

CHICAGO, July 18.—Discarding ancient tradition, the Democratic National convention late last night noisily nominated President Franklin D. Roosevelt for a third term as chief executive and did it by accla-

A smashing majority of the convention's 1100 votes had been cast for the president and, before the result of the first ballot could be announced, James A. Farley, who had been a candidate himself, announced his support for the ticket and moved that the rules be suspended and the President be acclaimed as the party's nominee. The motion went through.

The tally clerks had made the first ballot totals as follows: Roosevelt, 946 13-30.

Farley, 72 27-30. Garner 61. Tydings 91/2.

Hull 5 2-3. President Roosevelt, speaking from Washington tonight, is expected to announce acceptance of the nomination.




