They Expect Repetition of 1918—Hitler Prefers

MUNICH, Feb. 24: (CP) -Chancellor Adolf Hitler declares that enemies of Germany "who think they can repeat 1918 have not the slightest idea of present day Germany."

Speaking today on the twentieth anniversary of his proclamation of the Nazi party's twentyfive point program, Hitler asserted he preferred peaceful settlement of problems but "if they want force they shall have force.'

Hitler emphasized that Russia, an enemy of Germany in the last war, was now joined to the Reich by treaties of trade and friendship.

FINNS CRACKING HELSINGFORS, Feb. 24: (CP)-The Red Army has driven to within about seven and a half miles of strategic Viipuri, Finnish without pause, is pressing to widen the wedge despite heavy losses. The Finnish command admitted Russian conquest of coastal regions of Kaislahti and Koivisti near Viipuri in a communique which said the Russians were using those points as starting places for attacks to clean up

HELSINGFORS, Feb. 24: (CP)-Twenty Soviet divisions, consisting of 360,000 men, are engaged today in a mass offensive on the Mannerheim Line but the defenders are still holding grimly on.

of the Bay of Viipuri.

The strategic city of Viborg is still in Finnish hands, the defenders having rushed up reinforcements to the number of 24,-000, consisting of men to large extent over ordinary military age, to the battle lines.

Fourteen of the twenty Soviet divisions are laying siege to the disputed fortress of Koivisto at the western end of the Mannerheim Line on the Gulf of Finland. The mighty Russian Army birthday attack on Viipuri having been repulsed yesterday with continued heavy Soviet casualties. Last night the Reds were reported less than six miles from Viipuri.

A Finnish communique yesterday admitted that the Russians were pushing forward deeper into the Mannerheim Line centre beyond Lake Myola. North of Lake Myola, however, two battalions were killed in two attacks while eight hundred were killed in a third attack across Lake Ayrapean.

To you it means that we are going to win the war and that, if we do not, it will not be your fault. You are enjoying life today and you plan to continue to enjoy it, war or no war.

Being old does not depend upon the number of years you have lived. It depends on your mental outlook. Some people are young at eighty and others are old at forty. It is a great thing to keep young, to cultivate the fresh outlook, to remember the value of hope and the joy of fine experience. When Professor Osler suggested ridding the community of all those over forty, he probably meant those who mentally had reached the age when their usefulness had ceased to exist. 




