Balkans Are Cutting Off Reich

ROOSEVELT CONDEMNS INVASION

President Of United States Outspoken Against Action Of Reich

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15: President Roosevelt of the United States has publicly condemned Germany's invasion of Denmark and Norway. "Force and military aggression are again on the march," he says. "If civilization is to survive the rights of smaller nations must be respected by the more powerful nations."

The President is delivering a radio address today which will be broadcast throughout the world.

RANGERS WIN CUP

New York Takes Stanley Cup Emblematic Of World's Hockey Championship

TORONTO, April 15: (CP)—New York Rangers won the Stanley Cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship Saturday night, by defeating Toronto Maple Leafs three to two in the sixth game, an overtime contest.

The Maple Leafs got away to a good start by scoring once in the first period—Apps from Davidson—and again in the second period—Metz from Schriener. In the third period New York dominated the play and evened up the count—Neil Colville scoring after eight minutes and Pike after ten minutes.

Puppet Gov't Has Resigned

LONDON, April 15: (CP)—Reuters said that the German controlled radio at Oslo and announced the resignation of the puppet Quisling Nazi government of Norway. This is the government which Germany had said it would negotiate with as King Haakon and the Norwegian government had failed to co-operate.

BRITISH HAVE LANDED AT NORWEGIAN POINTS; REICH IS MINE-BLOCKED

Pocket Battleship Admiral Scheer is Badly Damaged if Not Sunk—Submarines and Airplanes Do Fine Work for Allies

NEARING SWEDISH FRONTIER STOCKHOLM, April 15: (CP)—Fighting between Norwegian and German forces brought the invading Nazis nearer the Swedish border today. Swedish authorities announced that three thousand Norwegians had fled across the frontier near Halden where they were interned. However, it was reported that Norwegians were clinging to positions elsewhere.

LONDON, April 15.—It was officially announced today that British forces—marines and soldiers—had been landed at several points on the coast of Norway to assist the Norwegians in the campaign to drive out the German invaders.

ed last Thursday morning with at least four hits by torpedoes from the submarine Spearfish, in command of Lieut. Commander J. H. Forbes, which thus got its revenge for an arduous experience last fall when it was almost trapped in Helligoland Bight.

It was also announced that the German cruiser Karlsruhe, previously said to have been sunk by Norwegian shore batteries, had actually been the victim of torpedo attack by the submarine Truant off Christiansund.

Fourteen supply ships of the Germans, continued the Admiralty statement, had been successfully attacked by the Navy, ten being definitely known to have been sunk. The enumeration did not include nine destroyers known to have been sunk at Narvik nor submarines.

Meantime the Norwegians continue their stout resistance against superior mechanized and motorized forces of the invaders. Swedish and Finnish volunteers have joined with Norway to fight off the Germans. The Germans are concentrating on Konesvinger, a railway junction north of Oslo, one line of which leads to Trondhjem and the other to Stockholm. That some advances have been made by the Germans in that area is not denied.

Italy May Hear Call Of Bugles

ROME, April 15:—Italian naval manoeuvres are being held earlier than usual this spring, the fleet concentration being undoubtedly due to the tense international situation and the possibility of spreading war. "The bugle call may sound some morning soon for Italy," an official spokesman warned yesterday.

H.M.S. YORK NOT SUNK

Another False Report From German Propaganda Machine

LONDON, April 15:—There is no confirmation from the British Admiralty of German propaganda claims of the sinking in the North Sea of H. M. S. York with six hundred men on board. (H. M. S. York visited Prince Rupert in 1938 in the course of a Pacific Coast cruise. The York was built in 1928 and until recently was stationed at Bermuda as flagship).

The British Columbia Gazette announces the appointment of Alexander Turnbull of Prince Rupert, C. J. Frederickson and H. D. Stafford of Prince George and J. F. K. English of Pouce Coupe to be commissioners under the Evidence Act.

Stavanger, doing extensive damage to German aircraft. This was only part of extensive activities carried out over the week-end by the Royal Air Force in harrying the enemy and making their occupation of Norway the more difficult.

It is reported that German planes shuttling across the entrance of the Baltic Sea are transporting troops into Norway at the rate of 4,000 per day. Two hundred planes are reported to be engaged in transporting troops in this manner.

Nazis May Withdraw In a broadcast from Berlin this morning in English the announcer suggested that the Norwegians did not appreciate what the Germans were trying to do for them and, if they did not co-operate better, it might be necessary to withdraw from the country.

LATEST ON SITUATION

Week-End Developments In Scandinavian War Summarized—Various Important Moves

British Forces are reported to have landed in Narvik under protection of naval shellfire. An earlier Norwegian communique said Norwegian troops north and west of the ore port were ready to attack the German, who are said to have fled into the interior following the British landing on Saturday. The British War Office and Admiralty announced British forces had now landed at several points in Norway.

The British Admiralty announces two German troop transports sunk and four torpedo hits scored on a convoy of transports in Skagerrack since last night. The announcement added that a transport had been set afire at Bergen and a small supply ship sunk by combined naval and air action.

Earlier Great Britain reported a successful torpedo attack on the German pocket battleship Admiral Scheer, the laying of a mine field across Germany's Baltic back door and other blows against the German navy.

An air raid on Stavanger is believed to have destroyed a gasoline dump. There have been repeated British air raids on various Norwegian coastal points now in the hands of Germany.

Germany officially denies that any points on the Norwegian coast have been recaptured. There is no official comment from Germany on what may have happened at Narvik except for a statement that losses when Nazi destroyers met a formidable British fleet have not yet been ascertained.

A British Broadcasting Corporation broadcast to the Norwegian people assures them that the "invasion of your country will not go unpunished. British soldiers are coming to your assistance. When you see them do everything you can to aid them. If you know where Germans are tell them. If a British soldier needs food, give it to him. If he needs shelter, give it to him. Pass on the word."

CLEAR UP SUB CALL

Distress Message, Purported To Have Come From British Ship, Said U-boat Had Been Seen

THOMASTON, Maine, April 15: (CP)—Mackay Radio said that a radio station, presumably Canadian, had reported a distress signal from the British freighter Craig early today after sighting a submarine eight hundred miles northeast of New York. The matter had since been "cleared up."

SLAIN IN WINNIPEG

Mrs. George Harrop Is Charged With Murder Of Her Husband

WINNIPEG, April 15: (CP)—George Harrop, aged 42, was shot and killed in his home town today and Police Chief George Smith said that Mrs. Harrop will be charged with her husband's murder.

Roumania Decree Has Prohibited Wheat, Oil And Fuel for Germany

JugoSlavia Also Joins in Move to Prevent Hitler From Getting Supplies From That Quarter—Crop Failure Given as Reason

BUCHAREST, April 15: (CP)—A Roumanian decree tonight prohibited indefinitely all exports of wheat, petroleum, coal and wood, cutting off Germany's main source of supplies in southeastern Europe. The government economic council has decided to void all wheat contracts because of prospective crop failure and has ordered foreign delivery of other products stopped until adequate reserves are assured for the army and railroads.

JugoSlavia has also intimated that all its exports will be limited to a distance of 100 miles from the country.

REICH GUN BOATS ARE THREATENED

Roumania Takes Strict Control Of All Traffic On Danube River—Germany Alleges "English Sabotage"

BUCHAREST, April 15: (CP)—Strict control of Danube River traffic was enforced by Roumania today following German threats to send gunboats down the river to protect German shipping from alleged "British sabotage."

TWO SUBS SUNK BERLIN—Germany claims the sinking in the North Sea of two British submarines which were surprised by Nazi bombing planes as they lay on the surface.

NAZIS BUNGLE IT PARIS—German dead were left hanging in barbed wire entanglements as they were driven off by French machine gun and rifle fire after an unsuccessful attempt to penetrate French positions on the Western Front in the Vosges section. There was a heavy German artillery barrage with howitzers being brought into play but it was badly handled and machine guns proved effective in killing many of the enemy. It is now said that there is no indication of a general collision of forces on the Western Front.

AFTER KING HAAKON STOCKHOLM—The Norwegian government has advised Great Britain that German air attacks are being directed personally against King Haakon. This seems apparent, it is said, through German planes bombing all towns where Haakon has been. The King and the Norwegian cabinet had a meeting today at an undisclosed point.

BLACK-OUT ORDERED BERLIN—German radio tonight broadcast a warning that all lighthouses and signal fires on the south coast of Sweden should be extinguished. No explanation is given, not even that it is for the "protection" of Sweden.

NORWEGIAN SUNK LONDON—The Norwegian steamer Tosca, 6000 tons, has been sunk by a German torpedo. The crew of thirty was taken to safety in Scotland.

SHOT DOWN BY SWEDES STOCKHOLM—Swedish anti-aircraft guns shot down a German military plane which was flying over Swedish territory. All but one member of the crew were killed. Another German plane came down on the west coast of Sweden and its crew was interned.

DUTCH IN FIELD AMSTERDAM—Martial law has been extended to all strategic points in Holland. Hundreds of thousands of troops are in the field and everything is ready for Holland's effort to defend its neutrality.

Navy Upholds Its Tradition

LONDON, April 15: (CP)—The British Navy lived up to its best traditions of valor and generalship Saturday when, led by H.M.S. Warspite, the fleet penetrated the fjord of Narvik, Norwegian ore port, and sank seven German destroyers, causing the German soldiers, who had been garrisoning the place, to take to flight over the hills. The British Admiralty late Saturday night officially announced the success of the engagement and it has since been confirmed in Norwegian statements that the British are definitely in control at Narvik and are making their way up the railway line which leads to the Swedish iron mines. The retreating Germans are believed trapped between the British and Norwegian forces. The recapture of Narvik is a severe blow to the Nazis' Scandinavian campaign.

One Hundred Homes Along Red River Near Drumheller Are Evacuated

DRUMHELLE, Alberta, April 15: (CP)—Rising flood waters of the Red Deer River have forced residents to evacuate one hundred river side homes at nearby Newcastle, joining refugees from East Coulee, Carbon, Wayne and Rose-dale.

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EDITORIALS

WHY IT FELL THROUGH

In January of this year the Germans evidently intended to invade Belgium and many people at that time wondered why the plans were changed. The real reason was because the Belgian high command got word of it and the Germans knew they had the information.

It seems that a German officer was planning to travel by train from Berlin to Cologne with the complete plans of the proposed invasion. In order to have an extra ten hours with his newly married wife he decided to travel instead by plane and accepted a lift with an air force friend. The plane became lost and landed on Belgian soil. The German officers tried to burn the plans but were prevented from doing so by Belgian guards. The result was the Belgians learned all the details of the scheme and it was called off.

It is possible that the Germans have new plans for the invasion of Belgium or it may be that some other country will be the sufferer. At any rate Belgium has the benefit of the first failure to help her in her defense, should she need it.

SPLENDID WORK

The driving of the Germans out of Narvik on Saturday was another exploit that shows how valuable is a strong navy with brave, daring men manning it. When the news arrived Saturday it was hard to believe that there was not some mistake. We did not doubt the ability of the navy to take Narvik but we did not realize there were so many German warships bottled up there. Seven war vessels at one swoop is pretty good work. And the best of it was that there was no bragging ahead of time of what they were going to do.

The British are making good their word when they said they would come to the help of Norway. Not only have they cleaned out the Nazi nest at Narvik but also they have landed troops at several places in that country and these will be joining the Norwegians in the defence of their country and to share in the considerable task of driving out the Germans.

Another very important task which the British navy has carried out is the mining of the German and Danish coast all the way from the Skagerrack to the borders of Lithuania. This does not make it impossible for ships to leave Germany but makes it extremely difficult and dangerous. Undoubtedly, German mine sweepers are at work fishing out the mines but it is dangerous work and takes a long time. In the meantime the mine layers doubtless will continue the work of laying more mines. Nothing so well illustrates how completely Britain and France have secured command of the seas as the invasion of the Baltic by the British right up to where the Russian sphere of influence begins and the mining of most of it.

It's interesting to know when reading the Daily News that the people of the whole district are doing the same.

FROM THE SHOULDER

Players Have Much to do Themselves With Success of Football—Legion Does Its Bit

The Prince Rupert Football Association has made a good start for the 1940 season. The success of the season however depends first of all on the players themselves. They must have the determination to back up the association. There is never a year but the players complain of the lack of support of the general public. This is due to the players themselves.

How can they expect spectators to attend matches if teams turn up short of players, games are held up till half an hour after the time for starting and often teams are not wearing uniform strips.

Another usual complaint is that the refereeing is not good. Here again players and spectators are partly to blame. They do not know the rules of the game. And in any case the referee checks what he sees. He may miss what someone else sees but he is much more likely to see something that others do not see.

The request from the Association to the Canadian Legion to sponsor a team was considered by the Legion. From previous unfortunate experience over a number of years the Legion decided that it was unable to do so. But they did something which must help. It voted the sum of twenty-five dollars to the Football Association for football purposes. The "old soldiers" are alas too old to play but this substantial contribution is evidence of their support of the game and a real encouragement to the football association executive and players alike.

Jack Ewen, Boys' Work Secretary for R.E.C., is Active Here

"Measure of the Effectiveness of Life" was the subject of Jack Ewen of Vancouver, Boys' Work Secretary of the Religious Education Council for British Columbia, in delivering the address at morning service yesterday in First Presbyterian Church. Not by length, contentment or attainment of goal should success in life be measured, declared Mr. Ewen. Rather should it be judged by the development of soul and mind, in breadth and vision. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. H. G. Funston and Mrs. E. J. Smith presided at the organ. There was a selection by the Junior Choir with Miss Pat Brocklesby as soloist. The congregation was large.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Ewen was at the United Church Sunday School and last night at First Baptist Church, his subject being "The Challenge of the Horizon." The Baptist vocal quartette, consisting of Messrs. Andrews, Brandt, McCormack and McGladery, rendered a selection.

After the Sunday evening services there was a rally at First United Church when many young people of various denominations gathered to hear Mr. Ewen. Tom Johnstone presided and Guy Thorne led in prayer with William Hildebrand reading the Scripture lesson, Ken Dakin led the singing and there was a selection by the Baptist quartette as well as by the United Church choir. 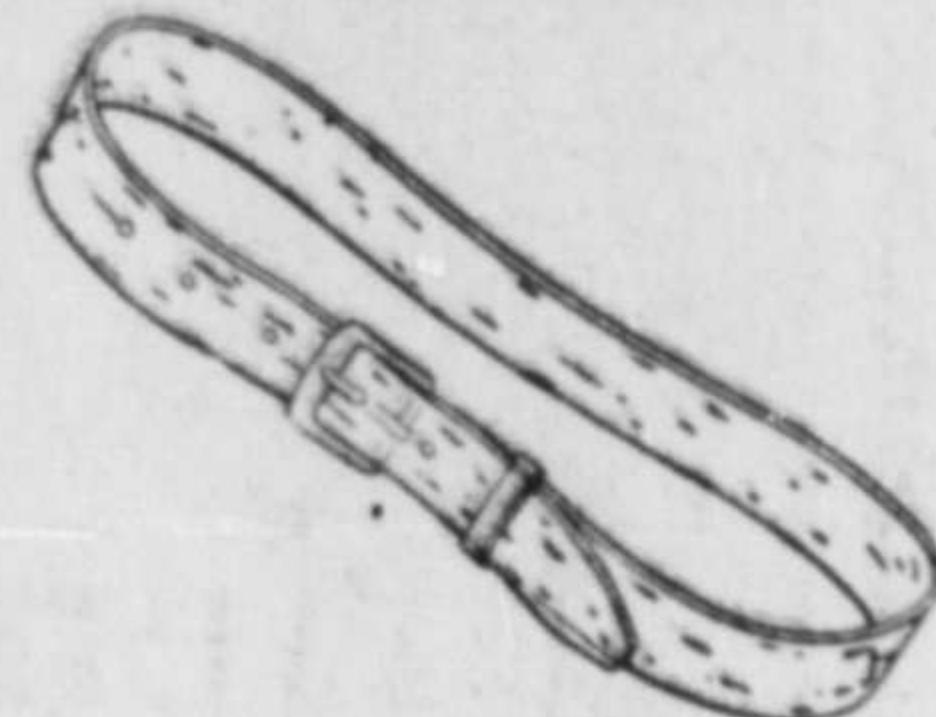

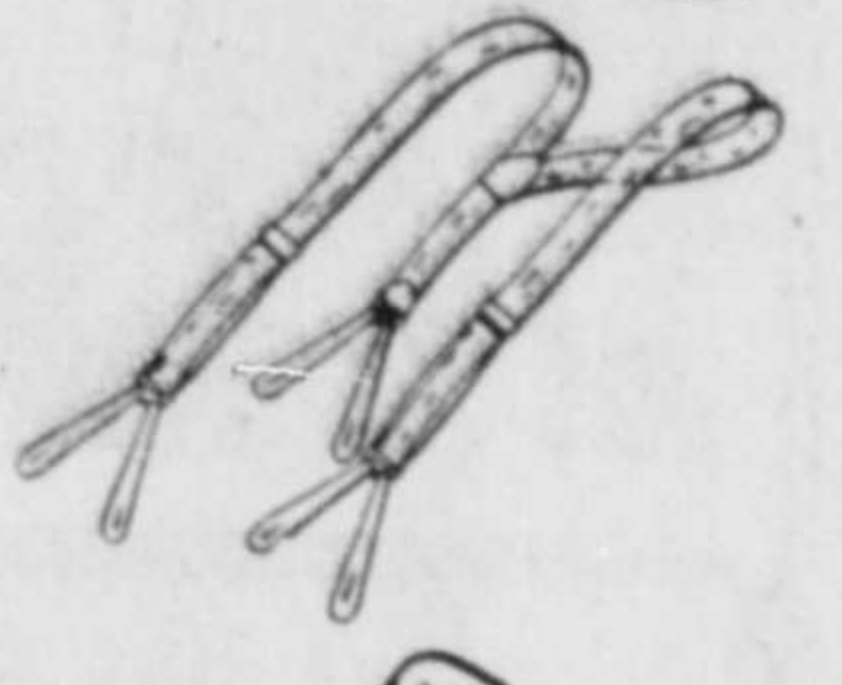

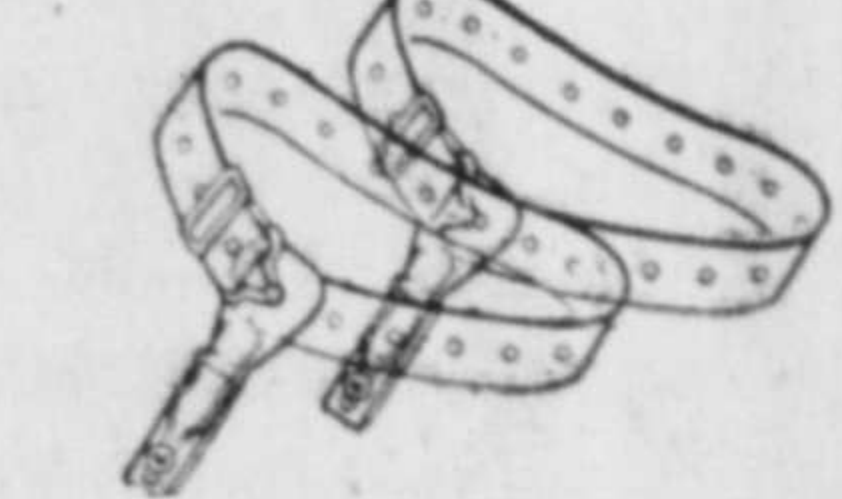

"A MESSAGE TO HITLER"

By ROBERT A. MORTON

Only a few weeks to wait, and the first warm glow of Spring will touch the devastated lands and peoples of Europe! From the beginning of time, Herr Hitler, Spring has been nature's promise to mankind—a promise of new beauty, new life, and renewed inspiration for trust and fellowship among men.

But in this year of 1940, Spring may bring the fulfillment of another promise, Herr Hitler, your promise of mutilation and death for countless thousands of men, women and children. That is to be your Springtime contribution to the progress of the human race—your gift to the world as the leader of a national group engaged in spreading German culture in Europe.

For the so-called national interests and honor of Germany, you have pledged a Spring harvest of Blood and Iron. Already, after many promises as easily broken as given, your Nazi war machine has violated three nations that were at fault only in possessing civilized instincts of a higher order than your own and material resources ripe for plunder.

As one who has known and loved the German people, marveled at their genius for the arts and sciences of civilization, revered the great names of their poets and musicians, I, an American citizen, have watched with sorrow your rise to power, and the crippling and enslavement of the mind, spirit and goodwill of the nation. And, yet, I have some understanding of the process by which a people can be pushed into the bottomless pit of fanatical egotism, avarice and barbarity.

Herr Hitler, many years ago a shrunken little German professor named Nietzsche, who was to die insane, wrote a book. In it he exalted the German "superman," hailed the warrior as nature's supreme achievement, glorified war and the conquest of the weak and preached the Will to Power as Germany's highest destiny. Other writers invented the myth of the "superior Aryan race," of which Germans were represented to be the

purest representatives, and by that strange fiction entitled to rule the world.

Grim Fairy Tales

You, Herr Hitler, soared high on the wings of such grim fairy tales and promises. Day and night the propaganda of your cult of war assailed the national conscience of your people with the savage doctrines of Nietzsche and the call-to-the-race-to-conquer of Wilhelm Wirth. "God" it was proclaimed "a Nazi God, has ordained a world dominated by Germans; has given Germany a sacred mission to rule or destroy 'inferior' peoples."

By that revival of the law of the jungle, your cult gained followers, seized power, killed, imprisoned or exiled all who resisted its inhuman theories and practices and thus, Herr Hitler, by means of concentration camps, firing squads and the headman's axe and by unceasing deadly propaganda, the collective mind of many Germans was poisoned, deluded and paralyzed. The others have been silenced.

Under your inspired guidance Germany has abolished the forms of civilized justice and has set up the supremacy of force and war as the legal principle of a German world order in which man is doomed to live and die under a God-created Nazi dictator and a regime of hate, greed and banditry.

Herr Hitler, upon this planet called The Earth man during his brief stay is reset with the perils of natural forces that he must combat to remain even a short space of time. Then, too, selfishness and vanity have incited man against man in warfare. But slowly and surely through the ages there has evolved a sense of interdependence among groups of men, an understanding and practice of mutual responsibility and altruism, of friendship and generosity and a realization of spiritual values that came to a flowering in the life of the Nazarene.

All of these precious growths, the fruit of the wisdom of many generations of men—these have been denied and suppressed by your command.

German children, young and old, have been taught to hate with a psychopathic hatred, to see only through blood-shot eyes, to think only in terms of a single warped mind. The stream of energy of the German people has been turned aside from the building of civilization to the sabotage of the structure they helped to create. Your cult has imposed upon its own and other peoples stark cruelties that have shocked and united against Germany the public opinion of all free nations.

Leading Nation to Ruin

Would you have the world believe, Herr Hitler, that you and your group are the idols of the German people, a people bereft of all right to act or think for themselves, living under ruthless military law, hounded by a secret police, with the shadow of the executioner reaching over every home? A people led to economic ruin and to slaughter in a senseless war? Do you exult in the enforced acclamations of a stricken multitude?

Think you, Herr Hitler, that one man in his moment on Earth can blow out the torch of reason, or nullify the divine attributes of mind and soul? If so, I disagree with you, for, after a fleeting interval, the physical self returns to its separate elements and hate, frenzy and cruelty become only a sunned memory.

Herr Hitler, the purpose of this message to you is not solely to condemn. For you I hold the same sympathy as for an unfortunate whose offenses against humanity are the products of a clouded vision. Plainly it is written in the records of medical science that an abnormal ego, when charged with an over-powering urge to inflict suffering and death upon others and bordering on a reversion to primitive brutality, is a mental ill-

BURNS LAKE, April 15:—Wolves have been playing havoc with the deer and moose in the district surrounding Binta and Uncha Lakes just north of Tweedsmuir Park. On Binta Lake they killed a cow moose and her last year's calf after a hard battle in which several wolves were severely injured.

Zealand Anxious Regarding Dutch

Warns What May Happen In East Indies If Nazis Attack Holland

AUCKLAND, N. Z., April 15: (CP)—Because of Holland's Pacific possessions, maintenance of Dutch independence is viewed by New Zealand as of vital importance. German troop movements on the Dutch frontier are considered in some ways of more immediate importance to the Island Dominion than any other aspect of the war.

Peter Fraser, deputy prime minister, left no doubt of the New Zealand government's concern at threats to Dutch neutrality in a recent speech.

"If Germany walks through Holland there will be no Netherlands East Indies," he declared. This would mean the end of Pacific security. Another Pacific power, which he "need not name," would take possession of Dutch Indies.

Blackout Helps Bag-Snatching

But Six Months Report Shows Less Other Offences In Old London

LONDON, April 15: (CP)—A survey of crimes committed in the Metropolitan Police Area has just been issued by Sir John An-

erson, Home Secretary. The six months ending February 29, when the blackout was longest, showed an increase in bag-snatching and shop breaking compared with the same period last year. Cases in burglary, housebreaking, robbery and attempted robbery with violence decreased. Shopbreaking was attempted 159 times more than the previous year and bag-snatching cases rose from 227 to 277. Burglars and housebreakers been less active, with a drop of 374 crimes. Cases of robbery attempted robbery with violence dropped from 84 to 67.

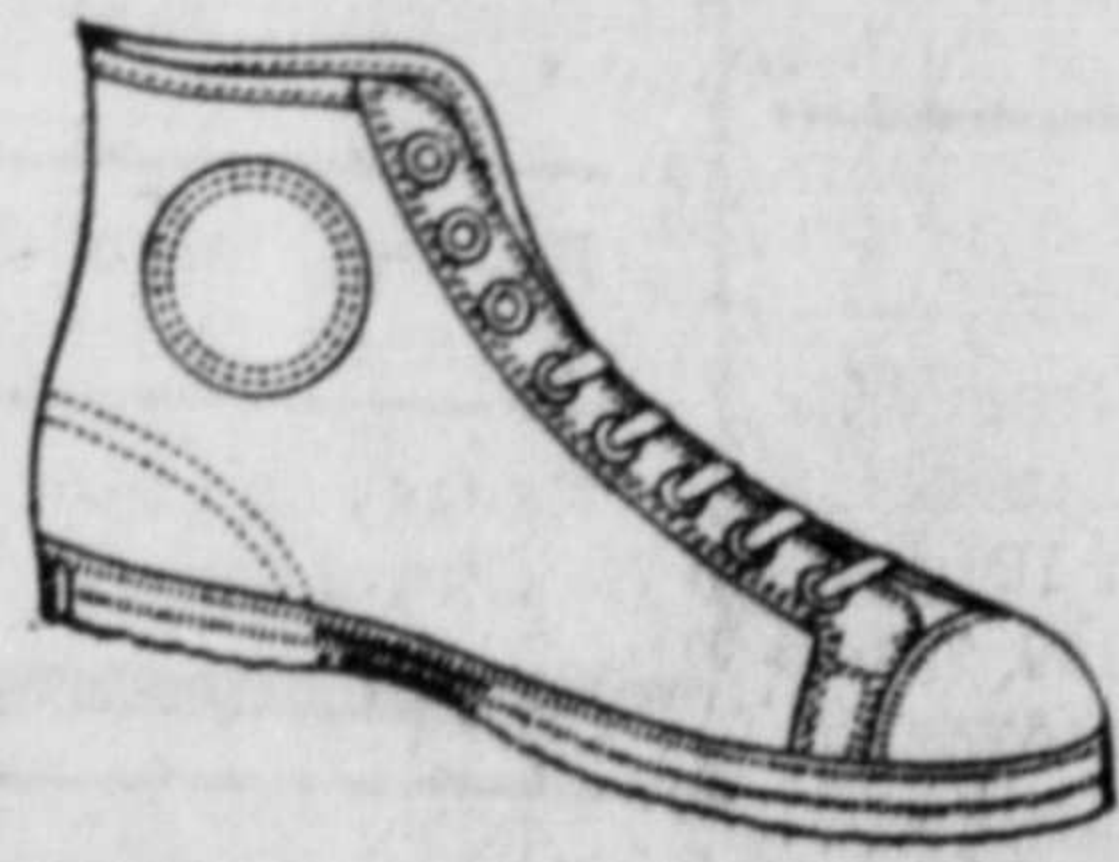
