Being the Diary of the Last 15 Days in the Life of a Royal Air Force Ace

FIRST DAY

LONDON, January 31: (CP)—First day (September 2, 1940)—First day at our new station. Leapt from our virgin couches at 0650. This shook me a bit. Was still slightly dopy when at 15,000 feet we sighted a large lump of blitz. Solid block of 20 Dornier 215's with a large fighter escort. Attacked enmasse, then dived away as fighters came down. Joined Butch again after a frantic tail-watching break-away, and started after the bombers again.

COMMENTS ON HITLER

"Just Another Pep Talk" — "Travesty of Facts and Tissue of Falsehoods."

LONDON, January 31—"Just another pep talk" is the way British papers described Chancellor Adolf Hitler's speech yesterday. "A travesty of facts and a tissue of falsehoods," said one newspaper, pointing to misrepresentation of facts both past and present.

The British answer to Chancellor Adolf Hitler's speech of Thursday is that free peoples will fight to the end until Germany is forced to throw out the Nazi control. This was conveyed in a British Broadcasting Corporation statement today. The American press attaches little importance to the latest Hitler speech.

ARE STILL RESISTING

Iron Guards Continue Fight Against Antonescu—Congestion of Prisoners

BUDAPEST, Jan. 31—Isolated bands of Iron Guards are still resisting the Nazi regime in Rumania. Three thousand rebels against the government of Premier Ion Antonescu have been arrested in Bucharest alone.

Jails are congested and even the schools are now being used to house prisoners.

Many mayors of Rumanian cities and towns who were dismissed in the purge have been reinstated.

FAR EAST WAR OVER

Nevertheless Some Fighting Continues as Thai and Indo-China Talk

SAIGON, Jan. 31—Except for a few minor clashes participants in which are believed not to know that an Armistice has been called, the border war between Thailand and French Indo-China was over while negotiations for peace proceeded. The peace conference was being conducted on a Japanese warship and other Japanese warships were standing nearby.

AMERICANS IN SERVICE

United States Fliers Are Now On Guard for Great Britain

LONDON, January 31—The squadron of American volunteer fliers in England has completed its training and is now on active service engaged in guarding of Britain.

SHELTER DEATH

SHEFFIELD, England, January 31 (CP)—Two women who took a bucket brazier into an unventilated Anderson shelter in Sheffield died of the fumes.

MENACE IS REAL, SAYS COL. KNOX

United States Secretary of Navy Makes Strong Plea for Support of "Lend-Lease" Bill

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31: (CP)—Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox testified today before the Senate foreign relations committee in the hearing on the "Lend-Lease" aid to Britain bill that the United States government had information that Germany was watching long range weather forecasts for a period of expected good weather in which to launch an invasion of Great Britain. Knox renewed his forecast of a very grave crisis within sixty or ninety days in the course of his testimony which included statement that it was "wild fancy" to talk as Col. Charles A. Lindbergh had done of a negotiated peace in Europe. Lindbergh, Knox asserted, was not competent to speak on the subject of military strategy. He said that Germany and Great Britain alike were seeking desperately for a plane that would be master of the skies.

Col Knox, in urging full and immediate support to Great Britain, said that United States needed time to prepare to meet a strong aggressive Germany if it was to prevent the war from being "transferred to America." If Great Britain were defeated, he declared, Germany would most certainly endeavour to take over bases on this side and move its forces across the Atlantic as soon as she gained sufficient strength. Negotiated peace could only result in stalemate. As long as the Nazi system continued, United States would have to have a tremendous army and navy to ensure her continued existence.

While Col. Knox was giving his testimony before the Senate foreign relations committee, the bill was sent at the other end of the Capitol to the House of Representatives floor for a momentous debate starting Monday. After a brief hearing, the House rules committee gave the bill legislative right-of-way under procedure calling for three days of general debate and permitting unlimited offering of amendments.

U.S.-JAPAN WILL FIGHT

Sir Victor Sassoon Believes Germany Will Push Nippon Into War

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—Arriving here yesterday from Hong Kong, Sir Victor Sassoon predicted that United States and Japan would be at war within a year. Germany would push Japan into war with the United States, Sir Victor said, in the effort to divert American support from England so that Germany would have better chances in an invasion of Britain.

Racket In Insurance

EDMONTON, Jan. 31: (CP)—Edmonton police announced today that theft and false pretences charges have been laid against sixteen Edmonton insurance adjusters and garages. The crown alleges that padding of insurance bills was carried out by some of the defendants while others stole various automobile accessories by listing them on insurance bills.

Air Raid Horn Heard in Montreal



Montreal citizens were warned last week-end that the time has come for them "to prepare an air raid shelter" in every home. Assistant Director Charles Barnes of the Montreal Police Department and organizer of the "C.P.C." Civilian Protection Committee and William Fair on a roof of a building test a diaphone horn, twenty-five of which spaced a mile and three-quarters apart on roofs that have been selected, would adequately cover the metropolis. These horns can be heard over an area of four square miles, but to overcome normal sounds within offices, stores, factories, homes and public conveyances, etc., sites half that distance apart have been chosen as a result of many tests. These horns being operated by compressed air, a reserve supply is available to offset danger of power failure.

OONA RIVER MAN DIES

Victim of pneumonia which developed from a severe cold, Dalmar Anderson, 68-year-old fisherman, died at Oona River, Porcher Island, at 2 o'clock Thursday morning and his body was brought in last night by Harold Jensen. Mr. Anderson was a native of Sweden but had been in Canada for many years, having been for a considerable time a resident of Oona River. As far as can be learned, there are no relatives in this country.

RIBBENTROP IS WORRIED

Would Like to See Petain and Laval Get Together More Quickly

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—A spokesman for Joachim von Ribbentrop said today that the German foreign minister was "astonished and concerned" over the failure of Premier Marshal Henri Philippe Petain and Pierre Laval to get together more quickly in France.

Berlin appears to agree with a campaign which has been launched by the Paris press attacking the Vichy government for failure to cooperate with Germany.

Signs are not lacking of a collapse altogether in the co-operation of France and Germany.

Jack Nichol Is Dead In South

Only Son of Former Newspaper Owner and Lieutenant Governor

VICTORIA, January 31.—John More Nichol, only son of the late W. C. Nichol, one time owner of the Vancouver Province, and Lieutenant-governor, died here yesterday at the age of 43 after a lengthy illness.

Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, arrived in the city from Smithers on last night's train and will sail on the Venture tonight for Vancouver, calling at Bella Bella, Namu and other coastal points on the way south. On his return north, he expects to be accompanied by Mrs. Hanson who has been spending some time in Vancouver.

CASUALTIES VERY HEAVY

More Than Seven Thousand Italians Killed or Wounded by Greeks During Last Few Days

ATHENS, Jan. 31.—More than seven thousand Italian soldiers have been killed or wounded during the last few days in the course of the failure of the Fascist counter-offensive against the Greeks in the war in Albania.

Greek forces, pushing north of Klisura, are reported to have found heaps of Italian dead and many wounded in abandoned Fascist positions. A Greek spokesman said that four Italian counter-attacks had been repulsed in two days. Later reports from the Albanian front said that the charges were so disastrous that Italian commanders had to call off the offensive action to reorganize their forces.

The Italians are reported to be withdrawing from Tepelini, one of the important points on the way to Valona. This withdrawal of Italian troops from the key point in the Greek drive in Valona was reported by military circles at Belgrade but there was no immediate confirmation.

FISHING IS IMPROVING

Industry is Getting Out of Red, Declares Hon. J. E. Michaud

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—The Canadian fishing industry is getting out of the registry, Hon. J.E. Michaud, minister of fisheries, says. Things are getting better for the men in the industry which provides a living for half a million people.

NO BREAK IN ITALY

Ridiculous to Suggest That His Ally is Cracking Up, Declared Chancellor Hitler

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—Chancellor Adolf Hitler, in his speech yesterday, ridiculed reports that Italy was cracking up. All hopes of revolt in Italy were futile. Germany and Italy would march ahead side by side.

HEAVY RAIDS RESUMED

LONDON—Nazi bombers, coming up the Thames estuary in large formations and then breaking up into various sections, today staged the most intensive and widespread series of daylight air raids London and other parts of England have experienced in months. There were far flung "lone wolf" raids. Several persons were killed and a number of buildings demolished. Many incendiaries were dropped but these were quickly doused. Three persons are known to have been killed and at least four injured today in an afternoon raid on London which followed two earlier bombless alarms. There were no alerts overnight.

JAPAN VS. CHINA

SHANGHAI—Violent fighting is reported to have broken out again between Japanese invaders and Chinese defenders in the southern part of Honan Province.

ITALIANS QUIT TEPELINI

ATHENS—Tepelini, important town on the way to Valona, has been abandoned by the Italians to the Greeks in the war in Albania. The Italians are now falling back on Valona. The Greeks brought down four Italian planes in air fighting over the battle front in Albania yesterday. The Italian attempted to use tanks in the Albanian fighting but they bogged down. The Fascists have lost heavily again in prisoners and equipment.

EIGHT MILLION BRITONS

LONDON—Great Britain, it is estimated, may have eight million men under arms by September. The Italians attempted to use tanks.

DRIVING ON ALL FRONTS

CAIRO—British forces continue their drive across northern Libya towards Bengasi following the capture of Derna. Somewhere between Derna and Bengasi the Italians are expected to make a stand. A number of Italian counter-attacks in Eritrea have been repulsed by the British, the Fascists suffering heavy casualties. In Ethiopia, the British are approaching the important town of Moyale. In Italian Somaliland the British campaign continues satisfactorily.

ARMISTICE SIGNED

SAIGON—An armistice was signed today in the war between Thailand and French Indo-China. Terms negotiated by Japan, were not immediately disclosed. The armistice ends months of intermittent border fighting. Japanese military mediators were looking on during the signing by the representatives of Thailand and French Indo-China and a Japanese naval force was standing by.

Enemy Sub Off Coast Of Canada

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The possibility of an enemy submarine operating off the east coast of Canada is seen. A suspicious undersea craft is reported to have been sighted far from St. John's, Newfoundland, in the vicinity of the Grand Banks.

King Receives Harry Hopkins

President Roosevelt's Personal Envoy Lunches with His Majesty

LONDON, Jan. 31.—King George gave an audience yesterday to Harry Hopkins, personal envoy to President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Hopkins had luncheon with His Majesty and the Queen.

GERMAN IS SHOT DOWN

At Least One Nazi Raider Destroyed By British Yesterday, It Is Known

LONDON, Jan. 31.—One German air raider is known to have been shot down during the course of daylight raids by the Nazis yesterday. The raids on England yesterday were the heaviest in several weeks but they were of scattered nature with only a few machines participating. Balloons in barrage at Dover were singled out for attack and a number were dropped. There was no air raiding activity in any part of England last night.

TELLS OF DUNKERQUE

Noted Correspondence Says Hitler Lost His Chance to Get to England

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Robert G. Nixon, noted war correspondent, at a dinner in his honor last night, said that, if the British army had not succeeded in the evacuation of Dunkerque, which he covered, there might have been no England today. Hitler could have been in London in ten days after the collapse of France, declared Nixon. "Now, however," Nixon said "I don't believe she could get there in ten years." "Their morale is high," said Nixon of the British people. "As usual, they do every job they undertake in a thorough manner."

FORD IS ADAMANT

Automobile Magnate Would Give His Plants to Government Rather Than Bow to C.I.O.

DETROIT, Jan. 31.—Henry Ford, automobile manufacturing magnate, yesterday authorized the statement that, rather than agree to the Congress on Industrial Organization demand for a closed shop, he would turn his plants over to the federal government for a rental of \$1 per year so that they might be used for national defence purposes.

**Six Against . . .**

Rev. S. McM. Kerr of Vancouver points out that there were six provinces opposed to the Sirois Commission report and not three as generally stated. He claimed it was a scheme of the financiers and its purpose was to make the people dig deeper into their pockets for taxes. He blamed Prime Minister King for bringing up a contentious matter at a time when every effort should be devoted to winning the war.

**Position Of France . . .**

The position of France is causing Germany considerable worry. Marshal Petain, who is dictator of the country, continues to hold out against German demands. The Germans would like to enforce the demands by occupying the country only in that case there would probably be a flight of French warships from Toulon and General Weygand with his army of over a million men in Africa would definitely align himself with the British. This makes it desirable that any negotiations with the Vichy government be carried out in a peaceable manner if possible.

**Fall Of Derna . . .**

The taking of Derna by the British, while not an outstanding event, is another step toward the eventual freeing of all Africa from Italian domination. Eighteen years ago Mussolini became dictator of Italy and one of the features of his appeal to the Italian people was the building up of an Italian colonial empire in Africa including the driving of the British from that country and securing control of the Suez Canal. Ethiopia was taken and so was Albania and the feats of arms were so magnified as to appear very important. The Italian navy and merchant marine were built up and the air force strengthened. So puffed up with success was the dictator that he had visions of domination including Greece and, possibly, Turkey. A move was made against Greece but it was stopped at the outset and the Italians were driven out of a large part of Albania. Then the British began to move and only one more stronghold remains in Libya to be captured for the British to hold all of that province and the country to the south. Ethiopia and Somaliland are likely to be given up soon. Tripoli will then be the only remaining Italian province in Africa.

Mussolini now sees his life work crumbling. His hold on Italy is weakening and no one can tell what will be the outcome once the power of the Fascist regime is broken. The people of Italy have been told only part of the story of defeat and even today they seem to believe that the Italian navy is supreme in the Mediterranean. Gradually the truth of the situation is seeping through and only this week a big Fascist demonstration was called in order to prevent the people from starting a movement for a change.

**Canada's Output . . .**

Those who sometimes feel doubtful about the extent and value of the contributions of Canada to the war effort may be cheered by a few lines from "Overseas," published in London, England. It says: "The speed and scope of the war effort in the Dominion of Canada is being increased beyond anything imagined possible in the earlier days of the war and, with the tremendous and accelerating output in the United States, the other Dominions, and the amazing improvement in production in the United Kingdom, promises soon to relieve any possible anxiety about arms of every type for the great armies now growing to full strength in Great Britain and the Middle East."

**SEEKS AID OF PEOPLE**

B. C. Bracewell, City Commissioner. Speaks to Rotary Club on Civic Work—Man of Experience

"Fortunate is the community where the business element is welded into a unit desirous of the welfare of the community rather than gratifying its own selfish purposes." That was one of the interesting statements made by B. C. Bracewell, Prince Rupert's new city commissioner, who addressed the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday afternoon at its regular luncheon, Dr. Neal Carter presiding.

Mr. Bracewell suggested that men broad enough to do this would be successful in business, at the same time exerting a far reaching influence for community progress. A municipality had not reached its greatest use which had not developed the best possible civic consciousness.

In considering municipal affairs the question to ask was whether the municipality or personal interests were to benefit. A really successful municipality would return in value to its citizens more worth than they individually could obtain themselves by expending an equivalent amount to what they paid in taxes.

Mr. Bracewell did not favor the single tax. He said it might be all right in the early stages of development of a municipality. Land as land did not need policing. Neither did it need fire protection or education. Education, he suggested, certainly should not be charged against the land.

Roughly, the activities of a municipality resolved themselves into formulation of policies and supervision on the one hand and executive and administrative activity on the other. Normally the former was looked after by an elected body, but no council functioned without reference to public opinion and no commissioner could give effective service unless he had public opinion behind him.

Mr. Bracewell suggested that an organization composed of representatives of various public or semi-public bodies might be an influence in formulating policies in keeping with the best interests of the community. In that matter he asked for the help of the people of Prince Rupert in order that he might carry out his work successfully.

The speaker said he was a great believer in the ballot as one of the greatest watch dogs ever invented. Yet popular decisions often were a curse to real progress.

**Sketches Career**  
Mr. Bracewell gave a very brief sketch of his own official life. He said he did this with reluctance but he thought it due the people here to have some idea of his experience. He joined the provincial service on October 1, 1938, but, prior to that, he had had 28 years of municipal experience in British Columbia. For 25 years he was municipal clerk at Penticton and, prior to that, was connected with the municipality at South Vancouver. In answer to a question, he said the city of Penticton was in first class condition financially with \$100,000 surplus in its sinking fund. Yet for several years during the depression the municipality had been unable to keep up its sinking fund payments.

1 teaspoon salt.  
½ teaspoon prepared sauce.  
½ teaspoon prepared mustard.  
1½ cups soft bread crumbs.  
1 cup ham, finely chopped.  
Combine the salt, sauce and prepared mustard with the chopped eggs. Heat the cream of mushroom soup and add the chopped eggs (with seasonings), soft bread crumbs and chopped ham. Heat and cook 4-5 minutes. Chill for 2-3 hours. Mold into croquettes.

Fine crumbs.  
1 egg, slightly beaten.

**Death of British Golfer Recalls Great Career On the Links**

LONDON, January 31 (C P) — The Empire lost one of its greatest golfers when John Ball died. Ball, whose record of winning eight British amateur titles stands unchallenged, was a born golfer.

He made his first appearance in an open championship while still in his teens and started the golfing world by finishing sixth, eight strokes behind the winner. He won both the British open and amateur in 1890, a feat not equalled until R. T. (Bobby) Jones did it 10 years ago.

Ball won 99 matches in amateur championships and his final appearance in championship play came in 1927 when he was beaten in the second round after drawing a bye in the first.

### Sport Briefs

Daniel E. O'Sullivan, 82, is relinquishing active management of Churchill Downs, the rambling old racing plant that has been home to the Kentucky Derby 65 years. And with him—even though "Colonel" Dan isn't going to leave the desk where he has worked for years in a simple, grey-walled office under the Downs stands—is going a strange era in the colorful history of the famous track. It has been an era of horse-racing publicity written in Colonel Dan's flowing lyrical prose, and sometimes in poetry. The colonel remarked: "Any Irishman who couldn't write poetry about a pretty girl or a thoroughbred horse ought to be chloroformed." It has been an era, too, of bigger purses, bigger stands, bigger crowds, bigger bets, bigger hot dogs—everything bigger, louder, faster, sleeker. It brought the mint julep at a dollar a throw and take the cup home as a souvenir; an era that brought a private "Millionaire's Room" in the Downs clubhouse and 50-cent bleachers on the backstretch.

Colonel Dan, now special assistant to Matt Winn, Downs boss, was resident manager of the Downs for nearly 20 years. He had three careers before he went to work for Winn, then and now head of Churchill Downs and affiliated tracks. He had been a newspaper editor, a lawyer, a politician-public officer. He had a reputation as a hard-hitter with a pen. And when Winn hired him, it was to write of the Derby. Colonel Dan sang of the Derby in poems, in letters, in slick-paper brochures. But for what the Derby has become, Dan tips his hat to Winn. He takes no credit for the public recognition that helped boost the race's added worth from \$30,000 in 1920 to \$50,000 in 1921 and on up to \$75,000 last year. The new era at the Downs has brought a former sports writer as publicity man and appointment of a younger man as resident manager. The new era has come, but Colonel Dan hasn't gone. He's still at the little brown desk.

**STOPPING OF WORK**

B.C. Government Found Many Obstacles in Way of Adoption of Sirois Report

VICTORIA, Jan. 31—In curtailing provincial autonomy, Plan One of the Rowell-Sirois Report would prevent road building and necessary public works in British Columbia, forestall any help to municipalities, make it difficult to conserve natural resources, reduce educational and social standards and require the province to make a "disproportionate sacrifice" for the good of Canada.

These are the claims which the B. C. government made in a brief which it submitted to Hon. J. L. Isley, national finance minister, after the collapse of the Dominion-provincial conference.

In it the government argues that supposed benefits to the province in the financial transfers are based in false premises, that actually B. C. would suffer in a monetary way and it contends that in many instances the Rowell-Sirois commission did not give proper study to financial and statistical bases involved in its findings.

The brief said that, since the Sirois plan proposed substantial changes in the Confederation arrangement, it was considered prudent to distinguish between permanent and temporary measures that might be introduced in the light of world conditions.

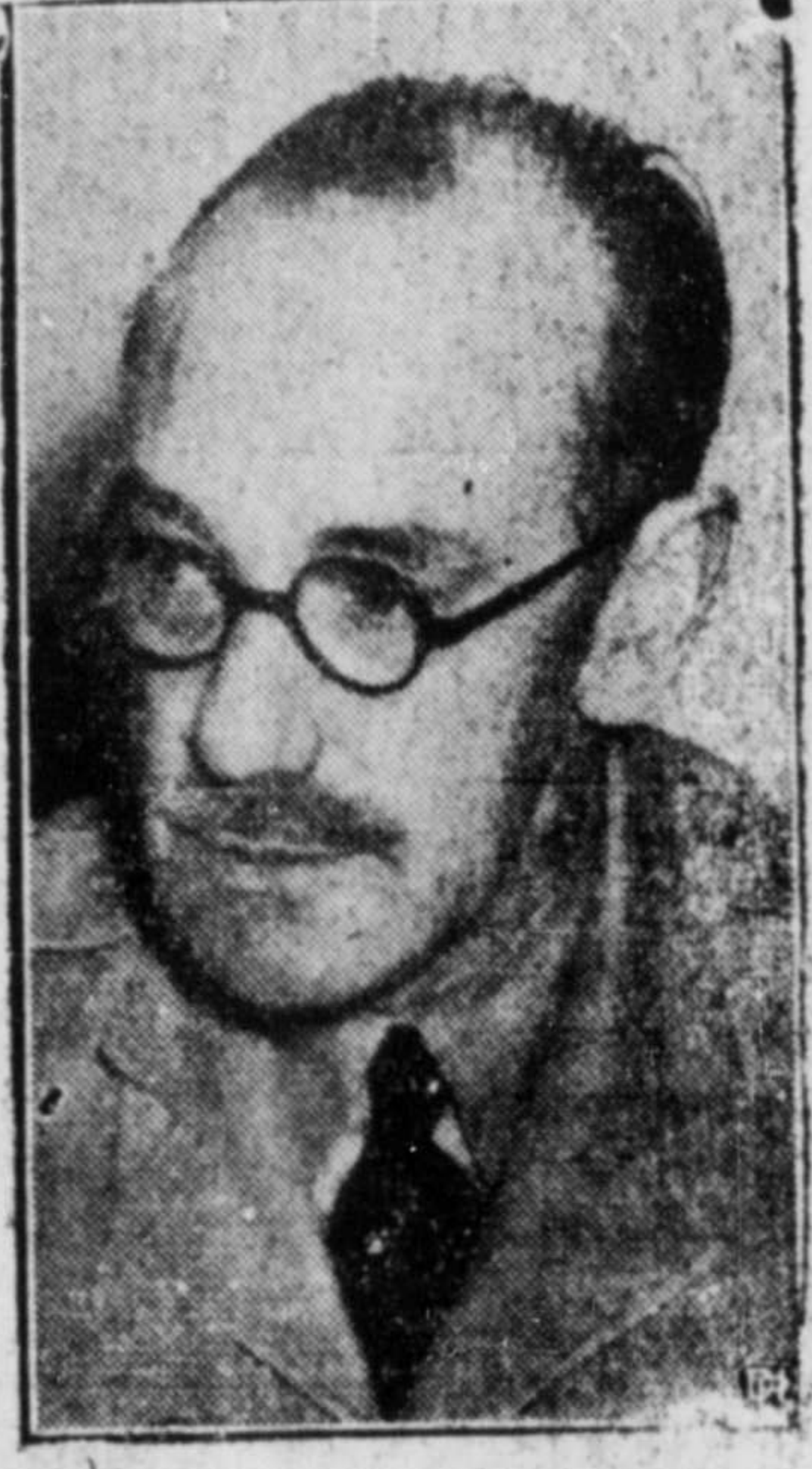
"There is no disposition on the part of the government of British Columbia to shirk the responsibilities which fall upon the province under the federal system," it states. "These responsibilities are conceived to be primarily the wise and efficient performances of the duties assigned to the province under the constitution. It is the opinion of the government that the most direct and significant contribution this province can make towards strengthening the Canadian Confederation is to perform these functions adequately."

**WOULD GET INTO FIGHT**

Former Ambassador to Germany Would Declare War—Glass Would "Shoot Hell" Out of Nazis

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 31.—Appearing yesterday before the Senate foreign relation committee in its hearing on the "lease-lend" aid to Britain bill, James W. Gerard, who was United States ambassador to Germany when this country entered the First Great War, said that nothing could be hoped for out of a "negotiated peace" and he would prefer an immediate declaration of war by the United States. This was a lightning war, declared Gerard, and lightning action was required to meet it. The Axis powers were required to meet it. The Axis powers were required deeper and deeper into Latin America, declared Gerard, and, if Hitler should succeed in conquering England, Germany and Italy would seize Mexico and menace the United States. Hitler's aim was, undoubtedly, world conquest.

Senator Carter Glass, Democrat, Virginia, who is all out for Great Britain, favored using United States naval vessels to convoy shipments to Great Britain. He would send United States ships everywhere that international law permitted and "would shoot hell out of anybody who interferes with them."

Within the next ten days or so Wendell Willkie and Alfred M. Landon will both testify before the committee.

The vote of the House of Representatives foreign relations yesterday in favorably reporting the bill was 17 to 8.

Having been approved by the committee, the bill now goes before the House for debate and passage. The Senate foreign relations committee is now holding its hearings and there will be the same procedure of reporting to the Senate. If the bill is passed by both chambers it will go up to the President for signature.
