Liberal Victory Is Greatest Yet

Mackenzie King's Wartime Gov't Given Fresh Mandate; Is Now In Stronger Position Than Before

Entire Cabinet is Returned to Office Including Hon. Ian Mackenzie in Vancouver—Manion Defeated But Woodsworth May Be Re-Elected

OTTAWA, March 27: (CP)—Whisked back to power by the greatest majority ever accorded in a Canadian general election, the wartime Liberal government of Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King prepared today for its task with a fresh mandate, giving it a stronger position than ever.

Party standings on the civilian vote at 10 o'clock this morning gave seats as follows: Liberals, 176. National Government, 38. C.C.F., 8. New Democracy, 7. Liberal Progressive, 3. Independent Liberal, 3. United Reform, 1. Independent, 1. Unity, 1. Deferred, 1. Doubtful, 6.

The Liberal landslide was greater than in 1935 when Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett was defeated and overthrown. Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, the Conservative leader, who was defeated in Fort William by Rev. Dan McIvor, Liberal, and whose National Government party was re-elected.

The election of candidates was made on the civilian vote but in most cases winners held substantial majorities which are unlikely to be overturned when the active voter vote is reported next week. The entire Liberal war cabinet was returned to office including Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of pensions, in Vancouver Centre.

Outstanding figures defeated were A. A. Heaps, C.C.F., Winnipeg North; Hon. W. D. Herridge, founder of New Democracy in Kindsersley, Saskatchewan; M. A. McPherson, Conservative leader runner-up, in Regina; Hon. C. H. Canan, former secretary of State in Montreal-St. Lawrence-St. George; Miss Agnes McPhail, United Farmer of Ontario labor member for Grey-Bruce since 1921, who lost to W. E. Harris, Liberal.

J. S. Woodsworth, C.C.F. leader, was re-elected in Winnipeg North with a 114 lead over A. R. MacDonnell but said himself that he was not sure of the result until the military vote was received.

The C.C.F. national chairman, M. J. Coldwell, was re-elected in Rosebush-Biggart and John Blackmore, Social Credit leader in the last House, was returned in Lethbridge.

Province By Province Prince Edward Island returned a solid bloc of Liberals to make the trend early evident after the polls closed last night.

Nova Scotia elected eleven Liberals out of a possible twelve. A C.C.F. was elected in Cape Breton-South. New Brunswick, formerly Liberal with one exception, divided ten seats between the Liberals and National Government.

Quebec returned 61 Liberals and three Independent with Three Rivers voting deferred owing to the death of the Liberal candidate, Wilfrid Polsson.

Ontario elected twenty-five National Government candidates, the same number as last time, with the Liberals returning fifty-seven.

An outstanding Ontario switch was in Leeds, Conservative since 1903, where Hon. H. A. Stewart was defeated by George T. Fulford, Liberal.

Manitoba remained Liberal with the only National Government success J. A. Ross in Souris. Three C.C.F. gains from Liberals marked the voting in dried-out Saskatchewan. Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King had a close run

Political Hatchet Buried With Mutual Goodwill; Fraternizing Of Candidates In Party Rooms

Prince Rupert buried its federal election hatchet soon after the results of the battle of the ballots became known last night on a high note of goodwill and amicability which was a fitting culmination to a campaign which all parties unhesitatingly admitted was one of the cleanest and least bitter that has ever been staged locally. This spirit could

have been no better illustrated than by incidents which occurred at committee rooms of the Liberals, National Government and Co-operative Commonwealth Federation parties, the highlights being calls which were made and reciprocated by the candidates and sentiments which were expressed.

The Liberal candidate, Olof Hanson, early took occasion to visit the committee rooms of the National Government and C.C.F. where he was heartily received and welcomed. Mr. Hanson, in speaking at these committee rooms, made it clear that it would continue to be as it had been in the past his policy to represent at Ottawa no particular party or faction but the people of the constituency as a whole giving his best attention to all representations no matter from what quarter they might arise.

He expressed goodwill for those who might have opposed him in the election and the hope that, now the contest was over, he might receive their co-operation and enjoy their confidence in the task of serving the riding and the country.

Later George Cameron, the National Government candidate, and George Weaver the C. C. F. candidate returned Mr. Hanson's courtesy by calling at Liberal headquarters where both were cordially welcomed and called upon to speak.

Mr. Cameron had no criticism to offer in regard to the choice of the electors of Skeena nor did he have any recriminations. He saw in the result of the election here an expression of appreciation and loyalty to one who had served the riding faithfully and well. He had nothing but the best of good wishes to offer Mr. Hanson and in the years to come he wished success and prosperity to Skeena district and Prince Rupert city.

Mr. Weaver was in excellent humor and his good-natured remarks were in keeping with the general atmosphere of goodwill. He was ready to admit that all were aiming at the best interests of Canada. As for the C.C.F. it would never despair even if people were unable to agree upon what was in their best interests. "After all, the world was only a few million years old and there are a few more million years coming," he commented amid laughter. The C.C.F. was all for efficiency but sentiment must be considered as well as reason. Canada, undoubtedly, faced difficulties but he believed that all parties were out to do what they considered to be for the welfare of the country.

Mr. Weaver wished to comment on the exceptionally clean campaign which had been fought. Neither on platform or off it had he heard of anything dirty or disreputable having been resorted to by either of his opponents. None of the parties need to be ashamed of the campaign. The disposition which had been manifested to listen tolerantly to opinions as well as to give them was a factor in which he saw much hope.

Mr. Hanson saw in the willingness of the candidates and parties to mingle as they were doing ample indication of that spirit of unity which was so much to be desired. He was appreciative of the honor of re-election and also of the responsibility of office. Without the co-operation of the people of the riding and their suggestions and representatives, a member could not give the best service and he hoped these would be freely forthcoming.

This was of particular importance in a riding of such vast size as Skeena. He would continue to give the best service he could. He had no quarrel with his political opponents. In the past he had been able to co-operate with those who might have differed with him politically. Speaking of present world conditions, Mr. Hanson commented: "We are all peace lovers and we all want peace but we have been shoved into a chaos and we must all give of our best in fighting our way out of it."

Mullen, in Camrose increased the number of Social Credit candidates so far definitely elected in Alberta's general provincial election to twenty-three, six short of a majority. The number of Independents so far definitely known to be elected is fifteen, leaving nine seats still in doubt.

SKEENA GIVES HANSON CLEAR MAJORITY OVER FIELD, 'TIS INDICATED

Trend of Results Generally Not Much Different Than in 1935 — Weaver Second Man—Cameron Loses His Deposit

Seventy-five out of 115 polls in Skeena riding this morning gave the total vote to date as follows:

Hanson, Liberal, 3990; Cameron, National Government, 1253. Weaver, C.C.F., 2318. Morris, Independent Liberal, 121.

The remaining polls have a maximum total of 2200 votes.

Results of yesterday's federal election voting in Skeena riding indicate that Olof Hanson, the Liberal candidate for re-election, received more votes than his three opponents combined. Of course, the returns are still incomplete and there is a remote possibility that, when all voting has been accounted for, there may not be a clear

over-all majority. The general trend of results in this riding are to a large extent similar to those of the 1935 election and surprises were few. George Weaver, the C.C.F. candidate, was second man. Evidently, George Cameron, the National Government candidate, has lost his deposit as did the Conservative candidate in the last election. Frank Morris, running as an Independent Liberal, was not a serious factor. He received only nineteen votes in Prince Rupert but at Ocean Falls was given 42 votes. Terrace, which is his home and where nineteen people went on his nomination papers, gave him only seven votes.

The result in Prince Rupert city was in line with those of the rest of the riding. Only at one of the eighteen polling divisions did Mr. Hanson fail to lead, this being at the waterfront poll where Mr. Weaver received 75 votes to 37 for Mr. Hanson and ten for Mr. Cameron.

TRAGEDY DETAILS

Further Particulars Of How Ocean Falls Logger Came To Grim End

Further Details have reached the city of the untimely death of Marvin Gore, well known logger of Ocean Falls and Bella Coola, who was killed recently down the coast by falling into the engine of his boat.

The skipper of another boat that was following closely saw Gore's boat suddenly swerve from its course and head towards shore. Upon investigation, Gore was found found lying dead on the engine. He had evidently been attending the engine when his sleeve caught in the fly wheel. His arm was torn out at the socket and he is believed to have died almost instantly.

NAZIS ARE SHOT DOWN

British And Neutral Vessels Lost And Some Members Of Crew Not Reported

LONDON, March 27:—The air ministry announced today that two German aircraft were shot down in flames yesterday in combat with Royal Air Force planes near Metz on the western front. One British plane was also downed in battle but the pilot parachuted to safety.

The British tanker Daghestan, 5,742 tons, is reported to have sunk on Sunday from undisclosed cause. The British steamship Castlemore, 6,574 tons, is overdue and it is feared that she and her crew of 40 are lost. Thirty-six survivors of the British ship Rosington Court, 6,922 tons, rammed and sunk by an unidentified tanker in mid-Atlantic on March 13, have been landed.

The Italian steamship Balbo, 5,114 tons, was damaged in collision with an unidentified Danish ship off the southeast coast.

The Netherlands coasting vessel, Saba, 400 tons, a week overdue from Amsterdam, is feared lost with crew of seven. An Amsterdam report said the Norwegian freighter Cometa was torpedoed and sunk at the British contraband control base at Kirkwall.

# EDITORIALS

**OUR CONGRATULATIONS**

The Daily News extends congratulations to Olof Hanson, member-elect for Skeena, on retaining the confidence of the electors for a third term. It was a personal victory just as much as it was a party victory. The probability is that any other candidate could not have polled as heavy a vote as he did. Liberalism is again triumph in Prince Rupert and surrounding districts. It is a victory for moderation but a determined moderation that is out to win the war at all costs.

The Country has decided that the Mackenzie King government is the one to carry on its policies of supplying the Empire with needed commodities and helping with the financing. It also is pledged to carry out its air training scheme, which has already been commenced and its policy of sending troops overseas fully trained and equipped as occasion may demand. It did not, however, receive any mandate to bring in a conscription measure although it has the right under previous laws to commandeer wealth or men for any special purpose for which they may be required. This, we presume, would be only a last resort.

**STATESMAN DIES**

Michael Joseph Savage, whose death we recorded yesterday, was an outstanding exponent of advanced legislation designed to benefit the mass of the people of his country. More than that, it has been pointed to as an example of what could be done. Unfortunately he died before his policies had been given a complete trial, enabling the world to form an unbiased opinion as to the wisdom of the course he took.

Among the legislation passed by the Parliament controlled by the labor group was a law providing for an increase in the unemployment relief allowances and old age pensions; restoration of wages and salaries to pre-depression levels; fixing of basic wage rates; compulsory unionization in order to take advantage of an arbitration law for industrial disputes; forty-hour week and five-day week in industries; a new marketing act including a fixed price for primary products; state reserve bank; scaling down of interest rates on mortgages; minimum wages for farm labor; control of rents and profits on goods or services.

All these laws have been enforced and the mass of the people have acclaimed them but during the past year or so there has been growing up a steady opposition similar to that against the New Deal in the United States that claims the country is being financially ruined and that the ultimate effect will be injurious to the country. Already New Zealand money is declared unacceptable in neighboring countries but that may be simply a passing phase. When war was declared the Labor government at once jumped to the fore as a supporter of the Empire and money was secured to raise and equip troops, many of whom are now on a war footing in Asia, threatening the forces of Germany or Russia that may attack in that part of the world.

No matter what the permanent effect of the New Zealand experimental legislation it was a magnificent gesture to try to bring relief to thousands of people of that country who had been suffering from the economic conditions.

As usual, that point is the centre of native boats from various parts of the coast taking the harvest of this unique and popular fish. The odd boat is also bringing a load into Prince Rupert for the fresh fish market. One of these was the Soring Rose, with Percy Stanley and Harry Innes of Port Essington on board, which arrived on Monday afternoon and left this morning on the return to Fishery Bay.

Bringing up a new cannery tender, the Sea Pride, for use out of Inverness cannery, Capt. Norman Brodhurst, veteran service boat skipper of this part of the coast, arrived in Prince Rupert yesterday after spending the winter in Victoria. The Sea Pride is a 97 foot vessel, equipped with a 50 h. p. Atlas-Imperial engine, which was built eighteen months ago and recently acquired by J. H. Todd & Sons. Capt. Brodhurst will take over command of the Klemtu which is now at McLean's boat yard here having a new type 60 h.p. Fairbanks-Morse diesel engine installed. Also at McLean's a new 60 foot seineboat, to be engine with a Caterpillar motor, is being built for Inverness. An extensive rebuilding job of the Florence, another Inverness boat, is now nearing completion at McLean's.

To investigate reports of petty thievery around the village, provincial police officers, with Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson, left early this morning on the P. M. L. 8 for Port Simpson.

C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at 9:15 this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 2 p.m. for Ketchikan and Stewart whence she will return tomorrow evening southbound.
