NEW YORK, March 7: (CP)-Following a spectacular voyage across the Atlantic Ocean from Clydesbank, where she was built, the giant new Cunard-White Star liner Queen Elizabeth, largest ship afloat, was safe in New York Harbor this morning. The voyage had been shrouded in the greatest secrecy and the public had no hint of it until late yesterday when it was nearing completion. It is expected the Queen Elizabeth will be tied up here for the duration of the war. She will be moored alongside the Queen Mary and the Normandie, the Mauretania having moved yesterday to another berth to make way for **MINES NOW** her.

Ending her bold dash across the perilous submarine-infested waters of the Atlantic, the 85,000ton liner which cost \$29,000,000 to build passed Ambrose Lightship shortly after 6 a.m. Pacific Standard Time and soon was in waters.
