# Thailand Is To Resist Invasion

## Britain Strong And Ready For Offensive Action In Axis War

Expected to Strike Either in North Africa or Russia—All Preparations Ready in Far East

LONDON, August 7: (CP)—Thailand is expected to resist any Japanese attempt to invade her and British aid—military or material—will be conditioned by United States response to the situation, it was declared today in the authoritative review. The source of the statement pictured Britain as much stronger and ready for offensive action in the Middle East where, it was declared, Britain already has halted the Nazi drive toward Suez. Commentators, speculating on the Middle East situation, suggested that Britain faced two alternatives—another attack on Italian North Africa or a move into the Russian oil field area to aid Russia.

### Mussolini's Son Is Killed

ROME, Aug. 7: (CP)—Bruno Mussolini, second son of Premier Benito Mussolini, was killed today near Pisa when a plane he was testing crashed. He was twenty-two years of age. He had been on active service with a bomber squadron since June 10, 1940, when Italy entered the war and had been in Ethiopia.

### BOMBING ENGLAND

Nazis Come Over and Cause Some Casualties With Slight Damage

LONDON, Aug. 7.—A few points in east and southeast England were struck by Nazi air raiders during the night. There were a few casualties and slight damage was done.

### PASSING OF TOM HANSON

Well Known Figure Along Waterfront and in City Succumbed Suddenly Last Night

Thorvald Salthammer Hansen, a well known figure along the waterfront and in the city, died last night at 8 o'clock in the Prince Rupert General Hospital following a collapse a few hours earlier. He had followed fishing here for years and was better known as Tom Hanson. He was a Norwegian and about fifty years of age. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of B.C. Undertakers.

World Domination The United States government, it was learned today at Washington, believes Japan's pressure bid for control of Thailand is part of a well patterned Axis plan to seize control of the oceans and thereby dominate the world. Latest Japanese moves were described as dovetailing perfectly with German demands on Vichy for military and naval bases in French colonial possessions, particularly at Dakar.

JAPS MOVING IN Thousands of more Japanese troops have been disembarked at Saigon in French Indo-China and are streaming towards the Thailand frontier where there is intense military activity. Japanese women and children are being evacuated from south China in fear of air raids. Thailand admits she has received demands from Japan and is facing a momentous decision and, at the same time, is under heavy pressure from Britain and the United States. She has recognized the Japanese puppet state of Manchukuo, probably in a futile attempt to appease Japan. The Jap paper Hochi says Japan is engaged in a co-operative defence of Asia against the white races.

Visit Of United States Warships Coincidence of Arrival at Brisbane Together With Movement of British Convoy Remarkable Upon LONDON, Aug. 7.—Surprise is still expressed over the arrival this week of the United States cruisers Northampton and Salt Lake City at Brisbane, Australia, on what is officially termed a training cruise. The coincidence of the arrival of the United States warships in Australia with the landing of a convoy of large numbers of British army and air force men and supplies is remarked upon.

Residents around the area concerned having complained of inconvenience they have been caused, arrangements have been made, it was stated at the City Hall this morning, between the Second Battalion, Canadian Scottish, and the city whereby the westerly barricade on Sixth Avenue at Thompson Street will be removed, permitting pedestrian traffic along the block to Dunsmuir Street whence it will be diverted to Fifth Avenue. The regiment and the city will co-operate in grading Dunsmuir Street between Sixth and Fifth Avenues after which vehicular traffic will be able to use that route. The work will be pushed through as soon as possible. Sixth Avenue between Dunsmuir and McBride streets will remain closed to the public.

### ALL SHIPS HAVE LEFT

No Further Japanese Vessels Are Now Left on Pacific Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—All Japanese ships have now left the Pacific Coast and no more are coming for the time being at least in view of the crisis in the Far East. The Kozui Maru has left Vancouver light, leaving a cargo of wheat on the dock because the money with which it was to have paid for it is frozen in the United States.

### POUNDING AT ENEMY

Royal Air Force Assault on German and Nazi-Controlled Territory is Kept Up

LONDON, Aug. 7: (CP)—The Royal Air Force today reported successful raids on industrial centres of western Germany and shipping off the Netherlands coast and indicated the assault had been renewed today on northern France. Ten planes were lost in wide-ranging operations yesterday and last night.

The latter attacks were centred on Frankfurt, Mannheim and Karlsruhe in continuation of methodical pounding of German targets and a communique reported "huge fires were started and considerable weight of bombs dropped on each city." Channel ports were also hit.

### HONORS BY GYRO CLUB

Farewell Dinner Dance Last Night For Mr. and Mrs. William Cruickshank Who Are Leaving City

Holding a delightful dinner dance in their honor, the Prince Rupert Gyro Club said its formal farewell last night to William Cruickshank, one of its most prominent and esteemed officers and members, and Mrs. Cruickshank who are about to leave for Regina to take up future residence. Upwards of fifty Gyros, Gyrettes and friends were present. While the affair was one of much pleasure to all, it was also tinged with general feelings of regret in view of the occasion of leave taking. President W. F. Stone was in the chair and the feature of the evening's proceedings was the presentation to Mr. and Mrs. Cruickshank of a beautiful silver cocktail tray, suitably engraved, as a token of esteem and appreciation from the club of which Mr. Cruickshank is a charter member and has held every executive office, being at present its treasurer.

The presentation was made on behalf of the club by G. A. Hunter who paid tribute to Mr. and Mrs. Cruickshank, voiced appreciation for their long association and great work for Gyro, regret at their departure and best wishes for future happiness and prosperity in their new home. Mr. Cruickshank made an appropriate reply. He confessed that it was with regret and only after much consideration that he was leaving Prince Rupert, the actuating factor being that he must accept promotion even if it did mean the severing of many personal ties, not the least important of which was the Gyro connection. ## Heavy Fighting Going On In Some Sections Of Nazi-Soviet Front

Moscow Fails to Admit Any Change in General Situation—Berlin Still Claims Russian Losses Enormous

MOSCOW, August 7: (CP)—Russian sources indicated today that the new German-Finnish push toward Leningrad from the north had fizzled out but reported heavy fighting south of that city, in the Smolensk sector west of Moscow and on the Ukraine front. The communique declared that the Red Army was engaged in fierce combat all last night on the Estonian front where the Germans have been trying to push northward toward Leningrad. In reference to continued fighting near Smolensk and Belyokov they gave no hint of a change in the situation. Another air attack on Moscow last night failed to hit military objectives.

### Noted Indian Dies

CALCUTTA, Aug. 7: (CP)—Sir Rabindranath Tagore, aged 80, famed as India's greatest modern poet and winner of the Nobel Literature Prize in 1913, died today.

### EDUCATION GOING ON

Evacuated to Country, 250,000 Children Continue Studies

LONDON, Aug. 7: (CP)—Education of London children is continuing despite the problems of evacuation and bombing.

London County Council, responsible for the health and education of most of London's youngsters, has followed its charges to the country where more than 250,000 boys and girls are beginning their second summer. L.C.C. school inspectors, teachers and nurses are in the reception areas. Their reports reveal that country conditions have not only improved the children's health, but have extended their knowledge of British geography, nature study and agriculture. "The children help farmers during out-of-school hours and run pig and poultry farms," a council official said. There still are 100,000 school-age children in London, 90,000 of whom are attending classes. The 10,000 absentees are, in many cases, children who had to leave their former homes or schools because of bombing. "Fifty thousand children have disappeared," the official said. "We have no record of their whereabouts, but they probably are in reception areas other than those which came into our evacuation scheme."

### CHURCHILL IS COMING?

Interesting Rumors in Regard to Movements of Statesmen

LONDON, Aug. 7.—There is much speculation over the possible connection between some announcements from London and Washington. Harry Hopkins returned to London two days ago from Moscow and neither he nor Premier Churchill have been seen since. It was announced that a high British authority would fly to the United States to confer with Mr. Roosevelt soon. This was thought to refer to either Mr. Churchill or Lord Beaverbrook. Mr. Roosevelt is cruising in the Atlantic on his yacht but much mystery surrounds his movements. The announcement about a Britisher flying to the United States was in a Washington dispatch to the London Daily Mail. However, both Premier King and Malcolm McDonald, in Ottawa, denied any knowledge of such a move and said it is very unlikely Mr. Churchill would leave the British Isles at the present time.

### BOMB SUEZ ONCE MORE

Thirty Persons Killed and Thirty-Five Wounded Last Night

CAIRO, Aug. 7: (CP)—Axis bombers raided the Suez Canal zone early today, killing thirty persons, wounding thirty-five and damaging property, an Egyptian communique said. There were a series of night raids.

Mobilization Of Democracy - - -

Many Canadians have not yet learned what democracy means. In other words they do not realize what it is we are fighting for. Here is the opinion of the Vancouver morning paper in regard to it.

Speaking at a meeting which demanded conscription of manpower and resources for war Brigadier General J. A. Clark made this statement:

"No election or plebiscite is necessary on this question. It would be unthinkable that the decision as to how our resources can best be mobilized should be left to the ignorant, the uninformed, the slothful, the slacker, and indeed some who may well be enemies but who still enjoy the franchise."

We are not concerned here with the merits or demerits of conscription or, again, with whether the government should hold an election or take a plebiscite upon its enforcement.

We are concerned with Brigadier General Clark's contention—that it would be "unthinkable" to allow a democratic expression of Canadian public opinion upon this issue. For, stripped of all good intentions, that is exactly what Brigadier General Clark has said.

It is worth while considering this statement for it has to do with the very principle which motivates us in our struggle to determine for ourselves our own course of action. That is called democracy.

Is it "unthinkable" that the men and women of Canada, whether they be university professors or elevator operators, brigadier generals or service station employees, should have the right to say what they are going to do with their lives and their property? On the contrary, we believe that any move to take this right away from them is "unthinkable." Indeed, we believe it to be so unthinkable that we are presently engaged in a war with Hitler, who holds the 17th century theory that "the people are unfit to govern" and would enforce this theory upon the world.

If Brigadier General Clark is right what are we fighting for?

You see this statement, made by a brave soldier, comes down to a question of that. It searches and challenges our way of life and our ability to organize ourselves as free men and women to defeat the dragooned might of totalitarianism.

There were some worthwhile things said at the meeting which Brigadier General Clark addressed. But the ordinary Canadian citizen, while he may not be much concerned over the finer points of politics, is yet very much concerned with the practical expression of democracy as it affects his life and his home. And he is apt to take the statement by Brigadier General Clark as an unjustified slur upon his sincerity. Brigadier General Clark would not permit the "uninformed" to have a voice in deciding this issue. But who is to be the judge of ignorance and intelligence. Are those who agree with Brigadier General Clark "intelligent" and those who agree with Mr. King "ignorant?"

The task that faces Canada is the mobilization of democracy into a fighting force that will march forward to victory over dictatorship. To win for freedom we must be free ourselves. That is the only way we can do it. If we adopt anti-democratic methods we shall have lost the great thing for which we fight.

This is not just a war about territory or about national interest. It is something above that. It is a struggle to determine the future of mankind.

And we are not going to mobilize democracy for victory by suggesting that the people are unfit to have a voice in the shaping of their own affairs.







**ENGLISH FASHIONS**

Regimental Crests Play Part and Tight Bolero is Embroidered With Names of Ships

LONDON, Aug. 7: Now that warm weather has finally arrived, milady is sporting summer clothing in what may be her last fling before clothes rationing taxes her wardrobe and obliges her to turn to simpler, more serviceable dress-wear.

On the streets much navy blue is to be seen, often with tiesilk in the red-and-blue stripes of the Guards regimental colors to tie the jacket, or making a belt to the dress or, instead, running down the brief sleeves.

That tiny check which is called "sponge-back check" is a summer-time favorite in a year that has had grey skies and cold winds until late. The heroine of Noel Coward's new play has chosen it in grey, white and lemon tiny checking. It makes a pleasant town-and-country outfit to wear away for week-ends. Stripes are worn broad, not narrow, at the moment.

A smart favorite is a suit of broad grey and maize-yellow stripes, with blown-out pockets and the forward thrust hipline which women are liking and which accentuates their small waists.

Crests and monograms are being embroidered high on the shoulders of blouses and dresses and regimental crests are particularly popular. One of the most charming boleros of the summer, very tight and brief, is worked all over with names of the ships of the Navy. Another is worked in gold and silver thread on blue with Prime Minister Churchill's memorable words.

Fringe Replaces Fur  
Fringe is used for the between-season suits to replace fur. Fringe decorates collars and tiny capes to jackets, over the rounded (but not

sloped) shoulders which most Englishwomen prefer. You get the fringe, in shorter form, repeated on the pockets of either the jacket or the dress. And longer silk fringe decorates some of the closely draped black dinner dresses.

As in suits, so in dinner dresses, there is nothing between the wide, wide skirt and the clinging line, often accentuated by an inset of color down the side—as in the army officer's dress trousers—and wide velvet skirts worn with tight hips, close and tiny bodices too, built to show the bustline.

Between these two comes, however, the ever useful shirt-waist dress. It does not make new fashion lines as do the others but it is infinitely comfortable with its wide bishop or brief puff sleeves, its blouse top bagged in, and its gentle skirtline to the ground.

It has new touches this year of silver and gold thread embroidery of tiny leaves or flowers around the buttonholes, by similar embroidery on collars and revers, and also by wide dolman armholes, sleeve contrasting to bodice in color but the two joined by more of this fine metal thread work in the shape of leaves or garlands. With this a little fringed "handkerchief" is worn gypsy fashion on the back of the head.

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
