RUMANIA SIGNS UP

Formally Joins With Axis Alliance -Spain Tomorrow Followed By Bulgaria And Slovakia?

BERLIN, Nov. 23: (CP)—Premier Ion Antonescu today signed up Rumania with the Axis alliance. announcing that he had done so in the interests of peace and a new order in Eurasia.

Rumania makes the fifth Axis partner—the others being Germany, Italy, Japan and Hungary.

It is expected here that Slovakia will sign up tomorrow with Bulgaria expected to sign on Monday and Spain Tuesday.

Premier Bela Tuka of Slovakia will come to Berlin tomorrow to sign as the sixth member of the Axis military alliance, it was learned tonight.

By the stroke of having Rumania today seal bonds with Germany for the formal expanding of the Axis bloc, the Reich pushed the Nazi sphere toward the Near East to a point less than 250 miles from the vital Dardanelles.

Rumania is also mentioned here as an early Axis signatory.

We have only to listen to the radio to know that. Much of it is insidious and not easily recognized as propaganda. When the American radio stations unduly dramatize the practical destruction of British cities it may be German propaganda. Every time we repeat the exaggerated reports of the German propaganda machine we aid Germany in her campaign of misrepresentation. Dr. Goebbels sends out reports in the hope that they will be passed on. We notice that Germany allows very little news of their own losses to go out and those losses must be very heavy.

Turkey Speaks Up - - -

For the first time since the beginning of the war Turkey has spoken in a manner that could not be misunderstood in regard to her position. Also she is preparing! to take part immediately if necessary, That is very important. All other Mohammedan countries are with the British Empire in this fight for freedom and the stand taken by Turkey will stiffen the backs of all Islam. It is an important step in the fight which will end in the destruction of totalitarian governments.

Hitler Becoming Annoyed - - -

Hitler is becoming annoyed. He does not like the British attacking his vital industries and destroying factories and communications throughout Germany. 


