Swedish Islands Bombed By Reds

Move On West Front Looms Russian Airplanes Are Also Active Over Norway; Protest Made At Support For Finland

NAZIS MAY ENTER LOW COUNTRIES

Invasion of Belgium Or Holland Again Believed Imminent—Ominous Military Moves

PARIS, Jan. 15.—The air is filled with rumors that Germany is about to essay an invasion of Belgium or the Netherlands to place herself in a better position to strike at England and France. Except for sporadic artillery fire, the western front had another quiet day yesterday although there were ominous signs of early and much more extensive activity. New mobilizations along the frontiers are reported. Chancellor Hitler is said to have massed 1,200,000 well trained troops along the Belgian and Holland borders. By crossing the lowlands, he might try to flank the Maginot Line.

With renewed threat of a German invasion of Belgium, all Belgian army leaves have been cancelled. The Netherlands are also taking precautions along the frontiers with their army leaves also cancelled. A Belgian spokesman said: "We are not alarmed but we are armed and ready."

All leaves for the British expeditionary force in France have been suspended against possible Nazi move. Most of the British expeditionary force is lined up behind the Belgian and Netherlands frontiers.

The order suspending all leaves for British soldiers at the front increased the concern over the bracing of Belgium and the Netherlands against any German threat to lowland's neutrality. Belgium and Holland are under virtually complete mobilization with nearly a million soldiers ordered to the borders.

Official London sources said that British troops already furloughed would not be recalled immediately. One informed observer said the British took the view that German invasion of the lowlands was not imminent but that "potential danger" existed.

A semi-official Paris statement said "everything allows us to fear a manoeuvre of diplomatic and military intimidation is being directed against the western neutrals."

NAZIS DENY INTENT

Meantime, Germany continues to deny her intention of attacking the low countries, declaring that the new precautions of Belgium and the Netherlands have been at the instigation of Great Britain and France who may themselves be planning a large offensive. In denying responsibility for the latest alarms, Germany warned Belgium and Holland to strictly guard their neutrality at all costs. The main endeavour of the Reich, it was declared, was to prevent a spread of hostilities. Great Britain, on the other hand, it was charged, was endeavouring to provoke a new situation and spread the war.

CABINET RESIGNS

Abe Quits as Premier of Japan and Prince Konoye Declines to Act—Admiral Yonai Named

TOKYO, Jan. 15.—Premier Abe, as expected, resigned with his government Sunday. Former Premier Prince Konoye then declined an invitation to form a new cabinet. He objected to army control. Abe resigned because of failure to negotiate a new agreement with United States.

PROBLEMS FROM WAR

These Will Be Specialized On By Fisheries Research Board This Year, John Dybhavn States

Naturally investigations of problems having bearing on the war will be given preference by the Fisheries Research Board of Canada in its activities during the coming year, it was stated this morning by John Dybhavn following his return to the city on the Catalina last night after attending the annual meeting of the Fisheries Research Board in Ottawa. The detailed program will depend upon funds which are made available by Parliament at the forthcoming session and it is expected that will be ascertained by the time of spring sub-executive meetings when further plans will be made. Meantime, the work will be carried along as at present.

The board, at its meeting, discussed in some detail the field of fish oils for war purposes, a conference of the Department of Agriculture having been held on the same subject. Medicinal oils from east coast fish were particularly discussed.

The absence at the board meetings of Monsignor Alexandre Vachon of Laval University, one of the ablest and most popular members of the board, was noted, said Mr. Dybhavn. Monsignor Vachon, who is known in Prince Rupert as a result of a visit here a couple of years ago, was recently appointed co-adjutor bishop of the Roman Catholic diocese of Ottawa with right of succession.

Speaking of fish market conditions for the year, Mr. Dybhavn observed that frozen fish stocks gave promise of being cleaned up by the time the 1940 fishing season starts which should make a favorable condition.

Big Fire In Large Jap City

TOYKO, Jan. 15. (CP)—Fire is believed to have killed three hundred persons and destroyed 4000 homes and the business district of Shizuoka, a city of 200,000 persons southwest of Tokyo. Shizuoka is well known as a centre of the Japanese orange growing industry.

Today Admiral Mitsuama Yonai, a moderate, having accepted the Premiership, completed formation of a cabinet which, it was said, would continue Japan's present diplomatic policy towards the United States. Atlantic Fleet To Be Expanded

Naval Patrol Activities To Be Increased By United States

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—A large expansion of the United States Atlantic fleet is contemplated by bringing around from the Pacific Coast numerous smaller and older vessels for patrol purposes. The newer ships will be retained in service on the Pacific side.

Leaflet War Is Being Renewed

Germany Claims To Have Shot Down Two British Raiders on Saturday

LONDON, Jan. 15.—British planes, flying over Germany, Austria and Czechoslovakia Saturday, dropped hundreds of thousands of leaflets stating that the Allies were fighting only against Hitlerism. Berlin claimed that two of the raiders had been shot down.

Uncle Sam To Extend Credit

Making \$50,000,000 Available to Finland to Purchase Goods in United States

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—United States is considering extending a \$50,000,000 credit loan to Finland. A conference is called for today to consider the whole Finnish question.

PLOT OF FASCISTS

G-Men Break Up Conspiracy To Take Over Government—Arms Taken—Arrests Made

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The Federal Bureau of Investigation has uncovered an extensive pro-Fascist plot, the ultimate aim of which, it is believed, was to overthrow the government by force and take control of public services. Caches of arms and ammunition have been seized and a number of arrests made.

A plot to smash the United States government and replace it with a dictatorship through a series of bombings and assassinations was today charged against the seventeen New York members of the "Christian Front," who had been arrested by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the head of which, J. Edgar Hoover, said it was planned to set up a government like the Nazi regime.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—United States Army engineers today presented a new \$400,000,000 program of river and harbor improvements, flood control work and power installations.

CONVENTION AT JUNEAU

Unions at Alaska Capital as Abolition of Fish Traps and Amendments to Fishing Regulations

JUNEAU, Jan. 15.—Four delegates, representing thirty-one unions, are attending the Alaska conference of the Maritime Federation of America here.

Amendments to the fishing regulations, abolition of fish traps, confirmation of the appointment of Governor Ernest Gruening are asked. Martin Hegeberg of Copper River is chairman of the convention, sessions of which are expected to conclude Tuesday.

RED PUSH LOOMS UP

Soviet Expected To Renew Finnish Drive To Regain Prestige—Women And Children In Air Toll

HELSINKI, Jan. 15.—Five hundred bombs were dropped on Helsinki Sunday by Russian planes. Thirteen persons were killed and seventy wounded. Many of the victims were women and children. The air bombing was continued on this Finnish capital with vigor today. Twenty-one bombers attacked Viipuri today, killing two persons and injuring many others. A whole street of stores was demolished.

Weather in Finland is somewhat milder at 16 below and days are getting longer.

It is evident that Russia will soon start another push in the attempt to regain lost prestige. Little more than patrol activity was reported on the Karelian Isthmus yesterday. There was somewhat more activity on the central front.

Indications are that the Russian army along the Salla front will be forced into an attack by lack of supplies is seen by the Finns.

Moscow Interprets It That State of War Either Exists or is Being Prepared For—Claims Are Rejected

STOCKHOLM, January 15: (CP)—Eight Russian planes bombed the Swedish islands of Kallaks on Sunday without inflicting damage, reports reaching this capital said last night. The islands are on the western side of the Gulf of Bothnia close to Lulea in northern Sweden. Other reports originating at Kirkenes, Norway, said that Norwegian anti-aircraft batteries fired upon Russian planes crossing the ill-defended border into Norwegian territory.

TRYING TO KEEP WARM

Germans, By Thousands, Desert Their Homes for Railway Stations and Public Buildings

BERLIN, Jan. 15.—The coal shortage making it impossible for them to heat their own homes, thousands of Germans are flocking into railway stations and other public buildings in the endeavour to keep warm. They have brought with them mattresses and cooking utensils. The streets are full of snow and it is cold.

Resignation Of Chamberlain Is Being Suggested

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Certain English newspapers are demanding the resignation of Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain. "If we are to win, he must go," they say.

No Sensation Is Anticipated

Hore-Belisha Expected To Make It As Easy As Possible For Chamberlain

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Rt. Hon. Leslie Hore-Belisha, retired ten days ago as Secretary of War, will make a statement at the opening of Parliament on Tuesday as to his position. There is no expectation, however, that he will say anything sensational. The feeling is that he will make it as easy as possible for Prime Minister Chamberlain to reply.

From The Waterfront

On a regular voyage to Alaska, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 11:45 yesterday morning from Vancouver and sailed an hour later for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due back here Thursday afternoon southbound. The vessel had on board forty-eight passengers of whom five disembarked here, two going aboard here for the north. The Princess Norah is making only one more trip on the Alaska run before being replaced by the Princess Louise. The change of steamers is being made considerably earlier than usual this year owing to a shuffle of ships in view of the Princess Mary being taken off the Vancouver-Powell River run for an extensive overhaul.

Taking over the run of the steamer Catala which has been withdrawn from service for two or three weeks for annual overhaul, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, arrived in port at 10:15

last night from Vancouver and sailed at midnight for Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow afternoon southbound.

Ten carloads of grain arrived at the week-end for the local elevator and there are at present forty-nine more cars on the railway line bound here, thirty-two being on the territory west of Jasper Park. Something less than one hundred carloads are now required to fill up the local house.

Indian Department's cruiser Naskeena, with Indian Agent James Gillett and Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson on board, is due back in port today from a trip to Port Simpson and Kinloch after having been away since the middle of last week. At Port Simpson Mr. Gillett conducted the annual election of a village council.

C.N.R. steamer Prince George was taken on to the pontoons at the local dry dock today for hull work in connection with her annual overhaul. She will be out of the water for a week or ten days.

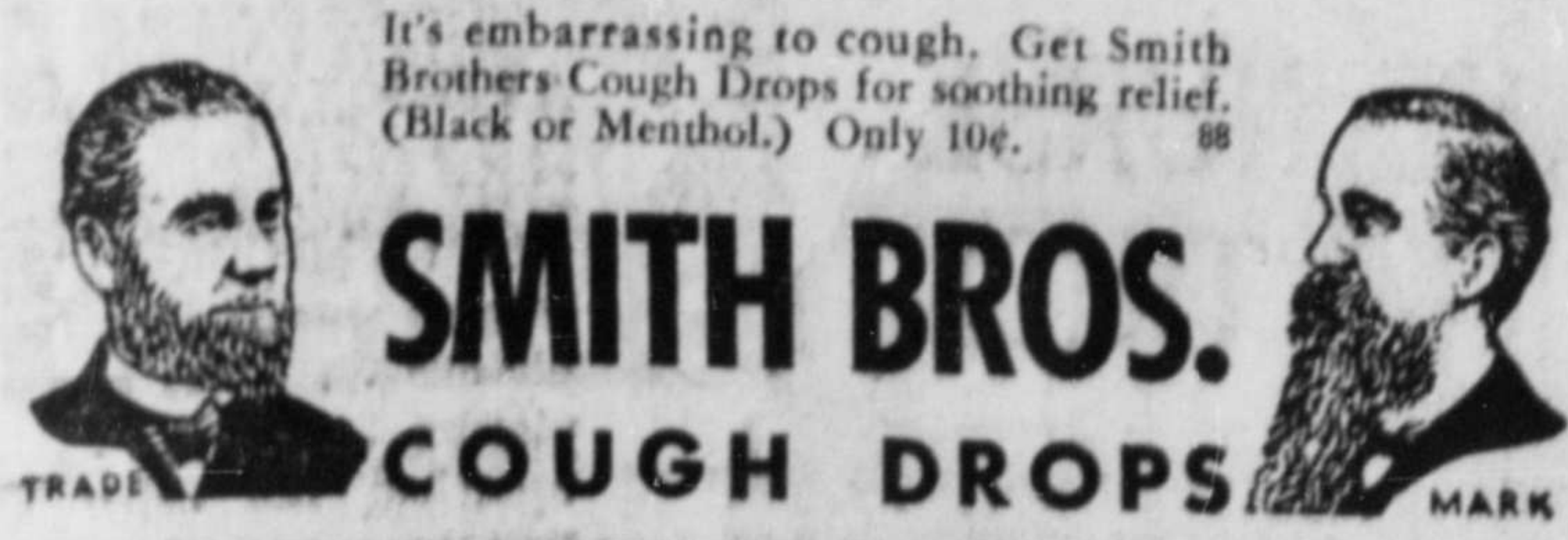

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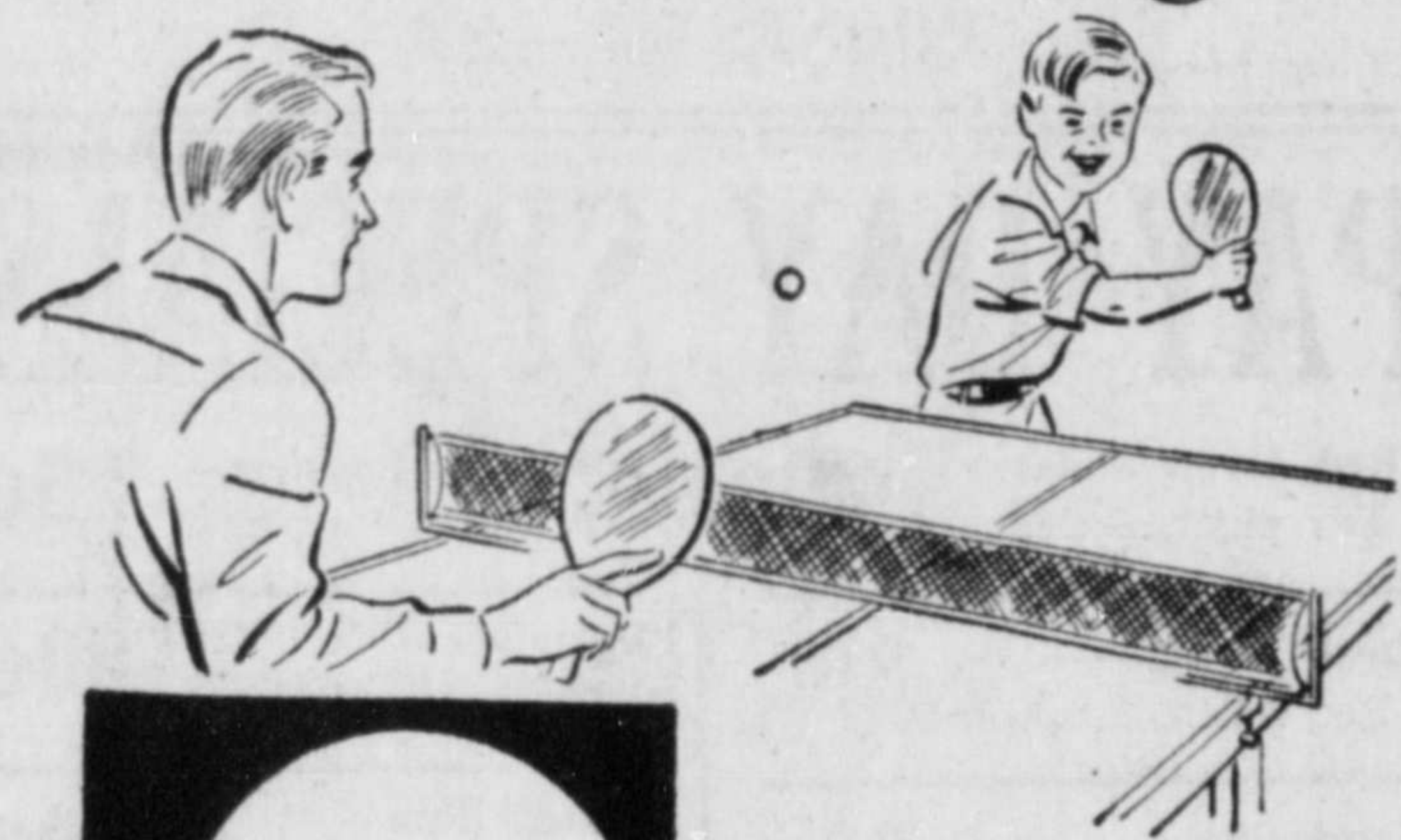
