Great Britain Is Quietly But Steadily Disposing Of Enemy Naval Craft, Statement Shows

WINDERMERE TRAGEDY
PRINCE RUPERT—Provincial police seeking clues in a fire which destroyed the palatial Windermere district home of J. Forester, an English lawyer and former Member of the Legislative Assembly. The home of Forester and another believed to have been John Forester, aged 80, were found in ruins.

LIFE IMPRISONMENT
PRINCE RUPERT—William Mulhens was sentenced to life imprisonment for kidnapping of three year old Marc Trisman Jr.

NORWEGIANS TRAINING
PRINCE RUPERT—Three hundred Norwegian men are training for military service with the Canadian Air Force. They wear R.C.A.F. uniforms with "N" markings. Another 150 are in training inside two weeks.

GERMANS CAPTURE NAZIS
PRINCE RUPERT—Two English farm hands captured four German soldiers after their plane crashed in a field in Hertford. The Germans surrendered without resistance.

TRIP TO ENGLAND
PRINCE RUPERT—Hon. J. L. Ralston, Minister of National Defence, will be on a trip to England to confer with Prime Minister Winston Churchill and other British officials on war matters.

BUQ BUQ ATTACKED
PRINCE RUPERT—The Royal Air Force Bomber Command smashed up the Italian water storage facility at Buq Buq.

PARLIAMENT NOVEMBER 5
PRINCE RUPERT—Parliament will convene on November 5 and adjourn on January 1. Prime Minister Chamberlain will announce the results of the election. Members from distant ridings will not be able to attend at the opening only a quorum of twenty members needed. Hon. R. B. Hanson, Opposition Leader, agrees to the adjournment.

REOPEN BURMA ROAD
PRINCE RUPERT—Dropping any policy of appeasement to Japan, the British government is authorized to state to have decided to reopen the Burma Road to China on October 17.

JAPS ENTER HANOI
PRINCE RUPERT—Japanese troops have entered the suburbs of Hanoi, capital of French Indo-China, according to reports from Hanoi.

HAS BEEN TURNED OVER
PRINCE RUPERT—A Miller, British official, has been turned over by abductors to Rumanian authorities, it is announced. However, there is no word of whether abducted oil executive, Miller Clark.

NEW DEPUTY MINISTER
PRINCE RUPERT—Dr. Bruce M. Stewart is present in Washington. He has been appointed deputy Minister of Labor, succeeding William Dixon, who is retiring.

BOMBING WAS MISTAKE
PRINCE RUPERT—Germany has admitted dropping of bombs on Eire recently but explains it was by mistake. The fliers had lost their way.

Nine Submarines and Destroyer Sunk Recently; Bombing Activity Over London Is Becoming Lighter; R.A.F. Busy on Channel

LONDON, October 4: (CP)—As if attempting to even scores after Great Britain announced the destruction of nine Axis submarines and a destroyer during the past couple of weeks, German planes thundered up the Thames in sneak attacks against London this afternoon and blasted against a southeast town. The pounding of the town was the worst it had experienced.

DETROIT IS ONE AHEAD

Overwhelmed Cincinnati Reds With Thirteen-Hit Barrage to Win 7 to 4

DETROIT, Oct. 4: (CP)—The Detroit Tigers celebrated their arrival home after splitting honors in the first two games of the World Series at Cincinnati by exploding a thirteen-hit barrage to overwhelm the Cincinnati Reds and gain a two-to-one advantage in the World Series. There will be further games here Saturday and Sunday and, if necessary to decide the best four out of seven series, sixth and seventh games will be played in Cincinnati Monday and Tuesday.

Rudy York and Frank Higgins supplied Detroit today with homers in the seventh inning. This broke up a sparkling pitching duel between Jim Turner of the Reds and Tommy Bridges of the Tigers. Both four-base clouts came with a Tiger on the sacks and Higgins' wallop high into the upper left field stands sent Turner to the showers. Whitey Moore came in and got the side out. He was lifted for a pinch hitter in Cincinnati's part of the eighth and Joe Beggs went to the hill for the Reds in the last half, only to be shelled for two more runs.

Bridges, who won two games for Detroit in the 1935 World Series, was touched for two hits and staggered near the finish.

LOG SCALE INCREASES

Production For This Year Maintaining Substantial Gain Over 1939

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the month of September this year totalled 29,487,556 board feet as compared with 18,078,897 board feet in the same month last year. The scale for the present year to date is 149,714,000 board feet as against 98,003,351 board feet in the first nine months of 1939.

The scale per varieties this September was as follows:
Douglas Fir, 907,767 board feet.
Spruce, 17,081,238 board feet.
Cedar, 6,047,818 board feet.
Balsam, 949,134 board feet.
Hemlock, 379,268 board feet.
Miscellaneous, 1,051 board feet.
Spruce and cedar log production was doubled this September over last with a slight increase in hemlock production.

Production of poles and piling this September was more than double September 1939, the scale this September being 157,700 lineal feet as compared with 75,630 lineal feet in the same month last year. The production for 1940 to date is 1,514,987 lineal feet as compared with 832,578 lineal feet. The production per species was:
Cedar, 137,766 lineal feet.
Hemlock, 17,747 lineal feet.
Miscellaneous, 2,196 lineal feet.
The tie scale this September was 18,058 pieces, all jackpine, as compared with 13,321 pieces in September 1939.
Cordwood this September totalled 341 cords as compared with 223 in September 1939.

May Move On Greece

ATHENS, Oct. 4: (CP)—Italian Army forces in Albania totalling 130,000 men and 120 tanks have shifted positions to new posts near the Greek frontier in the past few days, official sources said. It was added: "All precautions have been taken by Greece against surprise from any quarter." The Italian troop movements synchronize with a renewed propaganda campaign in the Italian press against Greece.

JAPAN IS DEFIANT

Suggests It Is Up To United States Whether Or Not War Spreads To Pacific

TOKYO, Oct. 4: (CP)—Domei News Agency quoted Premier Kono of Japan tonight as saying: "Whether the Pacific will become the scene of war or peace depends on whether Japan and the United States will respect and understand each other's position." In an interview with the Japanese press, Premier Kono urged the United States to reconsider its previous position and "positively cooperate with the Axis in construction of a new world order."

In an interview earlier today, Foreign Minister Matsuoka said that the entry of United States into the European war or United States insistence on maintenance of status quo in the Far East would result in Japan going to war with United States.

IS TRULY LAUNCHED

H. M. C. S. Esperanza Takes To Her Natural Element With Ceremonies Befitting Occasion

Well and truly launched was H. M. C. S. Esperanza, a mine sweeper and latest acquisition to Canada's naval strength yesterday afternoon. The fine hull slipped smoothly into the water and all arrangements went off without a hitch. Weather was auspicious and it was a propitious occasion. A large crowd including shipyard workers witnessed the launching and, as the vessel moved down the ways, there was enthusiastic applause. Later she was taken in tow and moved to a berth where work of completion will be carried out.

Rt. Rev. E. M. Buno O. M. I., Bishop of the Roman Catholic Church for Northern British Columbia and the Yukon blessed the ship. He prayed that she would have success in the battle against enemies of the Empire and that her career would be long and useful.

Mrs. Olof Hanson, the sponsor, hurled a bottle of champagne against the bow as the vessel started to slip down the ways into the water. She said: "I name this ship His Majesty's Ship Esperanza. God bless her and those who call her." The ship was gallily bedecked with flags.

After the ceremony, little Miss Doreen Olson presented Mrs. Hanson with a handsome bouquet. On the launching stand were only official people.

Later in the drafting room of the dry dock general office a reception was held. Toasts appropriate to the occasion were observed. G. A. McMillan, superintendent of Canadian National Steamships, presided. In proposing a toast to the new ship, Mr. McMillan acknowledged the services of those who had worked in connection with the vessel. He trusted that the ship would be worthy of the fine men who would sail her and that she would have a long and successful career.

Commander George Berrie, naval officer in charge at Prince Rupert, in reply, expressed confidence that the ship would be worthy.

Mr. McMillan then proposed a toast to the sponsor, Mrs. Hanson, then whom there was none more worthy. Mrs. Hanson replied briefly and appropriately.

Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena, was also called upon and, in a few brief remarks, declared that the yard was an asset to the nation and a credit to the community in this time of crisis. The new ship was an example of what could be done. The port and its facilities stood ready to carry on further work along this line.

Serving of refreshments brought the formalities of the occasion to a close.

Hitler And Mussolini Have Meet at Brenner; Difficulties Are Seen

"Each Wants to Get Help From Other" Is Way British Broadcasting Corporation Interprets Rendezvous Today

NEW YORK, Oct. 4: (CP)—British comment on the Hitler-Mussolini conference heard over the British Broadcasting Corporation system was that "apparently the dictators are having difficulties" and "each wants to get help from the other." Observers in Washington believe the dictators, particularly Mussolini, are worried over the course of the war. Odds on British victory are increased from 50-50.

BRENNER, Italy, Oct. 4: (CP)—Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy and Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany held a three-hour war council today and discussed "all problems" confronting the Axis according to a communique. Hitler's armored car headed back through Brenner Pass at 2:40 p.m. (4:40 a.m. Pacific Standard Time) and Duce's rolled southward five minutes later, leaving the world to wonder what, if any move, had been planned.

JASPER HAD BIG SEASON

Popular Mountain Resort Had Many Guests This Year

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 4. — "By far the greatest and most successful season in the history of Jasper Park Lodge," declared Robert S. Sommerville, manager of the Lodge, as he passed through Winnipeg yesterday. "No doubt the general war conditions had a great deal to do with the arrival in Canada of so many United States tourists. The Canadian Rockies drew special attention from these people and Jasper recorded the largest number of guests ever handled at the Lodge.

"We not only had the best general season, with space at a premium throughout most of the summer, but we had the largest golf week ever held in that section of the country. Not only was the entry a record breaking one of 231 players but we had the unique experience of keeping 74 guests on a waiting list and these people were unable to compete because of the large entry.

"We constructed a new riding trail this year at Jasper which makes a 12 mile circle of the Lodge area. It is 10 feet wide and affords every type of riding possible from a full canter to a walk. "This was decidedly popular with the guests as also were the many 'breakfast rides.' For these we had as many as 75 riders out on the trail early in the morning to get their breakfast in the open.

"Next year's business looks very heavy. Already we have advanced reservations for a larger number than ever before and included in the advance list are the names of many distinguished people from both Canada and the United States.
