Big German Motorship And Is Now Taking It To Esquimalt

Exploit of Well Known Canadian Vessel, Now Warship, Officially Announced at Ottawa-Prince Rupert Men Take Part in Operation

OTTAWA, Sept. 26: (CP) — The Canadian armed merchant cruiser Prince Robert has captured the German express and cargo ship Weser of the North-German Lloyd Line off Manzanillo, Mexico, with most of the crew on board and is escorting the prize to Esquimalt, Hon. Angus Macdonald, minister of national defence in charge of naval affairs, announced today. The minister said that the Weser, a vessel of 9,175 tons, was captured last night.

The Prince Robert, a former Canadian National cruise ship plying between Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Alaska, is commanded by Commander Charles Taschereau of Brest in France, set infantry Beard, R.N., and carries a crew of twenty officers and barracks ablaze, damaged docks two hundred men including, from Prince Rupert, Lieut.
