# War News

GREEKS STILL SUCCESSFUL

ATHENS- Greek forces are having further successes against the Italians both in repulsing the invaders in the Kalamas River sector and in the assault upon Koritzo, the Italian base in Albania. Surrender of two thousand Italian soldiers together with a commanding general is reported and an entire Italian division of 15,000 men is in danger.

BRITISH BOMB MUNICH

LONDON-The Royal Air Force yesterday raided Munich about the time or shortly after Adolf Hitler adressed a beer hall gathering in observance of the seventeenth anniversary of the beer hall putsch. The beer hall itself was hit. The British raid prevented the broadcasting of Hitler's speech as had been planned. Cther important military objectives in the Reich were struck by the British planes, operations of which extended to Milan and Turin in Italy.

BOMBING LONDON STILL

LONDON-Nazi war planes returned to the bombing of London today after a heavy night of attack as a result of which further scars were left on the capital. London was heavily raided by the Germans early last night, the attack becoming less intense after midnight. Today planes operating singly were bombing London. Liverpool and Birmingham were also attacked. Civilians were killed outright in the streets of London and others were buried in the rubble of falling buildings.

VICHY THREATENS ACTION

VICHY-The Vichy government may resort to military action to recover parts of Africa belonging to France which have declared themselves on the side of General Charles de-Gaulle. This report today followed a conference last night between Premier Petain and Vice-Premier Pierre Laval.

HITLER IS DETERMINED

MUNICH-In his beer hall speech here last night, Chancellor Adolf Hitler declared his confidence in ultimate victory. For nearly two hours he extolled the virtues of the Nazi party. He was determined, he said, to carry the war on to a successful conclusion and would accept no compromise. The Reich was ready to meet any combination of nations, Hitler declared. Production of war materials for the Reich had reached the highest point on record and was the greatest in the world.

CHURCHILL GRATIFIED

LONDON-Speaking today on the result of the United States election, Prime Minister Winston Churchill said that it brought "the utmost encouragement to Great Britain on the long road it must tread before final victory." The British Prime Minister offered his heartfelt congratulations to the United States President. A succession of disasters and heavy perils have been survived, said Mr. Churchill, who said, however, that all this had shown was survival and the inflexible will to win. "Between survival and victory, however," he said, "there is a long road to tread."

### Political Aspect - - -

Under the present system the money voted for the highways is apportioned among the political constituencies according to their needs. If a commission were appointed, it is presumed that this appointment would be set aside and, as the commission would be largely representative of the big centres, the money would be spent to provide fine automobile roads for the benefit of the big centres. Districts like those of northern British Columbia would find themselves neglected.

As a matter of fact, the appointment of a commission presumes the spending of more money on the highways and this would mean higher taxation. Suppose a commission of three men were appointed.
