

Britain To Fight Alone

LONDON, June 17: (CP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill reiterated today that Great Britain will fight on alone with every hope of success until Hitler is conquered.

"We have become the sole champion now in arms to defend the world cause," said Churchill. "We shall do our best to be worthy of that high honor. We shall defend our island and, with the British Empire around us, we shall fight on, unconquerable, until the curse of Hitler is lifted from the brows of men."

"We are sure in the end all will be well."

Churchill made this declaration in a radio broadcast to the world this evening.

Churchill attended three French cabinet sessions yesterday. Mr. Churchill stated that the blockade of Germany was more effective since Germany had made serious inroads on her resources by her drive into France. Everything pointed to an eventual Allied victory

FRANCE IS SUING FOR PEACE

NO TIME TO TALK

In Danger And All Resources Must Be Put Into Defence, Declares De Valera

DUBLIN, June 17:—President Eamon de Valera again warned the people of Eire yesterday of the danger in which this country is from war. "It is no time to be saying 'when your neighbor's house is on fire and the roof is falling on your roof. It is time for action.'"

All resources of the country must be put at the disposal of the Government at once, said de Valera. He spoke from the recruiting platform as William T. Cosgrave, former Premier, said that all political differences had been sunk in this emergency.

Twenty thousand Irishmen have entered for military service in the last two weeks, the speaker said in the Dail disclosed.

CHILDREN EVACUATE

From London and Southeast England to West Reached Its Peak Yesterday

LONDON, June 17.—The evacuation of school children from London to the southeast of England reached its peak period yesterday when scores of special trains, carrying as many as eight hundred children each, took them to Devon elsewhere in the west. The migration was carried out with the utmost smoothness and order.

BAR GOLD

LONDON, (CP)—The Montreal price of bar gold on the London market was unchanged today at \$4 per fine ounce.

Four Subs Were Sunk

LONDON, June 17.—An Admiralty statement last night disclosed that four enemy submarines had been destroyed in the Mediterranean since Italy entered the war on Monday. Two of these were lost during the attack on H.M.S. Calypso which was sunk.

Meantime, Russia Continues To Strengthen Her Position; Is Taking Control Of Baltic

STOCKHOLM, June 17: (CP)—Tallin, Tartu and other large towns in Esthonia were occupied today by Soviet troops who marched in shortly after the government had accepted Moscow's ultimatum demanding military control on the grounds that terms of a non-aggression pact with Russia had been violated not only by Esthonia but by Latvia and Lithuania.

Latvia, which had shown a disposition to resist a similar ultimatum, was also entered by Soviet soldiers.

President Smetona and his government of Lithuania were announced to have fled to Germany where they were interned, leaving Lithuania in complete subjection to Russia.

Soviet intentions aroused much speculation among observers who argued that the Soviet troop concentrations were considerably larger than were necessary for the domination of small Baltic States where Russia already has bases.

The belief is that Russia is making these moves to protect herself in the light of latest European developments.

In Moscow it was denied that Russia had moved to strengthen non-aggression pacts with Roumania, YugoSlavia and Turkey.

CHURCHILL GRATIFIED

Sen's Message Of Satisfaction To Mackenzie King On Canada's Declaration Against Italy

LONDON, June 17.—Prime Minister Winston Churchill has sent a message to Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King of Canada in reply to Canada's announcement of declaration of war against Italy. "May I, on behalf of my colleagues and myself, express profound satisfaction at this demonstration of Canada's complete solidarity with us in the critical struggle in which we are engaged," said Mr. Churchill.

CHUNGKING IS RAIDED

Government Buildings And Three Hundred Houses Destroyed

CHUNGKING, June 17.—More than 100 Japanese planes dropped some eight hundred bombs on Chungking yesterday, demolishing the government buildings and three hundred houses. Many fires were started but there were comparatively few casualties owing to the previous evacuation.

In Tokyo today a Japanese government spokesman said Japan intended to sustain its attack upon Chungking, the provisional seat of Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek's government, despite protests or representations from any quarter.

Vessel Not Listed Said To Be Sunk

NEW YORK, June 17.—Radio advices late Saturday told of the torpedoing of a steamer named Wellington Star several hundred miles off the coast of Spain. Lloyds Register fails to list any vessel of the name "Wellington Star."

More Britons Called Up To Join Colors

LONDON, June 17.—Three hundred thousand more Britons were called to the colors over the weekend and further volunteers for service in the Royal Air Force were called for.

READING, Pennsylvania, June 17.—Two officers of the German-American Bund were arrested here yesterday. The nature of the charges were not disclosed.

Italian Vessel Victim of French Destroyer Off Canary Islands

LONDON, June 17.—An Italian liner is reported to have been sunk off the Canary Islands by a French destroyer.

Ark Is At Ketchikan

KETCHIKAN, June 17: (CP)—Paul Satko guided his Ark of Juneau safely into Alaskan waters Sunday morning from Dundas Island. The Ark, with Satko, his wife and seven children on board, arrived at Ketchikan at 11:30 a.m.

ARE STILL ADVANCING

German Forces Are Now But Twenty-five Miles From Swiss Frontier In France

FAHY, Switzerland, June 17: (CP)—French refugees crossing the Swiss frontier this morning said that German motorized columns had reached the outskirts of Besancon, about twenty-five miles from Switzerland.

Two hours after Premier Petain of France had broadcast the announcement that he had asked the Germans for peace a fierce battle began on a plain behind Pontarlier where large numbers of German motorized units found their way southward blocked by French infantry.

Pontarlier is about 35 miles southeast of Besancon in rugged Doubs area.

The battle is reported to have started when the Germans tried to enter Pontarlier.

CHECK UPON ALL ALIENS

New Legislation In United States Provides That They Be Registered and Finger-printed

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 17.—The United States Senate Saturday passed legislation requiring the registration and finger printing of all aliens in the United States. In some cases deportation is provided for. The legislation now goes to the House of Representatives.

COLLIDED OVER N.Y.

At Least Twelve United States Fliers Killed In Mid-Air Crash

NEW YORK, June 17: (CP)—At least twelve United States Army fliers were killed and one injured when two bombing planes crashed after colliding and locking wings over the city limits. The planes were up from Mitchell Field. Civilians were also killed in the crash.

GREAT BRITAIN RESOLVED TO FIGHT ON, ACCEPTS SITUATION AS "TRAGIC BUT INEVITABLE"—WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO FRENCH NAVY

With the Spanish ambassador to France mentioned as a possible intermediary, the Republic of France, under its new Premier, Marshal Henri Phillippe Petain, today sought an "honorable peace" with Germany. Great Britain is reported to have already accepted the "tragic yet inevitable" situation, expressing determination to fight on alone although much may depend upon the disposition of the French Navy, air force and colonial possessions. The French Navy is the second strongest in Europe. There is not the slightest attempt in Great Britain to blame France. A peace offensive, possibly through the United States, may be Hitler's next move. The German Foreign Office in Berlin refused to comment on the situation early today.

A voice believed to be that of the 84-year-old Premier Petain was heard on the French radio wave length today, announcing that France must give up the fight. He said he had entered into negotiations with the enemy last night to see whether an agreement could be reached. At the same time the National Broadcasting Co. in New York reported that Marshal Petain, in a brief message, had announced France's capitulation to Germany.

"The battle has had to cease during the night," Petain said. "I have approached the enemy with a view to finding out whether he would be prepared to put an honorable end to hostilities."

Petaim, the 84-year-old "Hero of Verdun" succeeded Paul Reynaud as Premier last night, naming Former Premier Camille Chautemps as vice-Premier and General Maxime Weygand as minister of war.

The report of French capitulation brought London comment that Great Britain would fight on until victory was achieved even though the support of France on land was lost.

Speaking at Lincoln, Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador to Berlin before the war, said he expected Chancellor Adolf Hitler to attempt an invasion of Great Britain this month or in July.

Berlin radio broadcast an "official announcement" that Marshal Petain has proclaimed France's capitulation and said that Chancellor Hitler would meet Mussolini shortly to discuss the situation. Hitler and Mussolini will meet to formulate the attitude of Germany and Italy towards France's request for terms on

Boys' Band Tag Day Is Success

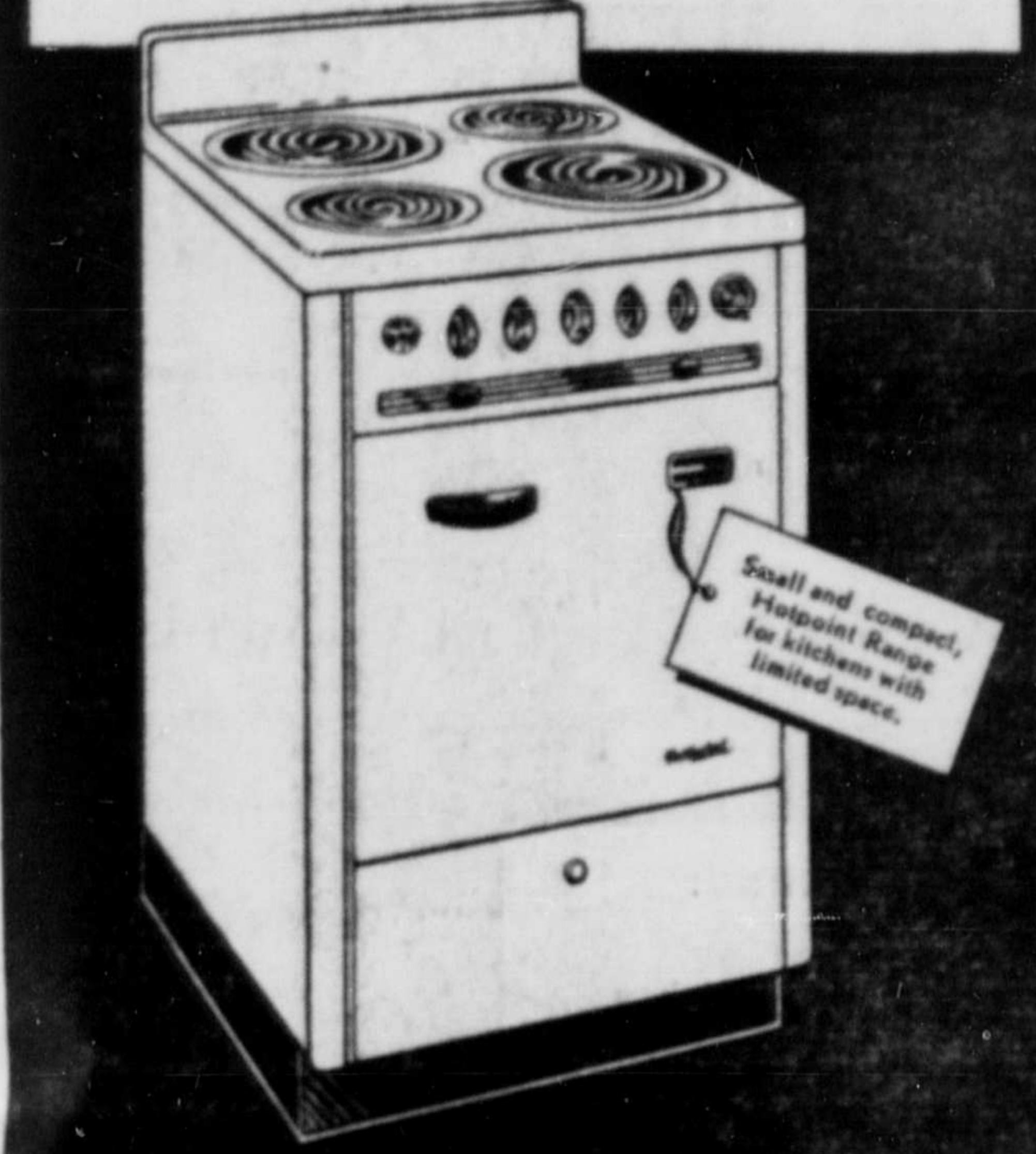
Sum of \$115.85 Realized As Result Of Canvass Held On Saturday

War News

FATE OF FRENCH FLEET

WASHINGTON—Official United States is much concerned as to whether Hitler shall obtain control of the French fleet which, with that of Italy, would make a naval force equal to that of Great Britain and thus bring the Nazi menace closer to the United States. The alternatives for France, other than surrender of the fleet, would be to scuttle it, to keep up the war at sea under direction of Great Britain or turn over the Navy outright to Great Britain. Possibly, an understanding was reached before France sued for peace. The French navy, according to latest lists, has six battleships, ten aircraft carriers, eighteen cruisers, seventy destroyers and 72 submarines, many of very late construction.

ROUMANIAN GOVT QUILTS

BUCHAREST—The Roumanian cabinet of Premier Tatarescu is reported to have resigned.

TURKISH POLICY

ANKORA—Turkey officially announces that its policy, for the time-being at least, will be one of non-belligerency. Russia is reported to have advised Turkey that it wishes it to keep out of the war so peace and status quo may be maintained in the Balkans.

GERMANY BLOCKED

LONDON—No matter if France is compelled to withdraw from the war on land, Great Britain will continue the war to a successful conclusion, the Press Association said in an official statement. British forces are continuing to fight in Normandy. The blockade of Germany would be even more effective now that Italy has entered the war. Germany still must win in a few weeks or months if it is to win at all.

TAKE OVER INDUSTRIES

CANBERRA—The Australian government plans to take control of all the industries of the country and to call up another quarter of a million men for home defence as well as to reinforce forces already sent abroad.

BRITAIN TO TAKE ORDERS

NEW YORK—The British government will take over delivery of more than 3100 war planes contracted for by the French and now in process of fabrication in the United States, it was learned from authoritative sources today.
