EDITORIAL

Roll Out the Barrel - - -

Just before some of the little folks aboard the ship that was recently torpedoed went to their death, they sat in a lifeboat and sang among other songs "Roll Out the Barrel." Some critics have said they thought it would have been more appropriate had the children been singing hymns just before being dashed into eternity. Evidently the aim of those in charge of the children was to keep them from thinking of the possibility of drowning. Singing songs they knew and that went with a swing aided in keeping them cheerful and happy to the last. We do not think so poorly of the Creator as to imagine that the songs they were singing could affect their hereafter. Anyway no place would be heaven without a barrel of fun there sometimes.

Getting the Truth About War - - -

Some Canadians seem to be a little worried because they are not told the whole truth about the war. Official communiques omit certain important matters. We all know the British War Department does not consider it to be in the public interest that the enemy should know many details about the war. We hear about the war losses from so many sources that we feel sure the official accounts are not far from correct except that the reports of losses are usually delayed.

Prince Rupert as a Market - - -

A casual run through the country near Prince Rupert makes it clear that the people of the interior are learning more and more to depend on Prince Rupert to take their marketable produce. Owing to the total absence of horses there is not much local demand for hay but there is a good demand for fruit, vegetables, berries, potatoes, turnips, milk and milk products, provided they are of good quality and well packed. Grading is very important. We are told that vegetables and potatoes are in greater demand if they are clean and carefully graded. Apples especially should look attractive to the customer. Already it is evident that the methods of marketing are improving and this accounts for the increasing demand. It is hoped that this increase will continue and that more and more of the products of the interior will make their way into Prince Rupert. Trade of this kind will be mutually beneficial. The permanence of Prince Rupert depends to a large extent on the development of the interior and the value of the Prince Rupert market to the producers of the interior depends upon the development and growth of the city.

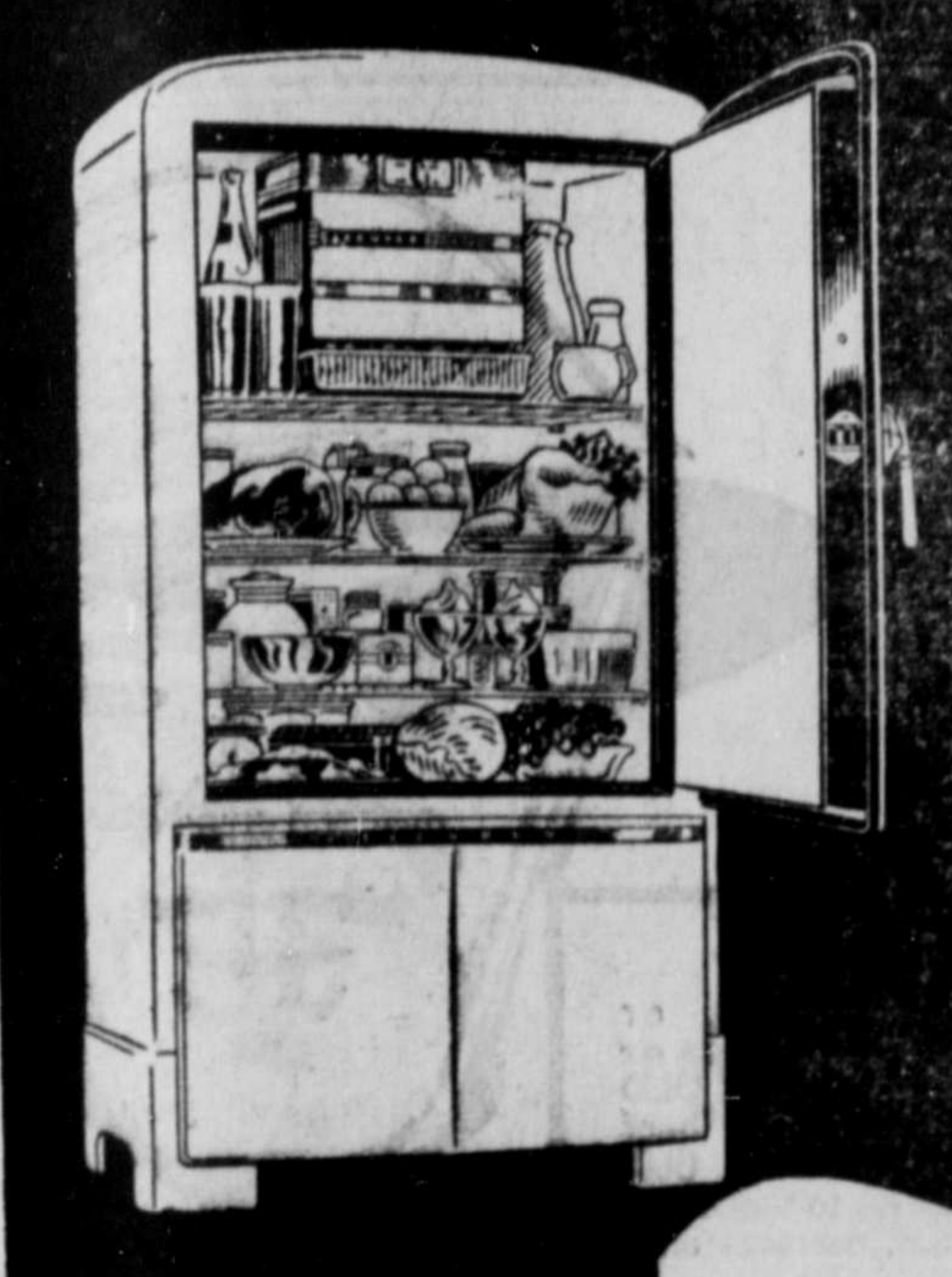

missioned in Dominion Navy


HALIFAX, Sept. 25.—Six over-age
destroyers obtained from the United
States were commissioned as Cana-
dian vessels yesterday. Royal Cana-
