of Dominion three per cent bonds maturing March 1, 1940, into equal par value of the new issue. The bearer bonds will be of denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000.

The range of registered bonds will be \$500 up to \$100,000. Chartered banks will loan investors up to eighty per cent of the principal amount of bonds to be purchased at 3 1/4 interest for a period of three months.

BALKANS LINE UP

Italian Solidarity Move Gains Ground - Rulers of Roumania And Jugoslavia Meet

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Jan. 12. (CP) - King Carol of Roumania and Regent Prince Paul of Jugoslavia are reported in official circles to have held a secret conference. It is understood that Carol sounded out Paul on the Jugoslavian attitude toward the Italian-Hungarian offer of support to Roumania in return for a Roumanian promise of territorial revision with Hungary after the war.

Meantime a Hungarian delegation has arrived in Bucharest to conclude arrangements for an agreement between the two countries.

BAR GOLD

LONDON, (CP) - The Montreal price of bar gold on the London market was unchanged today at \$35.54 per fine ounce.

RUSSIANS MAKE NO HEADWAY

Gigantic Effort of Russians Against Finland Meets With Little Success

WITH THE FINNISH ARCTIC ARMY, Jan. 12. (CP) - The Russian army is making a gigantic effort to cut a path southward from the Salla and Petsamo fronts in the Arctic, having started a twin attack. The fighting continues. However, an undisclosed village in the Salla sector is the only northern position which the Reds have been able to fortify strongly.

Meantime Finnish marksmen are reported to have picked off groups of Soviet troops in the air as they attempted to land by parachute from planes behind the Finnish lines on Karelian Isthmus. The general attack of the Russians on the Kerelian Isthmus is still being successfully resisted by the Finns.

QUINTS TO NEW YORK

Famous Canadian Girls Will Be Exhibited at World's Fair This Year

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. - Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia reports that arrangements have been about completed to bring the Dionne quintuplets to the World's Fair this year. A replica of their Callander, Ontario, home will be built on ground formerly occupied by the Soviet Russia exhibit. They will be seen by the public but will be unable to see the public. All proceeds will go to Canadian Red Cross.

NO BRITISH SUB SUNK

German Report of Nazi Patrol Boat Sinking Submersible Is Officially Denied

LONDON, Jan. 12. - The German report of a Nazi patrol boat having sunk a British submarine is officially denied.

MORE RAIDS ON ENGLAND

One Nazi Bomber Flies Over London—British Believe One of Raiders Perished

LONDON, Jan. 12: (CP)—For the fourth successive day, German bombers today ranged along the east coast of England and penetrated as far as they could over land before being driven off by pursuit planes and heavy anti-aircraft fire.

One Nazi bomber flew over some sections of London before turning off to the north to escape defensive action.

A large Dornier flying boat, believed to be a mine layer, was sighted half a mile off the East Anglian coast and driven out to sea.

The German scouting bombers, as they cruised above the British ports today, met the anti-aircraft fire in clear skies over the Thames Estuary, Suffolk coast and off Yorkshire. They also continued new activity at sea.

One of the visiting German planes is believed to have been successfully brought down. The last seen of it was when it headed out to sea with a heavy pall of smoke issuing from its tail.

At various points along the east coast anti-aircraft fire was heard. One merchant ship and one fishing vessel were made the object of bombs but were not damaged, the raiders being driven off before being able to do so.

In Berlin German authorities claimed that three British patrol ships had been sunk and one British pursuit plane brought down. Yesterday German bombers sank the British steamship Keynes, 1705 tons, in the North Sea, the survivors being landed this morning.

Soak macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. Drain. Place a layer of macaroni in well buttered baking dish. Mix butter, mustard, salt, cheese, pimento and cayenne. Sprinkle macaroni with cheese mixture. Add another layer of macaroni, sprinkle with cheese mixture and repeat until ingredients are all used. Pour hot milk over macaroni. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until macaroni absorbs most of the milk. Sprinkle with chopped parsley before serving.

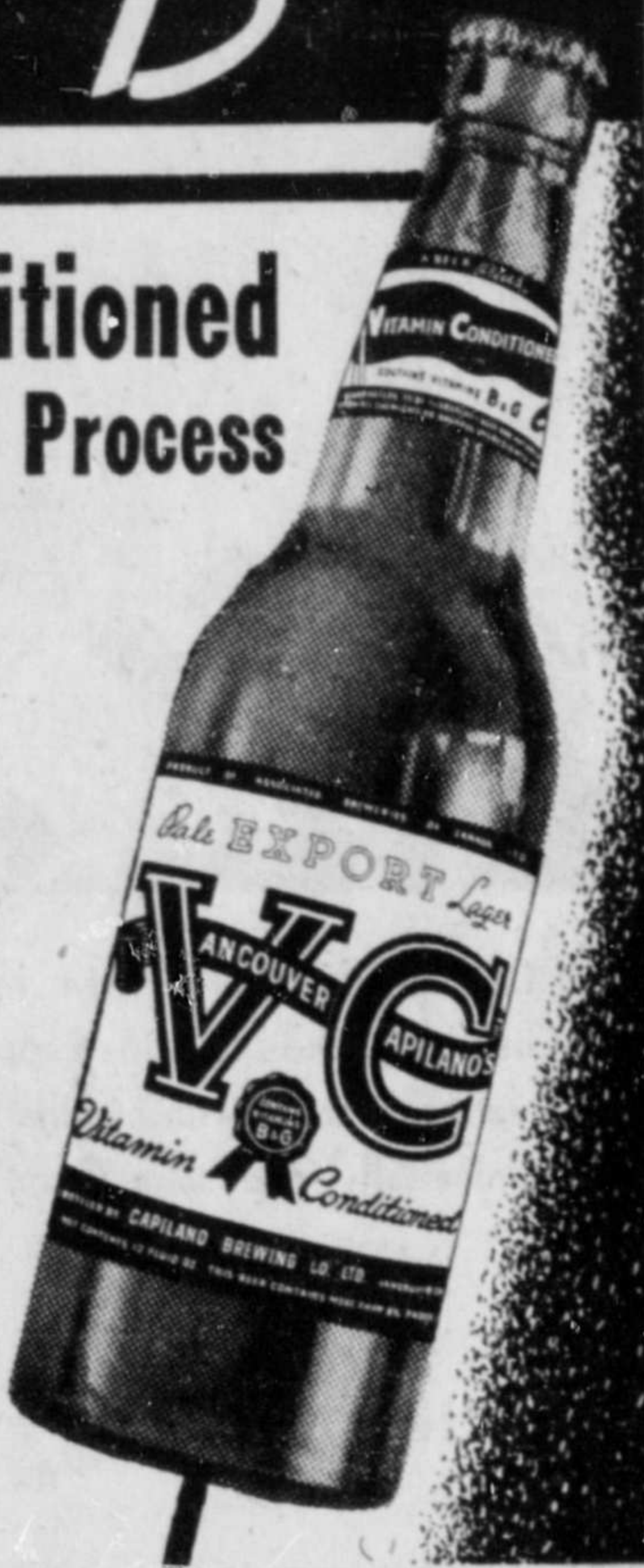
