SHORTAGE

Calls Suspended-Nazi Troop Movements

AMSTERDAM, May 8: (CP)-The Netherlands continue in a state of tense alarm over the imminence of invasion in a possible extension of the European war, possibly bein --- ed in vicinity of Friesen Islands on the northeast coast as a jumping off place for the threatened Nazi attack upon Great Britain. Two German columns were reported last night to be advancing towards Holland from Bremen and Dusseldorf.

Official circles said today that outgoing telephone calls from Amsterdam had been suspended for nightly periods from 10 p.m. to 8 p.m. for handling government business. Telegraphic services were largely normal although Associated Press messages went unacknowledged.

Train service for civilians has been curtailed in Holland to permit of heavy troop movements being handled.

Radio weather reports were suspended last night.

Special arrangements have been made for Dutch diplomatic services in event of war.

Holland has 500,000 men under arms. All leaves, as announced yesterday, have been cancelled.


