Ships, Planes For Great Britain

TO BUILD FREIGHTERS

Orders Given To American Yards For Sixty Cargo Vessels

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28:—Great Britain has completed arrangements for the construction of sixty cargo vessels in the United States at a total cost of \$40,000,000.

The vessels will be of 8500-tons each with turbine engines and standardized parts.

All ships will be completed within eighteen months, it is hoped.

Britain will pay in cash. Prime Minister Winston Churchill has approved doubling the order but priorities must be arranged.

ITALIANS HARD HIT

British Bombers Stop Reinforcing Activity In Albania—Further Greek Advances

GREAT VICTORY ATHENS, Nov. 28: (CP)—The Greek counter-invasion of Italian-held Albania is still progressing in all sectors, according to unofficial reports, but official circles maintain reserve. Dispatches picture the Greeks as constantly hammering the Italians and forcing wholesale surrender and retreat.

ATHENS, Nov. 28: (CP)—British aerial bombing has to large extent prevented the Italians from bringing up reinforcements for a new stand in the war against the Greeks in Albania which continues to go against the Italians.

Important new advances are reported by Greek authorities today to have been made against the Italians despite stiffened Fascist resistance.

It is predicted here that the Greeks are due for greater victories and that the Italians will finally be thrown into the sea.

New Italian Offensive Meanwhile it was stated at Rome that Marshal Pietro Badoglio is to assume personal charge of the Fascist forces in Albania with a view to instituting a new offensive against the Greeks which is expected to get under way by January 1.

TELLS HOW TURIN HIT

Raid of Important Italian Arsenal Described by Home-Coming Royal Air Force

LONDON, Nov. 28: (CP)—Royal Air Force bombing pilots, returning from Tuesday night's raid on the Royal Italian arsenal at Turin, further describe their exploits.

The Air Ministry said that pilots of a second bomber flight saw a large factory building ablaze on arrival. New fires were started and, on departure, explosions were taking place.

The British also struck at Berlin Tuesday night.

SERVICE ABROAD

Sir Percy Lake Had Varied Career In Military Life

VICTORIA, Nov. 28:—After representing the Dominion on the Joint Commission which in 1938 reported on the defence of Canada, the term of General Sir Percy Lake, who died here recently, expired and he rejoined his regiment in India.

The South African War saw General Lake in charge in Britain of mobilization and his work in this connection was praised by the Royal Commission which later investigated the conduct of that campaign.

In 1902 Sir Percy gave valuable assistance to Sir Frederick Borden when the latter attended the Imperial Conference with Sir Wilfred Laurier and again a year later when the Imperial Defence Committee discussed certain questions connected with Canada.

The second and most important chapter of General Lake's official work in Canada opened in 1905 with his election as Chief of the General Staff in Canada.

General Lake in 1907 accompanied Sir Frederick to the Imperial Conference and again went with the minister, as chief military advisor, to the special defence conference of 1909.

NAVAL ENGAGEMENT

HIS BODY IS FOUND

Remains of Another Victim of Lorne Creek Train Disaster Are Recovered

Provincial police headquarters here were advised today by Constable B. E. Munkley of Terrace of the finding of a body identified as being that of W. Cizek on the shore of the Skeena River near the bridge just above Terrace.

Cizek had been missing since a Canadian National Railways engine and tender plunged through a flood-weakened bridge at Lorne Creek some twenty miles above Terrace.

There will be an inquest at Terrace and the body will be forwarded to Hazelton for burial, a widow and family residing there.

Old Sock Hoards Return To Banks

Nazi Raids In Old Country Tend To Increase Funds In Savings Accounts

LONDON, Nov. 28: (CP)—Those "old socks" and home strong-boxes are going out of favor here now and money is returning to the banks.

Nearly £4,500,000 (\$20,025,000) was returned to London banks in mid-October. In the few weeks preceding that about £16,000,000 (\$71,200,000) was taken from household hoards and brought to the comparatively greater safety of bank vaults, some authorities estimated.

The old custom of keeping money buried in the garden is still being followed, however. Several cases of buried treasure have been revealed by bombs which fell on private property.

NAZIS LOSE 11 PLANES: R.A.F. BUSY

Last Night's Attack On London Again Before Midnight—South-west Town Attacked

LONDON, Nov. 28:—Eleven German planes were brought down yesterday during raiding on England. Two Royal Air Force planes were lost but the pilots were safe.

The northwest coast and the Midlands were again subjected to attack but heaviest hit last night was a southwest English town, said by the Germans to have been Plymouth, which was severely bombed by Nazi raiders.

A clear day today brought Nazi raiders over singly and in small groups but they met with stiff resistance from anti-aircraft guns and fighter planes.

Damage and casualties around the southwest town were described as "fairly heavy."

There were two new air raid alarms in London today. After the second this afternoon enemy planes again approached London at great altitude.

It was revealed today that two famous London hotels—the Savoy in the Strand and the Carlton in Carlton Place, a block off Pall Mall, had been damaged in recent air raids.

Germany Heavily Hit There was heavy bombing last night by the Royal Air Force of the Cologne area in Germany, the ports of Antwerp, LeHavre and Boulogne and several airdromes.

One British plane was lost. The raids on enemy territory were announced as having been "heavy and successful."

EDITORIALS

That Evasive Fleet . . .

For many months the British Mediterranean fleet has been patrolling the sea which the Italians claim as their private preserve. On several occasions the Italian fleet has been sighted but in every case it retired. Only once was there a real clash and then the Italians suffered most. Finding that the Italian fleet would not come out from the shelter of the shore guns, the navy organized a raid on Taranto harbor and sank pretty nearly half of the fleet.

Again this week the British got within long range distance of the enemy but with little result. The Italian fleet retired at full speed and was too far away for effective shooting.

Criticism at Victoria . . .

They had an interesting debate at Victoria a few days ago. The government was being criticized for not reducing its proposed expenditures for the coming year. Premier Pattullo, in defending his action, asked the Conservative opposition to give specific cases of where they would cut down the budget. Although there was much talking, not one member of the opposition would venture an opinion as to where it might reduce expenditures.

The Vancouver Sun, both editorially and through Bruce Hutchison, also gave the government a roast for not cutting costs but failed absolutely to do more than generalize. Not an item in the budget was challenged.

When the final vote was taken the C.C.F. members voted with the government.

bencher at Westminster.

Militant Leader

Down in the south banners waved and torches blazed as the Irish Home Rule movement gathered strength and, when Edward Carson, the fiery Dublin barrister, came forward to champion the opposition of loyalist Ulster, James Craig stepped to his side.

Carson made the speeches. Craig worked away in the background, forming the Ulster Volunteers, 100,000 strong, pledged to fight against "Home Rule and Rome Rule." Ulster's Protestant population rose behind them, spurred by Prime Minister Herbert Asquith's Home Rule proposals into determination to fight against "the bartering away of our liberties."

In church, chapel and meeting house throughout the province, the Ulster Covenant was signed September 28, 1912. More than 470,000 men and women, "humbly relying on the God Whom our fathers in days of stress and trial confidently trusted," pledged them-

selves to use "all means which may be found necessary to defeat the present conspiracy to set up a Home Rule Parliament in Ireland."

But when, the Great War broke out Craig at once transferred his energies from the cause of the north to the major issue. He organized the famous 36th Ulster Division whose gallant feats remain among the proudest records of the Allies. His home in Down was placed at the disposal of the wounded and for several years he had no fixed residence.

During and after the war recognition came in Westminster. Craig was made a baronet in 1918, held in turn the positions of treasurer of His Majesty's household, parliamentary secretary to the ministry of pensions and parliamentary secretary and financial secretary to the admiralty. He held the latter post until 1912 when he resigned from the British cabinet with Lord Carson to become prime minister of Northern Ireland.

Sick of the Irish problem and the "Black and Tan" troubles, Britain had enacted in 1920 the Government of Ireland Act, dividing Ireland into parts with separate parliaments in Dublin and Belfast.

Southern Ireland, waging guerrilla warfare "to maintain the republic proclaimed at the Easter Rising of 1916," spurned the offer of a parliament.

Northern Ireland, fearful of being swallowed up in some new whirlpool, accepted her parliament with misgivings only when she was assured of her position as an integral part of the United Kingdom. She continued to return 13 members to the British House of Commons.

During the troubled days that followed his taking over the prime minister's office, Sir James brought into full play the qualities of statesmanship for which he became noted. Never an eloquent speaker, he demonstrated a preference for action to words.

The storm which his government encountered were frequently fraught with peril. There were religious riots in Belfast, a southern boycott of northern goods, bomb outrages and midnight shootings. But Sir James' hand was always

steady at the helm. He was always ready to dissuade reckless supporters in the journey of his administration towards ordered conditions and prosperity.

During the years of his rise in public life Lady Craigavon, daughter of Sir Daniel Tupper, whom he married in 1905, was a constant companion to her husband. She accompanied him on many cruises he was advised to take in later years on account of his health.

His heir, Hon. James Craig, was born in 1906 and educated at Eton.

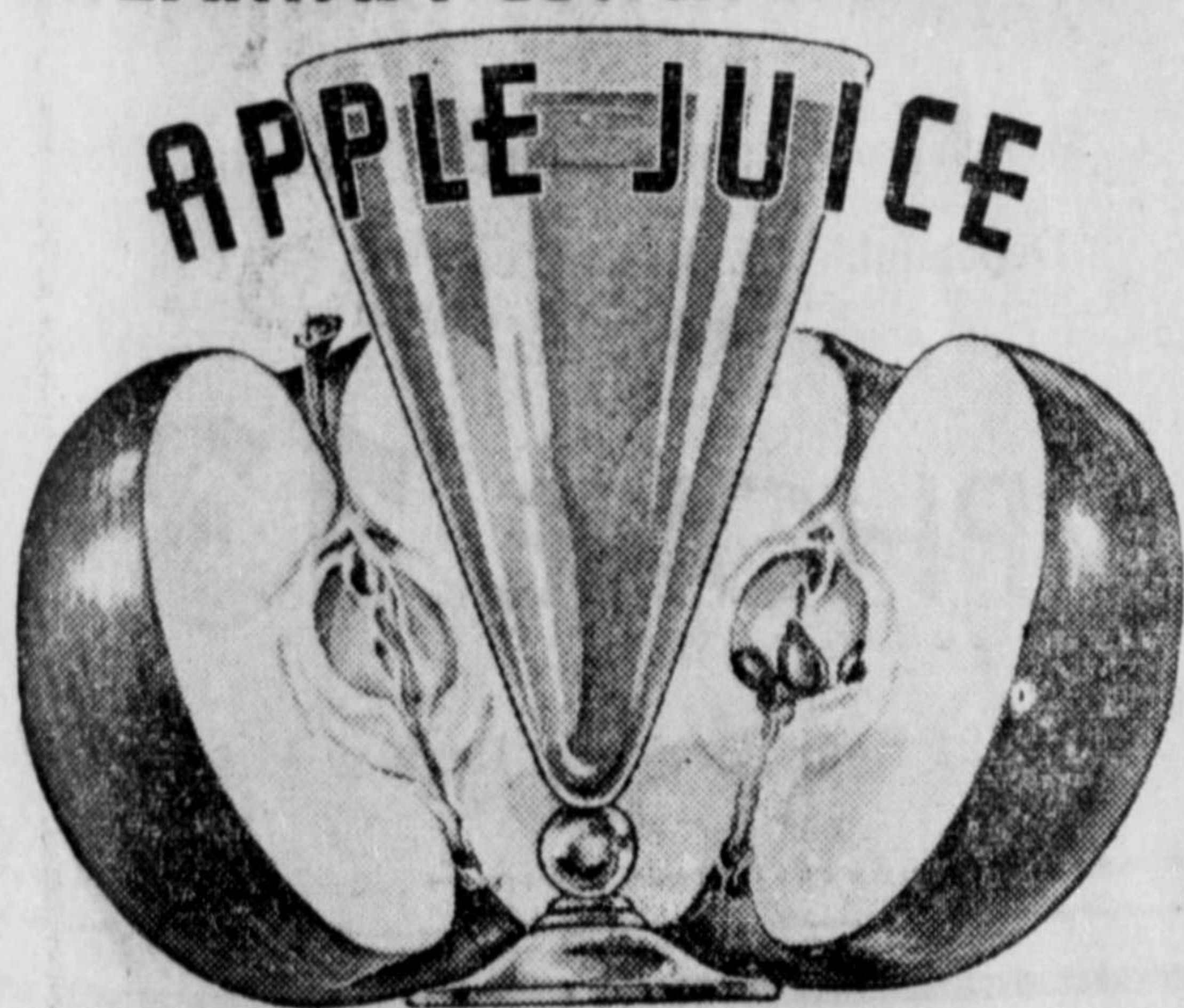

ing on these lines for several years, General Lake being more closely concerned than any other person with the details of the important measures taken to this end. These included expansion of the courses for permanent and non-permanent officers desirous of qualifying for the staff; the admission of Canadian officers to the staff college at Camberley; interchange of officers with other Dominions, India and Great Britain; the uniformity of army examinations with those in Britain; development of departmental corps and formation of new ones; purchase of the Petawawa training ground; grouping of military districts in Eastern Canada into higher commands; the re-arming of the artillery with the 18-pounder and 60-pounder guns; the organization of the cavalry and artillery into permanent and non-permanent; preparation of new establishment tables and introduction of many new books of regulations and manuals. Also during this period, Canada assumed responsibility for the fortresses at Halifax and Esquimaux.

The new appointment as Inspector-General in 1908 enabled Sir Percy to study the effect this reorganization had had upon the efficiency of the militia. Incidentally, he always acknowledged that the fine co-operation of Generals Otter, Lessard and Vidal of the Canadian Permanent Militia was a great factor in enabling the reconstruction while Sir Frederick Borden throughout his term as Minister of Defence worked in the closest co-operation with the Chief of General Staff.

Sir Percy Lake's connection with the Canadian militia ended late in 1910 and, on his departure for an army post in India, the Canadian Defence Department published a special order setting forth the high appreciation by the Canadian government of General Lake's work in the interest of the Canadian forces.

From 1912, General Lake was chief of the General Staff in India, where he faced stubborn governmental resistance, made on the grounds of economy, to his plans for maintaining the efficiency of the forces.

Sir Percy's active service in the war was largely in the Mesopotamia campaign. In 1916, he was given the task of rescuing the 6th (Poona) Division, Major-General Townshend, which was besieged at Kut-el-Amara after

an ambitious but unsuccessful attempt to seize Baghdad. The British base was at Basra on the Persian Gulf, the only means of communication with Kut being the river which was by no means easy to navigate. Sir Percy began or-

ganizing a methodical offensive which under existing conditions was remarkably difficult. In March a gallant surprise attack was launched against Dujaila Redoubt, key-point of the Turkish defences. Due to an error of judgment by one of the column commanders, however, an opportunity to break through and enter Kut was lost. Further efforts by General Lake and his army to relieve Kut, made against not only a strong enemy but also flood conditions and very bad weather, failed and Kut surrendered on April 29.

General Lake then built up his forces and equipment in preparation for a sustained offensive but he was recalled to England in August to testify before the Mesopotamia Commission. His successor, Sir Stanley Maude, acknowledged that subsequent triumph was largely enabled by General Lake's careful preparation. Sir Percy's conduct throughout the campaign was fully vindicated by the official history.

General Lake remained in England from 1916, occupying an important post under the Munitions Ministry until the end of the war.

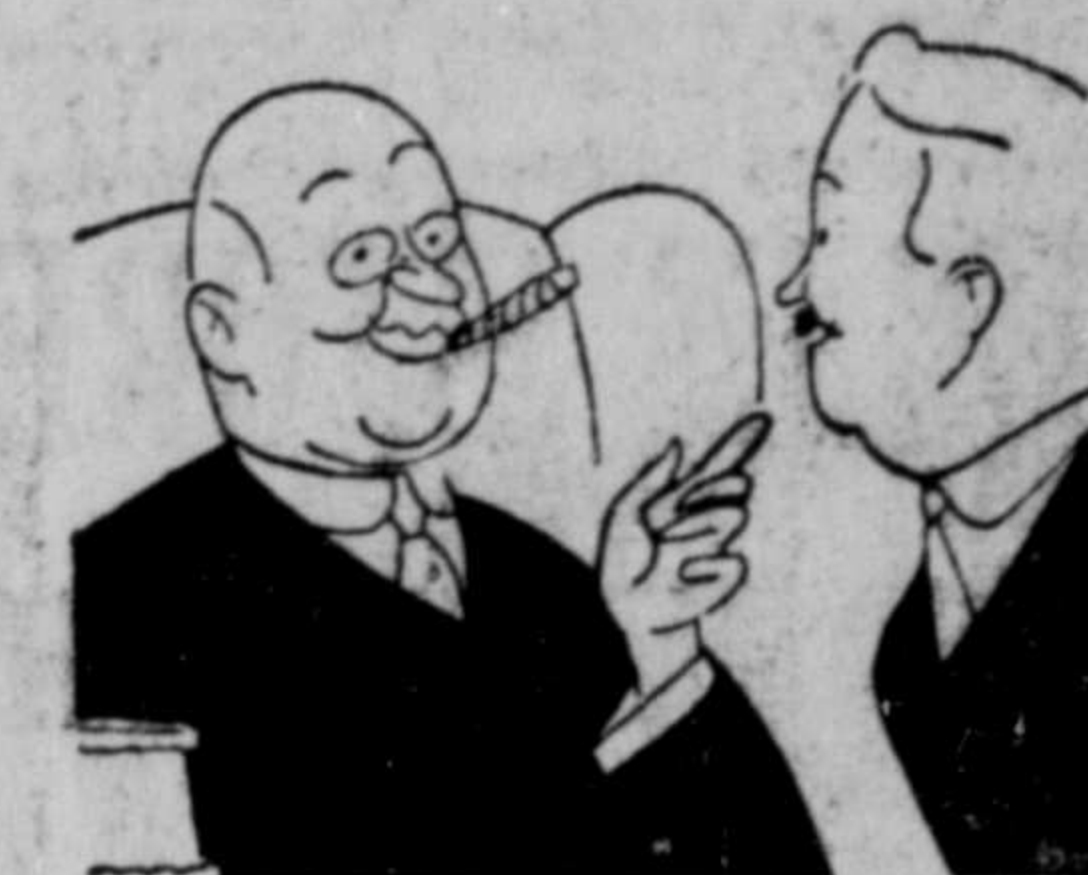

4.—Still unconvinced, I replied, "You may differ, but I'm afraid these imported ryes are beyond my means." Smithfield was amused. "Do you know that some of the world's best ryes are distilled right here in Vancouver?"



5.—"You see," he added, "This rye has the clear, amber color and authentic flavor that all distillers seek. I doubt whether it could be so perfectly distilled with any other water than Vancouver's pure, non-alkaline-kind."



6.—"That being the case, don't you think it would be sheer prejudice to pay more for imported brands?" he asked me. I had to agree. Funny, Smithfield is the least dogmatic of men—yet he is always convincing.
