VITAMIN A AND SIGHT

Gyro Club Hears From Dr. H. N. Brocklesby of Phase of War Effort Here

Speaking before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday, Dr. H. N. Brocklesby said he was glad to feel that he might be doing something constructive in way of a war effort in working upon the development of Vitamin A so that it might be made practically available in connection with adjustment of eyesight to night blindness and war conditions, particularly as regards air force gunners, navigators, observers, machinists, etc. Under war conditions, the rectifying of Vitamin A deficiency had become a problem of importance. To devise means of making Vitamin A economically available was the aim of a great deal of study and research which was now going on and in which the speaker himself was engaged. Sources of Vitamin A in Canada were being investigated as well as economic production methods, means of concentration and stabilization.

Dr. Brocklesby, in opening, referred to the eye as an instrument of warfare. No instruments based on the development of the primary eyesight could be more perfect than the function of the eye itself, declared Dr. Brocklesby as he discussed the physiology of the eye, and its functions.

President G. A. Hunter was in the chair and expressed appreciation to the speaker for his talk. Luncheon guests were Capt. B. L. Johnson jr. of Vancouver and Sam Joy of Prince Rupert.

SMITHERS, Nov. 7. (CP)—The first fall of snow of the season arrived in the Bulkley Valley Tuesday morning and, while it was very light and hardly enough to turn the ground white, it appeared from the present weather conditions that it was but the forerunner of more to come.

Railway Fatality Is Being Probed

Inquest Opens Into Death of J. S. Thom Who Lost Life in Lorne Creek Engine Accident

SMITHERS, Nov. 7.—A coroner's jury was empanelled here on Saturday and proceeded to Hazelton, accompanied by local provincial police officers, to view the body of J. S. Thom, one of the victims of the recent train accident at Lorne Creek. The body had been found several miles west of Pacific the day before by Sidney Dannhauer of Copper City who had been patrolling the river in a boat looking for any of the bodies of the victims that might have lodged on the river bank. The body, when found, was lodged in some logs about five feet above the present water level.

The jury will sit in Smithers next Wednesday to hear the evidence in the case.

The patrol of the Skeena River is being continued in the hope that some of the other bodies from this accident may be recovered.
