London defence batteries went linto action early this afternoon when squadrons of invading Nazi war planes caused the fifth alarm of the day. The waves of attack were turned back by the Royal Air Force in each case. Defences worked smoothly and nine German planes were shot down with loss of one of Great Britain's fighters. In each of the four earlier alarms either the defences were strong enough to hold back the raiders or central London was not their objective. Although London was kept in an almost continuous state of alarm from dawn to dusk few German planes managed to penetrate London defences and drop bombs. These inflicted some fatalities.

The twenty-fifth night of bombardment for London passed with less severity than usual but attacks on Great Britain were widespread. Heavy attacks were aimed at several northwestern towns. Raiders also struck at southwestern Scotland and Wales and the shopping district of Liverpool was bombed for the third successive

Pounding At Germany

The United Church has sensed this and recommends that members of that organization purchase war savings stamps or certificates and donate them to the Church.

War Savings Certificates could be' used by the Churches as a basis for credit or in other ways and the donation would at the same time satisfy the patriotic aspirations of the people. The churches must be kept going and this is one way of doing it.

Another, a woman corporal in the W.A.A.F., dragged a pilot from his blazing plane and shielded him from a bomb, and thousands are working all day and every day in the week in munition factories and doing it with a right good will. Nothing is so stimulating as a crusade and today we are all crusaders-every one of us. Nothing that can be done by the most iniquitous group of criminals the world has ever seen can keep back the SE dawn of a new and better and more Christian world."

Back again to our soldier heroes, let us quote:

"The Lancastria was sinking: hundreds were in the water, but the soldiers on board remained until the end. They were seen clinging as best they could to the side of the ship as she disappeared and could be heard singing together "There'll always be an England." But try to picture what it must be to face drowning suddenly, with no time. to make any preparations, no time to write any last words, no time almost to think, and yet facing a horrible death, facing the unknown, and to be able to sing "There'll Always be an England."
