Preparing For Winter Campaign

Invasion Possibility Still Seen Although Observers Discount It

Campaign for Winter May Shift to Egypt Where German High Command Is Reported to Have Assumed Direction of Operations

LONDON, Oct. 2: (CP)—Military circles in Great Britain continue preaching invasion preparedness but military observers express the belief that the zero hour for such an attack this year has come and gone. They think it likely that the invasion fleet will be maintained in German-held Channel ports through the winter to divert the British fleet but predict that Egypt will likely be the next important battlefield.

Briton Is Kidnapped

BUCHAREST, Oct. 2: (CP)—The British legation says that a young man, apparently a Guardsman, has been kidnapped by the director of the British-organized Astra Romana, largest company in Rumania. The man was unable to determine the whereabouts of the kidnappers. Rumanian authorities have promised an investigation of alleged kidnapping of British subjects.

YACHTS ARE TAKEN OVER

Ocean-Going Craft Are Seized to Further Bolster Canadian Navy

OTTAWA, Oct. 2: (CP)—Further expansion of the Canadian navy through acquisition of fifty large ocean-going yachts is being planned by Hon. Angus Macdonald, minister of national defence for naval affairs.

The vessels have been acquired through conversion into anti-submarine control craft and will be ready after Canadian animals.

SOLIDIFY AMERICAS

Representatives of Nine Republics Visiting United States Defences

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 2.—The campaign to further strengthen Western Hemisphere solidarity in the face of dictatorial aggression from Europe continues. Twenty-three military chiefs and diplomats from nine Latin-American nations left today by plane to inspect "One for all and all for one" United States coast defence bases. Should be the keynote policy today, declared President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The head of the Bolivian delegation hoped that the chain of happy relations between the American republics would be further forged.

LONDON.—The Prime Minister lunched with the King at Buckingham Palace Tuesday. Knighthood was conferred on Captain Henry Harwood, commander of the squadron which fought in the Battle of the Plate with the German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee.

GERMANS TRAIN RUMANIANS

BUCHAREST.—German officers are now training Rumanian forces in tank and mechanized equipment use.

MINARETS DARK

ALEXANDRIA.—For the first time in history minarets of the Alexandria mosque are dark during Mohammedan Holy Month. War precautions make this necessary. The same condition prevails at Port Said and Ismaela.

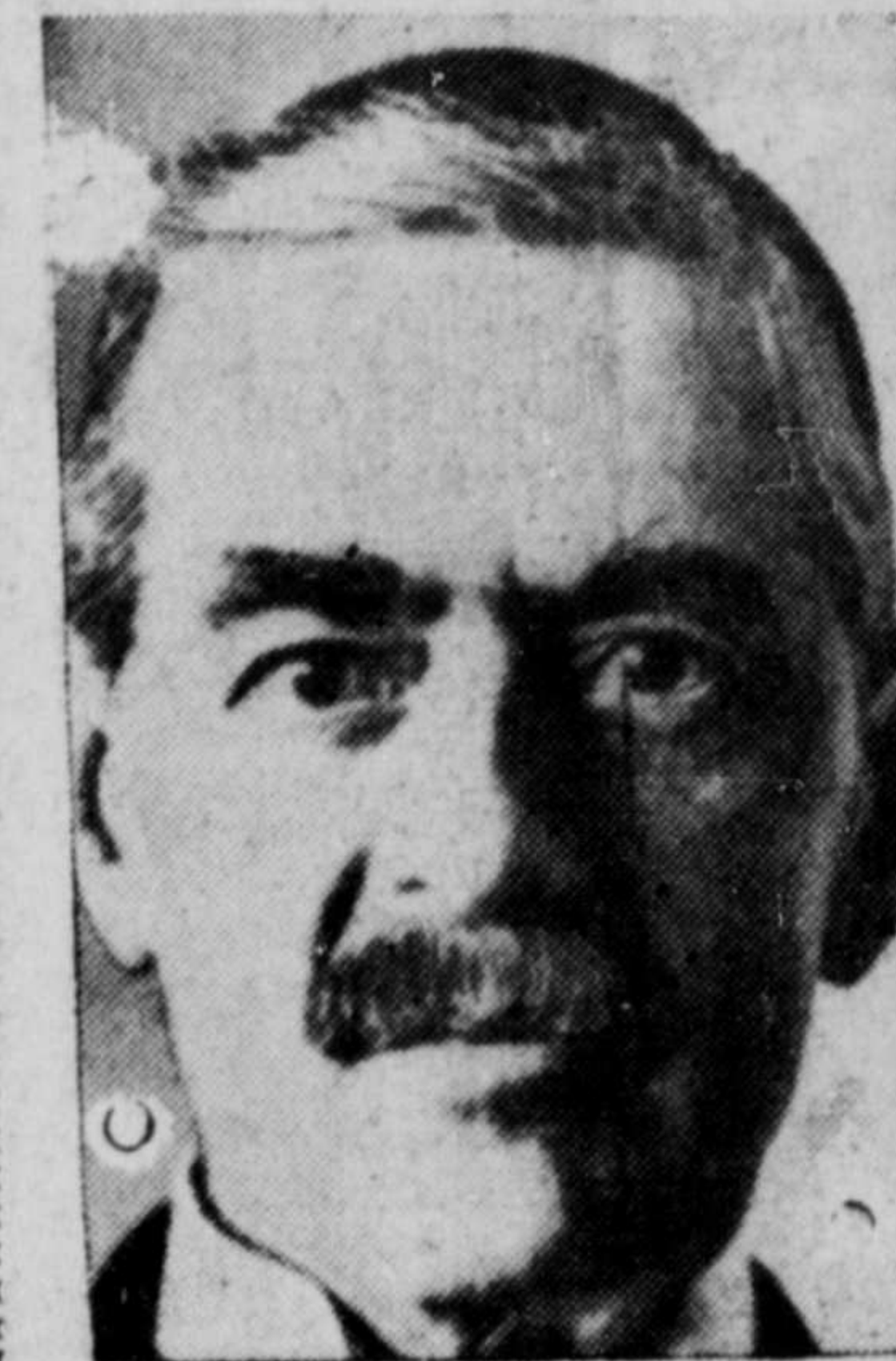

Chamberlain Expected to Resign With Lloyd George Entering Churchill Gov't

LONDON, Oct. 2: (CP)—Resignation of Former Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain as President of the Council in the Churchill government on grounds of ill-health is imminent and may be announced tonight or tomorrow, it is reported in political circles. Resignation of the former Prime Minister would likely involve several government changes and it is thought that Former Prime Minister David Lloyd George might return in an advisory capacity.

Detroit Won First Game For American League in Opening of World Series

Tight Pitching of Buck Newsom Proved Too Much for Cincinnati Reds; Game Put On Ice in Second Inning

CINCINNATI, Oct. 2.—Detroit, American League champions, loosed their batting power behind the tight pitching of Buck Newsom today to defeat Cincinnati Reds seven to two in the first game of the 1940 World Series. The Tigers put the game on ice in the second inning with a five-hit five-run blast which sent Paul Derringer, the red-leg ace pitcher, to the showers and then added two more in the fifth, when Bruce Campbell banged a homer into the right field bleachers to score behind Rudy York, who had tripled.

BASES IN BAHAMAS

United States Army And Navy Mission Making Inspection—Greeted By Duke Of Windsor

NASSAU, Bahamas, Oct. 2:—Eight members of a United States army and navy mission, headed by Rear Admiral John W. Green, arrived in the Bahamas to inspect possible sites for bases to the establishment of which Great Britain has agreed. The mission was met by the Governor of the Bahamas, the Duke of Windsor. Reports that the Duke may return to the United States with the mission lack confirmation.

NEW SYSTEM OF DEFENCE ASSAULTS ON LONDON ALL FAIL

London People Cheered By Announcement That Night Air Attacks May Be Checked

LONDON, Oct. 1: (CP)—London, with an unofficial toll of five thousand dead and eight thousand wounded in September air raids, has received official assurance that a new defence system is being built up to meet night attacks. The nature of the system has not been disclosed but it comes as comforting news to thousands who are now compelled to spend most of the nights and much of the days in shelters.

SPAIN NOT COMING IN

Entry In War Will Not Result From Present Conferences, It Is Said

ROME, Oct. 2: (CP)—A Fascist source declared yesterday that immediate Spanish entry into the war will not result from conferences which started yesterday between Premier Benito Mussolini and Spanish Minister of the Interior Roman Serrano Suner.

There is little likelihood of Spain entering the war or joining up with the German-Italian-Franco pact for the present at least, Virginio Gayda, authoritative Fascist editor, says. Spanish bases will probably be used for an attack on Gibraltar, however, Gayda suggests.

R. A. F. Pounding Hard at Reich

Numerous Military Objectives Hit By British Bombers During Night

LONDON, Oct. 2.—Five major German attempts—three by day and two by night—to raid London in force failed yesterday. During the day five German planes were brought down while the British lost four. The raiders found it impossible to penetrate the ring of fire on the outskirts of the city and were unable to drop bombs on the inner city. There was a lull in the night raiding, the first alarm of the night, during which planes appeared in the northwestern section of the city, being suspended just before midnight although another came shortly after. The new lightning shell defence appeared to be functioning effectively. The enemy night attack was much lighter and the people now pay little attention to day alarms.

Since midnight last night at least eight German planes have been brought down in the course of raids on various parts of Britain, it was announced this morning.

London defence batteries went into action early this afternoon when squadrons of invading Nazi war planes caused the fifth alarm of the day. The waves of attack were turned back by the Royal Air Force in each case. Defences worked smoothly and nine German planes were shot down with loss of one of Great Britain's fighters. In each of the four earlier alarms either the defences were strong enough to hold back the raiders or central London was not their objective. Although London was kept in an almost continuous state of alarm from dawn to dusk few German planes managed to penetrate London defences and drop bombs. These inflicted some fatalities.

The twenty-fifth night of bombardment for London passed with less severity than usual but attacks on Great Britain were widespread. Heavy attacks were aimed at several northwestern towns. Raiders also struck at southwestern Scotland and Wales and the shopping district of Liverpool was bombed for the third successive night.

Pounding At Germany

Meanwhile the Royal Air Force kept pounding away on the Reich with another night attack on Berlin, causing a two hour and fifteen minute alarm which came earlier than usual, beginning before midnight. Elsewhere the Royal Air Force attacked important military objectives including big gun emplacements of which twenty-five have been located between Cap Griz Nez and Calais. Both sides of the English Channel trembled, so heavy was the British attack.

The Air Ministry announced that Royal Air Force bombers attacked a Berlin munitions factory during the night. Bombers also attacked an oil plant at Cologne, a power station at Duisberg, an aircraft factory at Rotterdam and western German communications as well as Channel invasion ports.

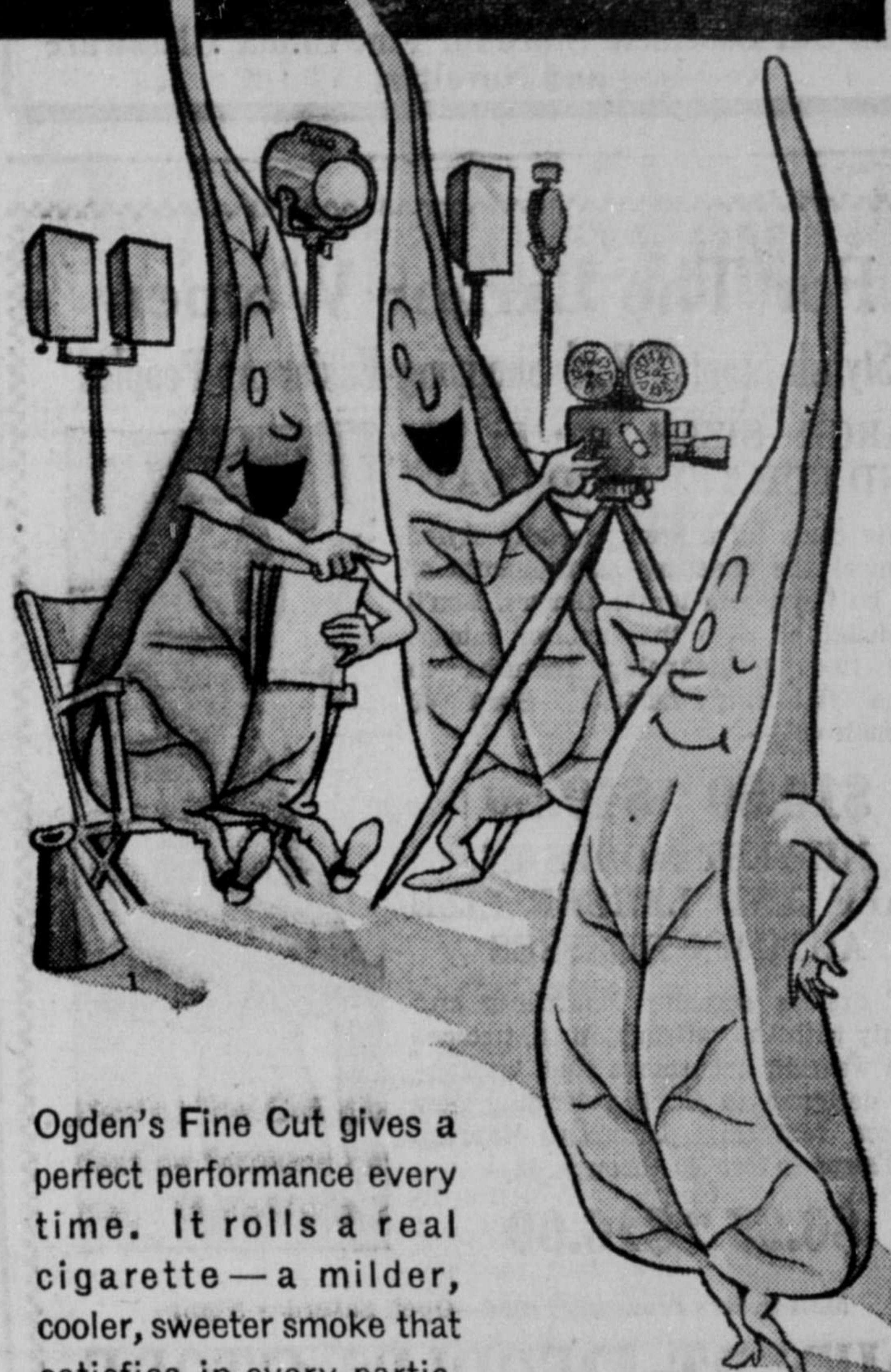

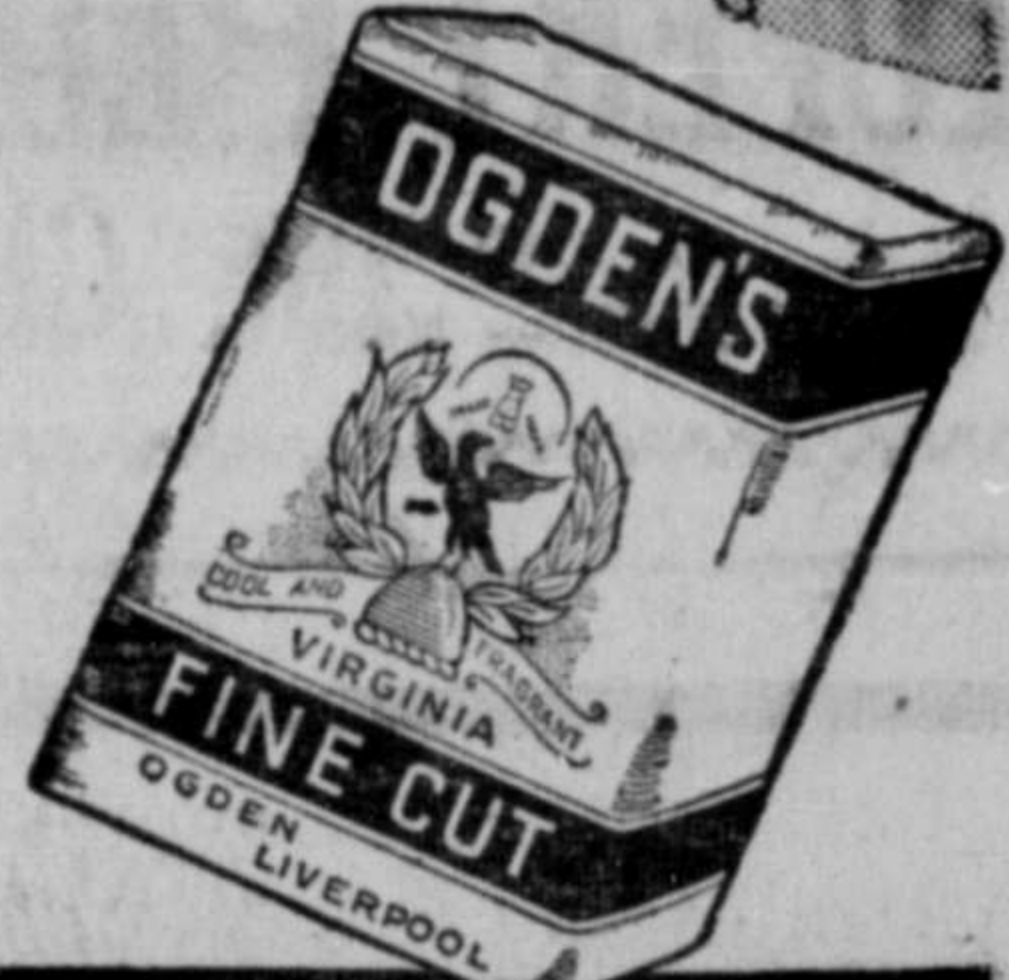

EXPPELLING OF BRITON

Have All Been Ordered Out of Rumania—Hand of Axis Seen Behind Move

BUCHAREST, Oct. 2. — Inspired, it is believed, by axis coercion, the Rumanian government last night ordered the expulsion of all British subjects from the country. There are several hundred Britons in Rumania.
