BRITISH SUPERIORITY

In spite of German boasting it is found that the British are far superior to the enemy in the air. Figures just issued show that Germany has lost two hundred war planes since the Norwegian invasion and during the same time Britain lost only thirty. The Germans also lost twenty-six transport and supply ships in addition to the warships already reported. The Germans have been announcing all sorts of victories, most of which have been found to be figments of the imagination.

When the war started the Germans had a superior air force but today the British have an even stronger force. While the Germans may still have a slight advantage in numbers, practically all the British planes are new and strictly modern. The British personnel is also excellent and the men have proven themselves capable of being able to outfight the enemy on most occasions when they have not been too greatly outnumbered.


