# Britain Now In Command Of Air

## Berlin Keeping Silent On War

### For "Certain Reasons" News Will Be Scarce, It Is Said By Germans

#### Moscow Claims Capture of City and That Germans Have Been Driven Back "Significant Distance" From Leningrad.

LONDON, Sept. 30: (CP)—A German military spokesman in Berlin declared today that there would be little news from the eastern front for the next few days because of "certain reasons" which were not disclosed. He added that "certain importance can be attached" to statements in the German press that the campaign on the Russian front might run into the winter months.

A German military spokesman admitted that winter any time now would hold up the Nazi panzer forces although the German army was well equipped to stand the winter in Russia.

In Moscow the Red Army reported today the recapture of a city on the approaches to Leningrad and the taking of many other communities in a concentrated series of counter-attacks. As the recent struggle continued along the front that spans the continent, the Red Star, Soviet Army newspaper, said that the northwestern city of "B" was recaptured after three hours of battle culminating in the bitterest sort of hand-to-hand fighting. The Germans were driven back "a significant distance from Leningrad where they have made no gain in a fortnight," Red Star said.

## Rudolf Hess On Hunger Strike

LONDON, Sept. 30: (CP)—Rudolf Hess, Chancellor Adolf Hitler's former deputy, who made a sensational flight to Scotland last April, was reported tonight to have started hunger strikes twice in his place of detention in anger because he was being treated as a prisoner of war and not as a special envoy.

### BRITAIN IS BOMBED

LONDON—German bombers were over Scotland and the east coast of England last night. The attack was on small scale although several were killed and injured.

## ONLY TWO DEFENDING IN FIELD CAUCASUS

### Straight Fight in Provincial Election Between Premier Pattullo and George Weaver.

LONDON, Sept. 30:—British-Russian consultations in regard to the defence of the Caucasus are under way. General Sir Archibald Wavell is in Teheran in this connection. Plans, it is reported, are being considered to send a British expeditionary force into the Soviet Union by the way of Iran, but this is denied in official military quarters where it is said it would be impracticable.

## JURY HAS CASE NOW

### Perjury Trial Of Francois Lake Man Nears Conclusion

The case of William Frederick Behnke of Francois Lake, charged with perjury, went to the jury at 12:45 noon today at the Supreme Court Assizes before Mr. Justice A. M. Manson. Takings of evidence was concluded yesterday afternoon, the witnesses during the afternoon being Ralph Johnson and Corp. Frederick W. B. Boyd, for the crown, and Behnke himself and Lloyd Roberts for the defence. On resumption of court this morning argument by C. T. MacLean of Smithers, defence counsel, and the summing up by His Lordship were heard. The jury went to lunch after retiring and was due to return to the jury room at 2:15 p.m.

## FAILED TO GET BACK

### Widespread British Raids On Enemy Territory Sunday Night Cost Seven Machines.

LONDON, Sept. 30:—From widespread raids of the Royal Air Force over northern Italy and western Germany Sunday night five British planes are missing and from a coastal command raid on oil depots and refineries along the occupied French coast two bombers failed to return, the Air Ministry announced. Last night Hamburg and Stettin in Germany were bombed.

## FIRST AID ORGANIZED

### Instructor Angus Macdonald To Have Four Classes During This Fall

At least four First Aid classes will be conducted in the city during this fall by Angus Macdonald, busy local instructor. Organization of the classes is now being completed and all have substantial enrolments with more expected. The men's class last night was the latest to organize, it being decided to have the opening class on Thursday night when further enrolments will be received. The classes will meet as follows: Monday—Seal Cove. Wednesday—Women's. Thursday—Men's. Friday—Women's Service Corps.

## EXECUTION OF CZECHS

### Twenty-Four Have Already Paid With Their Lives For Plotting Against Reich.

BERLIN, Sept. 30:—German firing squads have executed twenty-four Czechs accused of plotting to throw off German rule, it was announced today, and the spokesman blamed London and Moscow for rebel preparations which led to swift German counter-measures in the protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia. Three former army leaders were among those executed for trying "peacefully to separate the protectorate of Bohemia-Moravia from the Reich."

## Shipping Losses Have Been Cut Two-Thirds, Churchill Asserts In Optimistic Review Of War

### Judge's Tribute— BRITISH JUSTICE IS FINE

#### One of Greatest Institutions of Commonwealth and Democracy.

A bright spot in a rather drab session of Supreme Court Assizes which is now in progress here was that on Saturday afternoon when Mr. Justice A. M. Manson, in the course of remarks of appreciation to those who were serving as jurors, voiced high tribute of the virtues of the jury system as one of the fine traditions of British justice and a principle of democracy which the Empire was struggling these days to maintain.

## LOSS WAS NOT GREAT

### H.M.S. Nelson Hit by Aerial Torpedo But Not Badly Damaged During Convoy Battle.

LONDON, Sept. 30:—The Admiralty said today that an aerial torpedo hit on the Battleship Nelson, the loss of a fighter plane crew and the sinking of a motor vessel constituted the only cost of moving an important convoy through the central Mediterranean under a week-end running attack by Italian planes, thirteen of which were destroyed. A torpedo launched by one of the Fascist planes Saturday slightly reduced the speed of the Nelson but there were no casualties among the crew.

GREENVILLE, Sept. 30—John McKay, six year old younger son of Fred McKay, well known Greenville bandmaster, passed away in the Port Simpson Hospital on Tuesday of last week after an illness of two weeks.

## FOR KING SALMON

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30:—An 11-mile motor highway has been constructed along the Sacramento River exclusively for specially-constructed tank cars carrying salmon for the spawning beds. Mr. Justice A. M. Manson has accepted an invitation to speak before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at the regular weekly luncheon this Wednesday.

## Although Suffering From Lack of Power Aloft, British Prime Minister Admits, However, That Hitler Is Still Strong.

LONDON, Sept. 30: (CP)—Great Britain has seized the initiative from Germany in the air, has cut shipping losses two-thirds in three months and has several times considered invasion of the German-dominated continent, Prime Minister Winston Churchill told the House of Commons today in a broad war review which was the most optimistic he has yet given. Adolf Hitler is suffering from a very serious shortage in air power, Mr. Churchill said, but "for the rest he still retains the initiative and we have not had the force to take it from him."

The prime minister thus did not rule out the possibility of British invasion of the continent but remarked: "Hitler does not tell us his plans and I do not see why we should tell him ours."

In every respect except in the air, the prime minister said, Germany remains so strong that Britain's own peril of invasion is not past and only enormous conversion of United States factories to produce war material can keep Russia on the firing line indefinitely. To keep Russia in the fight, "sacrifices of most serious and extreme kind will be necessary by the British people."

## Three-Barrelled Drive

Prime Minister Churchill sounded a warning that Hitler might be expected to soon start a three-barrelled drive against Russia, North Africa and England.

The most important need for the moment, Churchill said, was continued and growing British and American aid to Russia.

The Royal Air Force stood ready, if necessary, to bomb Rome and bomb it hard, Mr. Churchill threatened.

Two million British soldiers were ready to hurl any attempted invasion of Britain into the sea.

Great Britain no longer stood alone, but had the support of the United States and Russia.

Although Hitler no longer had the initiative in the air and sea losses had been greatly reduced, Mr. Churchill again warned against over-confidence. Germany had a very serious shortage in the air but still had the initiative in Europe. Hitler had the weapons and supplies and the means of transportation.

Allied sea losses from enemy action in July, August and September were only one-third of April, May and June.

## Shipyard Work . . .

With the commencement of actual construction of houses for the dry dock workers and with the possible extension of shipyard work it is very satisfactory to know that Lloyd's have at this port now a fully qualified and permanent surveyor to check on the work.

It will be part of the duty to the new surveyor to make regular progress reports both to Lloyd's and to the owners of the freighters which, indirectly, means the federal government, which also is indirectly the owner of the shipyard. He also reports on the mine sweepers and on the United States transport Kvichak now being reconditioned at the yard.

A surveyor at this port will be an assurance to all persons concerned that Prince Rupert can do work equal to any in the country. Any criticism made by this paper in connection with the dry dock has never been at the quality of the work done but rather at the economic aspect of the work. All reports indicate that the actual work on the ships has been excellent.

## Important Gathering . . .

The conference taking place today at Moscow promises to be outstanding in that it is one in which the democracies of the world put all their cards on the table and indicate that they trust each other. 
