Roumania Swinging Towards Nazis

Significance Is Seen In Reconciliation Of King Carol and Iron Guards

Centre of International Interest Now Shifting From North-Western to Southeastern Europe

LONDON, March 16: (CP)—The centre of international interest has shifted from northwest to southeast Europe with Roumania again occupying the limelight as she shows indications of veering away from the side of the Allies towards Russia and Germany. Most significant move is the patching up by King Carol of his quarrel with the pro-Nazi Iron Guard for whom he has declared what amounts to a general public amnesty. Today Carol received in audience 250 representatives of these Iron Guards following release of a large number from prison and concentration camps. They pledged their allegiance to the crown. It has been denied that Iron Guards will be admitted to the Roumanian cabinet. Government spokesmen have also gone out of their way to declare that there will be no change in Roumanian foreign policy and that the country intends to retain its policy of strict neutrality.

MONTREAL, March 16: (CP)—National Hockey League play-offs will commence next Tuesday night, it was announced last night by Frank Calder, president of the league. In New York the Rangers and Boston Bruins will commence a best out of seven game series. At Toronto the Maple Leafs and Chicago Black Hawks will start a best out of three game series and at Detroit the New York Americans will open a series with Detroit Red Wings.

War News

AIR RAIDS EXCHANGED

LONDON—British and German air forces exchanged raids last night, the Air Ministry announces, with the Royal Air Force making an extensive flight over Poland. A German bomber clashed with the British coastal patrol in a running fight. The enemy craft escaped in a damaged condition. Three German planes also flew over the northeast part of France. Royal Air Force patrols scouted Heligoland Bight this morning and returned safely although they were fired on by anti-aircraft batteries and attacked by Nazi fighters.

JAPAN AND RUSSIA

TOKYO—The Japanese have protested to Russia, asserting that a Russian patrol fired illegally on a Japanese patrol at the border of Sakhalin Island, ownership of which is divided between Japan and Russia. Reports from Tokohara said that there were a dozen Soviet and two Japanese casualties in the border clash. Soviet soldiers are reported to have machine-gunned Japanese on the Outer Mongolian-Manchoukouo frontier. Both sides, it is evident, are reinforcing themselves for a resumption of fighting.

NEW SUBMARINE WAVE

PARIS—Sinking of two German submarines reported by French naval sources was accompanied by the comment that Germany was apparently dispatching a new u-boat wave. One submarine was reported sunk by a British armed trawler. Such a sinking was reported by the British Thursday but it is unknown if the French report covered the same incident.

MORE ATROCITIES

AMSTERDAM—A party of 75 Polish refugees arriving here yesterday, reported further atrocities in German and Russian occupied Poland, particularly directed against Jews. In Warsaw one hundred Poles and Jews were lined up and shot by the Nazis for the killing of two Germans at Przemysl in Russian-occupied Poland 650 Poles were lined up and shot summarily. Great famine is reported to be imminent in both sections of Poland.

SENTENCED TO DEATH

PARIS—August Steinberg, native of Austria and a second lieutenant in the German Army, has been sentenced to death by a French court-marshal for espionage.

MORE BUTTER ALLOWED

LONDON—Effective next week Britons will have their butter ration increased from four to eight ounces weekly in view of an improved supply.

MAC DONALD IN PARIS

PARIS—Rt. Hon. Malcolm MacDonald, British Colonial Secretary, and his staff are here for a three-day conference with French authorities on the question of co-ordination of colonial war efforts.

CABINET CHANGES

Important Shake-up in Both British and French War Administrations Anticipated

LONDON, March 16 (Canadian Press)—Impatience at the leisurely course of the war appears to be growing both in Great Britain and France and important cabinet shake-ups in both countries are anticipated. There is growing favor for a bolder diplomatic policy in order to thwart extension of totalitarian influence.

In Britain Leslie Burgin, minister of supply, Sir Samuel Hoare, Lord Privy Seal, and Sir Kingsley Wood, Secretary for Air, are believed due for removal or demotion. There is believed to be little likelihood of a change in the premiership and no reorganization is expected to be announced before Easter although the whole question of war policy and progress is expected to be discussed by the House next Tuesday. There is considerable criticism of purchasing methods. A major shake-up in the French cabinet is expected. Premier Edouard Daladier may relinquish the ministry of war to Marshal Gamelin, the present commander-in-chief of the Army, and may also have himself relieved of the portfolio of foreign affairs.

New York Stock Market Is Weak

Considerable Declines in View of Uncertainty of International Situation

NEW YORK, March 16—The trend of the New York Stock Exchange continues definitely downward in view of the uncertainty of the international situation. In the first hour of trading this morning 270,000 shares changed hands with the industrial average dropping 79 to 145.75 and rails 20 to 29.81. Utilities at closing yesterday were off 04 for the day, closing at 24.10. There had been substantial declines in yesterday's trading.

Opening Date Of Big Bend Road

Will Be June 29, Two Days Before Opening of Jasper-Banff Highway

OTTAWA, March 16 (Canadian Press)—Formal opening of the Big Bend Highway in British Columbia, final link to an all Canadian highway between Vancouver and Halifax, has been set for June 29, two days earlier than the opening of the Jasper-Banff highway.

Veteran Preacher Of Province Dies

Rev. George Reid Passes Away in Vancouver—Was Once on Islands

VANCOUVER, March 16: (CP)—Rev. Geo. Reid, veteran Methodist missionary, who has been living here in retirement since 1918, died yesterday at the age of 77 years. He came to British Columbia in 1887 and ministered on the Queen Charlotte Islands and in other parts of the province.

STILL QUIET IN WEST

PARIS—A quiet day is again reported on the western front. Rain and fog kept fighting to a minimum.

SUSPEND SHIPPING

Holland Decides That it is Too Dangerous to Send Further Ships to Sea

AMSTERDAM, March 16: (CP)—The newspaper de Telegraaf reported today that the Navy had ordered Netherlands shipping companies to suspend all navigation until further notice due to the dangers threatening shipping.

Trawler Captain Tells His Story

Details of Thrilling Runing Fight With German Submarine Are Disclosed

LONDON, March 16: (CP)—Capt. Harry Westerden of an unnamed British trawler described at a Scottish port today how his little vessel destroyed a German submarine in a seventeen-hour surface fight after bringing it to the surface with depth charges. During the fight the trawler's speed was forced up to eighteen and a half knots although the normal top speed is only eighteen. The trawler made port in a sinking condition, her engines being found to have shifted five inches from their supports. It is reported that another German submarine was destroyed yesterday but no details have been announced as yet.

Car Went Over Malahat; Man Is Badly Injured

VICTORIA, March 16 (Canadian Press)—Ernest L. Stock is in critical condition in hospital here with injuries sustained yesterday when his automobile plunged fifty feet down an embankment from the Malahat Drive.

Bulletins

WELLES IN ROME ROME—Summer Welles, United States Under Secretary of State, is back in Rome for further conferences which it is said may signify a possible new peace move. Mr. Welles had an 80 minute meeting with King Victor Emmanuel this morning and met Foreign Minister Count Ciano for seventy minutes. An unexpected conference has been arranged for Mr. Welles with the Pope Monday and he will also meet Premier Mussolini again before sailing home.

SHIP IS ASHORE

SAN FRANCISCO—The Australian steamship Kahika, 1537 tons, is reported sinking fast after piling up on rocks in a pass between Australia and Tasmania. The vessel Taroon, presumably an Australian government craft, was going to the assistance. It was not known how many were on board.

FINNS FOR CANADA

OTTAWA—The Department of Natural Resources is considering a proposal for the resettlement of dispossessed Finns on Canadian farm lands. The proposal has not yet been before the government.

BAR GOLD

LONDON, (CP)—The Montreal price of bar gold on the London market was unchanged today at \$37.54 per fine ounce.

Churchill Shows How It's Spoken

Admiralty First Lord Strong For Straight English in Foreign Words

LONDON, March 16 (CP)—Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, is giving Britain's common man courage to talk "plain English." The common man is tired of those tongue-twisting names of towns and generals in Germany and France, Finland and China in the current wars.

The First Lord has set his own style. Without a tremor, Churchill refers to Hitler and the "Nazies." The ordinary man has been struggling with "Nahtzees" and wondering whether he has said it right. Churchill also has shown he can say "Graf Spee" as it is spelt instead of the German "Graf Ship-pay." And he gets away with "Benno Airs" and "Monty Video." British Broadcasting Corporation announcers saw the trend of opinions in complaints about their correct but unintelligible pronunciation of names in the Spanish war. They compromised and foreign names they say now are meant to be intelligible to the British public while not departing too much from the native pronunciation.

LOSSES IN OCEAN WAR

Naval Trawler and Freighter Are Latest Victims of Mines

LONDON, March 16: (CP)—The Admiralty announced today that the naval trawler Peridot had struck a German mine and sunk without loss of life. The British freighter Melrose, 1589 tons, is also reported sunk after an explosion following striking a mine, eighteen of the crew being missing. In Berlin it is announced that German bombing planes, reconnoitering over the North Sea, sank one British patrol boat and badly damaged another.

Commercial Fishing Ban

Tweedsmuir Park Rod and Gun Club Passes Resolution

FRANCOIS LAKE, March 16—At a meeting of the Tweedsmuir Park Rod and Gun Club a resolution was passed, on motion of J. H. Henkel and Verne Taylor, protesting to the Departments of Fisheries at Ottawa and Victoria against permits being issued to allow commercial fishing in the lakes of the central interior. The motion was passed unanimously and the secretary, T. P. L. Mulvany, was instructed to seek the co-operation of all local rod and gun clubs.

Joe Sugden, president of the club was in the chair.

Four Were Quite Badly Injured

Damage to Equipment Extensive in Train Collision Near Medicine Hat

MEDICINE HAT, March 16: (CP)—Four persons are in serious condition from injuries sustained early yesterday morning when an east-bound Canadian Pacific Railway passenger train crashed head-on into a pusher engine near here, eleven in all being hurt. They are, however, expected to recover. The engine telescoped and engine tender, mail, baggage and express cars of the passenger train were derailed. No British Columbians were on the list of injured.

Steps Toward New Alliance

President of Norwegian Parliament Arrives in Stockholm, Capital of Sweden

STOCKHOLM, March 16: (CP)—First definite step in negotiations toward a possible northern defensive alliance was seen yesterday in the arrival here of C. J. Hambro, president of the Norwegian Parliament.

FINNISH CABINET TROUBLE

More Ministers Have Now Resigned, Making It Four In All

Explanation Why Surrender Made

Best Expedient in Means—Air Raiding Was Crippling Little Nation

FORTIFY AGAIN

HELSINKI, March 16 (Canadian Press)—Finland will begin immediately fortifying her new frontiers and to reorganize her battered army following the Soviet peace, informed quarters declared. There will be no general mobilization of the army except for certain classes which will be released to help with civil reconstruction. The Finnish proposal for a defence alliance with Sweden and Norway is another part of the determination to be strong. Sweden is lending Finland a large number of motor-cars to assist in removal of displaced Finns to new homes from the areas which have been handed to Russia. Large Swedish labor corps will also be sent to aid in reconstruction.

LONDON, March 16 (Canadian Press)—Exchange Telegraph reports out of Stockholm reports the resignation of two more Finnish cabinet members—Juho Paasikivi, minister without portfolio, and Eino Flenndt, minister of public works and national welfare. Their resignations are the outcome of the acceptance of the peace treaty with Russia. Paasikivi is one of the delegation which accompanied the Premier to Moscow. Two other ministers resigned yesterday.

After two-and-a-half hours of debate, the Finnish Parliament yesterday, by a vote of 145 to 3, ratified the peace treaty with Russia under which 1500 miles of border and strategic territory is surrendered to the Soviet. "We decided to choose peace as the best way for the most," said the Premier who, however, admitted "unwisdom in regard to the future, declaring that Finland, and civilization generally were still in the greatest danger."

It has been disclosed, now that membership measures have been passed, that enormous devastation done in Finland by Russian air raids was a material factor in deciding Finland to come to terms. As a result of bombing, it is now reported, Finnish railways were virtually destroyed, stopping movement of troops. Many factories were also wiped out which, of course, affected supplies. All the damage in addition to the damage done by bombing of cities and civilian population generally. One estimate of the material damage as a result of the air raiding is \$500,000,000.

NEW YORK COPPER

NEW YORK, March 16—Copper futures continued a decline on the New York metal market today, dropping in the first hour of trading .04c. to .06c. with May at 23.25c. per pound.

EDITORIALS

FORGET POLITICS

It might be just as well to forget politics and enjoy the week end intermission, as a day of religious observance or as a time for recreation after a hard week's work. We wish we could advise doing the same with the war news but we know it would not be any use. We all want to know what has happened in Europe every day.

LORD HAW-HAW

There is a British Fascist at present in Germany broadcasting German propaganda who has been named by the British people "Lord Haw-Haw." He is now said to be William Joyce, a disgruntled Britisher, who was born in America of an Irish father. He was for a time linked up with Sir Oliver Mosley as director of propaganda. Being expelled from that organization he formed the Nationalist League and led it until it was dissolved. He is said to be a brilliant man with a knowledge of languages and is well posted on British social questions.

URGING AN ADVANCE

British and French people are beginning to tire of inactivity in the war. They want more action. They urge that the British and French armies press forward instead of waiting for an attack. We doubt if this advice is good. It is possible that by means of intense artillery fire and bombing from airplanes the defences of Germany could be so weakened as to allow of the entry of the Allies into their country. Similar advance has been suggested for the German armies in order to force a way into France. So far experience has shown that the advancing armies suffer most. But there have never before been such attacking forces as there are today. However, it is for military men to decide what is the best course, not civilians.

It has been said that military initiative wins any war. It is hoped that Germany be attacked at her weakest point and the war be carried into that country. In spite of what we read and hear, it is pretty sure there will be action within the next two months and it is not at all likely there will be peace until some decisive action has been taken.

Ocean Falls Basketeers Next Week

Art Murray received a wire yesterday afternoon from Ocean Falls advising that the paper town basketball team is prepared to come here on Wednesday and Thursday of next week to commence a series of games for the Northern British Columbia championship. There would later be two games at Ocean Falls.

Ocean Falls will have no less than two former Prince Rupert boys on the lineup when they arrive here. On the team will be ever popular KaZu Nakamoto, the former Tuxis flash a few years back. Kazu, often regarded as one

of the foremost pointgetters ever to play here, is a regular first string forward with the paper men—and is reported to be playing fine ball. Also on the line-up is Harley Lear, who was formerly an intermediate in the city league before migrating to Vancouver to learn the finer points of the game. Harley is about six feet one or two and is a leading scorer in the league at the Falls.

The Ocean Falls team will arrive next Wednesday morning on the steamer Prince George and will return home on the same vessel Thursday night. The games will be played in the Armory and the proceeds will go to the 102nd Battered canteen fund.

SPORT CHAT

All-star time has come to the National Hockey League again, accompanied by the speculation that always springs up when the writers go to work to select the Canadian Press teams. One familiar name is almost certain to be missing when the ballots of hockey writers in the six National League cities are counted and the first and alternate teams of 1939-40 are compiled. Eddie Shore has made the first team in seven of the nine years in which it has been chosen for the Canadian Press. This season the veteran rattle handling defenceman has left Boston Bruins to devote most of his time to managing and directing his newly-acquired International-American League club at Springfield. He made a few appearances with the Bruins and then was traded to New York Americans, who have used him when he could spare the time.

There will be other changes—some based upon the fading of long-established stars; some upon injuries that have kept players out for long periods and others upon the rise of brilliant youngsters like Boston's famed Sauerkraut Line. Some writers would elect the high-scoring Krauts from Kitchener, Ont.—Milt Schmidt, Bobby Bauer and Woody Dumart—as a unit. Dave Kerr of New York Rangers, so far ahead in league average that no other goaltender could catch him, is bound to give Frank Brimsek of Bruins a fight for the position that poker-faced Frank won last season in his first appearance as a big-league goalie. The selectors won't overlook Earl Robertson's work in keeping the Americans going behind a wobbly defence.

Aubrey (Dit) Clapper, selected beside Shore on the defence in 1939, has played better than ever at the blue line for the Bruins since Eddie's departure. What the Boston captain has to worry about most is the continued brilliance of such established defence stars as Eddie Good-

Thompson's great job of coaching at Chicago has earned plaudits everywhere and may win him a coaching position. Country West and Frank Boucher, replacing Murrer Ari Ross and Manager Leo Patrick respectively as coaches of the Bruins and Rangers, have maintained a constant fight for first place, while Red Dutton kept his Americans punching.

Waterfront Whiffs

Official "Say So" in Regard to Halibut Season is Awaited Although Known—Navigation Examinations on—New Co-op Building About Finished

While it has been known authoritatively in Prince Rupert for several weeks that the opening of the 1940 halibut fishing season in the North Pacific has been set for April 1 by the International Fisheries Commission and that there will be little if any change in quotas as to the division of fishing between Areas No. 2 and 3, the official announcement has yet to be made but it is expected this will be forthcoming within a matter of days now. Meantime, the fleet at Prince Rupert, as at all other halibut fishing ports on the coast, is busy getting in readiness for the season's operations. The halibut vessel owners have been working out their arrangements for voluntary curtailment in the interests of conservation and orderly marketing. The British Columbia Halibut Marketing Board will be sitting in Prince Rupert at the first of next week. Halibut fishing vessels and their masters, which have been engaged in coastal defence patrol during the past winter, may be released so they may engage in their normal pursuit of halibut fishing.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 10 o'clock last night from the south and sailed at 1 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

At the conclusion of her present voyage, C.P.R. steamer Princess Adelaide is to be withdrawn from service for annual overhaul and in her place the Princess Louise will be coming north next week. The Princess Norah, which has been relieving the Princess Mary on the Vancouver-Powell River run, will be returning to the Alaska route for the time being.
