## BIG DRIVE OF ALLIES IS NOW ON

Counter-Offensive Designed To Liberate Trapped Flanders Force Is Under Way

PARIS, May 29.—Pushing forward in a major drive the great French counter-offensive, designed to reach across the German-held corridor to the English Channel and liberate the trapped Allied army in Flanders, is now on and some decisive results may soon be expected. Half a million of France's finest troops have been hurried into the drive by General Maxime Weygand, the Allied commander-in-chief. A French statement last night was that the battle along the Somme River was "developing favorably for our troops and becoming a major engagement."

With seemingly interminable artillery fire and widespread air fighting, the Germans sent over wave after wave of infantry in counter-attacks on the Somme front today and fierce hand-to-hand fighting ensued with the French inflicting fearful casualties upon the enemy from their automatic arms and taking many prisoners. The Nazis were effectively repulsed and the French gained some new positions. A full German division was thrown into battle in one sector of wooded, hilly region.

Many prisoners being taken by the French are extremely young, of poor physique and only half trained. One group of eleven prisoners was questioned and half of them had been in the army only since January and had had only eight weeks' training.

There is some uncertainty now as to how large a proportion of the Belgian army did lay down arms the order of King Leopold yesterday. It has become evident that certainly all did not and that a large body of Belgians is still fighting on. Berlin admits that the entire Belgian army did not surrender.

Reports from Flanders are to the effect that the British Expeditionary Force there is still intact although it has withdrawn some miles toward the English Channel. They have not lost their cohesion and are being admirably supported by the French.

An extremely violent battle was proceeding on the northern front today and the situation was not clear. However, it was stated that the French were still holding Calais and Dunkerque, although heavily bombed, was in no immediate danger.

Their lines continuous and unbroken, the British and French are holding on with extreme courage in spite of the violence of the Nazi attack.

Although their left wing has been uncovered by the Belgian defection, the British and French forces are still fighting with resolution and, even though they may be withdrawn, they will not be a beaten force, it is declared. Such ports as Dunkerque and Ostend are still available for the withdrawal of the Allied forces if needed.

"The British Expeditionary Force has never been broken or beaten back," a British military spokesman said last night. "They have fought and manoeuvred without wavering and have done everything that has been asked of them. They have been receiving the leadership of which they are worthy."

Despite unfavorable weather, the Royal Air Force continues active. It brought down twenty-two German planes in combat yesterday and carried out widespread raids on communication lines, troop concentrations and other military objectives in northern France, Belgium and deep into Germany. Dusseldorf, Bremen and Dortmund were among points bombed.

## War News

### LEOPOLD IS DETHRONED

PARIS—The Senate and Chamber of Belgium yesterday passed the action of the Belgian cabinet in denouncing and deposing King Leopold following his surrender of the army to the Germans. Leopold is reported to be enroute from his chateau in the Ardennes to confer with Chancellor Adolf Hitler. Premier Pierlot headed a Belgian demonstration yesterday to the monument of King Albert (Leopold's father). There were cries of "Long Live Belgium" and the Belgian national anthem was sung.

### AIR FORCE ACTIVE

LONDON—In spite of unfavorable weather yesterday, the Royal Air Force continued active over German-occupied France and Belgium as well as over Germany proper. Bremen and Hamburg military objectives were heavily bombed yesterday and there was violent shelling of railway stations on the Eastern Rhine. In a single engagement yesterday, eleven British Hurricanes, without loss to themselves, shot down nine German Heinkels and one Messerschmitt.

### RESERVES STATEMENT

LONDON—Prime Minister Winston Churchill expects to make a statement on the war some time next week, including comment on the surrender of King Leopold of Belgium. Meantime he warns the House that it should prepare for "hard and heavy tidings."

### BOOST TANK PRODUCTION

LONDON—Supply Minister Morrison announces he has appointed a board headed by Sir Alexander Roger to increase the production of tanks.

### OSTEND AND LILLE TAKEN

BERLIN—The German high command claims that Ostend and Lille have been captured. To the south the capture of Ypres and Armentieres is also claimed. (These claims are not confirmed either in Paris or London.)

### CURBING ALL ALIENS

LONDON—Activity of all aliens over sixteen years of age regardless of whether they are from "enemy country," is being drastically restricted under a new order effective June 3.

### HOSPITAL SHIPS SUNK

LONDON—Military circles announce that German planes several days ago bombed and sank two hospital ships crossing the English Channel with serious loss of life.

## EVENING UP ON FRANCE

Captured French Airmen to be Treated Harshly—Kinder on British

BERLIN, May 29.—Captured French airmen will be clamped in to chains, it was announced by Vice-Chancellor Herman Goering in reprisal for such treatment accorded German fliers who are captured by the French. English fliers will be exempted because they have consistently treated the Germans courteously and kindly.

## Lands Safely From Europe

United States Liner Washington Docks With Passengers From Europe—Going for More

NEW YORK, May 29.—The United States liner Washington arrived yesterday with 1000 Americans returning home from Europe owing to unsettled international conditions. The vessel is immediately going back for more such passengers. She will head for Bordeaux, French Mediterranean port.

## United States Tax Increases

Drastic Boosts All Around to Finance Defence Program

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Under President Roosevelt's new 5-year tax program intended to finance the national defence program by raising \$700,000,000 on a "pay as you go" basis income and general taxes would be increased 10 percent, the distilled spirits tax would be increased 75c per gallon and the gas tax from one to 1 1/2 percent. Beer and cigarette taxes would also be increased.

## SEND GOLD TO STATES

Both Yugoslavia And Roumania To Ship Their Yellow Reserves Across Atlantic

ATHENS, May 29.—Both Yugoslavia and Roumania have completed arrangements for the shipping of their gold reserves to the United States for safe-keeping, according to information received here.

## EIRE IS BACK OF BRITAIN

Puts Its Forces On War Footing In Order To Help Mother Country In Critical Period

DUBLIN, May 29.—(CP)—Moving swiftly to put its forces on a war footing in the face of the grave situation facing Great Britain, Eire has called up its army reserves. Thousands of volunteers are also rallying. President Eamon de Valera today announced formation of a national defence committee of representatives of government and opposition parties, this following conferences with Cosgrave and Labor parties. "All must work together in the holy cause," said a government spokesman.

## DEFEATISM IS MENACE

More Of Danger Than Nazism Or Fascism, Briton Tells New York Canadian Club

NEW YORK, May 29.—Sir Gerald Campbell, British commissioner to the United States, speaking before the Canadian Club here yesterday, declared that not Nazism or Fascism but Defeatism was the greatest enemy of the Allies. He expressed confidence that the air force would find the German weak spot.

Lord Lothian, British ambassador, admitted that news had been bad but declared that British courage and confidence was undiminished.

## Sir Roger Keyes Not Condemning Leopold As Yet

LONDON, May 29.—Sir Roger Keyes, former Admiral of the Fleet, just returned to England from Belgium where he had been acting as liaison officer between the British and Belgian governments, in a statement last night, urged that judgment be reserved in regard to the action of King Leopold in surrendering to Germany.

Sir Roger, who was with Leopold until a short time before the surrender Monday night, commented that the Belgian King had been a "gallant soldier."

## National Defence Committee Named

Industrialists, Union Executives, Economists and Financiers Called in by President

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 29.—Consisting of six members of the cabinet and seven leading industrial executives, union heads, economists and financiers, President Franklin D. Roosevelt announced his new executive defence committee yesterday. The duty of the committee, whose members will serve without pay, is to speed up the country's national defence program.

## Narvik Is Captured From Germans; Nazi Transports Numbering Seven Are Sunk

LONDON, May 29.—(CP)—A joint Admiralty-War office communique announced today that Narvik, the Norwegian iron ore port for Sweden, for possession of which battle has been waged for weeks, had been captured from the Germans.

"Information has been received this morning that Narvik was captured last night by Allied forces and Fagernes and Forsneset are also in our hands," the communique said.

Other information reaching London said that the Navy had sunk seven small German transports which were attempting to reinforce the Germans.

A Swedish news agency dispatch from Stockholm says that 180 British soldiers who had been cut off several weeks ago by the German advance north from Oslo, had crossed into Sweden after fighting 75 miles to the frontier from Lillehammer.

MOSCOW—The Soviet radio announced tonight that the Soviet government has informed Britain that the sending of Sir Stafford Cripps as a special trade envoy is not acceptable to Russia.

**HUGE WAR BILL**  
OTTAWA—The House of Commons gave third reading to a bill to appropriate \$700,000,000 for war purposes in the ensuing fiscal year, after defeating an opposition amendment without a recorded vote.

**MAKING IT EASIER**  
WASHINGTON—Secretary of State Cordell Hull today ruled that United States citizens may travel in belligerent aircraft of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. The ruling is designed to speed up the delivery of American warplanes to the Allies.

**NEW HIGH EXPLOSIVE**  
WASHINGTON—The Senate naval committee said today that a reputable scientist had reported the discovery of an explosive approximately 100 times more powerful than that which was the most destructive used in the last war.

**WARSHIPS TO LISBON**  
WASHINGTON, D.C.—Three United States warships have been ordered to Lisbon to protect United States interests there.

**LEGION IS BOMBED**  
VERNON—A home made bomb planted in an ash can at the rear of the Canadian Legion Hall shattered several windows in the structure here during a meeting at which local defence unit plans were being discussed. The bomb was believed to be made of stumping powder packed in a kettle.

## FIGHTING TODAY IS CONTINUING

Beleaguered British and French Army Moving Toward Dunkerque

PARIS, May 29.—(CP)—A war ministry spokesman this afternoon said the Allied rearguard was fighting German troops on the streets of Lille while the main northern forces withdrew toward Dunkerque. While occupation of Calais is claimed by the Germans, it is said by the French to be only partly occupied by the invaders.

The main German attack is reported to be directed toward Cassel, northwest of Lille and south of Dunkerque. The main French army is carrying on continuous operations on the great consolidated front along the Somme to the Aisne River, apparently aimed at wiping out the last German pockets as part of the general push forward in an effort to relieve the northern forces.

Most of Amiens is said to be in French hands while a German raid in the Ardennes sector has been thrown back.

LONDON, May 29.—The War Office said that the King had sent a message to the commander-in-chief of the British Expeditionary Force which read as follows: "The heart of everyone at home is with you and your magnificent troops in their hour of peril."

The air ministry announced that a force of R.A.F. fighters engaged a large group of German bombers near Dunkerque and shot down 22 without suffering any losses.

## Stock Market Has Recovery

Tendency to Strengthen up Yesterday After Morning Collapse

NEW YORK, May 29.—Stock, bond, commodity and foreign exchange markets—except Belgian—showed a rally in late trading yesterday following the morning collapse although not sufficient to wipe out the early losses. The day's trading in stocks totalled 1,200,000 shares. The improvement continued this morning with 160,000 shares changing hands in a dull first hour, averages being industrial, 114.66, up .40, and rails, 22.93, up .11.

## Naval Expansion Plans Approved

United States Navy to Have 10,000 More Planes and 15,000 Pilots

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 29.—The lower hour of Congress yesterday approved the naval air force expansion program providing for 10,000 airplanes and 15,000 pilots as well as expenditure of \$144,000,000 for new air bases.

## DRIVE ON TRAITORS

Communists and Nazis Are Barred From Government Jobs in United States

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 29.—In another sudden move against subversive activities in the United States, the Civil Service Commission today issued an order barring, as a matter of policy, all members of Communist or Nazi organizations from government employment. The order is being put into immediate effect.

This is the third move against Communist and Nazi sympathizers which has been taken in recent days. The first removed them from relief rolls and the second transferred authority over immigrants from the interior to the justice department.

Fingerprinting of all aliens is expected to be the next move.

## London Papers Express Views About Leopold

LONDON, May 29.—Some London newspapers are outspoken in regard to the surrender of King Leopold of Belgium to the Germans. Others follow the Prime Minister's example and choose to reserve their opinions until further information of the circumstances is available. One newspaper goes so far as to call the King a traitor. Another dubs him a "fifth columnist."

## General Smuts Is Confident Of Allied Victory

CAPETOWN, South Africa, May 29.—General Jan Smuts expressed confidence in an ultimate allied victory despite recent reverses. "The Germans may have had a victory but they have not won the war," he declared.

## Infantile Paralysis Spreads In Tacoma

Five Cases so Far Reported in Puget Sound City

TACOMA, May 29.—Another case of infantile paralysis was reported in Tacoma yesterday, bringing the total to five.

## HONOR ENEMY DEAD

EDINBURGH, May 29.—(CP)—With full naval honors, 20 German U-boat men were buried at a Scottish cemetery. Their bodies were taken from the water after their submarine was destroyed by the British.

### EDITORIAL

#### ANOTHER TRAITOR

When Belgium was invaded she immediately asked aid from the French and British. There was no delay in answering the appeal. When they got into a tight corner the Belgian king decided to save himself and deserted and, as commander-in-chief, told his men to lay down their arms and cease fighting, leaving the French and British to the mercy of the Germans. The decision was taken in the middle of the night and Leopold retired to a castle in Germany.

From all the reports the Belgians had fought bravely. The British have not been slow in showing appreciation of the part they played hitherto. They would have been heroes had it not been for the man who was leading them and who in a moment of weakness gave way to the blandishments of the enemy. Possibly when the war is over he will be removed from his castle and dealt with as should be the traitor he is.






