WAR MAKES NEW TASKS AT OTTAWA

(CP)—Creation of a dozen new public service bodies to handle war problems and the vastly increased activity of the defence department have filled practically all available office space in Ottawa and a new, temporary office building being rushed to completion will not prove sufficient to meet the demands for quarters.

NAZI PLOT IN BRITAIN

Intention Was To Paralyze Railways And Blow Up Public Works

LONDON, Jan. 17.—A German plot to blow up bridges, railways, and other public works of Great Britain has been nipped in the bud, it was disclosed last night in the Daily Mail and Daily Herald newspapers which said it was the intention to cripple British railway network.

COLUMBUS CREW IS COMING WEST

Men From Scuttled German Ship In Omaha on Way to Pacific Coast

OMAHA, Jan. 17.—Some five hundred members of the crew of the German liner Columbus, which was scuttled and sunk off the Atlantic coast recently to avoid capture by British warships, passed through here yesterday enroute to the Pacific Coast where they will be embarked on Japanese ships for the trans-Pacific voyage enroute home.

PEP TALK IN ITALY

New Secretary Of Fascist Party Warns Country That Nation May Be Forced Into War Any Time

ROME, Jan. 17. (CP)—Ettore Muti, new general secretary of the Fascist Party, warned Italians that they may be compelled at "any moment" to fight a European war.

SHOCK TO GERMANY

Allied Economic War Much More Effective Than in Previous Great Struggle

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The formidable allied economic warfare has placed Germany after four and a half months in about the same economic straits as she was in after two years of the last war.

CO-ORDINATION OF WAR EFFORT

LONDON, Jan. 17. (CP)—A party of French scientists and industrialists has arrived in England for a visit in connection with the co-ordination of the war effort of the two nations.

GUN RANGE 100 MILES

LONDON, Jan. 17. (CP)—The Germans are experimenting with a "Big Bertha" gun, which is expected to have a range of 100 miles.

Six hundred thousand British railway workers are being enrolled as anti-sabotage agents with orders to be on the alert for any suspicious acts against the nation's lines.

COMMUNISTS THROWN OUT

Vote To Expel Them From Public Life In France Almost Unanimous

PARIS, Jan. 17. (CP)—By an overwhelming vote of 521 to two the French Chamber of Deputies voted last night to expel Communist members and civil servants who have refused to repudiate Joseph Stalin and Soviet Russia.

RAID UPON HELIGOLAND

This Is Where British Submarines Were Lost In Daring Exploit

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The British submarines Undine and Starfish, loss of which was admitted by the Admiralty yesterday, were the victims of German defences in the dangerous exploit of a raid on Heligoland Bight naval base, it is now revealed.

RAIDER IS BUSY AGAIN

German Pocket Battleship Menacing Shipping In South Atlantic

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Another German pocket battleship is raiding merchant shipping in the South Atlantic according to reports reaching the Admiralty.

TANK SHIP GOES DOWN

LONDON, Jan. 17.—An unidentified tanker of some 10,000 tonnage was torpedoed and burned after an explosion off the south coast of England yesterday.

LOOK FOR INVASION

Tenseness In Regard To Holland And Belgium Is Renewed—Looks Like Move

PARIS, Jan. 17. (CP)—As reports reached here of the continued massing of German troops and military machinery along the Belgian frontier, France warned Germany that invasion of Belgium or the Netherlands would result in an even more complete blockade which would work disastrously upon Germany.

TURKEY GETS BIG LOAN FROM FRANCE AND GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Great Britain and France have agreed to make a twenty-year loan at interest rates of three and four per cent to Turkey.

FINNISH SPIRIT

The 72-year-old General von Mannerheim said in an interview today that Finland would fight to the "last old man, woman and child" and would destroy every city, town, forest and mine to leave nothing but ruin for the Russians.

HOPE-BELISHA RESIGNATION

The Hope-Belisha retirement discussion seems to have been a tempest in a teapot. Evidently the retiring minister did not agree with other members of the cabinet on some matters of administration of his department.

Hope-Belisha has undoubtedly done a great work in democratizing the army and popularizing the service. He retires with honor.

THE DIES REPORT

According to the report of the Dies Committee the Communist Party is a "border patrol of Russia" for the benefit of Russia. United States workmen, the report says, "have borne the brunt of the Communist efforts" and suffer most from them but have resisted so successfully that only ten or twelve of some 48 C.I.O. unions are "more than tinged" with Communism.

ALL HELPING FINLAND

Nearly every country in the world, except Russia and Germany, is doing something to help little Finland against the terror of being overrun by the Bolshevik hordes under direction of their Oriental leader Stalin.




