War News

Mightiest Battle Is Raging

JAPS URGE ASSAULT ON BRITAIN

TOKYO—Domei News Agency, in a special article today, urged the Axis powers to terminate the war with Russia so as to conserve German resources in manpower and equipment for an all-out assault upon Britain. Domei warned that the war with Russia, if extended, might leave the Axis powers faced with a dearth of materials. Tokyo newspapers today blamed Washington for what they called strengthening and spread of encirclement of Japan and said the Pacific situation was deteriorating.

CANADIAN NEWSMEN BLITZED

LONDON—Visiting Canadian newspaper representatives who had not heard an air raid siren once during their fortnight's tour of Britain were given a taste of Nazi air war on the eve of departure. A southwest coast town, where the party spent the night, was raided by German aircraft which struck the editors' hotel, none, however, being injured.

BIG DRIVE NEXT WEEK

Organization Of Campaign To Raise Funds For Civic Centre

ANKARA, October 8.—Germany and Turkey have struck a snag in their trade negotiations over the matter of the metal of chrome. Great Britain has the Turkish production of chrome tied up and Turkey is not anxious to offend Britain by breaking the contract.

Fisher on appeal hearings in County Court yesterday. At the original hearings before Stipendiary Magistrate C. D. Fogson at Port Essington no defense evidence was tendered. This, however, was presented on the appeal hearing. Only one of the cases was heard after which the appeal in the other case was allowed by consent.

Air Raid Sirens Are Authorized

TEMPERING OF JUSTICE HIS MOTTO

"Bill Of Rights" Was Inspiration Of Louis Brandeis—First Jew On Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 8: (AP)—The "bill of rights" embraced in the first ten amendments to the constitution, bulked large in the reasoning of Louis Dembitz Brandeis, now dead, throughout the 24 years in which he served as an associate justice of the supreme court in the United States. Designed by their framers to make clear the extent to which individuals should be safeguarded under the constitution, the ten articles found a consistent defender in the liberal-minded justice and he frequently turned to them for interpretations on the constitutionality of laws wherein the rights of property seemed to clash with human rights.

From the start of his supreme court service in 1916 he found a sympathetic soul in his old friend Oliver Wendell Holmes and he frequently joined with "the great dissenter" in minority opinions.

The retirement of Holmes left Brandeis as the oldest member of the court.

The appointment of Benjamin N. Cardozo brought into being another "liberal wing" of Brandeis, Cardozo and Harlan F. Stone and they formed a consistent "block" in upholding most of the New Deal acts which came before the court from 1933 onward.

They joined unanimous decisions against the NRA (national industrial recovery act), the Frazier-Lemke farm mortgage moratorium, the building and loan conversion act, the processing tax refund and the power of the President to remove a federal trade commissioner. They joined the majority in upholding the right of the federal government to sell power through the Tennessee Valley Authority, and in the "gold clause" ruling, both New Deal victories.

Senator Barkley of Kentucky said he could not say what the message would contain but added that arming of merchant vessels now prohibited would be the last drastic change that might be made.

WASHINGTON, D.C., October 8:—Congressional leaders announced today after a conference at the White House with President Franklin D. Roosevelt that Mr. Roosevelt would send a message to Congress tomorrow recommending changes in the neutrality act.

Government Spokesman Admits Economic Position Is Getting Worse

TOKYO, October 8:—A Japanese cabinet spokesman admitted yesterday that the economic situation in the country was getting worse and that the people must prepare for an even lower standard of living due to the cutting off of supply of raw materials.

The Japanese press has started blasting again at the United States and Great Britain for their unfriendly attitude towards Japan.

BOMBING ON AGAIN

Welsh Town And Some Points On English Coast Visited By Nazi Raiders

LONDON, October 8:—Anti-aircraft fire broke out of a Welsh town last night as German bombers came over and dropped missiles which caused some damage and casualties. Hit and run raiders also visited some English coast towns.

SHIP STRIKE-TIED SEATTLE—For the second time within three weeks an Alaska-bound liner is held from sailing on account of strike trouble. The Alaska Steamship Co.'s steamer Aleutian was unable to sail with 287 passengers and a large cargo of defence supplies when waiters and pantrymen refused to work after a colored pantryman had been engaged. Three weeks ago the liner Baranof had a similar strike and was held up. The union refuses to accept responsibility for the action of the men in striking.

Nazi Offensive . . .

Germany has tried a number of all-out offensives against Russia. Those who listen to the radio will remember hearing that Odessa had been taken, that the Germans had entered Leningrad, that Murmansk had been captured by the invaders. Also at Smolensk the Russians were badly defeated, according to Berlin. In fact a couple of weeks ago the Russians were so badly beaten on all fronts that they could not recover. On each of these fronts the attacks failed to achieve their objectives.

Now the Germans are starting a new offensive. Also the Russian defenders have been strengthened and while we know little about the real condition at each point, there is little to indicate that the present offensive will be any more successful than were the others.

Labor in Australia . . .

Labor has captured the reins of power in Australia, but there probably will not be very much change in the policy of the country. The Laborites are pledged to an all-out support of the war and it is impossible to make any considerable policy changes while giving full support to the war. This will not be Australia's first experience with a Labor government.





Having been delayed by fog on the voyage up the coast, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, did not arrive in port until 1:15 this afternoon from Vancouver. Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 10 o'clock tonight for Ketchikan whence she will return here tomorrow night southbound.

Aboard the steamer Princess Louise, which was in port yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver, were 178 passengers of whom twenty-seven disembarked here. Seven took passage from Prince Rupert for Vancouver.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, returned to port at 9 o'clock last night from Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 9:30 p.m. in continuation of her voyage to Vancouver and waypoints.

Bella Bella and Smith's Inlet areas will be closed to net salmon fishing this week-end, it is announced today at offices of the Department of Fisheries. This will mark the closure of all areas on the mainland part of the Prince Rupert district, leaving the north end of the Queen Charlotte Islands the only area in the whole district remaining open. The sum of chums is rapidly falling off and a number of seiners at the north end of the island abandoned fishing at the end of last week. Inverness, Prince Rupert and Nama cannery on the mainland and Pacifi and Lagoon Bay on the Queen Charlotte Islands are still in operation but the most if not all of these will be closing this week-end as far as salmon canning is concerned, it is expected. Prince Rupert has been running along lately on fish from Alaska.

More Passengers, Mail And Express Carried In August Than In July, It Is Announced

WINNIPEG, October 8.—August figures released by O. T. Larson, vice-president, Trans-Canada Air Lines, continue to show air line traffic at high levels. There were 9284 passengers carried, 84 more than July. Air mail totalled 129,427 pounds, 184 pounds more than July. Air express was 21,869 pounds compared with 20,397 in July.


