> ATHENS, November 22: (CP)—Capture of Koritza, key base in southern Albania from which the Italian columns drove into Greece twentyfive days ago, was announced today by the Greek government. "Our heroic troops, after hard fighting, entered Koritza triumphantly today. The advance of our troops continues everywhere," an official communique read personally by Premier John Metaxas said. The government ordered flags displayed throughout the kingdom as other announcements said the Greeks were also pursuing the Italian army which was retreating south of Koritza.
