War News

GERMAN PORTS IN FLAMES

LONDON—Flames beyond control were left by the Royal Air Force in the port of Bremen and its shipyards during the night, the air ministry news service announced today. At Vegesack, another coastal point shipyards adapted to U-boat construction were bombed with direct hits resulting in large fires. Numerous other points were bombed with loss of twelve planes. This morning's offensive started early again.

PRISON SHIP TAKEN

LONDON—The German vessel Alstertor, a supply and prison ship for a Nazi raider has been intercepted and the survivors of the sunken British merchantmen Rabaul and Trafalgar rescued, the Admiralty announced.

GENERAL GAMELIN ESCAPED

NEW YORK—The German radio announced in a Vichy despatch today that General Marie-Gustave Gamelin, former generalissimo of the allied forces, had escaped prison in France and that two persons are under arrest on suspicion of aiding in the getaway. Gamelin had been under arrest since last September with former Premiers Deladier and Reynaud Blum under trial for responsibility for the French declaration of war and the collapse of France.

VICHY—Rumors circulated in the past two days that General Gamelin had escaped his place of confinement in France were denied tonight by the Vichy government.

MARCHING ACROSS FINLAND

LONDON—German troops from Norway are marching across Northern Finland to attack the Soviet Arctic port of Murmansk, Reuters reported today in a despatch from Stockholm.

LONDON, June 28.—Soviet troops continued to fall back along the Sialulal-Wilno-Baranowice front before the German advance, halting only for intermediate battles on their way to new defence positions, the Soviet information bureau announced today.

Red Artillery and Tanks Have Routed Most Threatening Of German Columns Near Minsk

Germans Not Yet Reporting Details of Their Operations On Russian Border But Will Tell it All Tomorrow

MOSCOW—Red Army tanks and artillery in a joint counter-assault have routed the most threatening of all German armed columns that were shoved into buffer zone of occupied territory along the old Russian frontier, it was announced officially today. The German column was pointed toward Minsk on the road to Moscow, when the Russians, by their own account, turned the full fury of their military power on it.

(Axis sources at Istanbul claimed the Germans had taken Minsk but this lacks confirmation.)

BERLIN—Hitler's field headquarters said today "our big successes in the western theatre of the war will be made known by special announcement in the course of tomorrow. The Nazis continue to claim spectacular successes against the Russians but gave no detail.

Pay Visit To Canada

Hon. Peter Fraser, Premier of New Zealand Government Expected Soon

OTTAWA, June 28.—It was announced here today that Hon. Peter Fraser, head of the New Zealand government plans to visit Canada as soon as his duties in England allow him to leave. Most of the members of his government were members of the famous labor government of that country.

Waterfront Whiffs

Halibut Landings Still Lagging Behind Last Year—Problem of Keeping Boats Busy After Closing—Salt Lakes Attraction to Swimmers

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1941 season up to yesterday totalled 7,631,000 pounds as compared with 8,846,519 pounds at a corresponding date last year. The American landings for this year have reached an aggregate of 4,383,900 pounds compared with 5,193,600 pounds in 1940 while the Canadian total is 3,247,100 pounds as compared with 3,658,919 pounds last year. The week's total of halibut landings at Prince Rupert is 853,900 pounds consisting of 436,400 pounds of American and 417,500 pounds of Canadian fish. The highest price of the week for American fish has been 11.2c and 9.2c which was paid the Pierce for 14,000 pounds. The lowest American price was 10.7c and 9.2c which was paid to the Helligland for 40,000 pounds. The top price of the week for Canadian fish was 12.3c and 9.2c paid the Rio Rita for 7,500 pounds while the low Canadian bid was 10c and 8c received by the T.Y. for 1,500 pounds.

Many people have asked if it would not be possible to arrange for some kind of a ferry boat on Sundays and holidays as far as the Salt Lakes. The spot is by far the most beautiful in the neighborhood. The accommodation for swimmers the best there is anywhere this far north and the water the warmest on the coast. Years ago there was a good ferry service to the lakes and thousands of people enjoyed the swimming. With the opening of the highway the interest fell off but now a change is taking place. People are veering back to the place where the swimming is good. Possibly by next season a ferry service may be established.

What will the boys do when the halibut season is over? They cannot very well make a living for the year in four months. The game is fairly profitable while it is going but it is not going long enough. So what? Some of the boats will go out for black cod, some may pack salmon, some will do other kinds of off-shore work and a few of the more daring of the small boats may make trips to the westward and bring in a few summer trips of halibut before the weather gets bad. In a fairly busy time like this its wonderful how many boats can be employed remuneratively if the owners show some ingenuity.

Reports from the salmon fishing grounds show that so far this year 1,051 cases of sockeye salmon have been packed; 691 cases of spring; 22 cases of steelheads; 12,568 cases of bluebacks, 3,298 cases of cohoes, no pinks or chums. This report covers the whole British Columbia coast from Washington to Alaska.
