The vessel, which had left Rio de Janeiro on February 23 with the evident intention of endeavoring to use Norwegian territorial waters in the attempt to reach Germany, was the third German merchantman to be put out of action by Al'ied patrols this week.

PARIS, Mch. 15 (CP)-The Senate voted unanimously yesterday to go into immediate secret session to hear Premier Edouard Daladier explain conduct of the war to date. There ensued a three-hour session in which former Premier Pierre Laval and four senators fired questions at the administration on war matters The debate continues to-

are on the march from the areas which have been ceded to Rusia, choosing to cut new homes for themselves out of the interior of the country rather than be subject to the tyranny of Stalin and the Soviet. They are struggling through heavy blizzards and freezing temperatures. The Russians staged a "glorious" march of victory into Viipuri today to "liberate" the Finns but they found the city in a shambles with less than one per cent of the population there and those about to leave. The island of Hanko also being evacuated and Russian troops, in accordance with the peace treaty, are withdrawing from the Petsamo area. President Kyosti Kallio today submitted the Russo-Finnish peace treaty to the Finnish Parliament and it was formally ratified.

WAR POTENTIAL DEPLETED

LONDON-It is estimated that Russia, as a result of the Finnish campaign, has exhausted one-third of its war potential for the time being at least. This will affect the aid that Russia may be able to give Germany in the war against France and and Great Britain.

RESTRICT IMPORTS

WASHINGTON-Lord Lothian, British ambassador to the United States, issued a formal statement today from the embassy declaring British restrictions on imports to Great Britain of certain United States products solely as a war measure and "not in any way intended to cause a permanent diversion of trade." Negotiations by the Allies for purchase of additional thousands of United States war planes were suddenly suspended today. The move is believed to be connected with a forthcoming congressional inquiry into sale of airplanes to belligerents. Meantime it is reported that the Allies are negotiating with United States for purchase of \$100,000,000 of powder, shells and high explosives.

EDMONTON, March 15: (CP)-Close contests in the March 21 Alberta general election could delay final results for several days and it might be a week before Albertans know what party will form the new government. Under the single transferable vote method in the 47 single-mem-

Vice-Chancellor Herman Goering called on Germans to give to the state everything they could spare in the way of bronze, copper and lead articles a: a means of offsetting the Allied campaign to starve the Reich metallically.

SUPREME SOVIET COUNCIL

MOSCOW-The Supreme Soviet has been called into session March 29 to approve the Russo-Finnish treaty, to authorize the new republic to include newly won territory.

MORE ACTION DEMANDED

PARIS-The newspaper Le Temps joined yesterday in what seems to be a growing demand for more decisive action against the enemies of the Allies. The newspaper said that the time had come to end the policy of economic siege and to launch a grand offensive against Germany.

DALADIER IS ENDORSED

PARIS-The Daladier war effort was given a 240 to 0 vote of confidence by the Senate today after a two-day secret session.

ATHENIA CASE

NEW YORK-The Donaldson-Atlantic Line, owners of the liner Athenia, sunk off the Irish coast on the first day of the war, supposedly by a German torpedo, are seeking an order out of federal court here exonerating them from responsibility and asking that, if any liability should be attached, it be limited to \$200,000. CANADIAN ARMED FORCES

When the Conservatives were in power, the armed forces of the country were reduced in number and their pay slashed. The air forces were disbanded. When the present administration took over it re-established the air force, increased the regular forces and the militia and restored their pay. More encouragement was given to the . armed forces generally and the defences of the country were strengthened. If there was a lack of uniforms for I some of the new soldiers, it was no fault of the administration. The factories could not produce the goods fast enough. However, those who went overseas were properly uniformed. The government is criticized for little difficulties, due largely to the steady extension of departmental duties and the necessity of adding to the staffs. Today most of the troops are wearing the new uniforms and very soon they will be properly housed. No government could have done much better and conditions might have been a great deal worse.
