Intensified attack will make that even more evident, I believe. It is to be expected, and to be regretted, that this Battle of Britain will cost a good deal of suffering, hardship and, probably, death for the civilian population but there is no reason to believe that Britoms cannot take it. It is also a grave mistake, I believe, to feel that Britons will not also fight back and give the enemy blow for blow in his own territory.
