Great Liner Safe Across Ocean

Overseas Headquarters Of Royal Canadian Air Force Established In Old Land

OTTAWA, March 7.—Group Captain George Victor Walsh, M.B.E., of Ottawa, has been appointed to command the Overseas Headquarters of the Royal Canadian Air Force now being established in England.

NAZI PLANE IS DROPPED

Forty-Fourth Aircraft So Far in War Accounted For—Further British Raids Over Germany

LONDON, March 7 (Canadian Press)—The Air Ministry announced today that the Royal Air Force had shot down a German plane off the northeast coast of Scotland.

Royal Air Force fliers, it was announced earlier in the day, had scouted the German naval bases of Wilhelmshafen, Heligoland and Cuxhaven as well as the principal cities and ports of northwest Germany last night.

In Berlin the German high command, in addition to aerial activity against shipping on the North Sea, reports successful reconnaissance flights into France as far as Paris.

SUBMARINE DESTROYED

Chinese Claim of Naval Casualty of Enemy in Yangtze River Is Denied at Tokyo

HONG KONG, March 7.—Reports have reached here of the destruction of a Japanese destroyer by striking a Chinese-laid mine in the Kiangtze River on February 24 with loss of more than one hundred members of the crew.

U-BOATS ATTACKED

But British Sources Give No Indication of Results—Germans Claim Sinkings

PARIS, March 7: (Canadian Press)—Allied patrol boats attacked several German U-boats since the week-end, it is disclosed, but the results are undetermined.

SAWMILL IS DESTROYED

Electric Light Plant Also Consumed in Blaze Which Nearly Wiped Out Naas River Village

Bringing word of a recent village disaster which involved the destruction by fire of the sawmill and power plant with an estimate loss of \$8000 against which there was no insurance protection, Johnson Russ, chief councillor of Greenville on the Naas River, arrived in the city yesterday with Albert Moore, Peter Calder and Samuel Calder aboard the boat A. M.

The fire started, Mr. Russ reports, from a torch in the diesel engine room of the power plant. Soon the sawmill was also in flames and, with a strong wind blowing, the entire village appeared for a while to be in imminent danger of destruction.

The time of the fire was at 10 o'clock in the morning.

ARMISTICE IS SOUGHT

Russian Demands Are, However, Extensive—Sweden Co-Operates in Negotiations

STOCKHOLM, March 7: (CP)—Sweden is seeking to arrange an armistice in the Russo-Finnish war, unusually reliable sources said today, adding that Russian peace terms had recently been presented to Finland.

An armistice, it was said, would be followed by further efforts to arrange a settlement. If peace negotiations are under way, Scandinavian nations assume that Berlin would also be interested.

ATHENIA SUIT ON

Claims Totalling \$700,000 Are Filed Against Owners of Ship Which Sank on First Day of War

NEW YORK, March 7.—Claims for damages totalling \$700,000 have been filed in New York Federal Court on behalf of American passengers aboard the British steamer Athenia which was sunk off the west coast of Scotland on the opening day of the war.

UNLOADING COLLIERIES

LONDON—Eight of fourteen Italian colliers bound from Rotterdam to Italy which were detained by the British contraband control have been ordered to discharge their cargoes for which Italy will be recompensed after the war.

DREW'S CHARGES

OTTAWA—In an address last night Col. George Drew charged Prime Minister King with endeavouring to set up a dictatorship in Canada like that of Cromwell. He charged that neither the Prime Minister nor the minister of national defence were telling the truth when they said Canada was prepared for war.

SMOKE SIGNALS

VICTORIA—The provincial police have been dispatched to investigate reports of smoke signals five miles from Cape Cook on the West Coast of Vancouver Island.

GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED

LONDON—The Labor-Liberal non-confidence vote over Palestine policy was rejected 292 to 121 by Parliament late yesterday.

War News

ALLIES NOW BEST

LONDON—Great Britain and France have now passed Germany in rate of building warplanes, Sir Kingsley Wood, Minister of Air, told the House of Commons today. He said the Allies were far ahead in quality.

SENTENCED TO DEATH

PARIS—Two French radio announcers, who have been broadcasting propaganda from Stuttgart, Germany, on behalf of the Reich, have been sentenced to death in absentia for treason.

RUSSIAN ULTIMATUM

STOCKHOLM—Stockholm dispatches to Paris newspapers said that Russian peace terms were in the forms of an ultimatum expiring midnight March 8-9.

FIGHT TO FINISH

PARIS—Under Secretary of State Sumner Welles of United States arrived here today from Switzerland to confer with President Albert Lebrun, Premier Edouard Daladier and Auguste de Champetier de Ribes, Foreign Under Secretary. The French attitude as Welles arrived on his "fact finding" visit was far from conciliatory.

SINKING UNCONFIRMED

LONDON—There is no confirmation of the sinking off Land's End yesterday by torpedo attack of the big British tanker San Florentine. Exchange Telegraph says it has arrived safely in port.

REDS STILL HELD FROM FINN CITY

Russians Suffer Enormous Bloody Losses at Viipuri—More Intensive Siege is Anticipated

HELSINGFORS, March 7: (CP)—A Finnish communique today said that the Finns had repulsed all Russian thrusts across Viipuri Bay except two minor ones designed to flank the beleaguered city of Viipuri and the Mannerheim Line.

The Russians are still holding virtually the same positions on the outskirts of Viipuri as they did a week ago.

Great gaping holes on the blood-stained ice of Viipuri Bay told the story of how the desperately fierce Russian attacks had been beaten back by the Finnish guns.

WAR NEWS

RUSSIAN PLANES CONTINUED THE bombing of railways, towns and villages of southern Finland and at least forty persons have been killed.

Ten Russian planes, the Finns claim, were brought down yesterday. On the other hand, the Russians claim to have brought down three Finnish planes.

The Battle of Viipuri has now spread all the way from Viipuri Bay to the centre of the Kerelian Isthmus. A lull today suggested that the Russians might be preparing for an even more intensive offensive.

The Finns show no signs of surrender of Viipuri in spite of the opinion of some observers that it might have been more strategic to have retired before this.

The Finnish military authorities today called out men of twenty-year-old class as well as others who had been previously rejected on account of physical defects.

FURTHER SINKINGS

Neutrals as Well as British Victims of Mines in War at Sea

LONDON, March 7: (CP)—Sinking of the 3,000-ton Swedish steamer Lagaholm was disclosed when the crew reached a Scottish port.

Two more British cargo ships were sunk by mines last Saturday, it is announced. Four crew members were killed and eleven are missing.

Australia Coalition

MELBOURNE, March 7: (CP)—Prime Minister Menzies today formed a coalition cabinet with the Country party, closing the breach created last April by the death of Joseph Lyons who had held the quarrelsome parties together.

TO COMBAT MINES NOW

Electrified Cable Used by Liner in Crossing Atlantic

NEW YORK, March 7 (CP)—The Cunard-White Star liner Scythia has arrived safely from Liverpool, having made the voyage without success a new device, consisting of an electrical cable, which encircled her hull, to combat magnetic mines.

ROUMANIA IS NEUTRAL

His Policy Reaffirmed by King Carol in Opening Parliament

BUCHAREST, March 7 (Canadian Press)—King Carol opened Rumanian Parliament today with the declaration that all Rumanian resources would be thrown behind the Army as "a supreme guarantee of our independence and integrity of our borders."

The King declared that relations with other nations were good. Great Britain has demanded full equality with Germany in sharing Rumanian exports, including oil.

The King forecast that the counter might have to make great sacrifices for the defence of its frontiers. He announced taxes would be materially increased in order to maintain the army of 1,600,000 men under arms.

Roumania and Russia are said to be negotiating a non-aggression treaty.

Seventy-Nine Miners Back

PIONEER, March 7 (CP)—With British Columbia Police keeping watchful guard, 79 miners returned to work yesterday, ending the strike which paralyzed the Pioneer Gold Mine, big gold producer for five months. Some pickets were in evidence but there was no demonstration. No members of the Union were in the group returning to work although there was nothing to prevent them doing so.

CROSSES ATLANTIC

Spectacular Voyage Brings Queen of Seas From Glasgow to New York

NEW YORK, March 7: (CP)—Following a spectacular voyage across the Atlantic Ocean from Clydesbank, where she was built, the giant new Cunard-White Star liner Queen Elizabeth, largest ship afloat, was safe in New York Harbor this morning.

It is expected the Queen Elizabeth will be tied up here for the duration of the war. She will be moored alongside the Queen Mary and the Normandie, the Mauretania having moved yesterday to another berth to make way for her.

Ending her bold dash across the perilous submarine-infested waters of the Atlantic, the 85,000-ton liner which cost \$29,000,000 to build passed Ambrose Lightship shortly after 6 a.m. Pacific Standard Time and soon was in the safety of New York Harbor waters.

The ship is painted battleship grey and is manned with a skeleton crew under Capt. J.C. Townley, commander of the Queen Mary and Aquitania on their maiden voyages.

The vessel carried no armaments but, apparently, was protected by a mysterious new anti-mine cable which surrounds the ship high above the water. She had no passengers.

The Queen Elizabeth sailed from her fitting out station at Clydebank on February 26. She took a round about course and was convoyed by naval escorts for a good deal of the way. She carried extra fuel supplies in her tanks as a precaution against possible delay through changing of course. The voyage took twice as long as it would under normal circumstances.

GREAT RECEPTION

The Queen Elizabeth was not normally scheduled to leave on her maiden voyage until April 28 and, as it is, she is not entirely completed as yet.

Airplanes roared overhead as the great ship moved slowly up the harbor. They dipped in salute.

Only officials were allowed on board after the vessel docked. Even newsmen were denied admission.

In London the British press boasted over the success of the voyage. Great Britain's retention of the command of the sea and the ability of Clydesbankers to keep a secret were emphasized.

"This must be a startling shock to Hitler and the Nazi chiefs who claimed control of the sea," observed one paper. All Britain hailed the feat.

Canadian government officials hailed the voyage with delight. The Canadian Navy evidently knew little or nothing about it. A Berlin spokesman dubbed the voyage as a "disgraceful flight" about which there was nothing courageous or noteworthy.

# EDITORIALS

## THE FOURTH CANDIDATE

The filing of the nomination papers for Frank Morris of Terrace makes it a four-cornered fight in Prince Rupert in the general election to take place March 27. Of the four candidates we think the constituency and the country would be best served by electing Olof Hanson. His previous experience at Ottawa and the fact that he is trusted by the members of the government seems to us a good reason for voting for him.

We realize that Mr. Morris stands for much the same policy as does Mr. Hanson. He says he has always been a Liberal and was a supporter of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the old days. He is running as an independent and says Canadians can never hope to get results from the old line parties which he claims are controlled by the few instead of the people generally. That is where we think he makes a mistake. No member has ever done as well for the Skeena electoral district as has Olof Hanson because no member has ever served the people here as well. The election of a stranger who is an independent would be another voice in the Ottawa wilderness, possibly a good voice, but nothing more. Mr. Hanson is something more than a voice. He is an influence and a powerful one. Every vote given Mr. Morris is a vote taken from Mr. Hanson.

While we think Mr. Hanson is the best man to represent this district, he must be the free choice of the people of the district if he is to be useful. Every candidate has the same opportunity of publicity in this newspaper. We shall report their public meetings and, if they want anything more, it must be paid for at regular advertising rates. That puts everyone on the same basis.

## AUSTRALIA'S GESTURE

The most recent war gesture of Australia toward the European situation is of tremendous importance. It means that practically the whole nation is to be mobilized for war. It is planned to send very nearly a million men overseas, establish a reserve of about the same number and establish a home training force of half a million.

This action of Australia indicates how seriously they look upon the present situation. Should Great Britain and France be beaten in the present war they might find themselves invaded by Japan. That is the chief reason for the home defence force. Judging from the present attitude of the United States little could be expected from them.

## SITUATION IN PALESTINE

The situation in Palestine is not altogether unlike that in India. In the latter country there are the Hindu and the Mohammedan rivals. The Mohammedans are a minority and, as such, seek the protection of Great Britain against the Hindus, who would have the country independent of Britain. In Palestine there are two factions, the Arabs and the Jews. The Jews, who are born financiers, hope to use their talents in that direction to gradually buy out the Arabs. This is resented and the result is conflict. For the first six months of the war the differences seem to have been sunk in the larger conflict but now they have flared up again.

## LEADING FIGURES IN DOMINION ELECTION

Hon. ROBERT J. MANION  
Leader of the National Party

Hon. Robert James Manion enters his first general election campaign as leader of the National Conservative party fortified by a rich background of experience in such varied fields as war, medicine, literature, politics and business. Except for a brief interval he has been actively engaged in public affairs since 1917. The First Great War turned him from medicine to politics by way of the army. It remains to be seen whether in the Second Great War he will reach the highest political office in the gift of the Canadian people, that of Prime Minister.

Known throughout Canada and in Conservative circles particularly as "fighting Bob," Dr. Manion can be relied upon to throw the full weight of his energy and ingenuity into the electoral battle which will culminate in voting on March 26. In past campaigns he was always in the thick of the fighting for his party.

Born in Pembroke, Ont., 58 years ago Dr. Manion is of the third generation in a pioneer Irish-Canadian family and had his share of pioneering himself. When Robert was still a child his father moved along the then newly-built line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. They settled at Chateaufort but fled farther westward and settled at Fort William when an epidemic broke out at Chateaufort.

There the future political leader grew up in the rough and ready atmosphere of the head-of-the-lakes, but an early display of talent in school directed him eastward to university, and a medical career Queen's University, Kingston, the old Trinity medical school at Toronto and the universities of Edinburgh and Glasgow turned the lad from newer Canada into a skilled surgeon. He collected several gold medals in the process.

### Joined French Hospital

The outbreak of the First Great War interrupted a successful medical practice at Fort William and led him to turn down a flattering offer to join a world-famous surgical clinic at Chicago. It also marked the start of Dr. Manion's struggles for he had a fight to get into the army medical service. He went to France on his own and served in a volunteer hospital attached to the French army before he obtained an appointment in the Canadian forces.

As a medical officer in England and with front-line battalions in France, Dr. Manion learned much about war and the lot of the soldier. From the inside he saw the mistakes of sending unfit men overseas, and other things. He tells about them in his books "A Surgeon in Arms" and "Life is an Adventure." Dr. Manion was invalided

home and underwent a serious operation in May, 1917.

He entered politics as a Liberal when he was nominated for Fort William in the "khaki" election of 1917 but won the seat as a supporter of Sir Robert Borden's Union government. After the war, in 1921, he entered the cabinet of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen as Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and immediately became a power in the Conservative party. Through the years of Conservative opposition from 1921 to 1930, Dr. Manion held his seat at Fort William. Those years were highlighted by a short spell of office in Arthur Meighen's "shadow cabinet" of 1926 and as candidate for leadership at the first national convention of the Conservative party at Winnipeg in 1927. There Dr. Manion stepped forward as a contender for the mantle of Sir John A. Macdonald. Regarded as a "dark horse," he polled an appreciable vote but the choice of the convention went to R. B. Bennett.

Convention rivalries were forgotten in the ensuing years and Dr. Manion served under Mr. Bennett's leadership in the 1930 campaign which brought the party into power. He became Minister of Railways and Canals and had the difficult task of guiding the country's two railway systems through a period of depression and declining revenues.

The proposal for amalgamating the railways found no favor with him. He fought for the maintenance of the two systems and the integrity of the government-owned Canadian National. During his tenure the present plan of amalgamation in the avoidance of wasteful duplication of lines was worked out and passed through parliament.

The election of 1935 brought Dr. Manion his first personal defeat. He lost his seat in the landslide which swept the Bennett government from power. For a few years he rested and travelled and then when Mr. Bennett announced his retirement came forward for a second and successful attempt to gain the party leadership.

### Leader in 1938

At a convention in Ottawa in 1938, he won the leadership in a contest with M. A. MacPherson of Regina, Denton Massey, Joseph Harris and Hon. Earl Lawson, all of Toronto. All four defeated aspirants pledged their support to the new leader.

Dr. Manion re-entered the House of Commons when a vacancy occurred at London but had to fight a Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation candidate in a lively by-election.

The National Conservative leader is tall and moderately slim. His figure recalls the athletic prowess he displayed as a youth although his exercise is now confined to a two-mile walk twice daily between his home and his office in Ottawa. His abundant hair is grey and slightly curly.

Dr. Manion is the first Roman Catholic to lead the Conservative party since Sir John Thompson died in 1894. Should his party win the general election he will be the first Catholic prime minister since

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Sr Wilfrid Laurier was defeated in 1911.

### OVERSEAS HEADQUARTERS ESTABLISHED IN OLD LAND

Officers, accountant offices, medical officers, who will be seconded from the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, and dental officers, seconded from the Canadian Dental Corps.

The airmen personnel will include clerks, equipment assistants, motor mechanics (M.T.), and a number of airmen for general duties.

The R.C.A.F. Overseas Records Office will have a personnel of eight, three of whom will be officers and five will be airmen.

Other officers on the overseas headquarters staff are Wing Commander F. V. Heaks, who has been employed for some time as liaison officer for the Royal Canadian Air Force at the Air Ministry, in England; Squadron Leader A.P. Campbell, Squadron Leader B. M. Aronson, Flight Lieutenant C. C. P. Graham, Flying Officer W. H. Schroeder, Flying Officer W. A. Dicks, Pilot Officer E. C. Millar and Pilot Officer H. P. V. Massey.

Before leaving Ottawa, the party was inspected by Air Vice-Marshal George M. Croil, A.F.C., Chief of the Air Staff, who expressed confidence in the ability of all present to uphold high traditions of the Royal Canadian Air Force, he trusted they would exert every effort to support the squadron now in England, and to fill the requirements of air force personnel to follow in the wake of those who have already left the shores of their native land to engage in active service overseas.

### GARDEN 'NOTEBOOK

Many people were taken by surprise when the cold snap came. It was the only one of the winter and does not seem to have damaged the plants much. It has set them back which is probably a good thing. Just a few of the more delicate kinds that might have wintered well have been damaged. If not killed, Marigolds that were green seem to have succumbed. One or two people seem to have lost roses but they may yet recover.

Passing Dr. Hankinson's place on Borden Street, I noticed the other day, since the frost, that he has a nice bunch of hellbores (Christmas roses) in bloom. They stand up well, a bunch of white blooms with pink shadings. I have one plant under glass and the other in the open and the one in the open has been just as forward as the one that is covered. Had there been

more rain it might have been a different story.

The outstanding event in garden circles just now is the annual meeting of the Horticultural Society on Monday evening. It is to be held this year in the Commodore Cafe and will commence with the serving of a chicken dinner. The report of the president for the year will be given, directors will be chosen for the coming year and then Dr. J. T. Mandy will show a new lot of colored pictures taken by himself. Featured in this set is a fine collection of Prince Rupert garden pictures. The showing of the pictures will take nearly an hour after dinner.

Evidently William Gair has decided not to return to Prince Rupert, as was reported. He is locating elsewhere.

I notice a nice display of crocuses

In some of the local gardens. Snowdrops were out before the frost and I am told there were a few crocuses in bloom then. Daffodils will be in bloom soon.

The treasurer of the Horticultural Society would like to meet some of the members who wish to pay their dues. Not many have paid this year. Possibly some of them may remember to do it on the night of the meeting. The fee is very low.

The question of whether to grow perennials or annuals puzzles some amateurs. Those who wish a formal garden might do well to confine their activities largely to annuals as they are more easily controlled. For informal gardens the perennials give excellent results.

Many people ask me to recommend a flower that will bloom all through the season. I know of no such flower. The nasturtium blooms a long time but it commences very late. The average perennial looks well for about three weeks. A few last longer and some not as long. That is why I like a considerable variety of flowers. There must be a great many to make it possible to keep up a good showing all spring, summer and fall.

Some one else asks which is better manure or artificial fertilizer? I use both. This year some of the local people plan to treat their plants with Vitamin B1 which is being advertised as giving very wonderful results. It is likely there will be many failures in its use.

### HONORS FOR WAR DEEDS

LONDON, March 7: (C P) — Twenty-six British honors, decorations and awards may be won in wartime but only two—the Victoria Cross and the Empire Gallantry Medal—are given without regard to class, rank or income. Both may be awarded posthumously.

In wartime the highest honor for service, strictly speaking, is the Order of Merit. This is followed by the Order of the Bath. Next comes the Order of the British Empire with its various divisions. It is the intention to make the award of this order a high honor. Members of the Merchant

Navy have been made officers of the order. Two medals have been reserved strictly for the navy. They are the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal, for ratings, and the Distinguished Service Cross, for ranks up to lieutenant-commander and even commander. The medal already has been awarded to commanders of mine sweepers and other small naval craft. Men in the merchant service who distinguish themselves against enemy action and other war work are eligible for the Order of the British Empire in the civilian division. The start of the war has discussed the question of decorations for these men. It was felt civilian decorations were better because there was a slight excuse for giving them. The merchant service is the only one of the navy.
